



B-2 And C-2 Gasoline Rations Invalid June 1

Persons holding B-2 and C-2 ra- charge. tions which will not expire until after June 1 must present the coupons to their Ration Boards before June 1 in exchange for valid coupons of equal value.

District officials announce that gasoline dealers have until June 10 their ration evidence to ration banks by June 20.

These old-type B and C rations without serial numbers were invalidated as a measure to cut down black market operations, officials explained. Serially-numbered coupons give a permanent identity to each coupon, and are more difficult to counterfeit than the old type.

At the same time it was pointed out that serial numbering does not make endorsement of coupons any less necessary.
