## 73 SECOND SALK VACCINE SHOTS GIVEN AUGUST 1

On August 1, Dr. Glen Walker gave the second Salk Vaccine polio shots to 73 first and second grade children in the North Wheeler County area. 71 of them were of the group of 153 who took their first preventative shots here earlier this spring. The other two were children now in the county who had received their first shots elsewhere, according to Jesse J. Dyer.

The first shots were given by Dr. Harold Nicholson, at which time 153 first and second grade children of the area received the preventative shots.

## LOCAL FARMER PINNED BENEATH TRACTOR TUES.

Vernon B. Hardcastle was found pinned under his tractor about 7:30 o'clock Tuesday evening.

When he failed to show up at the regular time, Mrs. Hardcastle went to the field in which he was plowing about a half mile north of their home. There was a deep ditch at the end of the field keeping him from her sight until she was almost upon him. The tractor had overturned in the ditch.

The fingers of his right hand, caught under the tractor fender, were what was holding him. Mrs. Hardcastle went back to the pickup and got a hammer and screwdriver and proceeded to dig him loose. She got him in the pickup and drove back to the house.

Mrs. Hardcastle called Henry Greenhouse who came to her assistance. They then called Dr. Harold Nicholson, who treated him for shock and took him to the Wheeler Hospital.

Other than the crushed fingers Mr. Hardcastle received bruises on his neck and left arm. He said he never did lose consciousness.

## COTTON ACRES BEING CHECKED

"Cotton performances reporters have about completed measuring Wheeler County's cotton acreage," Albert C. Marshall, office manager of the ASC, stated this week.

A notice of measured acreage will be mailed each producer as soon as computations are completed in the office, Marshall declared.

In the event a producer has planted excess acreage, he will be allowed 20 days after receiving to dispose of the excess acreage. When he has disposed of it, he is to notify the ASC office in Wheeler.

The charge for checking disposed of acreage is \$2.00 per farm plus \$1.00 per plot, if there are more than one plot.

"Wheat growers whose 1956 acreage is as much as 25 per cent below their farm wheat acreage allotment will receive credit for full allotment acreage in calculating future farm allotments," Marshall said.

"If the farm's wheat acreage for next year's harvest is only three-

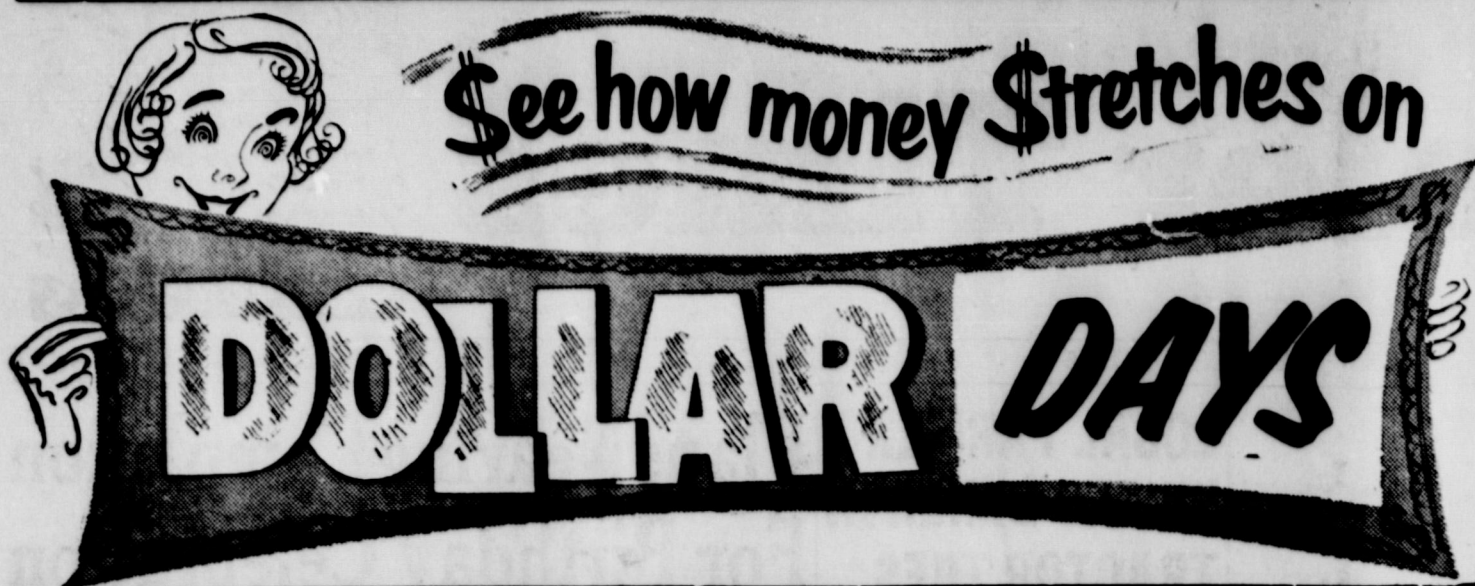

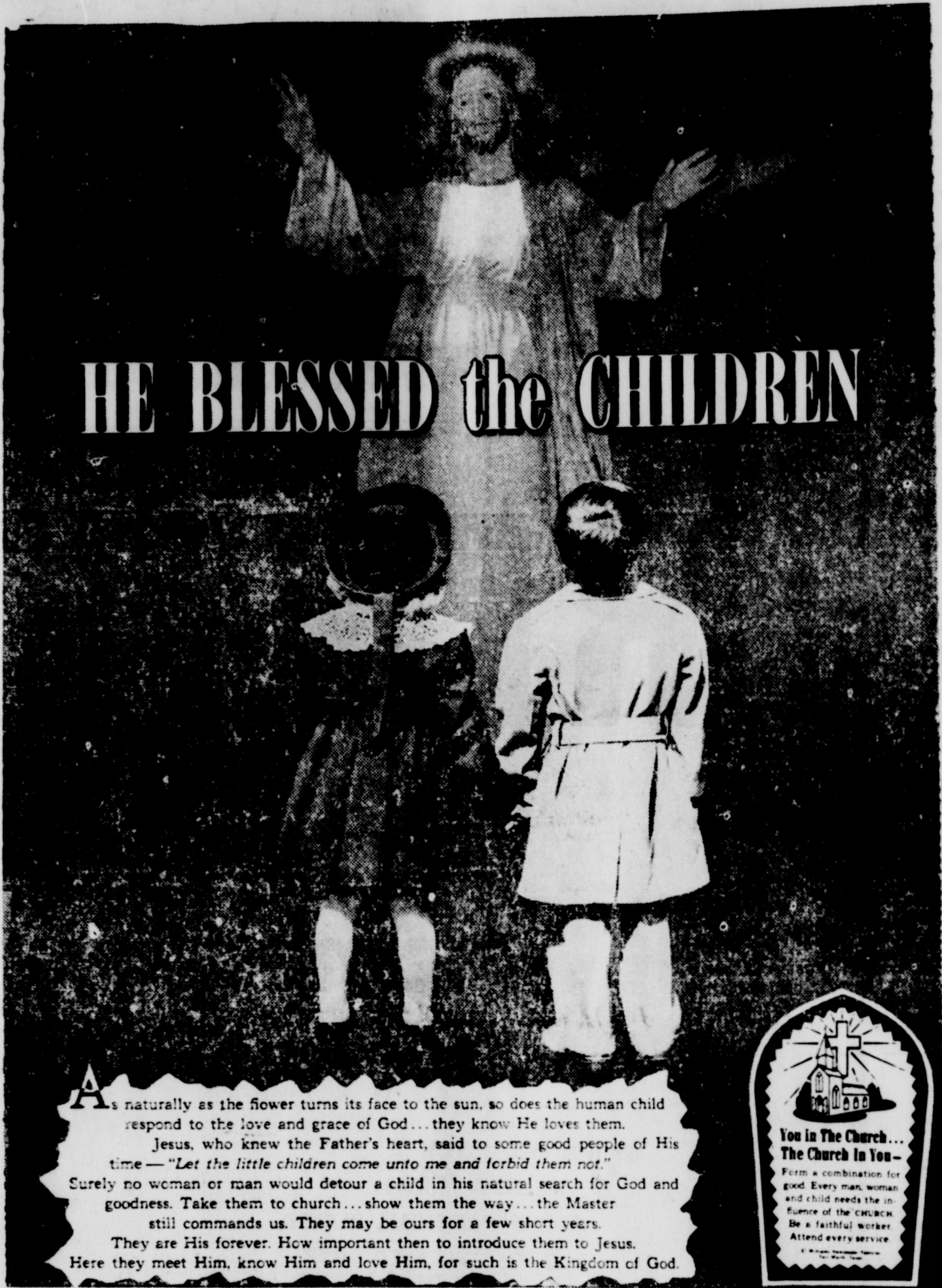

**Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News**

District cooperators of Wheeler County Soil Conservation District are becoming familiar with a new legume plant to this district known as Guar. Soil Conservation Service technicians are working with several cooperators who have planted from five to thirty-three acres of guar this past spring. Present growth is about the same as cotton in most cases.

Guar can be used as follows: 1. Soil building crop; 2. Pasture; 3. Cash crop; and 4. Seed can be used as feed when rolled for cattle.

Bud Treadwell, fourteen miles east of Wheeler, reports that he planted five acres of guar on a slope where feed failed to grow but the guar showed excellent growth.

Ben Trout, north-east of Wheeler, has been asked what he had seeded in the southwest part of his field. His guar is next to the road so that those interested in seeing this new crop can. He plans to follow next spring with feed.

Mr. Trout has been using rye, vetch, and cow peas for several years and is still interested in other soil building crops. While inspecting his guar it would be of interest to see his feed which has had no fertilizer except the use of his cow peas and vetch as soil builders in past years.

Clarence Zybach, four miles east of Briscoe, has thirty-three acres of guar that is doing good. Bennie Schlegel, one mile east

of Lela, has stripped his cotton with guar. This can be seen from the highway.

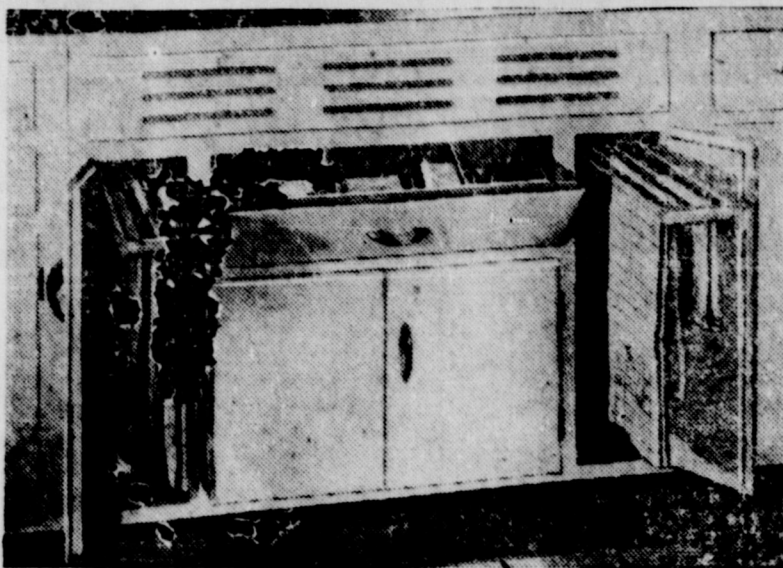

taken after a thorough study of national economic conditions, especially those prevailing in the residential construction and mortgage financing fields. The new requirement expected to help protect prospective GI loan applicants against increased prices of homes, over-extension of credit and financial risks. They should also tend to stabilize the mortgage market by eliminating the 30-year no down payment loan which currently is being traded at widening discount margins.

The new requirements are not retroactive. They are not applicable to purchase of homes for which VA has issued certificates of reasonable value prior to July 30, or in cases where requests for appraisals actually have been received in VA office prior to July 30.

Also, the requirements will not apply to GI loans made solely for the replacement or reconstruction of residential property that has been destroyed or substantially damaged by flood, fire or other similar catastrophes nor to repair, alteration or improvement loans.
