

## COUNTY X-RAY TOTAL SHOWS DROP OF 1542

Only 313 persons had their chests x-rayed while the State Health Department's mobile unit was in Wheeler last week, compared with a total of 887 one year ago.

The Wheeler county number of persons X-rayed last week was 2,058 compared with 3,600 the previous year.

Mobeetie came closest to the 1954 figure when 290 x-rays, compared with 360 in 1954.

This year's county total was a decrease of 1,542 from the 3,600 in 1954 and was 987 less than in 1953.

## BAPTIST PASTOR RESIGNS POST

Rev. M. B. Smith, who has been pastor of the First Baptist Church here since December 1947, tendered his resignation to the church, Wednesday night, November 2.

The resignation will be effective after services at the church on Sunday, November 20.

Rev. Smith has been active in all church and civic affairs of the city and will be greatly missed by the entire community. He has served as Scout Master for the city, been active in Chamber of Commerce work, a booster for the Wheeler School system, and operated a radio program for more than a year. Under his supervision the church has sponsored a morning worship service each Sunday morning.

During the eight years that he has been pastor of the church here he has seen it grow from a membership of 375 to about 540. He has conducted over 100 funerals, performed 317 weddings and baptized 182 people into fellowship of the church. He was instrumental in building the new \$42,000 Baptist church building.

Rev. Smith has answered a call to the Trinity Baptist Church located at 400 North Zimmer St. in Pampa. He told this reporter that the family expected to move by the first of December. That the children would finish this six-week period at school here before moving to Pampa.

## Proclamation

WHEREAS, By act of Congress on May 13th, 1938, November 11th of each year was made a legal holiday, and afterwards on June 1, 1954, Congress designated such holiday as Veterans' Day and

WHEREAS a nation of free people are grateful and desirous of paying homage to the veterans of all wars for the preservation of our freedom, and

WHEREAS there are now living in this vicinity veterans who saw action in 1898 at El Caney, Santiago and Manila, and veterans in 1917 saw action at Chateau Thierry, St. Mihiel, Chemin-des-dames, Meuse-Trgonne, and Sudan, and veterans who from 1941 to 1945 saw action in the Pacific, island hopping from the Solomons to Ryukyu, and action in Europe from the landing at Casablanca, through Italy and France to the Moselle River, and veterans who saw action in 1950 from Pusan to Heart-break Ridge.

NOW THEREFORE, I, the undersigned authority, do hereby proclaim a holiday on Friday, November 11th, 1955, in honor of these veterans who live in the City of Wheeler and the surrounding territory, and I admonish the citizenship of the area to spend at least a few minutes of that day in contemplation of the privileges that have been preserved by these veterans and by the grace of Almighty God.

## Highway 152 West Will Be Rebuilt Soon

Important news to the north part of Wheeler County is the announcement, this week that State Highway 152 from Wheeler west to the Gray County line will be rebuilt this winter.

The road will be widened from its present width of 22 to 24 feet of pavement plus eight feet of paved shoulders, said C. Clyde Drake of Wellington, resident engineer of the Texas State Highway Department.

The contractors' notice of construction, asking for sealed bids, calls for "construction of 16.871

miles of grading, widening structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment.

Bids will be received at the Highway Department, Austin, until 9 a.m. Thursday, November 23, and then publicly opened and read.

Mr. Drake stated construction work would probably be started soon after the first of the year.

Bids for construction eight miles farm-to-market road will also be let in December, the resident engineer declared. This blacktop road will extend from a point on U. S. Highway 83, six miles south of Wheeler, east and north to connect with the Twitty-Kelton farm-to-market road constructed a few years ago.

This construction will probably be started in January or February, Mr. Drake said.

These two projects will give Wheeler County approximately 25 miles of highway construction this winter.

## COTTON ABOUT HALF GATHERED

Ginners in North Wheeler County estimate the 1955 Cotton Crop is between a third and a half complete. The three gins at Allison and Briscoe have ginned about 410 bales and the ginners think the crop is just nicely started coming in. Yields there are running from a quarter of a bale to nearly a bale to the acre.

The two gins in Wheeler have ginned 1017 bales and ginners estimate the crop here is between a third and a half gathered. Some farmers are about finished gathering while others have not started yet. Estimates here are between a quarter to three-quarters of a bale to the acre, with a few farmers pulling nearly a bale to the acre.

Grades this far have been good averaging strict 15/16 middling.

County wide the estimated yield will be a little less than a third of a bale to the acre on the approximately 30,000 acres allotted to the County.

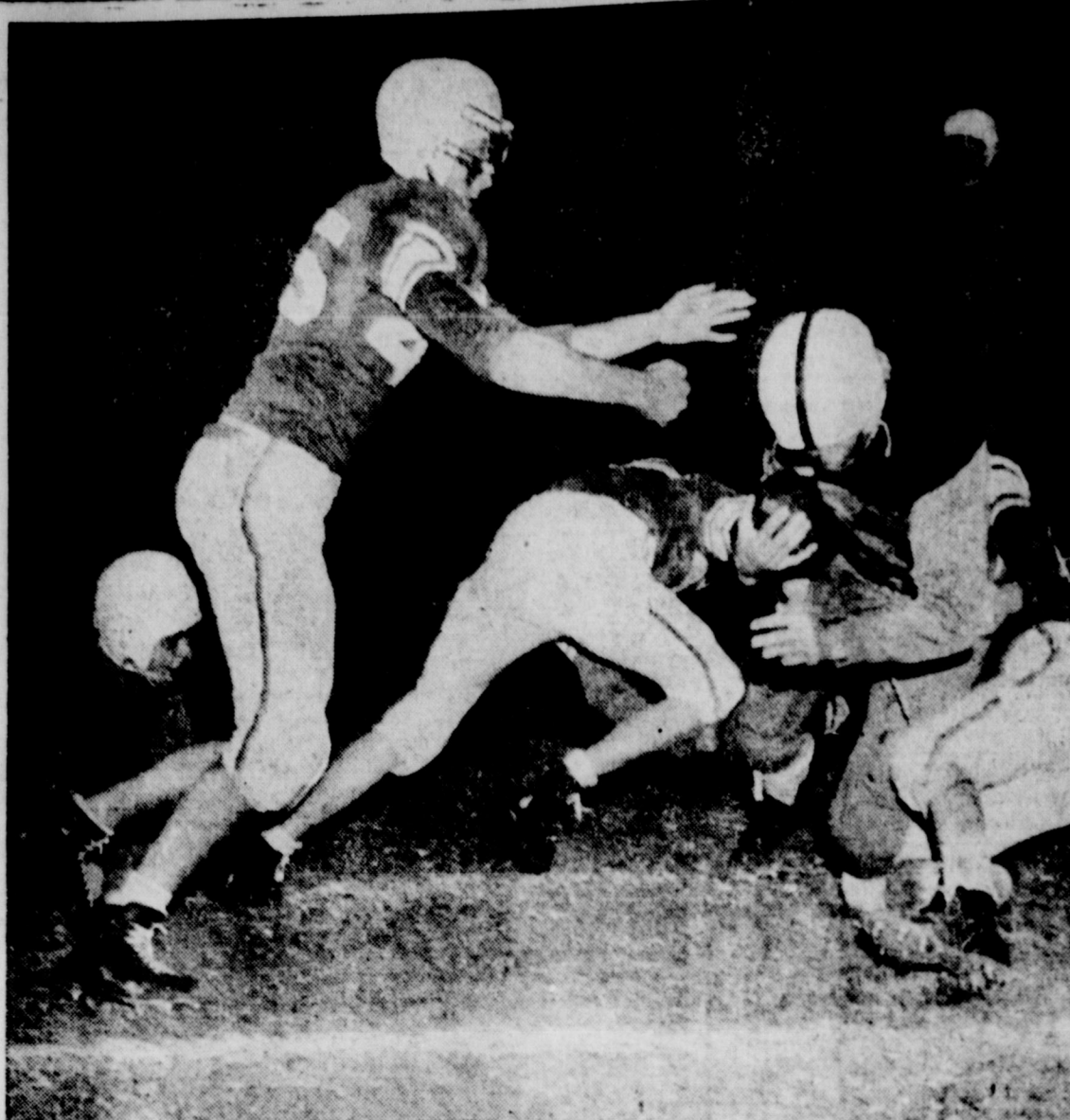
