The Wheeler High School Band attended the District 1 UIL Marching Contest Saturday in Borger. 12 class A schools performed before a crowd of about 700 in what was to be one of the best contests for the Class A schools in some time. Four schools received Division I's, Five received Division II's, and three received Division III's. Nazareth, Sunray, Wheeler and White Deer were the recipients of these superior marks.

Upon completion of the Class A competition, two of the four Division I bands were selected to attend the Region A Marching Contest in Wichita Falls on October 29. Wheeler and Nazareth were selected to represent District I at this event. Two bands from this contest will represent Region A at the State Marching Band Contest to be held in Austin on November 7th.



## GRUVER HOLDS OFF WHEELER

With 3:36 remaining in the game, the Wheeler Mustangs' hopes of a come-from-behind victory over the Gruver Greyhounds were put to rest once and for all.

The Mustangs had launched a late fourth-period drive that moved them from their own nine-yard line to the Gruver 19 before a Greyhound defensive stand stopped them cold at the 22.

Gruver took over, gained two first downs and ran out the clock to secure a 14-10 win over Wheeler before a capacity homecoming crowd here Friday night.

"They did about what we thought they'd do," Wheeler coach Ronnie Karcher said. "they came out and executed their offense well. We'd hold them for the first couple of downs and then break down on third down."

As the score indicates, it was a game that could have gone either way. Gruver, which rolled up 249 total yards on offense, gained only nine yards more than the Mustangs overall.

Wheeler quarterback Jason Wood completed three passes for 78 yards, one of them a 45-yard TD offering to Tommy Velasquez on the first drive of the second half. The Mustangs found 162 yards by ground.

Shane Guest led all rushers with 119 yards on 18 carries.

Of Gruver's 46 rushing plays, running back Ramon Ortega handled the ball 70 percent of the time (32 carries) for 111 yards and one touchdown. Greyhound quarterback Brent Wagner managed only 7 of 14 completions for 62 yards through the air.

Ortega was an essential asset in the Gruver victory. Even when he was met at the line of scrimmage by

### From The Minister's Desk:

On July 29, 1969, Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the surface of the moon. As millions of people watched this historic event on television, a television commentator excitedly proclaimed: "This is the greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world."

While this statement is understandable, it is not correct. The "—greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world—" is not the ascent of man to the moon, but is the descent of deity to the earth. This is a visited planet! It is a planet that has been visited by God in the person of Jesus Christ.

But what was the purpose of this visit? There are at least three words that can explain the purpose of this visit. These three words are:—

### Revelation

When Jesus came to this earth, he was the manifestation of God in the flesh. Jesus perfectly and completely revealed God to man. The Apostle Paul emphatically affirmed that in Jesus "—all the fulness of Deity—dwelled—in bodily form—" (Colossians 2:9)

The Apostle John recorded a great truth when he wrote: "—God is love—" (I John 5:8) But this great truth would be a simple abstraction if Jesus had not become flesh and lived among men. (John 1:4) His fleshly life, which is recorded in the New Testament, provides a full and precise portrait of God and His love for man.

This planet has been visited by the Son of God. And this visit was a revelation of God and His nature.

### Reconciliation

When Jesus came to this world, God and man were estranged by sin, needing reconciliation. And this reconciliation was provided by the death of Jesus. The Apostle

Paul wrote: "—If while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son—" (Romans 5:10)

The teachings of the New Testament are that the benefits of Jesus' death are appropriated when penitent man is baptized into Jesus' death. (Romans 6:3-4) Through this act of faith, the demands of God's justice are met and the sins of man are graciously pardoned which allows man and God to be reconciled.

This planet has been visited by the son of God. And with this visit, "—God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself—" (II Corinthians 5:19)

### Representation

Although Christians are reconciled to God by the blood of Jesus, they still are in need of daily representation before God. And this representation has been provided by a mediator, "—the man Christ Jesus—" (I Timothy 2:5)

The earthly life "—of the man Christ Jesus—" was characterized by the common experiences of life. Because of these experiences, He can ably represent Christians before God's "—throne of grace—" (Hebrews 4:15-16) The question—Does God understand?—has been decisively answered by the representation of "—the man Christ Jesus—".

The moon has been visited by man. And the earth has been visited by God. This visit is the greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world.

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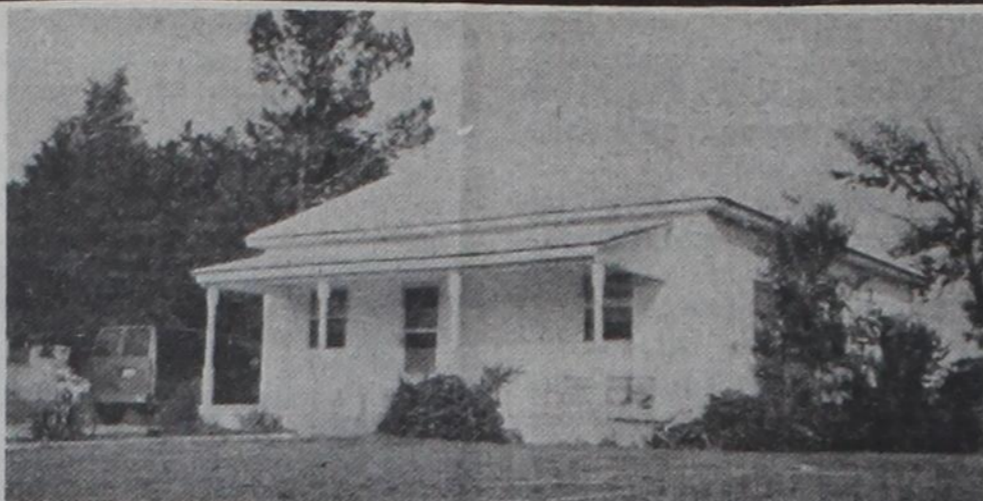
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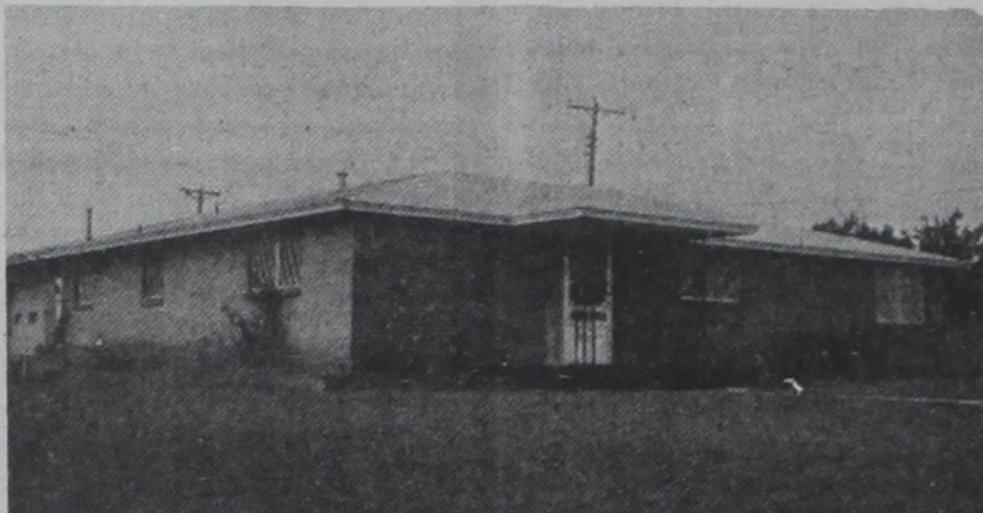

- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup milk

2 1/2 cups shredded cooking apples  
Vanilla ice cream (optional)

Combine first 4 ingredients in a saucepan; stir well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar dissolves; stir in butter. Set aside.  
Combine flour, baking powder, and salt; cut shortening into flour mixture with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add milk, stirring just until dry ingredients are moistened. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface, and knead lightly 4 or 5 times.



**PECAN CROP:** The Wheeler County Pecan Crop looks promising this year. Leona Coates offers these examples of the 1987 crop and a cluster from a tree in their orchard. The three pecans (bottom right) show the pecans attached to the tip of a branch and in their outer hull. Some people are not aware that a pecan has an outer hull which cracks apart when the nut matures. The hull has to be removed in some instances, which explains why Frank's and Leona's finger tips get black the latter months of the year. The pecans measure up to 2" from point to point.

## ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

### THE MATHEMATICS CURRICULUM IS PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE

In a rapidly advancing technological society, mathematics plays a very important role. A strong mathematical base is becoming increasingly necessary as our nation competes against other nations. Therefore, in order to promote the importance of mathematics, we need to begin by understanding the structure and purpose of the K-12 mathematics curriculum.

The purpose of the mathematics curriculum is to provide students with the appropriate knowledge that will prepare them for their future, as well as keep the doors open to many career opportunities in this technological world.

The mathematics curriculum offers students the opportunity to gain expertise in mathematics through a series of courses beginning in kindergarten and continuing through 12th grade. The curriculum is sequential in nature, meaning that a student must take one course before taking another.

The mathematics curriculum is made up of objectives that are cycled from year to year. During the first year an objective is introduced, while during the following years that same objective will be maintained and reviewed.

The mathematics curriculum is also a comprehensive curriculum in which students progress from concrete thinking skills into skills of abstract thinking. Students are continually taught basic skills and then asked to apply these skills to problem situations. This occurs with in a course as well as from year to year. For example, a student is initially taught place-value of digits based on their position-through the use of blocks or other objects, but later the students may be asked to apply his or her knowledge of value when working with estimation.

Some may tend to think that mathematics is a curriculum that never changes, but that is not true. Important changes are presently being considered nationally for the K-12 mathematics curriculum. Due to technological advancements and the rapid growth of knowledge, the mathematics curriculum is being studied nationwide to determine the appropriate curriculum content for students in kindergarten through 12th grade. Paper-and-pencil computation in the curriculum also is being evaluated to determine its level of practicality as a necessary skill of the future.

While paper and pencil have been the most commonly used tools in the

mathematics classroom, calculators and computers are rapidly becoming common tools as well. Calculators and computers allow teachers to expand the curriculum being taught. Teachers also have time to develop further the students' logical and abstract thinking skills, as well as their estimation and problem-solving skills that they will use throughout their adult lives. People spend the majority of their adult lives using calculators, making estimations, and solving problems—yet only a small percentage of their time is spent actually calculating by pencil and paper.

The mathematics curriculum is preparing students for their future. The amount and type of mathematics courses that students take during

their schooling experience will ultimately determine the type of mathematical problems that they can deal with in a career. If a student is exposed to algebra, geometry, and other upper-level mathematics courses, he or she will be able to qualify for more jobs than the student who has only a basic skills background.

Mathematics not only teaches skills, but also develops students' minds to think logically and abstractly as we must do as adults. Students should be encouraged to expose themselves to as much mathematics as possible. Consequently, parents and teachers must work together to stress the importance of mathematics and to develop a positive attitude among students about mathematics.

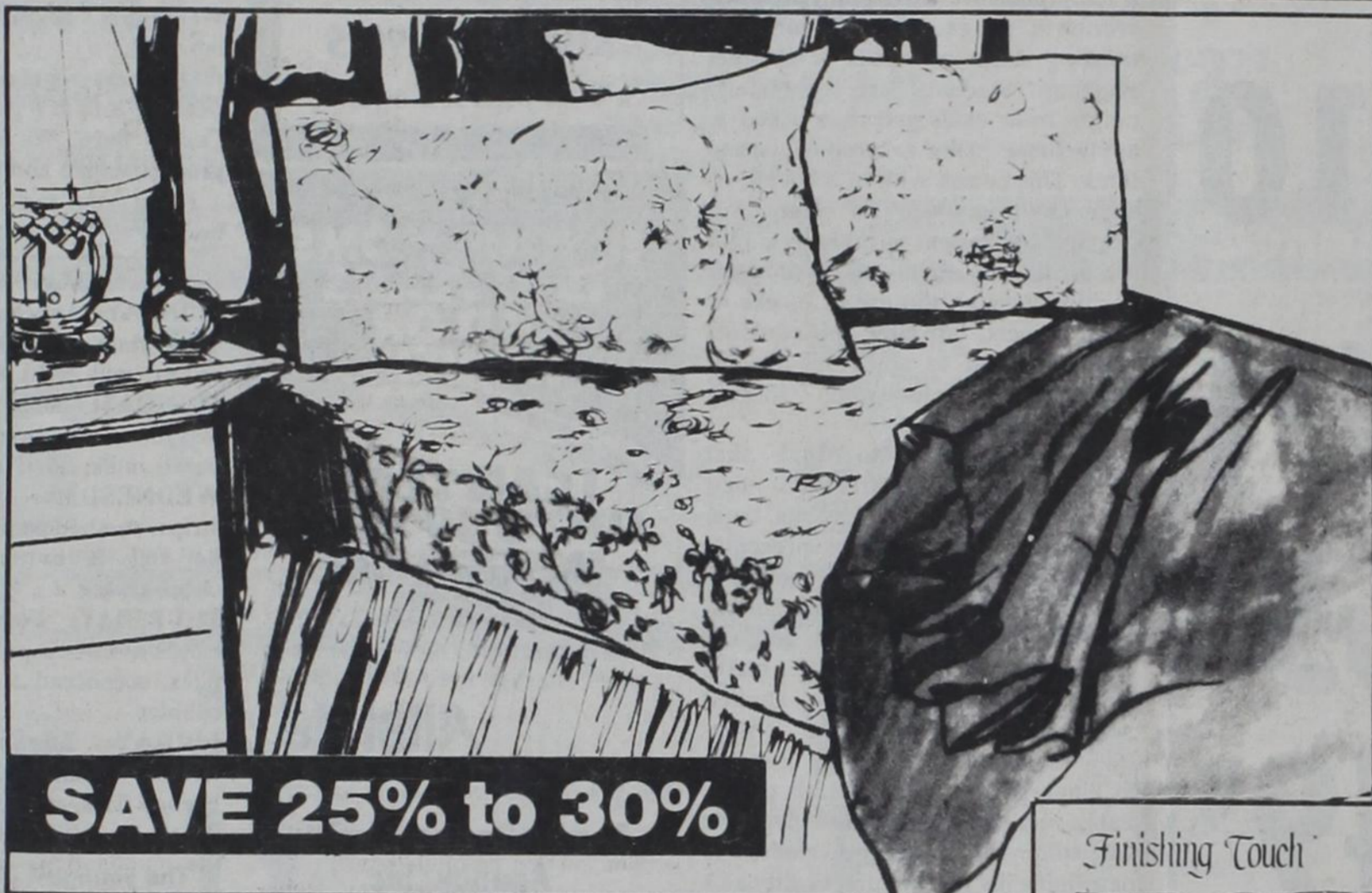

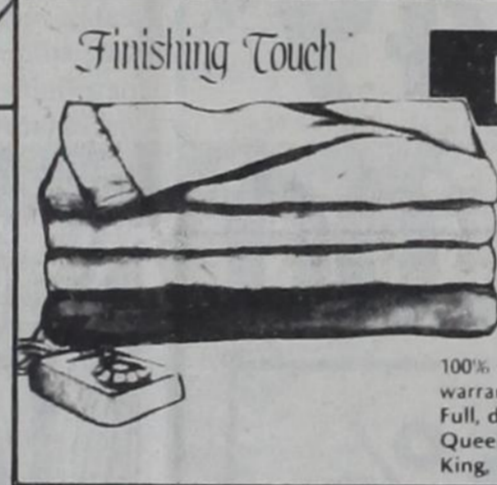

Wheeler defenders, he usually managed an extra three yards after the initial contact.

"Ortega's the kind of back that you have to break down and come at him," Karcher said. "We were caught standing up too often."

Things began well enough for the Mustangs. They allowed the Greyhounds only 14 yards on the first possession of the game, forcing Gruver to punt and giving Wheeler good field position on their own 46.

Michael Kenney scrambled for seven yards on Wheeler's first play from scrimmage. On second down, Shane Guest broke for a 32-yard run that would have scored except for a touchdown-saving tackle at the 15 by Gruver's Russ Royval.

Wheeler's next three plays moved the ball to the ten-yard line and brought up fourth-and-five. The Mustangs settled for a 26-yard Sammy Zepeda field goal to take a 3-0 lead with 6:21 left in the first quarter.

On the next series, Gruver struck back with a 12-play, 66-yard drive fueled by steady yardage option plays involving Wagner and Ortega. On the final play of the drive, Wagner pitched to Ortega on the 20-yard line and the Greyhound running back dashed in for the score.

## FmHA Activates New Farm Loan Program

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming. J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said today.

Under the new program, FmHA will try to find person in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county, Futch said.

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as 1 percent in some New England and midwestern states to highs of 68 percent in Hawaii, 57 percent in New Mexico, and somewhat lower percentages in southeastern states. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

Person who think they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office serving their area, Futch said.
