CARS KILL 11 IN PANHANDLE

Eleven persons were killed and 70 injured in rural accidents investigated by Texas Highway Patrolmen in the Panhandle area during the month of April.

Property damage was estimated at \$59,930.00.

In the corresponding month of 1955, five persons were killed, 53 injured and property damage was set at \$54,725.00. In March of this year, five persons were killed, 48 injured and property damage estimated at \$58,955.00.

So far this year fatalities total 27, with 233 injured and property damage totalling \$260,494.00.

Of the accidents during April 58 were on state and federal highways, six on farm-to-market roads, nine on county roads and eight in towns of less than 2,500 population.

Listed as causative factors of the accidents were: speeding, driving while drinking, failure to grant right of way, following too closely and driving on the wrong side of the road.

Principal violation in March were: speeding, driving while drinking, failure to grant right of way, improper passing and miscellaneous hazardous violations.

In carrying out their basic duties of traffic law enforcement the 27 patrolmen of the district, composed of 26 Panhandle Counties, the patrolmen investigated 81 accidents, made 837 arrests including 343 for speeding and 24 for driving while intoxicated.

They issued 1,353 warnings for hazardous driving, served 19 Safety Responsibility Police Demand Orders, investigated one case for restoration of driver's license.

The patrolmen worked 4,232 day hours and 2,319 night hours and travelled 75,041 miles.

WHEAT CROP IS BELOW AVERAGE

A farm bulletin from the Texas Employment Commission, Amarillo states that wheat harvest prospects in the Shamrock, Pampa and Canadian areas have continued to decline.

Some rain was received May 1, but in most areas it was too late, the bulletin stated. It continued: wheat planted on fallow land may make five to 10 bushels per acre. That planted on last year's stubble has little chance. Harvest should begin by June 15.

The Department of Agriculture estimated as of May 1, a crop of 18,450,000 bushels. This is somewhat above last year's disastrously low production of 13,464,000 bushels, but considerably below the 1945-54 average of 50,246,000 bushels.

Indicated yield per harvested acre at nine bushels is unchanged from a year earlier but 1.6 bushels below the average.

Only 2,050,000 acres, or less than half the planted acreage, are now expected to be harvested.

SERVICE FIRMS OF COUNTY IN MILLION CLASS

Receipts of 75 service establishments enumerated in Wheeler County in the 1954 Census of Business amounted to about \$880,000, according to a preliminary report covering service trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$171,000. They reported 106 employees of whom 81 worked full-time in the day period ending nearest November 15.

Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated businesses numbered 87.

Establishments providing personal services numbered 32 and reported receipts of \$281,000.

Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repair, parking and other automotive services numbered nine and had receipts of \$133,000.

Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 37 and had receipts of \$466,000.

"Personal services" group included such businesses as barber and beauty shop, cleaning and dyeing plants, laundries, and laundry services, garment alteration and repair services, funeral services, photographic studios, shoe repair shops and shine parlors, as well as other personal services.

"Automotive services" group included general automobile repair shops, battery service shops, tire repair shops, body repair and paint shops, and other miscellaneous automotive services.

The Wheeler Boy Scout troop will attend Camp Ki-O-Wah the week of June 17 to June 23, according to an announcement made this week by Scoutmaster Frank Walker.

The boys will assemble at the scout hut Sunday afternoon at 1:30 and leave for camp as soon thereafter as possible. Mr. Walker expects at least three adult leaders to be with the boys on that trip. During the week they are in camp two adults will be with them each day with stay periods overlapping, Mr. Walker said.

At camp this year, first and second class work will be stressed, the scoutmaster said. All phases of scouting will be available this year and special work will be done in fields that are hardest for local troops to handle. Canoeing and swimming along with life saving are some of the more popular parts of the camping experience, Mr. Walker said.

Sixteen boy scouts and two explorer scouts are expected to make the trip to camp this summer. Explorers must be active with the scout troop as senior patrol leaders to be eligible to attend the camp.

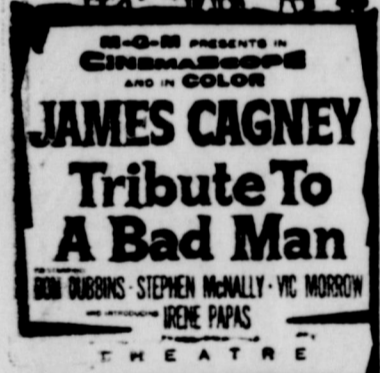
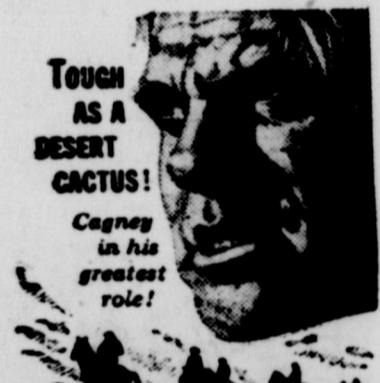
