MAN KILLED WHEN AUTO OVERTURNS

Frank W. Nelson of Pampa, 36-year-old father of two small daughters, was killed Christmas day in a one-car accident near Laketon on Highway 152.

Mr. Nelson died of multiple fractures of the skull and a crushed chest after his car overturned. The accident occurred at 2:35 p.m. Sunday just west of Laketon, while Mr. Nelson was en route to visit his wife's parents: Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Rogers, one mile west of Wheeler. He was alone in the car.

Nelson, who lived at 1101 South Christy, moved to Pampa 10 years ago and was employed as a floor coverer for the Pampa Paint & Glass Co. He was born December 8, 1919, in Gentry, Ark.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Duenkel-Carmichael Funeral Home in Pampa.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Faye Nelson, and two daughters, Rhynetta Gay and Carolyn Jeanette, ages 6½ and 3, all of Pampa; and a step-sister, Mrs. Jane Barnes, Fort Worth.

WILDCAT WELL BEING DRILLED

Drilling is progressing nicely on the wildcat well being drilled 13 miles east and seven miles north of Wheeler. Depth was reported as 3,177 feet last week-end with drilling going ahead in red bed and shale.

The well is the Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Co. No. 1 Britt, located in section 3, block 1, B&B Survey, on the Britt Ranch.

The well was spudded in on December 14, and surface casing was set at 500 feet. Proposed depth of the well is 7,100 feet.

McFadden of Dallas, Vice President of Employers' Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., today warned Texas pedestrians and drivers against "holiday", a dangerous malady which, Mr. McFadden said, brings death and injury to many motorists and pedestrians each year.

1956 WILL BE IMPORTANT AS VOTING YEAR

An important election year is coming up, and residents are reminded that January is the final period for paying poll taxes.

In order to vote in elections in Texas, citizens must be 21 years of age or over, have a current poll tax receipt or exemption and be a resident of the state one year and the county for six months.

The poll tax receipts dated 1955 are needed to vote in 1956 elections. On the ballot this year will be candidates for the president of the United States, governor and other state officials and several county officials.

Mail applications will be accepted at the office of Wheeler County Tax Assessor-Collector Thurman Rives from those who are unable to visit the office during business hours. The application must show the citizen's name, home address in Wheeler County, age, race, sex, length of residence in the state and county and should show the voting precinct if known, the state or country of birth and whether native born or naturalized and the occupation of the applicant.

All mail applications must be accompanied by a check or money order for \$1.75 for each poll tax receipt required.

Poll taxes must be paid in person, except that a husband may pay for his wife or a wife for her husband, or the poll tax may be paid by mail.

All persons 60 years of age before January 1, 1955, living outside cities of 10,000 population, do not have to secure an exemption but may vote without one.

All persons becoming 21 years of age after January 1, 1955, and before the dates that elections are held during 1956, must secure an exemption certificate not later than 30 days prior to the date such election is held.

All qualified citizens are urged to secure a poll tax receipt in order to participate in the elections coming up in 1956.

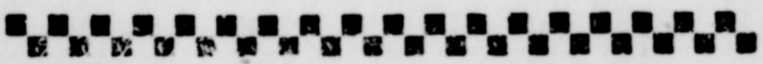

both walkers and drivers."

He said that at this time of year, when streets are crowded with vehicular and pedestrian traffic, road surfaces may be slippery and visibility poor because of inclement weather, all travelers should increase their vigilance.

Mr. McFadden warned pedestrians not to carry packages or umbrellas in a manner that will obstruct their vision and not to cross streets in mid-block or against the lights. He urges drivers to keep a sharp eye out for pedestrians who may be indulging in these pastimes.

"Safety in traffic is a two-way business; it calls for cooperation between drivers and walker," he said. "It's better to lose your right of way than to lose a life — your own or the other fellow's."

County Shows Gain In Business Firms

"There are 10 more business concerns in Wheeler County today than there five years ago," says Wayne A. Clark, manager of the Amarillo office of Dun & Bradstreet. Basing his facts upon the figures in the current January, 1956 Reference Book, Clark points out that in 1951 there were 250 businesses listed by Dun & Bradstreet; today there are 260 enterprises.

This indicates a 4% increase in the Wheeler County business population during the past five years.

The Reference Book, incidentally, lists only manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, and some service companies, such as laundries and gasoline service stations. It does not include some of the service and "professional" businesses, such as barber and beauty shops, real estate and stock brokers. Thus the figure for businesses in Wheeler County would actually be higher than the 260 quoted above.

Better than 95 per cent of all commercial transactions in the United States are made on credit terms and the buyer and the seller are brought together by means of credit information.

When the owner of a business or his accountant returns his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, the owner has taken the first step in establishing his responsibility as a seeker of credit.

The statement becomes a part of the credit report on his business along with a financial analysis, a description of what the business does, and a record of how it pays its bills.

On the basis of the information in the report, a rating is assigned and the businessman is listed in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book. This makes it possible for his suppliers and insurance underwriters, who use the book, to look him up and in this way he is assisted in getting his goods and insurance.

In other words, should a manufacturer or wholesaler receive an order for merchandise from a merchant in Wheeler County the listing and the rating of the merchant can be checked in the Reference Book. And it makes no difference where the seller is located. The listing of the Wheeler County businessman appears in every issue of the Reference Book in the United States.

A Reference Book listing contains the name of the business and the rating. The rating consists of two symbols. The first, a letter of

the alphabet, indicates financial strength or capital. It is the difference between what the business owes and what it owns. The second symbol, a numeral, reflects a composite of financial stability and payment record.
