## COUNTY BOYS WIN ON SWINE

Bobby Johnson and Regie Barr of the Wheeler 4-H Club won cash awards of \$40.00 and \$25.00 on their Swine Demonstrations sponsored by the Sears and Roebuck Foundation Program.

Bobby's Sear gilts farrowed 13 pigs and raised 11 that weighed 332-lbs. at 56 days of age; this was the third heaviest litter in this Panhandle district. Bobby receives \$40.00 from the Sears Foundation Program for his good work. In the boar demonstration contest Regie Barr receives \$25.00 for winning second. This contest was based on the management and records and breeding fees collected on the boar. Regie collected \$130.00 in prize money and breeding fees on his boar other than the above prize.

The Sears & Roebuck Company sponsors a Nation Wide Cattle and Swine 4-H Club Program that has done much for the improvement in quality of our livestock.

In Wheeler County Sears sponsors a Duroc swine program. Each year 8 gilts and one boar are given to club members. The boys feed and care for the gilts and when the gilts farrow their first litter, the boys have to give the best gilt back to the program to be distributed to another club member. The boy receiving the boar cares for him and furnishes a free breeding service for the gilts in the program.

To receive a pig under the program the club member must write an essay and turn it in to the County Agent's office where a committee is selected to decide which member get pigs. These pigs are distributed each spring so any club member interested should make plans to have their essay in the County Agent's office by April 1st, 1951.

## 4-H Club Council is Reorganized At Camp

The Wheeler County 4-H Clubs reorganized the 4-H club council at the county encampment July 14. Officers elected are Joe Van Zandt, Mobeetie, president, Jamie Clark, Wheeler, vice president, and Augusta Coleman, Mobeetie, secretary-treasurer.

Each club in the county will have two members on the council. Members chosen by members of the club present at the encampment are Joe Van Zandt and Tommy White, Mobeetie; Jerry Hays and Marjorie Peterman, Briscoe; Janice Jacob and Jamie Clark, Wheeler; Jimmie Harris and Glenda Richardson, Kelton; and Raymond Schlagel, Shamrock. Other clubs will elect their members in the near future. The 4-H club council serves as a planning group to take care of all county wide 4-H club activities. The council at their first meeting expressed their desire for more participation of all 4-H clubs in county wide activities.

## SCS TO CONDUCT IDENTIFICATION TOUR MONDAY

The Soil Conservation Service working through the local work unit will conduct a tour of Wheeler County Monday, July 24 beginning at 10:00 a. m. which will be for the purpose of helping agricultural instructors of the county to correctly identify the many types of grasses which are to be bound in the county.

John Carter, local work unit conservationist, announced that the tour would start from the west side of the Wheeler County Court House Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock and the group will work the west side of the county in the morning and the east side in the afternoon.

Those who will take part in the tour include groups from the Soil Conservation Service, the Extension Service, The high school agriculture departments and the Wheeler County Vocational School.

The Soil Conservation Service group will include: John Carter, conservationist; Jack Groat, soils scientist; Lloyd Courtright, engineering aide; Delma L. Faught, conservationist aide; and Jack Parsons, range conservationist.

The Extension Service group will include Ralph "Buck" Wheat, county agricultural agent; and Robert Ledbetter, assistant county agricultural agent.

Those representing the high school agriculture departments will be Howard C. Weatherby of Shamrock; Coleman Walton of Mobeetie; and Ike Sewell of Wheeler.

The Wheeler County Vocational School will be represented by George S. Gandy, coordinator; Sam Thomas of Mobeetie; Fred S. Farmer of Shamrock; John R. Peterson of Allison; W. C. Collins of Kelton; Frank Wofford of Wheeler; Owen B. Harvey of Shamrock; and Albert S. Thomas of Wheeler.

### ELECTION PARTY

There will be an election party at the Wheeler County Court House Saturday night beginning as soon after 7:00 o'clock as the first results are received. Results from the various boxes in the county will be posted on a large board on the west steps of the court house as quickly as they are reported. A. B. Crump, democratic chairman, is making plans to have the board properly lighted this year so that every one will be able to see the results easily.

The Court of Civil Appeals have visited Wheeler at one time or another during the course of the campaign.

There are 15 voting boxes in the county, and in each instance, the voting will be held at the accustomed place. There are public buildings in which the election is held in all communities except McBee in which box voting will be conducted at the Leonard Rathjen home. A. B. Crump, county democratic chairman pointed out.

Democratic Executive Committee Chairman A. B. Crump urges that everyone vote as early in the day Saturday as they possibly can so that election judges can keep up with the tallying and be through as soon after the polls close at 7:00 o'clock as possible. All judges are asked to please report to the Chairman at the courthouse in Wheeler as soon as they have their results tabulated.

**VOLUNTARY MOBILIZATION IS NOT ADEQUATE**

Labor union leaders have informed W. Stuart Symington, chairman of the National

Security Resources Board, that they are opposed to compulsory methods of mobilizing the country's resources in case of war. Their position is understandable. All Americans have a congenital aversion to any form of compulsion, and it is to be hoped that this always will be the case. It indicates we appreciate our personal liberties and will resist all unwarranted efforts to curtail them. At the same time, it must be recognized that some compulsion is necessary if all of the nation's resources are to be mobilized quickly and effectively for war.

It would be nice indeed if the government could meet all of its needs in wartime through voluntary action of the citizenship. But experience has shown that this is not a practical hope. A majority of the American people undoubtedly would be willing to cooperate fully to help their government in any reasonable wartime undertaking. But there is a large majority that would not cooperate on a voluntary basis. If this minority were permitted to have its selfish way it would throw an additional load of responsibility on those who were doing their part. To avoid this, some government controls are inevitable in wartime.

One type of manpower control already is in operation—the Selective Service system, under which young men who meet certain age and physical qualifications are drafted for service with the armed forces. The United States has been drafting men for military service so long it now is taken as a matter of course. But if the government can draft men for military service, is there any logical argument against drafting other men for industrial and other duty to assure those in the armed forces of an adequate supply of food, weapons and ammunition? Certainly not.

Elder Statesman Bernard Baruch probably expressed the sentiment of many thinking Americans in his recent comment on extension of the selective service act. "To me," he said, "there is something immoral in offering human sacrifice on the altar of patriotism and interfering with the lives of our youth without first setting up complete plans for the mobilization of industry, of capital, of materials, of transportation, of profit, of prices, of wages, and the other elements necessary to make us ready."

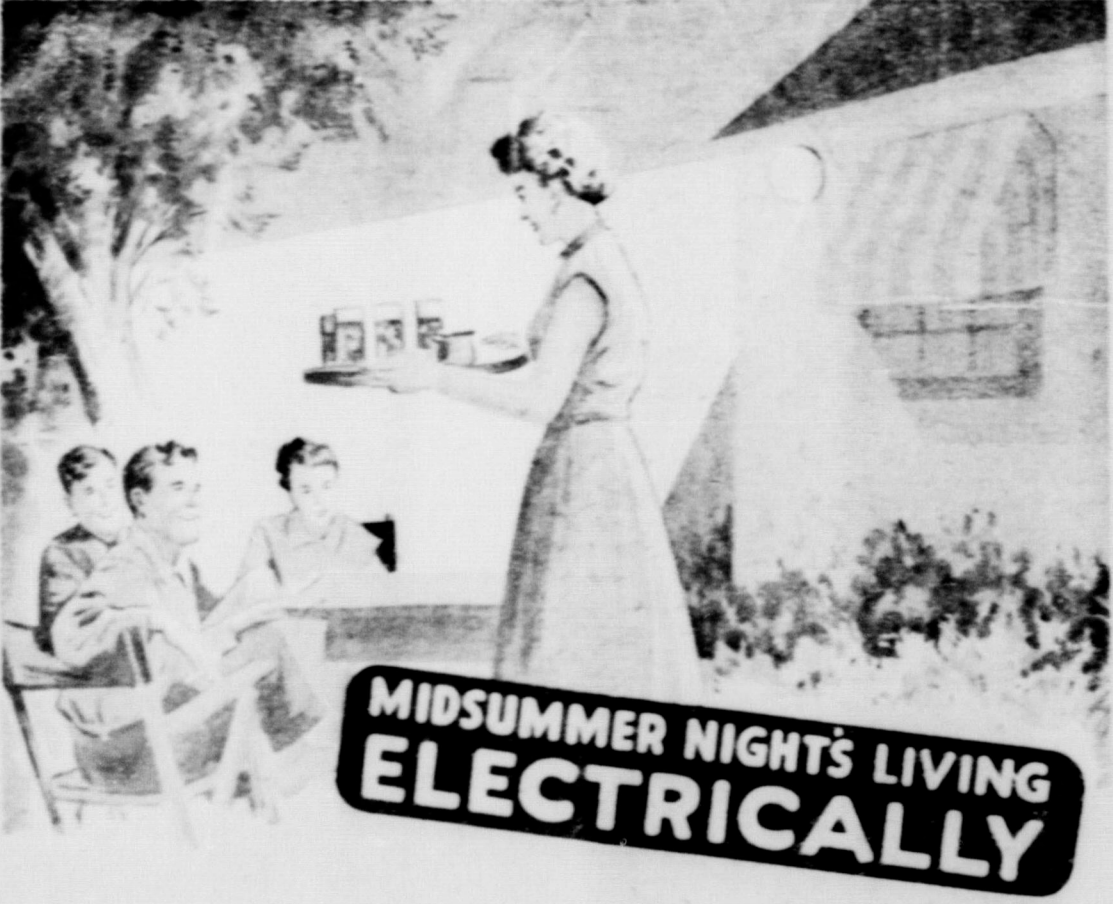

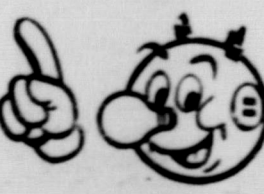

## Bascom Giles Will Report To People Thursday Night

State Land Commissioner Bas-  
com Giles will report to Texans  
upon the development of the state  
public school and university lands  
Thursday at 7:15 p. m. His ad-  
dress will be broadcast over a  
special network of 22 stations.

Giles, under whose direction  
two school funds have passed the  
staggering total of \$250,000,000,  
seeks re-election to the office he  
has held since 1938.

Giles' radio report will also dis-  
cuss the "tragedy of the tide-  
lands", the fight by Texans to re-  
tain possession of oil-laden sub-  
merged lands adjacent to the Tex-  
as coast. Giles, first state official  
to urge Texas action to hold these  
valuable properties, has been in  
Washington often pleading the  
cause of the Lone Star State.

In his radio address Commis-  
sioner Giles will also report on the  
development of the \$25,000,000  
Veterans' Land Program, which he

originated and sponsored, and will  
discuss his plan to expand the pre-  
sent program.

One of the few state elected  
officials to "come up from the  
ranks", Giles has spent 30 years  
in the General Land Office. In  
1938 he made his first political  
campaign, winning over a strong  
field in a stunning upset and has  
never had serious opposition since.  
Two years ago he won easily over  
three opponents without a runoff.

Father of two sons and of two  
young grandchildren, Giles comes  
of a respected and venerable Tex-  
as family. His family has owned  
the same farm in Travis County  
since 1850. His great grandfather  
served with General Rusk against  
the Cherokee Indians and his  
grandfather, Leonidas Baton Giles,  
was historian of Terry's Texas  
Rangers. His wife is the former  
Effie Dean Rogan.

In private life Giles is a sports  
lover, active in civic and fraternal  
organizations and is a "hobbyist  
historian". Material compiled un-  
der his direction was written into  
a history of the Texas domain,  
"Lots of Land", which was pub-  
lished in 1949, and a popular  
pamphlet, "History and Disposi-  
tion of the Texas Public Domain".

## KITCHEN MEMO

WHEN the latching is out and  
friends come and go, meal prepa-  
ration can be so demanding the  
hostess can't enjoy her guests. Any  
food prepared ahead is a blessing.  
This spicy Barbecue Sauce is pre-  
cooked, refrigerated, used when  
wanted for spareribs, beef or  
chicken. Melt 2 tbsps. butter or  
margarine, add 1 med. chopped  
onion, 1 chopped clove garlic. Cook  
until tender but not brown. Add 1/2  
cup chopped celery with leaves, 1/2  
cup chopped green pepper, 1 No. 2  
can tomatoes, 1 6-oz. can tomato  
paste, 1 bay leaf, 3 tbsps. brown  
sugar, 2 tps. dry mustard, 1/2 cup  
cider, 1/2 tsp. cloves, 1/2 tsp. salt,  
1/2 tsp. allspice, 2 slices lemon, 1 1/2 tps. salt,  
1 tsp. Tabasco. Simmer over low  
flame 30 mins. Let stand until cool.  
Strain if you wish. Yield: 2 1/2 cups.  
Swab meat or fowl with sauce,  
serve the balance hot in bowls.

Sprinkle and fold clean laundry;  
wrap and put in gas refrigerator  
for several hours and you'll be  
amazed how much easier it is to  
iron.

The apple has come a long way since the day it caused such havoc in Eden. It is more tempting than ever, for it is much more versatile—countless ways to serve this delectable fruit have been dreamed up by modern Eves.  
Other foods, too, combine with apples to make mouth-watering desserts such as the three given here. One combines tapioca with apples in a new version of an old dessert favorite; another uses crisp cereal flakes to complement the flavor of the fruit and to provide a crunchy topping. In the third recipe, shredded coconut is folded into orange-flavored whipped cream and served with baked apples to make a glamorous looking dessert with a deliciously subtle flavor. Yes, the apple has come a long way!

**Deep-Dish Apple Tapioca**

3 cups hot water  
3 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 1/2 cups sliced tart apples  
1/2 cup quick-cooking tapioca

1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon mace  
3 tablespoons butter

Add water and lemon juice to apples in greased baking dish. Bake, covered, in moderate oven (375° F.) 15 minutes, or until apples are partially cooked. Add remaining ingredients, mixing thoroughly. Continue baking 30 minutes. Stir well after 5 minutes, then stir every 10 minutes, and again when removing from oven. Serve warm or cold with Butterscotch Hard Sauce. Makes 6 servings.

**Butterscotch Hard Sauce:** Cream 1/2 cup butter or margarine thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup light brown sugar (firmly packed) gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add 1 tablespoon cream and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and beat well. Makes 1 cup sauce.

**Coconut Baked Apples**

6 tart apples, cored  
1/2 cup water  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 cup shredded coconut  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/2 teaspoon orange extract or grated orange rind  
1/2 cup cream, whipped

Place apples in baking dish, add water, and sprinkle with 1/4 cup sugar. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 45 minutes, or until done. Cool. Fold 1/2 cup of the coconut, 2 tablespoons sugar, and orange extract into whipped cream; top apples with the mixture. Garnish with remaining coconut. Chill before serving. Makes 6 servings.

**Apple Crisp**

3 cups thinly sliced apples  
2 to 4 tablespoons sugar or honey  
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
4 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 cup raisin bran, 40% bran flakes, wheat flakes, or 1/2 cup corn flakes, crushed

Mix together apples, sugar, melted butter, salt, and cinnamon. Turn into deep 8-inch baking dish. Cream butter; add sugar and flour and mix well. Add cereal and crumble together. Spread over apples. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 30 minutes. Remove cover and continue baking 15 minutes longer, or until apples are tender. Serve warm with cream. Makes 4 servings.

Special emphasis is being placed on the courses of study to be presented during the year and each member of the school will be allowed to take one study and receive credit on it during the two fifty-minute periods of class instruction offered each day. The studies and the persons who will direct them are as follows: "The Near East", Miss Dorothy McConnell of New York, editor of World Outlook and Miss Charlie Holland of Lufkin, Texas, a returned missionary from Japan; "Cooperation for Christian Community", Miss Estelle McIntosh of Clyde, Texas, a deaconess in Rural Work in Arkansas and Mrs. J. B. Davis of Amarillo, formerly a teacher in Panama Public Schools; "Corporate Worship", Mrs. C. A. Bickley of Lubbock, Jurisdiction Secretary of Spiritual Life and Miss Lucile Hester of Big Springs, Director of Christian Education; "A Christian's Vocation", Mrs. G. W. Damerson of Pineville, La., Jurisdiction Secretary of Missionary Education and Mrs. Cecil Matthews of Lubbock, Wesley Foundation Counselor, Texas Tech.

Workshops on "Work of the Women's Society of Christian Service", "Enrichment Materials" and "Recruitment for Christian Vocation" will be held each day under the direction of Mrs. Damerson, Mrs. Whigham and Mrs. Luther Kirk, Perryton, Conference Secretary of Missionary Personnel. ### Cost Of Keeping Track Of Worker's Earnings For SS Is Very Small

It costs less than 13 cents to keep track of a worker's earnings under social security for an entire year, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration.

As explained by Sanderson, the old-age and survivors insurance system is based upon individual wage accounts in which the government keeps a record of each worker's earnings in jobs subject to the law. So far accounts have been set up for about 80 million individuals who have wage credits, with the entire job of establishing and maintaining these millions of accounts costing about 1/4 of one

percent of the taxes collected. The overall cost of the complete program, including collection of taxes, record keeping, and payment of claims, is now approximately 3 percent of tax income and is declining steadily. This record has been achieved by the use of the most modern machine bookkeeping methods. Constant improvement in bookkeeping methods results in 60 employees doing the work now that required 100 in 1941.

As an example of his agency's speedy action, Sanderson mentioned the furnishing of wage statements. In spite of the fact that requests are received at the rate of about 3,000 every day, each in-

dividual's account is located among the millions in file, a summary of his earnings is prepared, and the statement is prepared within 72 hours from the request is received.

Briefly, elimination of fly and insect breeding places, personal cleanliness, and getting milk, water and food from safe, approved sources will aid in preventing a number of communicable diseases."

timism in most cases of polio. According to the figures, from 40 to 60 percent of all victims recover completely and can do anything they choose.

From 25 to 40 percent recover with only minor disability, and can, within very wide limits, lead perfectly normal lives. From 15 to 20 percent are more severely handicapped, and 5 to 10 percent terminate fatally.

"It all goes to show that polio is actually a minor case of illness, and an even less significant cause of death, when compared to certain other communicable diseases," the health officer concluded.

Increased consumption of milk by city people will be a big step toward improving their diets. In 1948 sixty percent of all city families were using less than five quarts or its equivalent per person per week.

Fish supplies the same high quality protein that is found in other meats and is an easily digested food. Most fish provide the consumer with vitamin A and B and the salmon and mackerel also contain the recently discovered vitamin D.

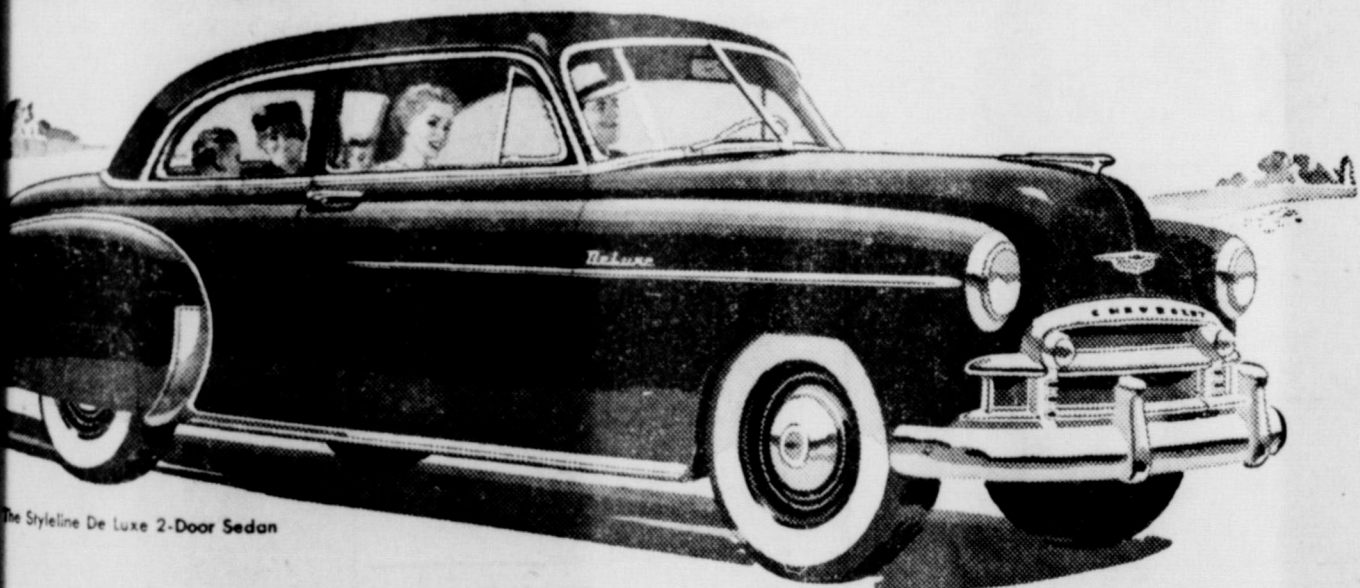
