# Across the Fence

The Cotton crop isn't as good as it was last year. Prices have been running as good as or a little better than last year. We have seen yields of 1/2 to 2/3 of a bale to the acre so far. We harvested our cotton variety and fertility trials on the C. B. Brotherton, Jr. farms. Right now it looks like the fall rains came too late to take advantage of

the added fertilizer. Alfalfa is becoming a popular crop. With the new feedlot demand, we look for increased plantings in our area. They're using honey bees down in Ward county in alfalfa to increase seed alfalfa yields. Local seed growers working with their county agent, E. J. Harrison, more than doubled former yields. E. J. was assistant county agent when I was a 4-H club member in McLennan Co.


