Absentee Balloting For Primary Election Begins

Absentee balloting in the July 28 democratic primary began this week. Any qualified voter who is unable to go to the polls and vote on election day may secure a ballot and vote absentee in the election. A. B. Crump, Chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee stated.

Absentee ballots must be obtained from the office of the County Clerk in Wheeler and applications must be made in writing. Persons who plan to be away from their regular voting precincts or who are physically unable to go to the polls should get and vote absentee ballots. Mr. Crump stated.

Wheat Farmers Vote On Marketing Quotas July 20

A referendum of wheat farmers will be conducted in Wheeler County and all other wheat producing counties on Friday, July 20. If more than two-thirds of those voting throughout the nation favor wheat marketing quotas, the program will become effective. If more than one-third vote against marketing quotas the program will not become effective.

Water, Sewer Extension Bonds Remain Unsold

The City Council, sitting in regular session last Thursday night with all members present, failed to sell the city improvement bonds. Interest rates offered by the bond buyers were so far out of line with what the council had been led to expect that they felt it inadvisable to sell the bonds.

Bids on the bonds called for 4 1/2 per cent interest the first ten years then 4 1/4 percent for the remainder of the term. The bonds are expected to run for 25 years. This rate was about one per cent higher than the Shamrock School bonds were sold for and about one per cent higher than the bidders had led the council to expect.

The council at the same meeting passed an ordinance calling for a 2 per cent gross receipts tax on public utilities using the streets and alleys for the erection of poles, wires and other types of property. This applies primarily to the telephone, light and gas companies. On a motion made by Hiram Whitener and seconded by P. L. Farmer, the General Telephone Co. was granted a franchise to use the Streets and Alleys for their lines for a period of 35 years. The city to receive the 2 per cent gross receipts tax for use of said streets and alleys. This is new revenue to the city. On motion made by P. L. Farmer and seconded by Al Thomas the city agreed to a telephone rate increase as follows. Business phones will go from \$9.00 to \$10.00. FARMERS FILE FOR GAS REFUND FOR A SAFE AND SANE VACATION

Farmers in the Panhandle area of Texas may obtain a refund of the federal excise tax on gasoline which is used for farming purposes by filing a claim at any time between now and October 1, 1956, according to H. B. Hamill of the Internal Revenue Service. Claims for the present tax rate of 2 cents per gallon are to be made on Form 2240 and should be filed with the U. S. District Director of Internal Revenue for the farmer's district. The forms are available at the Internal Revenue office in Amarillo, from county agricultural agents or at banks and post offices. Hamill said initial refund payments will concern gasoline purchased and used during the first six months of this year. The refunds will be limited to federal tax on gasoline used by a farmer for farming purposes, in carrying out a trade or business on a farm located in the United States. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline which is used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting any agricultural commodity. Hamill also urged farmers to keep ample records to enable Internal Revenue officials to verify accuracy of the amount claimed. They pile the car full of vacation miscellanea, plan to gruelling schedule, hit the road ready to do or die. Sometimes it's die! You can help stop this mass suicide. It's simple. You can refuse to be part of it. The formula for a safe trip doesn't cost a thing. Plan your journey ahead of time . . . allow plenty of time for leisurely driving . . . pack safely . . . stay alert every minute you're on the road . . . obey traffic laws and the dictates of common sense and courtesy. That's it! If you follow it, you'll have a safe, sane, and enjoyable vacation . . . one that won't cost you your life.

WHEELER SHORT MOISTURE

Well, courthouse custodian released rainfall for the first six months of the year. The figures with the Times for May and June we find that Wheeler 67 inches less moisture than last. The 1956 moisture as follows: May 1, 2 1/2 inches; May 2, 5 inches; May 30, June 8, 3 tenths of an inch; June 12, 3 tenths; June 17, 2 1/2 inches; June 24 3 tenths. This total rainfall for the first six months of the year is 11.9 inches. The Times showed 9.4 inches for the same period. In total in the two months of May and June 1955 we had 11.9 inches or 5.7 inches more moisture first six months of the year.

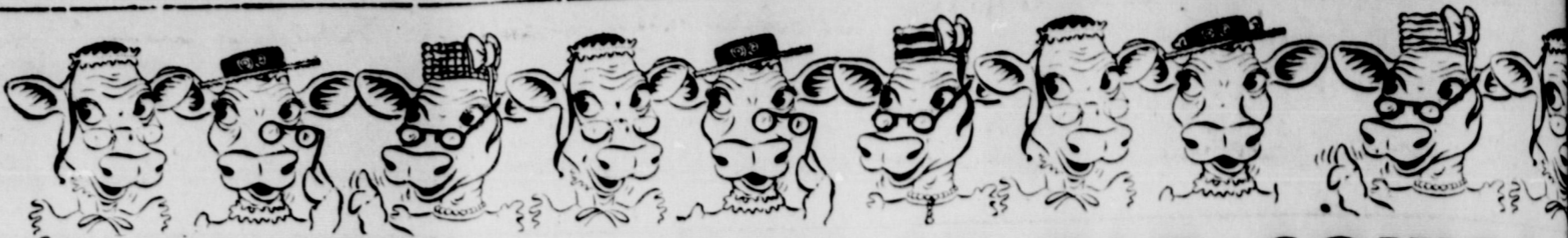

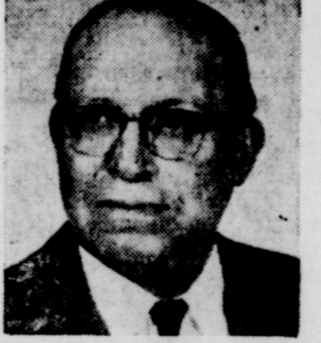

Wheeler County Soil Conservation District News

The Board of Supervisors cut short the last regular meeting to attend a public meeting on the Soil Bank. Full details on the year's Soil Bank have not been received. The Supervisors hope that it will help reach the District's objective which is to put every acre of land to the use to which it is best adapted.

One thing that was quite noticeable at the Soil Bank meeting was the opinions of the farmers on cover crops. Land which does not produce a crop this year needs some kind of cover for next winter. Drilled sorghums or sudan planted now will protect the land until next year. Sandy land too dry to plant can be seeded to rye next month to protect it from the wind next spring.

Soil Conservation Service Personnel assisting the Wheeler District will be glad to assist farmers select crops for the conservation reserve land of the land bank program. Some of this land may remain out of cultivation for several years. Using this land in a long time rotation with the cotton acreage can improve cotton yields and reduce operating costs.

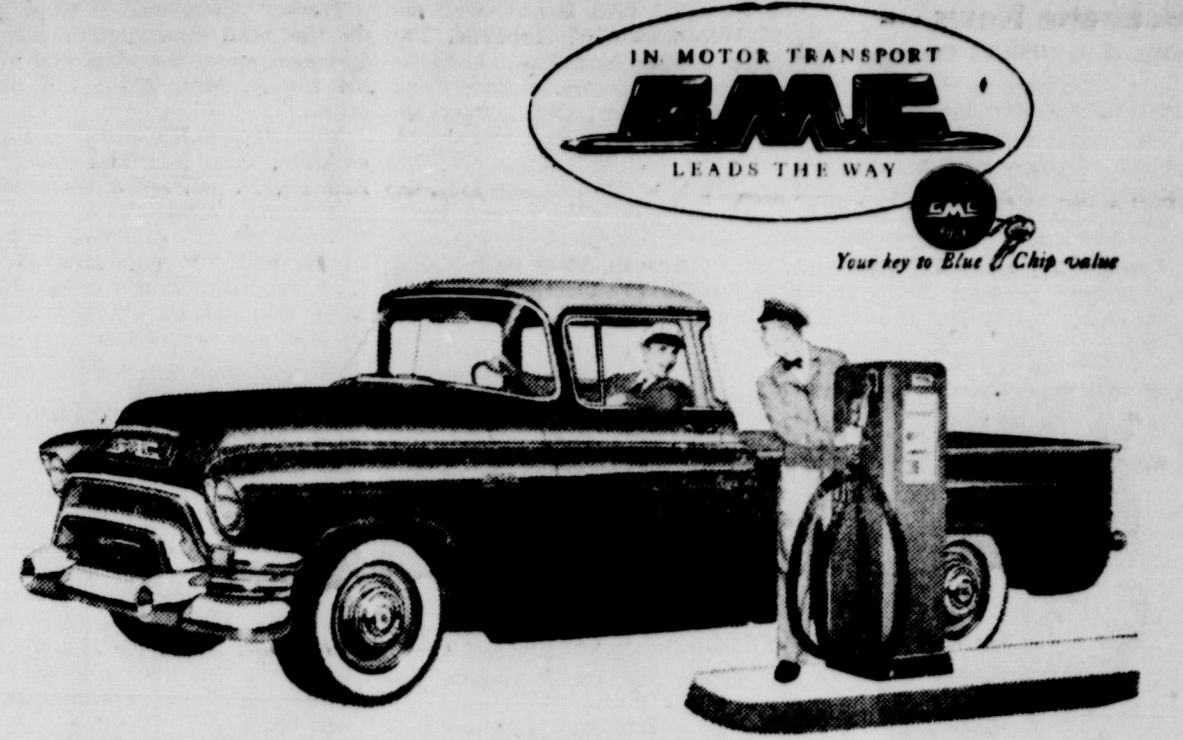

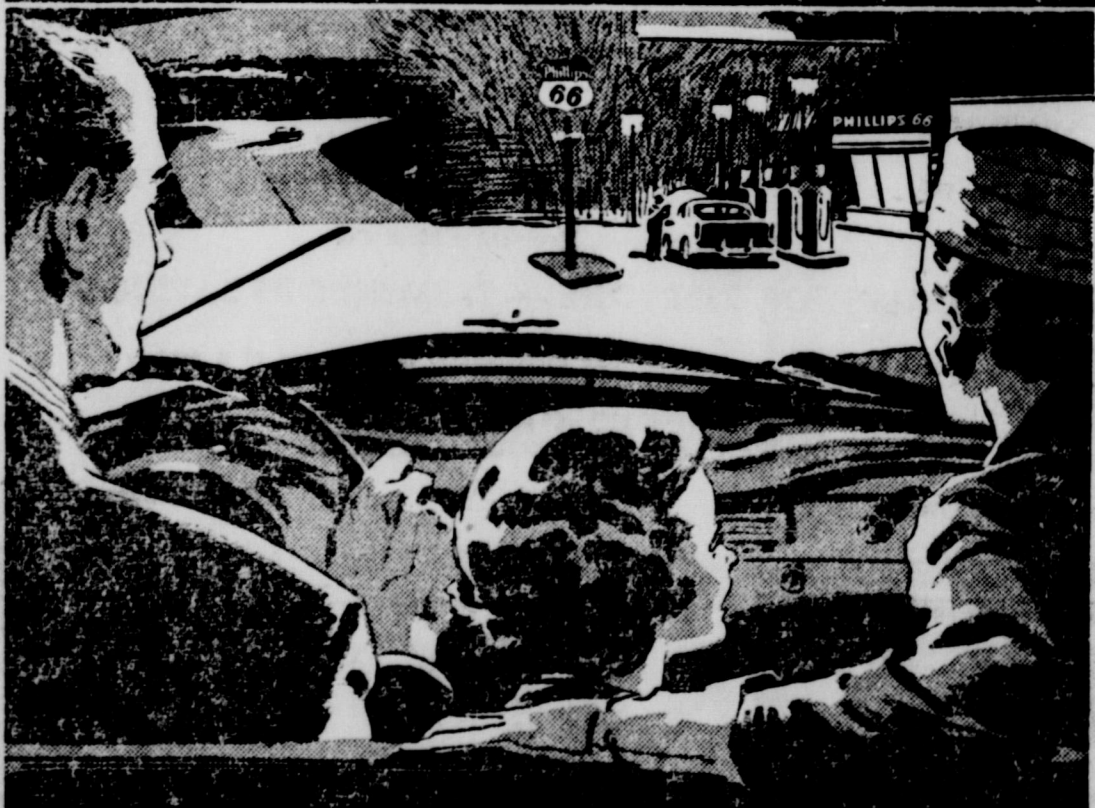

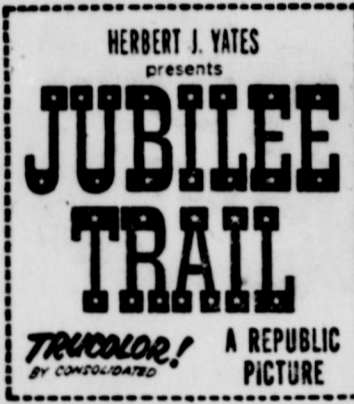
