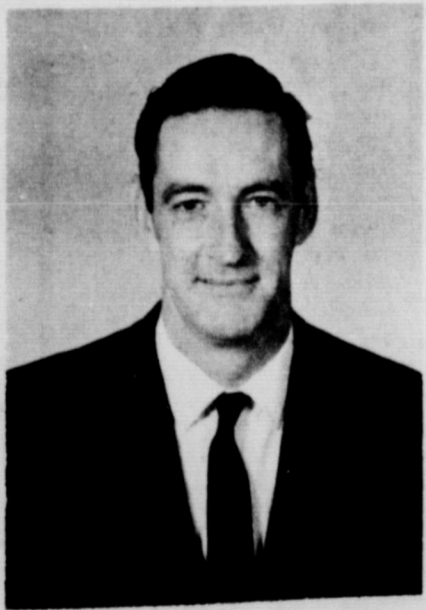

Accidents are more prevalent among people over 65. The reasons are that they are less able to recognize danger because the senses are not as acute, their reactions are slower and they tire much faster. Frequently, because they don't want to be a burden to others, they do not ask for special environmental safeguards and assistance that they need. Be alert to their needs.

Many older people take medicines. Some good rules to follow are these:
"Never store such products as medicines, cleaning agents or pesticides near foods and spices."
"Prepare special medicine labels with large letters for those with poor sight."
"Pour medicine from side opposite the label to keep exterior of bottles clean."
"Paste or glue bits of sandpaper on the bottles and caps of medicine that are not to be taken internally."
"For extra protection, draw a red X on external medicine labels."

*Store internal medicines separate from external medicines.

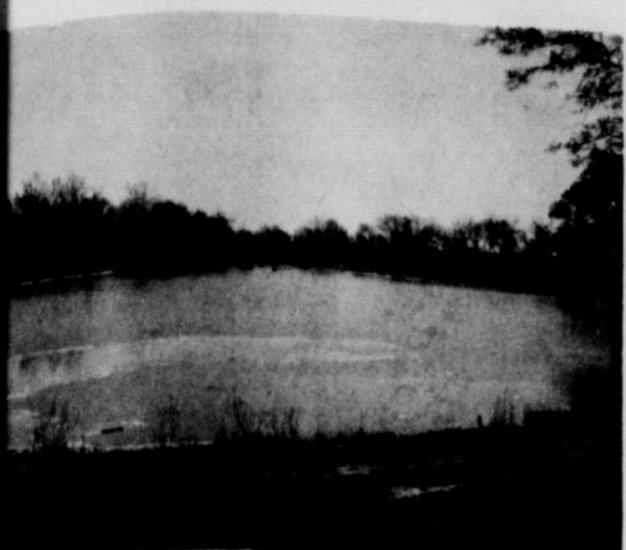

Rain in major wheat counties has improved crop prospects, at least temporarily. Currently, a bumper crop is expected from about 7% less acreage. Spotted alfalfa aphids and Pea Aphids were plentiful but beneficial insects like lady beetles are very active. We received several calls from farmers considering chemical control. With buildups of ladybeetles, it should be remembered that insecticides will also kill the aphids natural enemies.

Received a note from Al Novosad, Pasture Specialist at Texas A&M a few days ago concerning Midland Bermuda Grass. He says that Midland Bermuda would be the best choice for a hybrid bermuda in our area. NK-37 or Common bermuda don't have the production potential that we have with Midland, he added.

With improved growing conditions, pastures are supporting a lot more livestock. Saw where Bob Zybach at Briscoe was grazing about 80 cows on 24 acres.

Thomas Tomlinson: Crimson center, crimson blotches in green border, many leaves.

Outdoor Planting: Wait until all danger of frost is past to plant out in the open. Plant the Caladium tuber in moderately rich beds prepared as for most summer flowers. Give adequate water and good drainage. Overwatering will decay the tubers. Moisture should be checked by digging down a few inches in the bed. It is important to keep the soil moist at all times, but not soggy. Tubers should be planted 2 inches deep and 18 inches apart. Pack the soil firmly around them.

If Caladiums are started indoors, harden them by gradually exposure to outside conditions. For early plants, sprout the tubers in peat moss, sand or loose soil. Set into larger pots or outdoors

to spread. If a bloom bud starts up, pinch it off or the plant will produce few leaves.

When plant food is needed for proper growth, apply one tablespoon of 5-10-5 or 4-12-4 per plant as a sidedressing three times during the growing season.
