Farm Short Course Is Dispensed With

Annual College Station Meet Cancelled Through Fear of Paralysis Spread

Word received here Wednesday morning announcing cancellation of this year's Farmer Short Course at A. & M. college brought keen disappoinment to a score or two of county farm club members who had been busy during recent weeks in Baptist Revival In preparation for the annual event.

Fearing possible spread of infantile paralysis, which is prevalent in portions of the state, Dr. J. W. Cox, Rev. McKenzie, District Missionary, state health officer, advised directors of the Short Course program to dispense with the gathering this year. Acting upon the health officer's advice, cancellation was immediately

A telegram to Jake Tarter, county agent, and Miss Dalton Burleson, home demonstration agent, from H. H. Williamson, chief of Texas Extension service, read as follows:

 "Farmers Short Course and agents meeting cancelled because of infantile paralysis. This action follows recommendation of the state health department that it is not advisable to bring crowds of young people together. No cases at College Station, but scattered over state. Advise press and local people."

Wheeler county, in previous years, has been one of the outstanding subdivisions of the Panhandle to send delegations to Short Course. Some 456,000 pounds of dry mixture, half and half bran and cottonseed hulls was used. This, when properly moistened doubled in weight to 912,000 pounds. Ten thousand pounds of surplus bran was obtained from Hall county, 12,000 pounds from Childress and 6,000 pounds from Roberts

All the cottonseed hulls used in Wheeler county were obtained through the Shamrock Cotton Oil Co., says Tarter, who declares the firm co-operated heartily in the control campaign.

CENTER FARMER BRINGS IN OPEN COTTON BOLLS

Setting a record for this year and probably for several seasons, past and future, was an exhibit shown here Tuesday by T. G. Richardson of Center community, who brought in two open and apparently fully matured cotton bolls from his farm about 11 miles southeast of Wheeler. Richardson stated these bolls were from a six-acre tract of Half and Half, planted fairly early. He declares they reached maturity through normal development, with no unusual conditions to hasten the process, so far as he knows. First blooms were found July 2 on the tract now yielding grown staple. The bolls are of medium size.

Richardson also has a 10-acre field of maize, practically mature, which he intends to head within the next few days, principally to save it from grasshopper depredations. The insects have been eating the heads of






