

MUSTANGS EDGE SILVERTON OWLS 16-8

David Britt
Wheeler Mustangs
in a torrid passing
game in the last quarter and
to gain their first
win with a 16-8 con-
quest of the Silverton Owls
Friday night.
The Mustangs came back
to win 16 points in the third
quarter and the fans were on
their feet in the fourth quar-
ter. The Owls put on a des-
perately in this district
for both teams.
The win was the fourth
for the charges of
Cottrell and put the
Mustangs in a three way tie
with Clarendon and McLean
for the lead.
Following the opening kick-
off the Owls made the first
down of the game as they
went to the Mustang 19 and
some fortune smiled on

the visitors as Grady fumb-
led and Donald Rives recover-
ed for Wheeler at the 16.

Failing to move the ball,
the Mustangs had to punt
and a personal foul penalty
on the tackle gave the Owls
good field position at the
Wheeler 41. The Owls could
not go and booted the ball
into the end zone.

The Mustangs drew their
third 15 yard fine of the quar-
ter and had to kick again and
for the first time in the game,
the Owls had possession on
their side of the 50. Grady
got 17 out to the 45 on the
option play and it looked like
the Mustangs were going to
have their backs against the
wall again.

Grady lost 2 yards and a
pass was complete for another
2 yard loss and Silverton
quick-kicked on third down.
The kick travelled only 3
yards and Wheeler had their

first good field position of
the night, but it was short
lived.

Moving down to the Owl
27 on slants at the tackles
by Donald Rives, the Must-
angs saw their bid fail as
Rives fumbled and the Owls
recovered at the 29. The quar-
ter ended four plays later.

After an exchange of
punts, which Wheeler had the
best of throughout the game,
the Owls got the pigskin at
their 33. Cletus Grady, who
was a demon on offense for
the Owls, got 12 yards on
second down but was whack-
ed real hard at the Mustang
48 and the ball popped free
and Roy Chick fell on it for
Wheeler.

Once more the Mustangs
were halted and this time by
a pass interception by Lannie
Arnold at the Owl 11. The
first half ended with the
Mustangs near the midfield

stripe following a Silverton
kick.

The Big Owls stopped the
Mustangs short of a first
down to start the second half
and Britt punted 49 yards to
the Silverton 30. Here the
Mustang defense got the
first points of the game.
Chick threw Grady for a six
yard loss on first down and
then Dickie Burton put Arnold
to the ground for a 16 yard
loss as he attempted to pass
on third down. Facing fourth
down at the 7, Arnold dropped
back to kick from his end
zone. Wheeler put the big
rush on and a swarm of gold
shirts banged Arnold to the
end zone and Wheeler went
on top 2-0.

The Owls punted on their
free kick and Wheeler had
the ball at the Mustang 36.
Tommy Cole got the Mustangs
fourth first down of the game
with two slashes but fumbled

on the third play and Sil-
verton recovered at the Owl
49. Driving to the Wheeler
31, the Owls faced fourth
with a yard needed. Bill
Strange took a pitch from
Arnold and headed around
the Mustangs right flank but
Dickie Burton, Ronald Rives,
and Steve Simmons were there
and Strange picked himself
up four yards behind the line.

From the Mustang 35,
the visitors from Wheeler
headed goalward. Rives got
6 up the middle and Britt
followed with six more for a
first down. Britt picked up
5 more yards and then on the
fourth play of the series, a
hole opened up at left guard
and Britt popped through and
was gone for 48 yards and
the TD. The clock showed
2:16 remaining in the third
period as Tommy Cole kicked
the Mustangs into a 9-0 lead.
When Silverton couldn't

gain after the kickoff, another
short punt, this one for 7
yards, & Wheeler was on the
way from the Owl 25. Rives
skirted the right side for 12
and a first down at the 13.
Britt got three and Rives
added another 6 to the four
yard line. On the final play
of the quarter, Rives broke
into the end zone and with
Cole booting true, the Must-
angs had a 16 point bulge
going into the final stanza.

If Wheeler had hopes of
Silverton quitting, these hopes
were quickly dispelled.
The Owls took the kickoff and
behind the running of Grady
and Strange, moved to the
Wheeler 23 where they set up
shop with a first down.

Arnold went to the air but
Dave Britt intercepted the
toss on first down at the
Mustang 7. The Mustangs
gouged out a couple of first
downs but were forced to

kick and the Owls had it at
their 41.

A pass interference call
against Donald Rives gave
the Owls another shot at the
Wheeler 49. Three complete
passes moved the Owls to the
Mustang 7 and a first
down. Cole broke up a pass
in the end zone and then
Ronald Rives threw Arnold
for a 5 yard loss. Arnold
couldn't find a receiver open
and ran to the 3 on third down.
A fourth down pass was tipped
by Manning but Mike Tate
came down with it and the
official ruled that he was
still in the end zone for the
Owls touchdown. Arnold passed
to Whitfield for the two
points and with 2:07 to play,
the Mustangs lead had been
shaved to eight points.

Every fan and player knew
that the Owls would try an
onside kick and sure enough
they did and recovered at

the Wheeler 47. Grady got
5 at right end and then Ar-
nold passed to Tate for a
first down at the 31. An
incomplete pass stopped the
clock and then after a 3 yard
completion to Strange, the
Owls called time with 1:23
remaining. Tate broke for
the end zone on third down
but Britt knocked the pass from
Arnold to the ground and the
Owls faced fourth down and 7.
The Owls called on their big
gun but Grady got only 6 and
Wheeler took over at their
22 with 1:05 left. Silverton
had only one time out left
and the Mustangs simply
stalled the rest of the time
for their hard fought 16-8
triumph.

Rives and Britt each net-
ted 85 yards in the contest
rushing and Cole had 34 and
Simmons tacked on 3 for the
Mustangs total of 207 yards
rushing.

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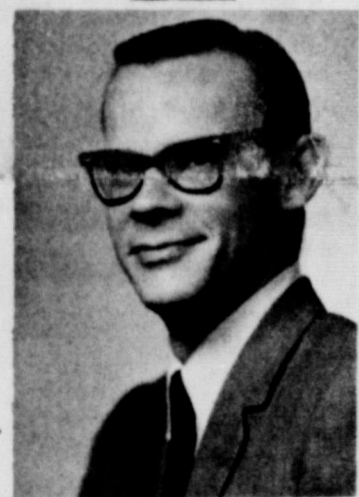

**COUNCIL MEETS . . .
James Martin Is
Hired By City**

The City Council passed
an ordinance calling for a
Sales Tax Election and hired
a new employee at their meet-
ing Monday, October 21.

James Earl Martin was
hired by the Council to fill
the vacancy left by the pro-
motion of Cecil Snelgroves
to the position of Water Su-
perintendent. The former wa-
ter superintendent, Ed Trim-
ble, resigned his position
in September. Several appli-
cations were considered by
the Council, with Martin's
familiarity with plumbing
being a prime consideration.

The Council voted to
donate \$75.00 to the Library
fund. This policy has been
followed for many years by
the council to help with the
operation of the Wheeler
Public Library.

The council voted to
accept an offer of \$50.00 per
acre oil lease from Harry
Wofford on the 20 acres of
city property where the city
sewage disposal plant is
located. The lease is for a
period of five years.

A special meeting will be
called later in the month.
At this time the Council will
pass an ordinance calling
for an election on street pav-
ing. The council proposes to
use a 1% Sales Tax to help
finance the paving project.
The Sales Tax election and
the Paving election are set
for December 4.

Gilvin-Terrill Inc. of Ama-
rillo was awarded a contract
for grading, structures, base
and surfacing on sections
totaling 13.3 miles of Farm
to Market roads 1046 and 277,
in Wheeler County. Lowbid
was \$257,954.86.

The project extends from
U.S. Highway 83 eastward
and northward to the Hempt-
hill County line. O. V. John-
son of Wellington, is the Tex-
as Highway Department engi-
neer in charge of the project
which will take an estimated
100 working days.

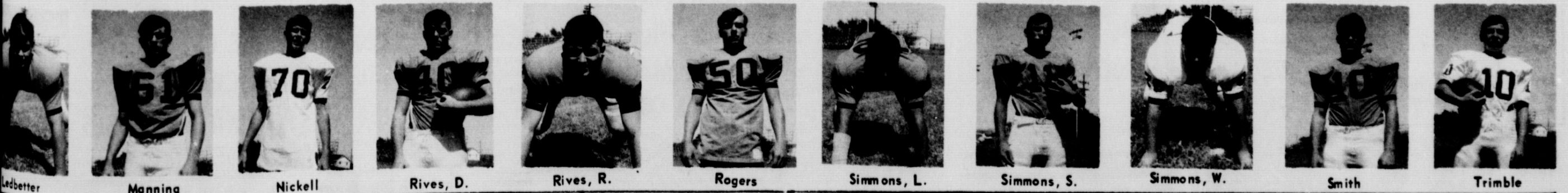

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PRODUCT LABELING

Food buying is easier these days. You no longer have to mull over the meaning of a "jumbo" pound or "giant" quart . . . or to search diligently for package weights and product ingredients.

These changes are a result of the Fair Packaging and Labeling Act of 1966 and every food package was to meet the requirements of the law by July 1968.

The following is a description of what is required on a food package:

1. Net contents of package - in terms of total ounces, followed by a separate statement showing pounds and ounces.
2. In contrasting bold face type that is easy to read - in the lower 30 percent of the display panel
3. Name of the product and product form unless it is illustrated.
4. Ingredients in order of their importance.
5. Name, address and zip code of manufacturer, packer or distributor.

The packaging law also prohibits the use of some

terms on labels. For example such exaggerating terms like "full" gallon or "jumbo" pound cannot be used. Terms such as "cents off" cannot be used unless the manufacturer is really offering his product in local stores at a price lower than the regular retail price.

You will no longer find half empty containers on the grocery shelves, unless the extra air space is essential to protect the product.

What does all this mean to you - the consumer? Essentially, this law enables you to get factual information about the food products you buy, according to the specialist. It also makes it easier to compare prices, per ounce, of various products in varying package sizes.

But, the law does not standardize package sizes, so read the label carefully.

CONSUMER INFORMATION

Food additives have been used since primitive man preserved his meat with salt.

Today additives are used in carefully controlled amounts of foods to change the food in some way. They are chemicals - but consumers should not be alarmed by the long complex names of the additives.

All food additives must be safe. Before a food additive is approved for use, it is studied for years. The 1958 Food Additives Amendment was enacted to protect the public by requiring pre-testing of additives. Federal law requires truthful labeling of food additives.

Food additives have many uses to improve the nutritive value of foods. For example, vitamin D is added to milk and other dairy products.

Additives are used for flavoring - salt, pepper, nutmeg, ginger, caraway, to add color and to preserve foods.

On the label of a loaf of bread you have probably seen the words "calcium and sodium propionate added to retard spoilage." These propionates, found naturally in Swiss cheese, have the ability of keeping bread from becoming moldy.

Emulsifiers and stabilizers often are added to foods to produce or maintain a desired consistency. Food additives perform other functions: foaming agents for pressure packed topping; curing agents for preservation, clarifying agents for preventing cloudiness in vinegar, etc.

The consumer should be aware that the Food and Drug Administration does not approve the use of a food additive unless it is safe for human consumption. If food additives were not used, the quality and quantity of food supply would deteriorate and prices would go up. Thus, additives help to make our food supply plentiful, nutritious, safe, convenient, varied, good tasting and economical.

CHICKEN-AVOCADO-RICE SALAD

- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cups cubed avocado
- 1 cup cubed cooked chicken
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/2 teaspoon finely chopped green onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sour cream
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise

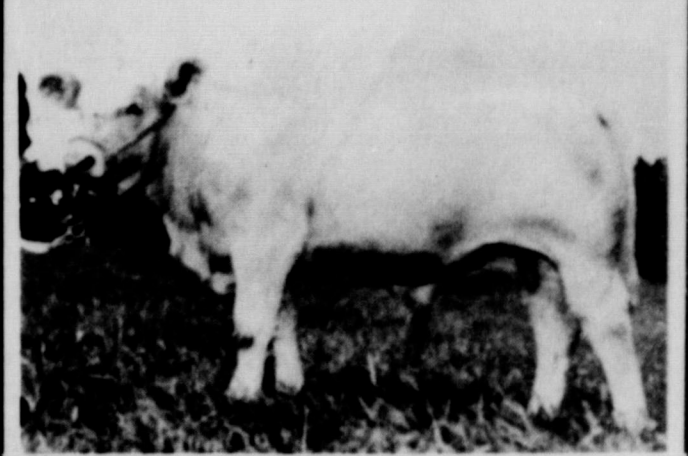

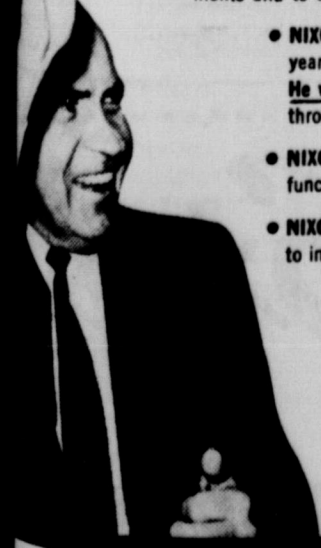
