Appreciation day for Dr. John L. Witt of Groom will be held at the Groom Public School Auditorium, Groom, at 8:00 p.m. Sunday, April 28, 1968. The program will be sponsored by the Groom Lions Club and citizens of the community and area invited to attend and pay tribute to this country doctor who has served so many of the 33 years he has been in practice in Groom. Master of ceremonies for appreciation program will be C. L. Culver, pioneer banker of Groom, who has been a resident since 1929. Dr. John L. Witt arrived in Groom in 1935, fresh out of college and took up practice following the illness of late Dr. Robert Foster. Training as an osteopathic physician and surgeon brought patients from a wide area of the Texas Panhandle. In 1946, he was joined in practice here by his cousin, the late Dr. John V. Witt and the two doctors opened a clinic which soon became well known over the state. The City of Groom now

City Council City Is Accepting Pool Applications

The City sponsored Rabies Clinic for the vaccination of pets in Wheeler will be held earlier this year. The clinic will be at the Fire Station May 1, 1968, from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Dr. Byron Range, Shamrock Veterinarian will be at the fire station to give rabies vaccinations to all dogs, cats and other pets brought to the station. Pets may be immunized for one year or 39 months. The one year immunization which may be given to any age animal will cost \$2.50. The 39 month vaccination is optional on all dogs above 5 1/2 months of age, but cannot be given to cats. The 39 month immunization will cost \$3.00. Vaccination tags and certificates will be given each animal immunized. In order to minimize dog fights or straying of pets, all dogs to be vaccinated should be on leash. Cats should be brought to the fire station in a cage. In the 17 years Dr. Range has been in Wheeler County he has not had any cases

of Rabies in dogs. However there have been a few cases reported in cats and skunks. This clinic is open to anyone who wishes to bring their pet to the fire station Wednesday, May 1. County Judge George Hefley and the County Commissioners urge everyone to take advantage of this opportunity to have their pet vaccinated. The Texas Veterinary Medical Association states that rabies is a virus disease which attacks the central nervous system (brain) that is invariably fatal in any warm blooded animal and is transmitted by a bite of an infected animal. This disease is found in wild life as well as in domestic dogs and cats. It is also transmissible to man. Vaccination against rabies is very reliable. A booster should be administered to maintain a good immunity. The Wheeler FFA Boys will pick up your pet and take it to be vaccinated. If you need the "ag boys" to render this service, call 2511.

District Court To Convene Monday

FHA NEWS RURAL BUYING POWER INCREASED

Many Wheeler, Hemphill and Roberts County low-income rural people have increased buying power, as a result of Federal Opportunity loans, according to John L. Manning, the Farmers Home Administration local representative. Mr. Manning, who has been Farmers Home Administration's Wheeler County Supervisor for 13 years, said some 9 farm and other rural families received over \$17,950 in economic opportunity loans since July 1, 1967. They used the loans, Manning said, to develop small businesses and improve their farming operations. Over 2,700 opportunity loans have been made in Texas since the beginning of the program in January 1965 with more than 430 being made this fiscal year. The opportunity loans are part of the Federal anti-poverty program, which Congress enacted three years ago. The loan program is administered by the Farmers Home Administration for the Office of Economic Opportunity. Low-income rural people, through the local Farmers Home Administration Office, may receive loans up to \$3,500 to develop income-producing businesses or to enlarge farming operations. VETERANS NEWS Information For Home Buyers

Home shoppers might find their best buy on real estate today in sales listings prepared by the Veterans Administration, Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said today. Nonveterans as well as veterans can purchase the homes listed, Coker added. Houses owned by the VA were financed originally with GI loans or direct loans, but the owners have failed to keep up the mortgage payments. The houses are in excellent condition and are usually located in convenient communities and desirable neighborhoods. Many are rehabilitated and redecorated before they are offered for sale to the public. One of the greatest advantages for most purchasers is built-in government financing, according to Coker. Other advantages are low closing costs, not attorney fees and quick settlements with early possession. The homes can be bought through any licensed real estate broker. The Veterans Administration pays the broker's commission. At times, only a small down payment is required. The mortgage may run for as much as 30 years with low payments that are comparable to rental costs. Full information is available from any VA Regional Office or by writing to Loan Guaranty Service, Veterans Administration, Washington, D.C. 20420. VA homes are for sale all over the country. About \$1 million in un-deliverable checks is returned to the Veterans Administration each year. This means that some 12,000 persons miss at least one payment of their monthly compensation, pension or other VA benefit. In some instances, failure to receive a monthly check results in a hardship to the family involved. To help solve this problem the VA advises all recipients to give the VA and the Post Office Department their new address, including Zip Code, when they plan to move.

ACROSS THE FENCE

BY MAX HATTER, CAA

The short grass is starting to green up and feeding cattle should slow in the next few weeks as more grazing becomes available. A lot of cotton land and maize land has been readied for planting by farmers over the county as favorable weather allowed leeway for field work. With cotton planting time

just around the corner, let's talk about something that greatly affect total yield from your acreage - Cotton Seeding Diseases. Fungi bacteria and nematodes are most damaging during periods that favor their development but are unfavorable for plant development. It is important to bury all surface trash below the planting level and plant the seeds on beds to allow proper drainage. Seeds should be treated with a chemical fungicide to control seed surface borne organisms and prevent seed rot. The seed should be of good quality and should give a high germination of normal seedlings at 65 degrees in 7 days. Lower quality seeds require higher temperatures and longer to germinate. To test the seed quality before planting, you can construct an incubator from an old refrigerator that will cool to 65 degrees. An electric light bulb controlled by a thermostat may be used to raise temperatures to 65 degrees. After seven days at the 65 degree temperature, high quality seed will germinate and have a straight root about 1 1/2 inches long. Low quality seed will have poor germination and roots which are coiled or nubbed. To assure a satisfactory stand, it may be necessary to apply an in-cropping fungicide when seedling disease has consistently been a problem. Sprays, dusts or granules may be used and they should be thoroughly mixed with the soil used to cover the seed in the furrow.

Up to 25% of our Agricultural producers will receive Acreage survey forms on May 29 from the USDA Statistical Reporting Service, according to Cary Palmer, Agricultural statistician in charge of the project. These

crop reports have been going on for over a hundred years and have been important aids to farmers in planning their production and marketing activities. Data is collected primarily from voluntary reporters, including 40,000 farmers and ranchers, 6,000 agricultural businesses and 250 County Agents.

Chemicals for Healthier Ornamentals: Keeping fungi and nematode populations under control on ornamental plants will make them healthier and more attractive. The most effective controls come from the use of chemicals. Check on this at your local feed store.

Winners will be recognized at an awards program at 3:15 p.m. Romy Enns, Dallam County 4-H'er, will preside at the general assembly while Cynthia Hanna of Deaf Smith County will be chairman at the awards program.

Youngsters will participate in 28 individual and team demonstrations and contests.

Junior and senior contests will be held in most instances although only the senior winners will compete at the state level. To compete in the senior division, a member must be 14 years of age or older.

The quarter horse judging and livestock judging contests will get underway at 9 a.m. and all other contests will begin following the general assembly.

Demonstrations that will be a part of the day's competitive contests include civil defense, community improvement, cooperative, dairy, electric, farm and ranch management, field crop, forestry, horse, natural resources, poultry, safety vegetable preparation and use and vegetable production and marketing.

Other contests include beef cattle business, clothing educational activity, entomology, foods and nutrition educational activity, money management educational activity, poultry marketing, public speaking, range and pasture grass identification, rifle, share-the-fun, soil evaluation and tractor operator.

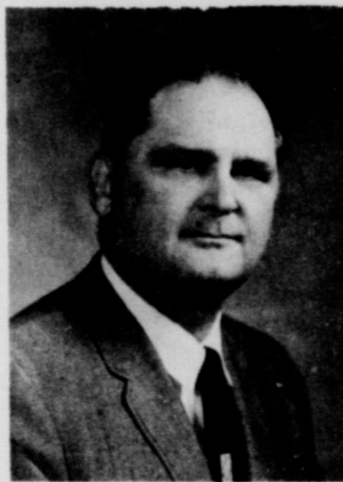

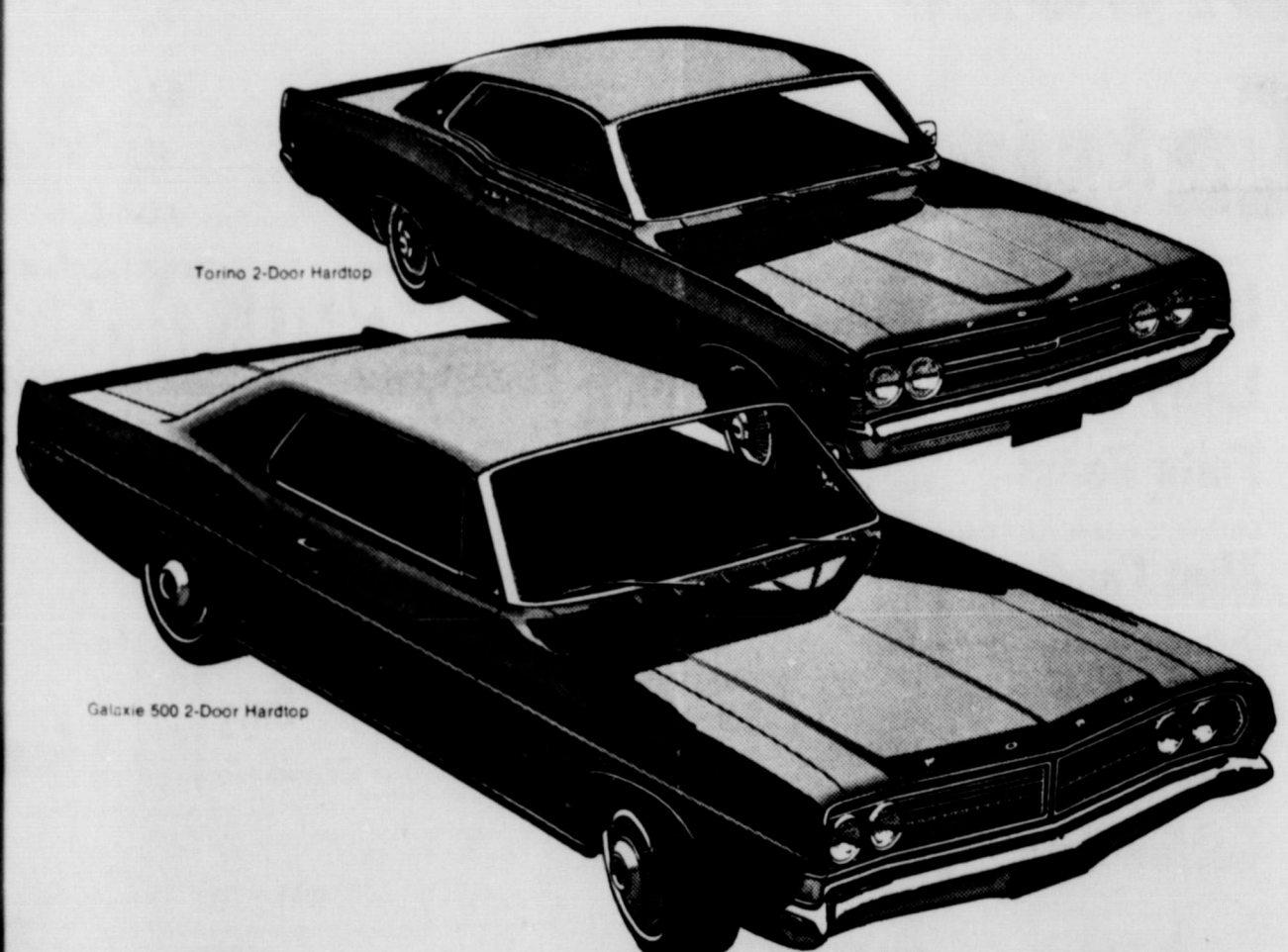
