## BLAST VICTIMS BURIED HERE SUN. AFTERNOON

Double funeral services were held for Arel Wilmerth Williams and Jesse Ferrel Williams of Sunray at the First Baptist Church of Wheeler Sunday, April 6, at 4:30 p.m. with the pastor, Rev. M. B. Smith, officiating.

The brothers died simultaneously early Friday morning, April 4, in an explosion which destroyed their father's home 7 miles northwest of Springer, New Mexico.

The brothers were on a fishing trip. Police theorized that they stopped at the dwelling, vacated about two months ago by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Williams, now of Borger.

State Police Capt. Penn Winston of New Mexico blamed leaking artificial gas. He said it was believed a gas tank valve was left partly open after a kitchen stove was moved out of the place about two weeks before.

Arel Wilmerth Williams was born at Indian Gap August 12, 1911 and Jesse Ferrel Williams was born at Hamil, April 17, 1917. The Williams family were long time residents, since August 1918, of Wheeler County, having lived in the Bethel and Briscoe communities and also in Wheeler and Shamrock. The men each lived long in Wheeler County five years ago. Both were employees of the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation, of Sunray at the time of their passing.

Survivors: Arel is survived by his wife, Elizabeth Sue Williams and one daughter, Karen Sue, age 2; having lost one son, Richard Arel in 1949. He also has two sons by a previous marriage: Herbert Hansell and Wesley Gene, both in the service of their country at present and stationed in Calif. Jesse is survived by his wife, Lois Aderholt Williams, one son, Jesse Royce and one daughter, Peggy Diane; all of Sunray. The men are also survived by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter S. Williams and one sister, Mrs. Bernice Osborn, all of Sunray.

Both men united with the Baptist Church at Bethel in boyhood. Arrangements were under the direction of Clay Funeral Home, Shamrock, assisted by the Kirk-Mason Funeral Home of Wheeler. Internment was in the Wheeler Cemetery.

## M. SHELBURNE IS CANDIDATE FOR CO. JUDGE

Marvin Shelburne, 61 year old prominent resident of Kellerville, this week announced that he would be a candidate for County Judge, subject to the action of voters in the July Democratic Primary.

Mr. Shelburne has been cashier of a bank and thus feels that he would understand finances of the county. He is active in church work, a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Order of the Eastern Star and the American Legion Post 68, Shamrock 40 & 8.

In making his announcement Mr. Shelburne stated that he had been living in Wheeler County since 1934 and this was the first time to run for any office and thinks that he is well qualified for the position.

"My father, who taught me some particulars about law, was Judge when he passed away at the age of 85 years. Also the late Senator J. H. Shelburne is my nephew," Mr. Shelburne stated.

Stating that he wants to contact as many people as possible and ask them personally for their vote and support, Mr. Shelburne said that he hopes to do so by July 26.

"If elected, I promise honest, efficient, economic and impartial judgement to the people," declared Mr. Shelburne.

## AUTOS SHOULD BE INSPECTED

Motorists are urged to have their motor vehicles safety inspected while there is a lull before the expected rush to inspection stations.

G. W. Busby, chief of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said 2,700 inspection stations have been certified to aid motorists in complying with the new state law. September 6 is the deadline for having all motor vehicles certified for safe driving.

Busby said the movement of vehicles to inspection stations is lagging, with only about 50,000 being inspected weekly. If a bottleneck is to be avoided before the deadline, he said, at least 100,000 vehicles a week will have to flow through the stations.

Requirements under the new safety law has been modified considerably following an anticipated rush to inspection stations when the law became effective a few months ago. Safety Department officials said many new inspection stations are being certified weekly to aid in avoiding another bottleneck.

"We earnestly hope that motorists will take advantage of the lull we are now having and avoid a last-minute rush in order to comply with the September 6 deadline," Busby said.

There are 5,398 vehicles required to be inspected in Wheeler County. Of this number there have been approximately 700 vehicles inspected.

In Shamrock, there are three inspection stations; Tisdal Motor Co., Montevary Motor Co. and Holmes Motor Co. In Wheeler, there are three inspection stations; Ware Chevrolet, Percy's Garage and Nash Appliance. Probably there will be other garages applying for an inspection station within the very near future.

## HOME LANDSCAPING MAKES PROGRESS IN WHEELER COUNTY

With the coming of spring, the lawns and shrubbery in Wheeler County are taking on new life. Of course, we all agree that a good rain would be much in our favor. But nevertheless, people are keeping the garden hoses at work to provide the moisture.

People in this county are at work on screening and windbreaks. When we say windbreaks, that can mean anything from the shelter belt on your farm to a few trees planted at the corner of your dwelling to break the wind. This year Extension Service has made a great deal of this planting possible through an arrangement with the Oklahoma Forestry Service of this area to produce trees where people can afford to buy in quantity, or may get as few as one hundred, according to their needs.

People are becoming color-conscious of the exteriors of their homes and are asking questions pertaining to evergreen shrubs that do well in this locality. In answer to this, let me say that the most attractive yards have several different kinds of shrubs; some that are ever-green, some to provide orange or red color in winter, some for blooms at different part of spring and summer.

Evergreen shrubs that do well here include: wax-leaf Ligustrum, Eunomys, Arizona Cypress (has blue tinge), Pine Red Cedar, Arborvitae Blue Spruce, (slowgrower). (Continued on Last Page)

High point individuals in the 4-H dairy judging were as follows: Jack Lemon, first, Collingsworth County 4-H; Gene Haddox, Briscoe, and Raymond Daugherty of Collingsworth County, tied for second; Kenneth Wynn, third, Collingsworth County 4-H; and W. L. Williams, fourth, Briscoe.

In the FFA dairy judging contest, Shamrock FFA, first; Wellington FFA, second; Quail FFA, third; Wheeler FFA, fourth; and Samnorwood FFA, fifth.

**FIFTH COLUMN IN EUROPE**

One of the Russian weapons which we  
must intelligently evaluate as the cold war  
continues, with its hot spots, is the Fifth  
Column menace in Europe, where any world-  
wide struggle will probably be won or lost.

The Russian brain behind the Fifth  
Column movement in Europe is Georgi  
Malenkov, whom many people expect to suc-

ceed Stalin as the next Russian dictator.

There are reports from Europe indicating  
that Fifth Column activities are reaching  
alarming proportions and that the activities  
are controlled through one chain of  
command, which makes it possible for the  
Communist Fifth Column to act with a unity  
of purpose in its central theme of resistance  
to the United States.

One of the first aims of the Communist  
Fifth Column is to control strategic industries,  
such as transportation, communication,  
metals and agriculture. This will give the  
Commies a powerful weapon, making it  
possible to paralyze Europe when they strike.

In the meantime, the Communist-dominated  
unions are directing their energies toward  
pressuring governments to end their  
defense efforts and to resume trade with  
the Soviet Union. At the same time, they  
are spreading unrest and slowing down the  
western defense effort, where possible.

One of the chief Communist outfits is  
the World Federation of Trade Unions,  
which includes many Communist-dominated  
unions which are strong in France and Italy  
and potentially strong in Western Germany  
and Austria. Using the United Nations  
Charter, this group was organized in 1945,  
calling for an international organization of  
workers.

Originally, the British Trade Unions  
Congress and the American CIO were members,  
but in 1949, as a result of a fight over  
the Marshall Plan Aid to Europe, the British  
and American Unions broke away from the  
WFTU and founded a rival organization, the  
International Federation of Free Trade  
Unions.

The Communist-controlled WFTU claims  
80 million members in 64 countries. It has  
been estimated that about five of the seven  
million Italian Union members are in  
Communist-controlled unions. In Western  
Germany the Communists have been concentrating  
on the strategic Ruhr Valley. About one-  
half of the workers in Communist-dominated  
labor unions in Western Germany are in this  
key Ruhr Valley area.

It is refreshing to note that American  
and British labor unions realize the true  
purpose of these Communist-controlled  
unions, stamping out freedom by spreading  
Communist over the world. It is important  
to keep the spotlight of truth on the  
Communist Fifth Column so that it cannot take  
advantage of the nationalistic spirit in many  
countries or the legitimate needs of the  
working man in efforts to further its own  
rotten aims.

Pompous men hang on to special priv-  
ileges and favored positions like drowning  
men hang on to a piece of wreckage, and for  
the same reason.

If you're wondering where to go on your

for every-day living. Eat out, forget all other  
work, and you'll have something.

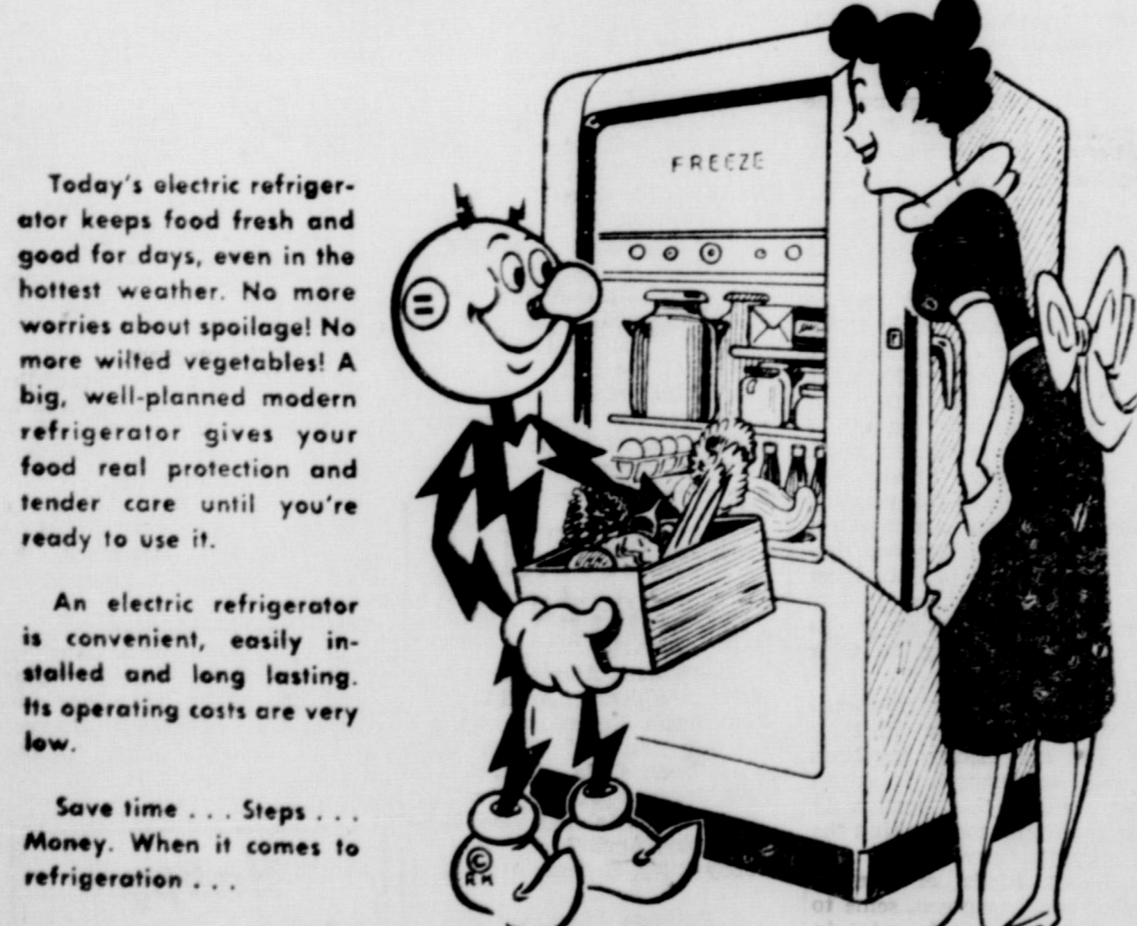

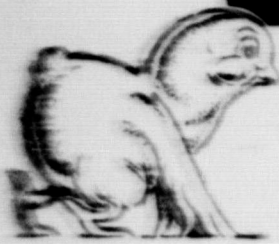

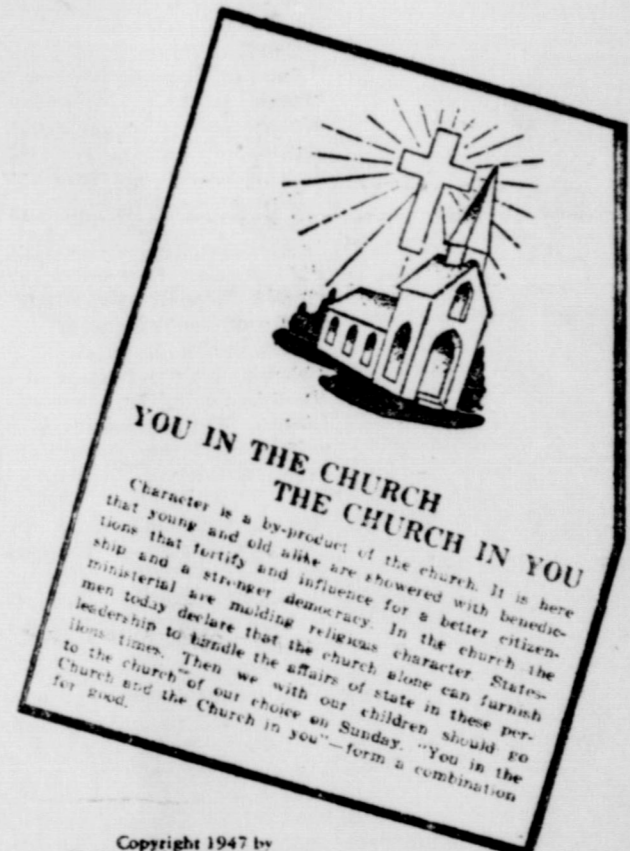

(but beautiful), Pfitzer Juniper (the low spreading kind of cedar), Cypress (tall slender type).

Evergreens with colored berries are: Nandina (has red leaves and red berries in winter), Pyracantha (some varieties have orange, some red berries), Oregon Holly (has shiny, waxy, yellow blooms and purple berries), Barberry bushes stay green in summer, red all winter.

For foundation planting winter Jasmine and Forsythia are liked for attractive foliage and pretty yellow blooms that come in February.

Bridal wreath or Spirea can be seen blooming profusely in different sections of the county at this season. Snowberry will grow in the shady side of the house and has pretty white blossoms.

For planting around the edge of the yard or along driveway, hedge plants such as Lilac Amoor Privet, or California Privet (which has yellowish leaves) are hardy. We can also grow Crepe Myrtle

(may freeze, but when cut to the ground, will come again.)

As to what to put in your beds, if you like bulbs for spring blooming, put out in October or November: Tulips, dills, Hyacinths or Crocus, bulbs provide: Gladioli, and Iris for blooms in summer.

Its no sin to pray for better surroundings, but you come to landscaping we should spend some time on our lawns this way we create beauty, gladden the eyes and bless our families and our neighbors and what's more it is common.
