ROBISONS HURT IN CAR WRECK

Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Robison were injured about 3 p.m. Saturday in an automobile accident 17 miles west of Clovis, N. M. They were enroute to Socorro, N. M., to spend Christmas with their son and family.

The Robisons were traveling west on Highway 70 when their car collided with a car containing Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Morgan and their daughter of Phoenix, Ariz.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Robison were hospitalized at a Clovis hospital. Mr. Robison suffered some cracked ribs and was released after treatment. Mrs. Robison sustained cuts and bruises of the face and ankle, an arm was hurt and several ribs cracked. She was the more painfully injured of the two.

Investigating officers said that the Morgan car was trying to pass a pick-up truck when the accident happened. The two cars met in a head-on collision.

Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show Saturday

Plans have been set to hold the Annual Wheeler County Jr. Livestock Show, Saturday, December 29, 1956, starting at 10 a.m. at the Wheeler County Jr. Livestock Show Barn in Wheeler, according to Mr. C. J. Van Zandt, General Chairman of the show. The judge will be Mr. L. D. "Dug" Wyth, Jr., Associate County Agent, with headquarters at Amarillo, Texas. Dug was a member of the Texas A & M Livestock Judging Team, Inter coach and trainer of the Livestock Judging Team at Texas A & M, and now working on the Beef Cattle Progeny Testing Program in Extension District 1 and 2.

All beef calves are to be weighed by Fat Jones prior to 9 a.m. and be in the show barn by 9 a.m. according to the Beef Cattle Supt. John Daberry. The Swine to be exhibited are to be in their pens by 9 a.m. so they may be weighed and classed according to Swine Supt. Raymond Moore. The Sheep are to be in their pens by 9 a.m. so they may be classed for the show according to Sheep Supt. Ira Passons.

Judging will start promptly at 10 a.m. and Harry Wofford, County Clerk, will be the mike announcing all events and winners as judging progresses. The lambs and fat barrows will be shown in the morning and the beef calves will be shown after dinner.

Banners will be awarded the Grand and Reserve Champions of the beef, barrow, and lamb divisions. The ribbons and banners have been donated by the Kiwanis Club of Wheeler and the prize money donated by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau and the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Showmanship awards will be made to the boy or girl judged best in the showmanship in the steers, barrow, and lamb division.

FEED PROGRAM EXTENDED HERE

Walter T. McKay, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, today advised John L. Manning, County Supervisor, of the extension of the Emergency Feed Grain Program in Wheeler and Hemphill Counties. Under this extension, farmers and ranchers may now file applications through February 15, 1957 for a supply of feed grain necessary to carry their basic livestock through March 15, 1957. Mr. McKay also advised that the Emergency Roughage Program will be extended, however, there will be a delay in accepting applications for roughage until sometime in early January since financial aspects of the program are being worked out in Washington.

FARM BUREAU AND SOIL BANK

Texas Farm Bureau members will join with members from all over the nation during the next sessions of Congress in attempting to amend soil bank legislation to carry out Farm Bureau policies.

Many specific Farm Bureau recommendations are included in the Agricultural Act of 1956. However, at Miami Beach, Fla., Dec. 13, delegates to the American Farm Bureau convention approved the following recommendations "in order that the soil bank may make a maximum contribution to the solution of our surplus problem."

Maximum possible use should be made of Commodity Credit Corporation for payments in kind under the acreage reserve program. Certificates entitling producers to payments in grains other than rice should be interchangeable.

No acreage placed in the soil bank under either the acreage reserve or the conservation reserve should be harvested or grazed under any circumstances.

Farmers placing land in either the acreage reserve or conservation reserve should be required to maintain the acreage of other land on the farm that normally is idle or devoted to uses that exclude it from the soil bank base.

Producers desiring price supports should be required to place cropland in the soil bank in amounts determined by applying a percentage factor to their acreage of price supported crops. This recommendation is not intended to require a reduction of acreage devoted to allotted crops. Producers would be free to meet this requirement either by placing such amounts of their allotted acreage as they desire, in the acreage reserve program, or by placing "non-allotted" acreage in the conservation reserve program. In either case soil bank payments would be earned.



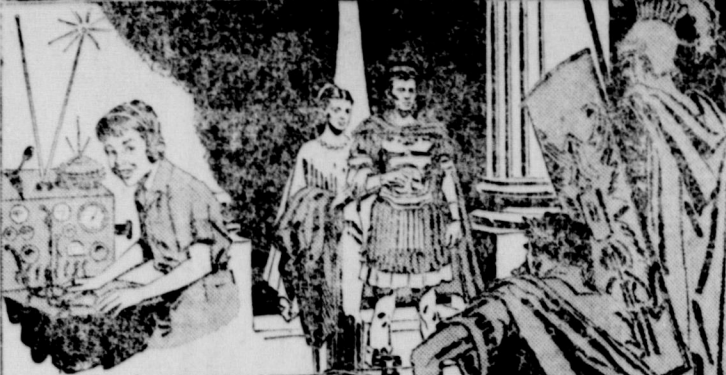

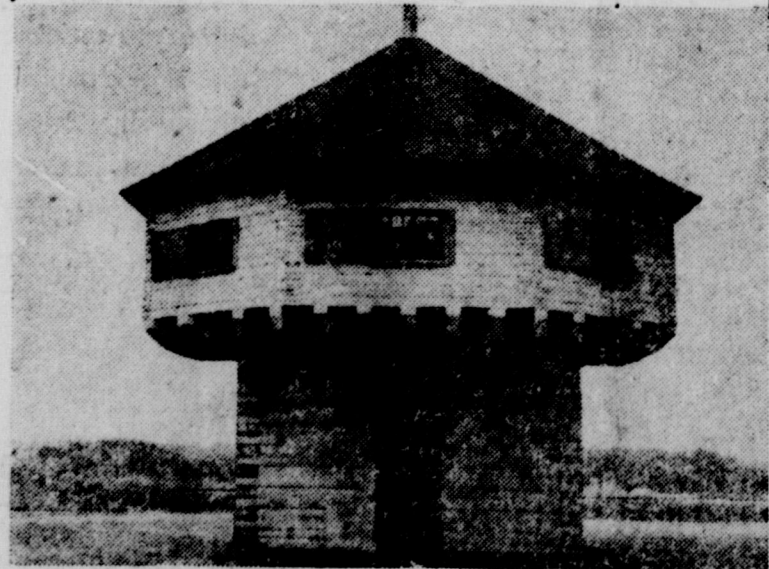

Blockhouse Honors Hero



Built by the British as a stronghold to repel Indian raids in the early 18th century, this blockhouse at Erie, Pa., is preserved in honor of an American Revolutionary War hero, General Anthony Wayne. A new fire-resistant asphalt roof now protects the historic treasure from fire.

A two-century-old blockhouse still stands on the site of the British-built "lake posts" at Erie, Pa., a memorial to one of America's great Revolutionary War generals, Anthony Wayne. The blockhouse has been preserved in all its original detail except for the roof, which has been protected with fire-resistant asphalt shingles, the same material used on most new homes.

Wayne, who earned the nickname "Mad Anthony" for his feats of incredible daring at the head of his troops, died at the lake posts while in command of occupational forces there in 1796. At his request, he was buried at the base of the blockhouse, but his remains were removed ten years later to the Wayne family burial ground in Radnor, Pa.
