Editorial

YOU MAY BE—NOBODY KNOWS!

If you have an opinion about what may happen in world affairs, you can be reasonably assured that it is just as likely to be correct as that of the most expert observers in the world.

Nobody knows the plans of the Kremlin. Despite the military strength of Russia and the past record of aggression, there is no way to determine what the future holds. Some newspaper correspondents, writing from Europe, take the view that, so far as

observers can determine, there are no present indications that the Russians plan an offensive this year.

At the same time, Under-Secretary of State James E. Webb, speaking of the success of our foreign policy, including the Marshall Plan, the North Atlantic Treaty and the Western European Defense Force, says that their very success "creates the present period of great danger." What he means is that if the defense of the democracies continue to increase, the Russians, if they are bent upon war, will be tempted to launch an attack before the present programs can be completed.

There is always the chance that aggressive action by satellite nations in the Balkans and elsewhere may precipitate a serious crisis. Yugoslavia is undoubtedly a danger point but "something" could happen around Iran, Greece, Turkey and Berlin. Without knowing the future, this country, and other free nations, have no choice but to arm themselves for the possible and prepare to defend themselves against anything that might happen.

SHOULD LEAVE SPAIN ALONE

The intense drive of some Americans to compel the North Atlantic nations to include Spain in the defense of Europe overlooks the important fact that, in the event of a Soviet attack, the Spaniards would have nowhere else to go.

From Washington comes the report that the Franco Government has advised the American Ambassador that Spain would be willing to move troops beyond the Pyrenees Mountains in the defense of Western Europe, provided the United States sends Spain the necessary military supplies.

The Franco regime, which owes its existence to assistance from the German and Italian armies, is as much the enemy of individual freedom and basic human rights as the Communists in Russia. To supply it with adequate military supplies would be to permanently guarantee its control of Spain. Moreover, such action by this country would run counter to definite opposition by the French and, perhaps, the British.

The North Atlantic Alliance will be strong only so long as it stands for individual freedom and the rights of human beings in their respective countries. It will represent, to a large extent, a homogeneous combination of free peoples, willing to fight for certain definite ideals of modern civilization. Its appeal to all people would be definitely weakened by including the reactionary government of Spain, either in its task of defense or in its advantages.

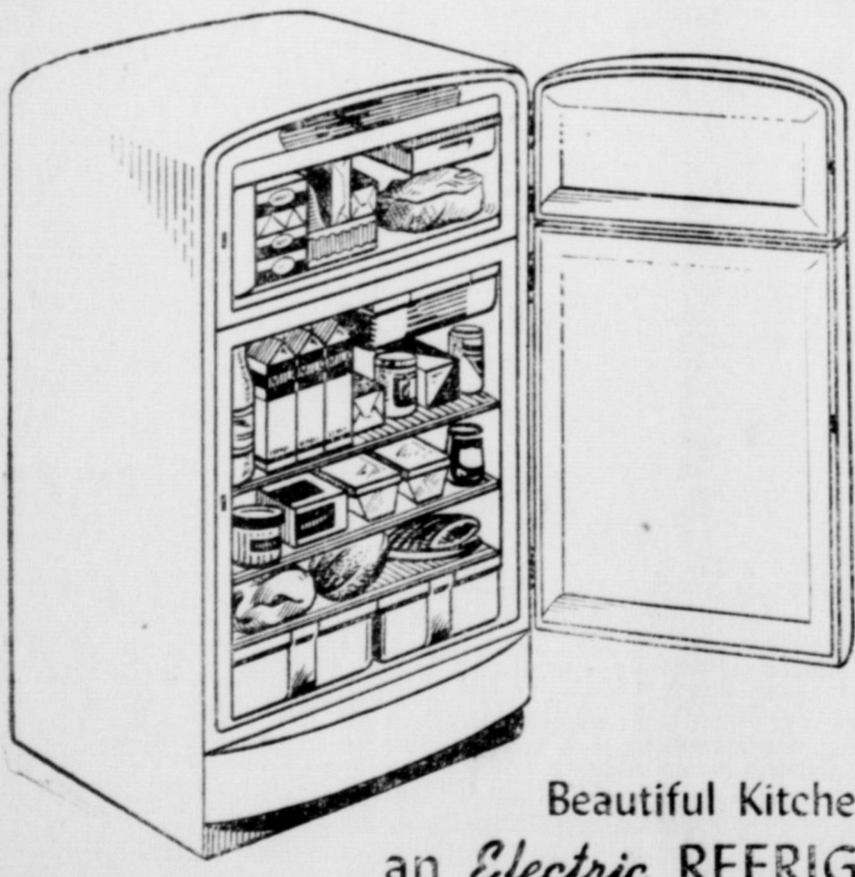

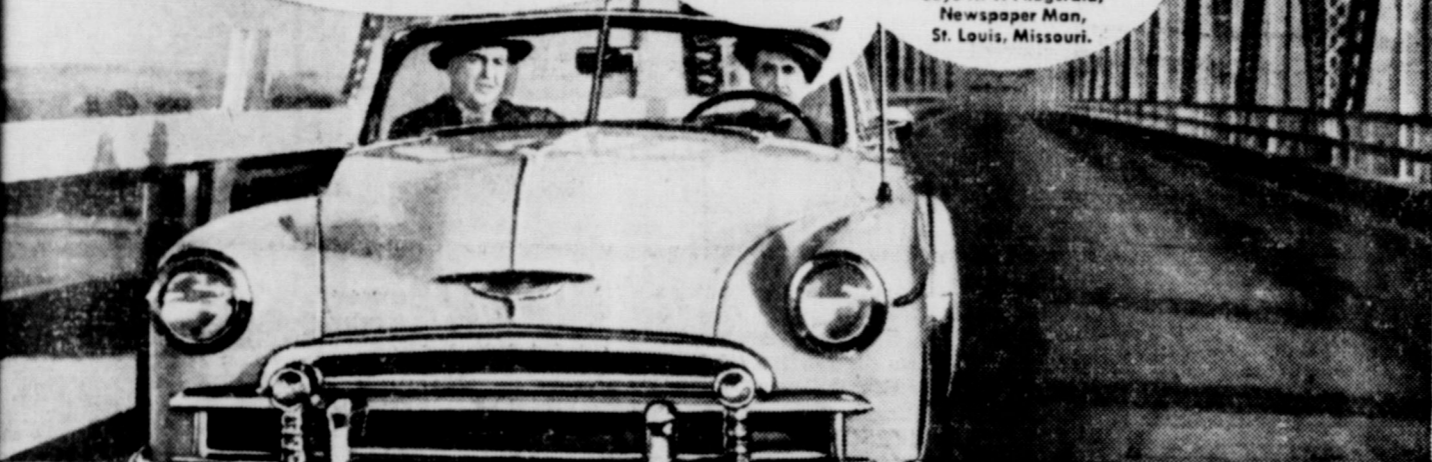

BUSINESS HEALTHFUL

housecleaning," let's not overlook the necessity for a community clean-up, which will make our grounds and premises as clean and attractive as is possible.

Throughout the State, many communities are observing what is known as "Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up" week, and the idea is an excellent one. In the first place, let's consider the clean-up phase

of the program.

Your home place, as well as any vacant lots you may own, should be thoroughly cleaned, and all weeds cut and removed. Old lumber, broken bottles or other glass, old tires, tin cans, and other refuse should be hauled away, and in this manner rat harborage and mosquito breeding places can be eliminated. Broken bottles and old tires sometimes hold water after spring showers, and this stagnant water makes an excellent breeding ground for mosquitoes. Old lumber and discarded boxes afford shelter and living quarters for rats, and the rats in turn spread property destruction and human illness throughout the community.

Conducive to good mental and physical health, a fresh coat of paint on houses, fences, garages, and in some cases on curbs and flower bed walls, adds much to the attractiveness of a neighborhood, and furnishes an incentive to keeping things clean, since they will inevitably show up unfavorably if permitted to become littered and dirty, and must stand comparison with a shining new paint job.

Sagging shutters should be repaired or replaced, since they can fall when a strong wind hits them, and may injure someone seriously. Screens should be kept clean and in good repair; clean, so that sufficient fresh air can

pass through them into the home; in good repair, so that they will exclude flies, mosquitoes and other health menacing pests.

Aside from beautifying the home and neighborhood by a thorough cleanup, we afford ourselves the best protection from fire that is possible, by eliminating all accumulated debris and trash.

When every individual in the neighborhood cooperates in keeping the community clean and attractive, it becomes not only lighter work, but in many cases an actually enjoyable project. If in your neighborhood there is a vacant lot or two, owned by out-of-town people, you and your neighbors can pool your time and effort and keep the lot free from weeds, trash and unsightly rubbish. It will make a good playground for the children of the community, where they will be off the streets, and very near their homes and under the watchful eye of parents.

There are no fences or boundaries beyond which sickness cannot travel. If germs are permitted to gain entrance to a home a block away from you, the resulting illness may be transmitted to your family by any one of several means. For instance, through faulty screening, which permits flies and mosquitoes to contaminate your person, your clothing, your food or water supply. Flies are especially dangerous in the spread of typhoid, dysentery, and other gastro-intestinal diseases. Mosquitoes spread malaria, and roaches have been proved to be transmitters of many of our common ailments.

Rats are one of the most dreaded spreaders of disease. If rats are allowed to roam at will in your neighborhood, please bear in mind that their retinue of human diseases transmitted include typhus, rat-bite fever, trichinosis, infectious jaundice, food poisoning, and other diseases which are dangerous and often fatal. This is one reason why every effort should be made to exterminate all rats, and cut off their shelter and food supplies.

You can readily see why it becomes important that the entire community participate in a clean-up campaign, and help in every way to keep the neighborhood clean at all times. It serves no purpose to reassure ourselves with the knowledge that our premises are clean and sanitary, unless we can say the same of the entire community. The same thing applies to your neighbor. If he keeps his home in spotless condition, he and his family can still suffer from the effects of your negligence, if you allow disease-breeding conditions to remain in or near your home.

Disease germs will never stop at boundary lines. They live on both sides of the track, and they will flourish and do well in the richest neighborhood just as they will in the slums, if the same filthy conditions prevail.

If pools or containers of stagnant water afford a breeding place for mosquitoes anywhere near your home, you and your family may suffer even though you have made sure that your own premises are well drained. In turn, if you are careless enough to furnish trash piles for rats to house themselves in, they may carry typhus or some similar disease to a delicate child who lives several doors, or even blocks from you.

If your open garbage pail permits flies to swarm and breed, they can carry filth and germs to a neighboring home and when a child carelessly holds the screen door open too long, that fly gains access to the home and will go quickly and surely to the nearest exposed food to feast himself and leave thousands of germs wherever he touches the food. Dysentery, typhoid or some other debilitating disease will probably result, and sometimes death follows, literally, in the footsteps of a single fly.

Roaches, besides being filthy revolting household pests, are spreaders of diseases from one home to another. Their habitual dwelling place is in the darkest, dingiest places, and they seem to flourish in filth and slime. They habitually crawl behind drain boards, around plumbing fixtures, and in dirty, inaccessible places where their eggs cannot be reached or disturbed.

In search of food, these filthy pests leave their dirty hiding places and travel all over the kitchen, their feet leaving thou-

sands of germs on dishes and drain-boards, until they find food which they contaminate and render unfit for human consumption. If you have been unaware of their visit and proceed to use that food, sickness can and often does result.

Mosquitoes, flies, rats, roaches—all these death dealing household and neighborhood pests need not be tolerated. Concentrated efforts on the part of all residents in a community can rid that community of these menaces to health and well-being. They will certainly die out and disappear if there is no food available to them; if there is no shelter or breeding places for them; if they are exterminated and killed out by united efforts of all persons in the community.

Your home and your neighborhood can be bright, clean, healthful, and attractive, if you and all your neighbors work to that end. It will afford you more cheerful living, more healthful living, and the contentment that comes with an attractive home, and the knowledge that you have done what you can to protect the health of your family and of your friends.

"Clean-up, paint-up" — it's a good slogan for an even better program of giving the entire community a thorough spring house cleaning. With the interior of our homes cleaned, brightened, and freshened up, with alleys cleaned,

drained and graveled, with yards in good shape and gardens prepared with vacant lots cleared of rubbish and made suitable for children's play—with these things accomplished we can enjoy living in a community which offers the utmost in attractiveness, sanitation and healthful living.

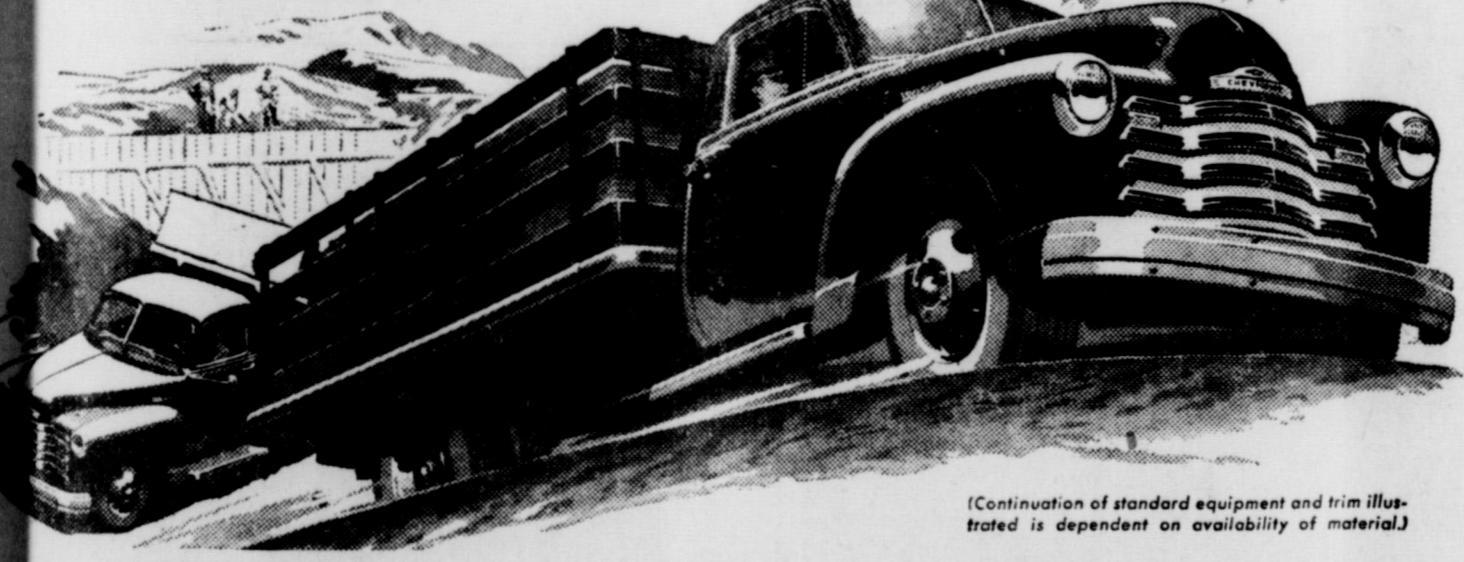

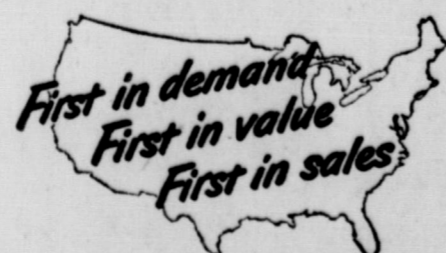

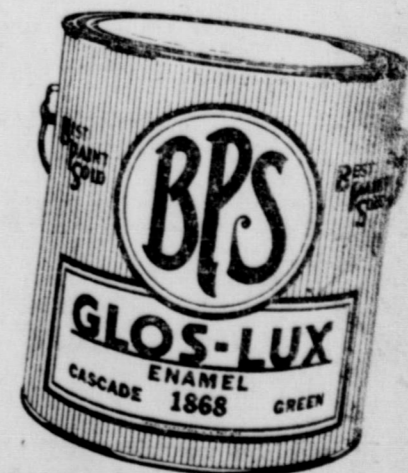
