Lee was a Whig loyal to the Union, and uped that the issues of the day might be ettled amicably. He, however, like many ien of his time, believed that his first duty ras to his state-Virginia. Although he had ready freed his slaves when the war began e felt it necessary to resign from the Army in April 20, 1861 and remain loyal to his state. Shortly thereafter, Virginia made him commander of the Old Dominion forces.

The record of his military achievements in that war is not needed here. His abilities were recognized on both sides long before the end, when Lee surrendered to General Grant at Appelmattex Court House, on April 9th, 1865.
