Wheeler County Gives Nod To Richard Nixon

Wheeler County, the first county in the state of Texas to report its complete unofficial election returns to the State Election Bureau in Dallas, picked Richard Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge, Republican candidates for President and Vice President respectively, by a 1428 to 1011 margin.

With the exception of the presidential race Wheeler County went Democratic. In the Governor's race, Price Daniel received 1820 votes as compared to Republican Steger's 618 votes.

For Senator Johnson led Tower by a margin of 1355 to 1076.

Wheeler County went along with the rest of the state by giving the nod on all four of the amendments.

PANHANDLE IS REPUBLICAN STATE PICKS THE WINNER

The Democratic presidential ticket swept to a narrow lead in Texas Tuesday and maintained that edge at a late hour in the vote counting.

Sen. John F. Kennedy led Vice President Richard M. Nixon 564,689 votes to 542,784 at 10 p.m. with 175 of 254 counties reporting including 26 complete. At this stage about one-third of the expected Texas vote had been counted.

If the Democratic ticket can maintain that edge, it thus will have pulled Texas back into the Demo column after an absence since 1952. A national Democratic victory also means a Texas vacancy in the Senate because Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson was the party's vice presidential nominee. This would call for a special election to fill the vacancy.

Johnson was well ahead in his bid for re-election to the Senate. He appeared for two offices on the Texas ballot.

Democrats also wrapped up virtually all statewide and county offices.

Rep. Bruce Alger only Republican in the Texas congressional delegation, led in his county, Dallas.

The four counties with the largest vote, all of which went Republican in 1952 and 1956, showed a split this year.

While Dallas, Harris and Tarrant counties tended toward the narrow edge to the Democrats.

Only three times has the state gone Republican in presidential elections—in 1928, 1952 and 1956.

This year, counties which were Democratic all three years tended to stay with that party. Numerous counties which went Republican in those three years went Democratic Tuesday.

The Constitution party fielded candidates, but the party did not campaign actively. The Texas Election Bureau did not tabulate the party's vote totals in some instances. It also did not compile vote totals Tuesday night for some of the secondary races in which Republicans were entered.

It was the wildest loudest presidential campaign in Texas history.

While the candidates pounded hard on major issues, some of the highlights were more interesting.

For instance the time former President Harry Truman halted a speech as if in shock that the GOP might win and then declared heatedly that if Texans voted for Republicans, Texans ought to go to hell.

And the Southern Baptist Convention president, Dr. M. B. Carroll of Memphis, Tenn., answered that Truman's Baptist Church kick him out if he didn't repent using such language.

And a couple of late happenings: A crowd delayed and screamed at Johnson for a half hour or more and blocked his passage to a luncheon speaking engagement in Dallas.

TIGERS TEAR PAST PONIES

The pigskin packin' acts of brothers Lloyd and Leroy Littlefield stewed up another District 1-B grid crown for Groom in Wheeler Friday night as the Tigers bowled over Wheeler's Mustangs, 28-0, before a slim, frost-bitten crowd.

In dealing the Mustangs their first conference setback, Coach Kenneth Miller's crew claimed their third straight league triumph. Having beaten it's two closest rivals, Claude and Wheeler, the Tigers meet Textline Friday night before wading into district play.

For the winners it might as well have been Littlefield night as Leroy tallied twice, Lloyd scored one TD and cousin Kit made the final touchdown.

As far as yardage was concerned, the talented ground gaining brother combination netted 252 of Groom's 321 yards rushing while Kit picked up 40 more. Lloyd rolled up 132 yards in 17 carries and Leroy covered 120 yards in 16 trips.

Staggering the Mustangs by capitalizing on a short Wheeler punt to score early in the game, Groom opened up a 20-0 halftime advantage by marching 76 yards for one touchdown and chalking up another with the aid of a Mustang fumble.

When Wheeler failed to move on its opening offensive series, the enthusiasm Irenthmen-ensuing punt traveled only eight yards against a brisk wind to the home team's 44. On the Tiger's second play, Lloyd shot through a hole in the left side of the Wheeler line to scoot 39 yards to score.

Highway Crew To Begin Work On U.S. Highway 83

The Texas Highway department has announced a new highway construction project beginning 1.2 Miles North of Shamrock on US Highway No. 83 for a distance of 3.0 Miles. The construction will consist of grading, drainage structures, widening structures, flexible base and surfacing portions of U.S. 83. The Texas Highway Department and the contractor, Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo, stated that the construction will begin November 7, 1960 and will be completed by July, 1961.

Clyde Drake, Sr. Resident Engineer of the Texas Highway Department, explained that traffic will be routed through the construction project. Drake pointed out that adequate barricades and warning signs will be prominently displayed, but that motorists should be extremely cautious in passing through equipment. The construction area will be zoned for a maximum speed of 40 miles per hour for the protection of motorists and workmen alike. The entire area and length will be patrolled to minimize inconveniences to motorists. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs, and speed zones, Drake said.

SUPERVISOR LISTS CREDIT RULES

John L. Manning, local supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration, this week named four points that successful farmers follow in making good use of credit.

His statement was part of a review of nine years of experience in the farm credit field, and was made at a training meeting of Farmers Home Administration county committeemen held at Wellington, Texas.

First, a successful farmer plans every step he is going to take, figures costs carefully, and borrows only as much as he needs.

Second, he considers both price and quality when buying, gets several cost estimates, and compares the relative value of new and second hand equipment.

Third, he borrows only to finance money making enterprises.

Fourth, he builds up a good credit rating. He plans his payments to come due when income will be available for debt payment. He takes proper care of security property. He makes his payments when due.

Mr. Manning said those principles gain yearly in importance as farming becomes more complex and farm costs increase.



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LOSSES SHOW ALARMING INCREASE ON FARMS & RANCHES

Fire losses in the United States increased an alarming 37 percent during the past 10 years, according to a report issued in 1959 alone.

Tragic figures were unveiled by Erbin L. Crowell of the general manager of the National Production Credit Association as he urged full cooperation by farmers, ranchmen and dairymen during National Fire Prevention Week, October 13-19.

The mounting fire losses present an increasing problem to our national economy," Crowell pointed out that the estimated fire loss on American farms and ranches in 1959 was \$18 million more than the preceding year.

The Canadian PCA is one of 36 agencies, owned and operated by farmers, ranchmen and stockholders, that provide short and intermediate agricultural credit to all 48 states.

Fire losses can have a devastating effect on the successful operation of a farm or ranch, he pointed out, and urged an effort to eliminate the cause of fire and to provide fire detection and fire fighting equipment to barns and their contents.

tents constitute 42.5 percent of the entire 1959 farm fire loss. Swellings and their contents were next with 35.5 percent, followed by livestock, other outbuildings and contents and farm machinery.

Listed as the most frequent causes of fires in farm homes in 1959 were chimneys and flues, ment, faulty chimneys and flues, defective and overloaded wiring systems and matches and smoking.

"A progressive start toward a year-around fire prevention program on our farms and ranches is a cleanup campaign to eliminate many fire hazards as possible during Fire Prevention Week," Crowell said.

The Canadian Production Credit Association has its central office in Canadian. A field office is located in Wheeler. The association serves an area composed of Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler counties.

H. H. Kealey of White Deer is president of the association's board of directors and Wallace N. Hamker of Booker is vice president. Other directors are C. B. Emmons of Wheeler, M. H. Smith of Canadian, Hugh Parsell of Canadian and M. Lawrence Elzey of Perryton. Crowell is manager and secretary-treasurer.

Meeting On Income Tax Will Be Held Thursday In Wheeler

A county wide educational income tax meeting will be held this Thursday night, 7 p.m., district court room, Wheeler. This meeting is sponsored by the farm management committee, chairman, Tom Puryear, Kelton, according to Bryan Swaim, County Agent.

Swaim said everyone was invited and specialists would be on hand to assist farmers, ranchers and people who figure income tax on problems such as: "What records are needed for income tax, what are business expenses, what may be deducted and exempted from tax, what may be depreciated and depleted, what and how capital gains and losses effect income tax and how inheritance and social security tax effects our income tax. This is an item we are all concerned with and one which we should understand in order to take advantage of the law as well as be sure we are doing our income tax correctly.

Swaim said even if we have someone else figure our tax, we must provide all the information. Therefore, we need to know what information is needed and how is the best method to keep this information over a period of years. Anyone of the major topics being discussed might save a person a days wages or more when properly applied.

E. M. Borden Is Finance Chairman

E. M. Borden, Wheeler has been named as Wheeler County chairman of the Lubbock Christian College 1960 Financial Campaign, according to Dr. F. W. Mattox, president of the college. Campaign goal has been set at \$2,077,000 with the Wheeler County goal set at \$13,700.00.

Lubbock Christian College, now in its fourth year of operation as a liberal arts junior college, has an enrollment this fall of approximately 380 students. Total campus assets amount to \$2,000,000 including the Auditorium-Administration Building, a 60-room women's dormitory, and 14 semi-permanent buildings. A giant field house, 382 by 182 feet, now under construction, will be one of the largest in the nation.

The campaign is designed to complete financing of the two present permanent buildings, provide for erection and equipment of the field house and build a dormitory to house 130 male students. It also aims to make available a three-year operational fund of \$300,000 to assure continued high level academic standards, more teachers and an improved salary level.

A three-year fund of \$120,000.00 to sustain the student work program and provide scholarship aid to gifted students with limited means also will be set up. Another aim is to purchase the additional 100 acres required according to the master plan for campus expansion.

The 1959-60 term brought a number of state and national honors to LCC. Dan Chrane, a so-

phomore from Pyote, Texas, won the National Junior College tennis singles' championship last Spring in Rochester, Min., Edd Workman, sophomore from Olton, was named World's Champion Cowboy at the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Contest in Clayton, N.M., during the past summer.

The LCC track team won first places in the spirit medley and the mile relay at the National Junior College track meet last May. The LCC women's debate team took top honors at the State Junior College contest and at the Desert Forensics Meet in Tucson, Arizona.
