About 100,000 acres of Wheeler county land should be terraced to save water and conserve soil, chairman Shaffer of the County Agricultural Conservation Committee states.

Program. This assistance to help farmers pay part of the costs of terracing is in recognition of the extensive need and the expense of construction. Terracing is a farming measure that can be carried out during the fall and interested farmers can obtain necessary information from the county office

in Wheeler. Terraces are broad ridges of earth constructed along the contour of the land. They intercept run-off water, slow its speed, and channel it along the ridges. By slowing the water, terraces permit the land to absorb more moisture, storing it for future crop use. The ridges of terraces carry the excess water off the slope at a rate of speed that will not cause channel erosion. By controlling this excess run-off, the terraces prevent gullies and ditches from being cut through the field.

Since 1936 when the ACP started, about 14,000 acres of land in Wheeler county have been terrace ed under the program. Last year 11 farmers terraced 1,000 acres




