## An Editorial

### Income Tax Scandal

The power to tax is the power to control. It is also the power to harass and destroy, a fact that can be seen in the news that the Internal Revenue Service was being used as an instrument to punish Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas for his opposition to Supreme Court edicts demanding integration. The only explanation that District Director Curtis R. Mathis of the Internal Revenue Service could offer to explain the fact that Governor Faubus was sent an "L-19" letter charging him with taxes on a total of over \$105,000, including two years' rent on his rent-free executive mansion, was to say "Somebody goofed." Of course, we've had the usual round of pious denials that the Internal Revenue Service was being used to punish Faubus. However, it will be recalled that the income tax also was used to try to bludgeon the late Senator McCarthy into silence on the Communists-in-government issue, only to have Commissioner T. Coleman Andrews award McCarthy a check for overpayment. It is immaterial whether or not all Americans are in complete agreement with Governor Faubus on all issues. What is important, however, is the fact that if the income tax can be used to punish Faubus and McCarthy for daring to run contrary to the political dictates of those in power in Washington, it can also be used to harass all of us. The attempt to punish Governor Faubus with the income tax is so serious in all of its implications that a full-scale investigation and honest report to the people are most certainly in order.

### RAPE CHARGE FILED AGAINST FAT CHILDRESS

Pat Maloy Childress, 53, of the Lela Community is being held in the Wheeler County Jail, charged with the rape of his 11-year-old step-daughter. Childress is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bond, pending action by the Wheeler County grand jury. A new term of court has been set for November 24, at which time the grand jury will take action on Childress. The grand jury will also decide the fate of James Franklin Hare, from Shelbyville, Ind., who is charged with the rape of his 12-year-old daughter. The Lela man was arrested Sunday evening by deputy sheriff Neal Raymond and Patrolmen R. C. Parker and Dave Crossland. Childress was first arrested for assault after the officers learned Childress threatened his brother-in-law, wife and uncle with a shotgun. Childress's wife told officers that she suspected that he was having relations with their 11-year-old daughter. Childress was taken to Amarillo and given a lie detector test. He later admitted having sexual relations with his step-daughter.

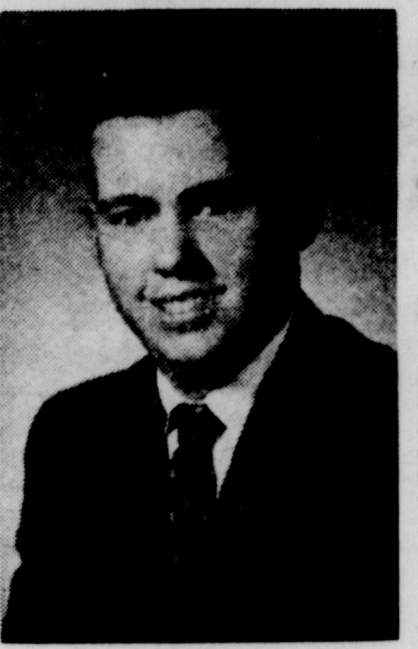

### County HD Agent Tells How To Roast Turkey

The unique American custom of giving thanks for a generous harvest brings to mind our traditional foods and service. The people in Wheeler County have received many blessings this year, so we should take time to express our thanks. The traditional turkey dinner with all the trimmings always tastes good to us at this time. In selecting a turkey for your Thanksgiving dinner buy 1 to 1 1/2 lbs. of turkey per person. If you buy a turkey which is already stuffed buy 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per person. The way to store the turkey is to keep the bird frozen until ready to serve. Ready-to-stuff birds should be thawed in the refrigerator or under running water. Pre-stuffed birds can be placed in the oven while still frozen or stored overnight in the refrigerator just prior to roasting. You will need a low-sided open pan, rack, roast meat thermometer, aluminum foil or several thicknesses of cheese cloth dipped in melted fat, corn bread stuffing, or whatever stuffing you prefer. To roast the ready-to-stuff turkey, preheat oven to 325 F. Take turkey out of bag. Noting information on label. Remove legs from tucked position and remove giblets and neck. Complete directions for roasting are on the giblet bag. Wash the turkey. Salt inside. Combine stuffing ingredients. Stuff body cavity lightly. Re-tuck legs. Stuff neck cavity and fold skin under bird. Place stuffed bird breast side up on rack to hold it out of the juices and to give a roast meat flavor and appearance. Insert roast meat thermometer into the thigh muscle next to the body. This area requires the longest time to cook. (Continued On Page 8 No. 1)

### Postmaster Pleased With Prompt Response To "MAIL EARLY"

Postmaster Jamison is pleased with the prompt response to his recently announced "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign. He said today, "The biggest single factor in getting all mail delivered before Christmas is the full cooperation of the public in early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts. Post Office facilities have been expanded, extra personnel will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Wheeler this year."

With Christmas only a month away, the Postmaster says it's not a bit too soon to start following these simple rules to insure delivery of your gifts before Christmas: Wrap them securely, address them correctly, and MAIL THEM EARLY.

The Postmaster said you shouldn't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

The Postmaster also reminds us that size and weight limitations for Parcel Post packages vary according to place of mailing and destination. He suggests that you secure Pamphlet No. 2 at the Post Office, which tells all about packaging and wrapping parcels. Always include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped. "Careful addressing of your Christmas cards is equally important," the Postmaster said. Bring your Christmas card mailing list up-to-date and be certain that you have the complete name, address, zone number, city and state for everyone on your list.

Always send your Christmas cards by First Class mail. They will be processed and delivered quicker and they'll be forwarded or returned, if it becomes necessary. Christmas cards sent by First Class mail may carry written messages; whereas, cards sent with Third Class three cent postage may only have a written signature.

Don't fail to put your return address on your Christmas card envelopes. This is not only socially correct, but it will enable both you and your friends to keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

All mail going long distances should be sent well before December 10th, and Christmas packages for local delivery should be mailed by December 15th. Mail all Christmas cards for nearby destinations by at least a week before Christmas.

## WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

For the first time in several years there will be a variety of locally grown grass seed available next spring. Weeping lovegrass has been the only locally produced seed plentiful enough to meet needs since the Soil Bank program started. A number of district cooperators have harvested native grass seed this year.

Jess Moore and Archie Hibler of Wheeler have sand lovegrass available. Native bluestem mixture has been harvested from the Britt Ranch east of Wheeler. Neal Davis and Sam McMurtry will have some of this seed as well as the Britt Ranch. This mixture is little bluestem dominant but has Indiangrass, switchgrass, sand bluestem and sideots grama as well. This native grass mixed with sand lovegrass makes an ideal mixture for sandy land.

Grass seed is usually much cheaper at this time than it is at seeding time. Grass seeding under the Soil Bank, Great Plains and ACP program will require a lot of seed next spring. Locally grown native grass seed is more desirable than seed shipped in from a distance.

The Board of Supervisors and the Commissioners Court have been trying to work out a cooperative deal to operate and manage flood prevention structures planned for the Gagby Creek watershed. No definite plan has been made as yet.

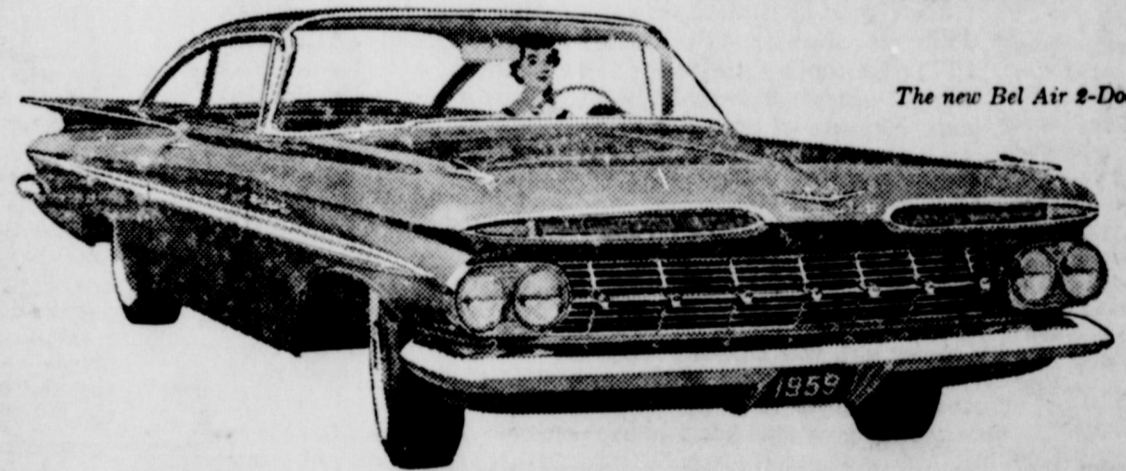

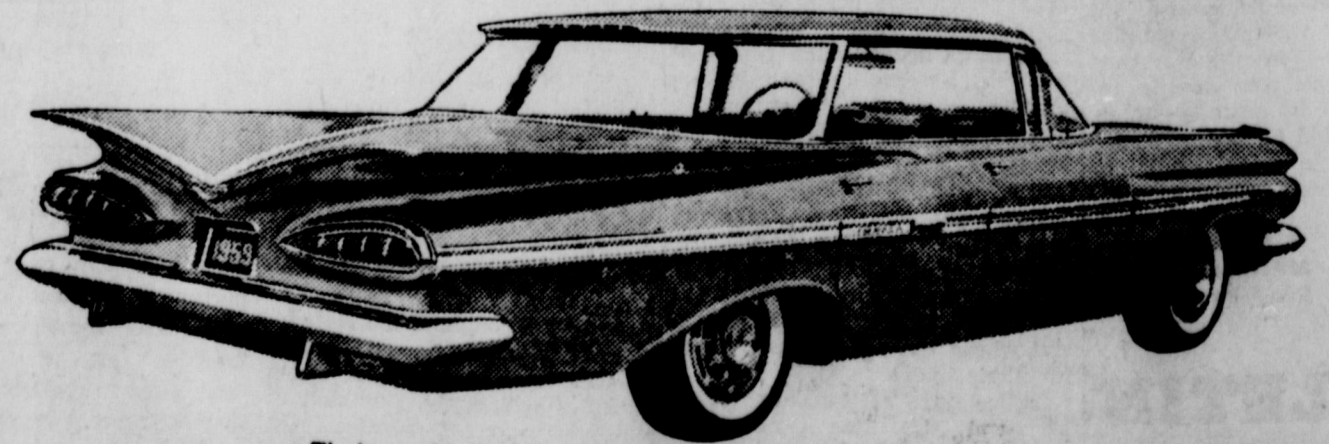

## PYRAMIDS AND CASTLES TO EXPLORE

The mystery of pyramids and the impressive grandeur of massive stone castles continue to lure visitors to Egypt and Syria, as they did even before the days of Marco Polo. Egypt has some eighty pyramids which extend from Cairo up the Nile. Syria has twenty-one castles which dot its Mediterranean coastline and its deserts.

A whole day, and more, can be spent exploring a pyramid or a castle, if you are curious and unhurried. Walking around the Great Pyramid at Giza is in itself a thrilling experience, though few tourists take time to do this. The Great Pyramid, built by the Pharaoh Cheops, towers unbelievably high above you, some forty-five and more centuries old, and more impressive than the tallest skyscraper that modern man has built.

As you walk, you can stop to visit the solar boat pits, to see the symmetrical streets of stone tomb-chapels of nobles closely hugging the pyramid of their pharaoh. You can see the entrance of the Tomb of Queen Hetep-heres, mother of Cheops. You can walk down the rock causeway, which once led down to the Nile and along which blocks of granite were transported to build the Great Pyramid.

### Inside the Great Pyramid

Climbing the Great Pyramid is a thrilling experience if you feel strong and husky. Agile Arab youths are provided to help you. Or you can climb up inside the Great Pyramid and visit the Queen's Chamber and the King's Chamber. To feel yourself within the very heart of one of the world's greatest monuments, and the only remaining Seventh Wonder of the Ancient World, is an awesome experience, and gives you a feeling of detachment from today's world, of being transported back four thousand years in time.

### Twenty-one Castles

Of castles, the most exciting Syrian castle to explore for a day is the Krak des Chevaliers, a Crusader Castle not far from Homs. It stands on a hilltop among green and rolling Syrian plains, dotted here and there with tiny stone villages. From far away the Krak looks like a story-book castle. But as you wind your way up its steep hill, you are aware of its massive stone strength—of its thick surrounding walls, its square keep, its drawbridge, its aqueduct, its moat.

The Krak des Chevaliers was so strong, in fact, that it was never taken by storm in battle. It surrendered in 1271. You can walk today along its ramparts, visit its chapel, its refectory, look seaward to the Mediterranean from its round towers, and dream of knights in armour who lived here, two thousand strong, in the early thirteenth century offering hospitality and succor to pilgrims to the Holy Land.

Should pyramids and castles become your hobby, you can easily arrange a pyramid itinerary or a castle itinerary for one of your visits to the United Arab Republic. In Egypt, in addition to the Great Pyramids, the pyramids of Dahshur, Sakara, Abu Sir, Lisht, Hawara, Meidum, Abu Roash are interesting to visit. Syria's most fascinating castles include Sahyun, Marqab, Tartus, Kasr el Hair, Aleppo's Citadel, and the picturesque Turkish castle which stands on a treeless hilltop overlooking the desert caravan of Palmyra over which the beautiful and gifted Queen Zenobia once ruled.

**PUMPKIN PIE AND POLITICS**



America's two most popular mince pie—are much more than past centuries both have had political and religious implications. Long before the Pilgrims observed our first Thanksgiving, politics entered into the eating of pumpkin pie in England in 1433. An act of Parliament that year forbade the eating of pumpkin pies by everyone below the rank of Baron. Prior to that they were sold by street vendors in early London. It was customary for the purchaser to stick his finger into the filling and pour some sweet juice into the opening. From this custom came the expression, "having a finger in the pie."

Such a small thing as the shape of a mince pie caused the Puritans to abolish, for several years, the observance of Christmas in the United States. In 1659, Colonial "pye bakers" reduced the size of the hitherto

holiday desserts—pumpkin and traditional holiday fare. During traditional and religious implications. huge mince pies. They began to make them smaller and baked them within a crust shaped like a manger.

This was too much for the Puritans. They outlawed the observance of Christmas because they thought that the manger-shaped pies were sacrilegious. But mince pie survived, and Christmas managed to outlive the controversial storm.

## ONE OF SHAMROCK'S FIRST CITIZENS ADMITS TO BEING AN OLD-TIMER

Ida Bradley Gragg is a spry, silver-haired septuagenarian who lives in a little white cottage at 602 South Texas Street in Shamrock. Always well groomed, she moves about quickly with the aid of a walking cane. Ida Gragg is one of Shamrock's oldest citizens. Her husband built the second house in the town.

Recently Mrs. Gragg was asked to be a feature on Laura V. Hamner's "Light and Hitch" program over KGNC. Her story will be told in August of 1959. When Mrs. Gragg was approached for her story, she said, "I thank you for the honor but I've never been much of a hand to live in the past."

Asked if she could, would she trade her past life for one in the present, she said after a minute or two of thought, "No, I reckon I wouldn't! While I enjoy the present and especially the modern conveniences, we had a better time in the old days. We had time for friendships, for thought and meditation and for going to church. We held preaching every Sunday in a dugout. And it was good preaching, for it came right out of the Bible. Everybody went to church then, it was the main thing!"

The Bradleys came to the Panhandle in the spring of 1889. There were ten of them: the father and mother, five sons and three daughters. They lived on a level stretch of land known as Bradley Flat. Later it was called the Ply-

mouth Community and is so called today.

The Bradleys suffered the usual hardships of the pioneers. They raised nearly everything they had to eat. Mr. Bradley had brought seed with him from Fort Worth; so they had big gardens. They dried fruits and vegetables in summer for use in winter. Mr. Bradley raised wheat which he had to haul to Quanah, Texas, to market. This wheat was exchanged for sacks of flour which were kept under the beds in the dugout where the family lived. "The air was purer then," says Mrs. Gragg, "and food kept better. The beefs that we killed in winter kept pretty well although we had no refrigeration except the cold weather."

"We always had lots of company at our house. Our women-folk would cook all day on Saturday. Then on Sunday everybody for miles around would come to our house for preaching. Families came and brought their food and many cowboys from the big ranches also came."

"As the country settled up we built a dugout school house which was known as the Indian Creek School. Mrs. Emma Winney was our first school teacher. Lillian Winney was our second. She is now Mrs. Fain and lives in Canyon. We had school mostly in the summer. All the children came on horse-back, and brought their lunches, fuel, and water."

"Before the school was built we had an Indian scare. A fellow came riding into our yard on a mule and hollering! 'The Indians are coming from Sayre!' My brothers took turns watching for them all night. My brother Andrew moulded bullets. And I trimmed them and put them into shells. I was nine years old when I worked at this job all night long. Fortunately, the Indians never arrived."

"We were happy when neighbors began moving in. I knew the late Millie Jones Porter of Wheeler when she was a girl. She and I had a good deal in common. We both herded sheep. This is the loneliest job in the world. About this time Millie met her future husband, Mr. Porter. He'd been to school very little but he wanted his wife to have an education. It was because of his wish for this that Millie went to college at old Polytechnic in Fort Worth. I longed to go too but we didn't have the money."

"We had 5000 head of sheep which Father sold and bought cattle. Then my father built the biggest house in this country - three big rooms, each 16 x 18 feet."

"My chum, Lou Goodnight, lived on Buck Creek. We spent many happy weeks visiting one another. Lou is now Mrs. Rankin in the Dozier Community."

"After the country settled up we built a plank school house. We had church in it for all denominations. Preacher Ed Wallace used to preach for us. He lives in Shamrock now and is 91 years old."

"My folks hoped that I would marry a preacher. Instead I married a cowboy named Nathan Gragg who worked for the Mill Irons. We filed on some land and built a two-room frame house on the south side of the Salt Fork of Red River. The rattlesnakes were so thick that first year that we killed several everyday. Twice snakes hung their fangs in Mr.

Gragg's leather boots but the fangs did not go through.

"Mr. Gragg and I had five children. My son, D. L. lives in Shamrock. Bill lives at Borger. My daughter Lily lives at Farmington, New Mexico. My daughter Dee lives at Texola, and Oleta lives at Spearman. I have nine grandchildren and seventeen great grandchildren. My husband died in 1944 of heart trouble."

"A few of the old timers I knew are dead. But, a good many still live around here. Ada Small Adkins lives at Cottonwood Falls in Kansas. Mrs. Cleo Small Templeton lives at Wellington. Hattie Small Mount (Mrs. Walter) lives in Amarillo. Mrs. Hester Small Holmes lives in Shamrock. Clinton, Horace, and Hugh Small live in Austin, Wellington, and Lubbock. The father of this family was Judge Small, the postmaster at old Aberdeen. He also ran the grocery store and the bank."

"Some of the Capertons still live around here. I don't know where they are. I remember Pearl, Mabel, Burt, Grady, Charlie, Francis, and maybe another one whose name I can't recall. Lula Wall Laycock lives here, and Carl Wall lives in Wellington."

Mrs. Gragg is a member of the First Christian Church in Shamrock. She is a devoted worker, known for her kind deeds.

"I'm right grateful for the compliment of being asked to be on Mrs. Hamner's program," she says. "But I want you to know the Graggs have always been in step with progress and the present. We owned the first telephone in our community in 1905. We owned the first phonograph, an old Edison with spool records."

"I read a daily newspaper, a news magazine, and the Readers Digest. And I try to keep up with the politics in my state."

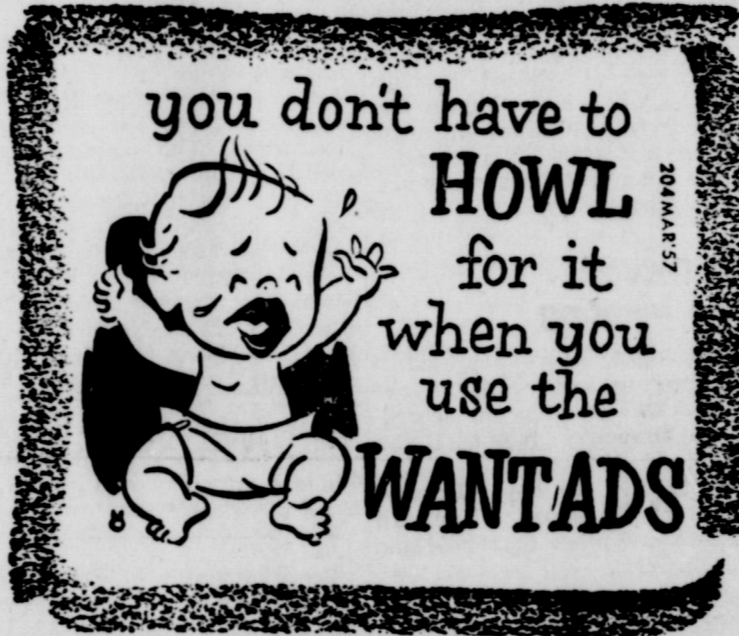

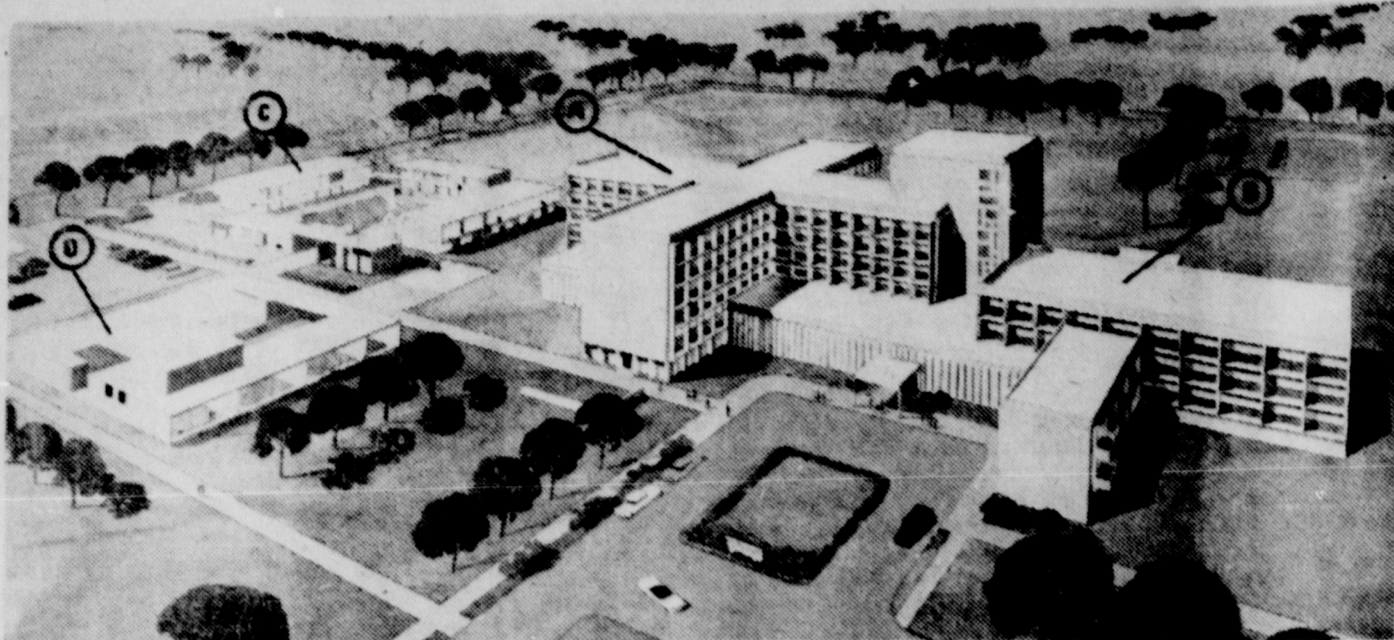

than 80 outstanding medical and business leaders from Texas and four other Southwestern states. Scott and White is a non-profit institution serving the Southwest.

### New Hospital For Southwest Is Announced

Designed as the nation's most modern combined diagnostic clinic and hospital, this \$10,000,000 building project has been announced by the board of the Scott and White Memorial Hospital of Temple, Texas. It will provide 279 beds and facilities for 50,000 clinic and hospital patients annually. An innovation for care of the critically ill will be a special observation unit on each hospital floor. A nursing station will be surrounded by a circle of 12 private rooms, where all patients will be under constant observation within a few steps of the nurses. This, it was said, will improve service for many of the critically ill.

Four hospital bed floors in the shape of a cross (A) and two clinic floors (B) rise above the first two floors and basement, which contain diagnostic and research laboratories, surgical and X-ray departments, rehabilitation therapies and other jointly used facilities. A Nurses Residence (C) will help meet the shortage of nurses in the Southwest by increasing student nurse enrollment from 60 to 85. The structure marked (D) is a future building for educational purposes.

The consulting architects, Elberle and Company of St. Paul, Minnesota, designed the new Mayo Clinic and specialize in planning combined diagnostic clinic and hospital facilities. Architectural working plans will be prepared by Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth.

Jay A. Phillips, of Houston, Chairman of the Scott and White Board of Trustees, said that the target date for starting construction is June 1, 1960. "We already have upward of \$1,000,000 and are aiming at raising the balance over the next year and a half. As a non-profit institution Scott and White serves patients from all parts of the Southwest. This new center will be of tremendous benefit in providing people of moderate means throughout our region with a high quality of diagnosis and treatment at a reasonable cost."

### Number One

cook. Spoon melted shortening over bird. Cover lightly with a tent of foil or cheesecloth. Do not crimp foil over edges of pan for this hinders browning. Immediately after stuffing, place the turkey in a slow oven (325 F.) never hold the stuffed turkey even though refrigerated.

To roast the already stuffed turkey preheat oven to 325. Remove turkey from transparent bag and remove foil wrapped packet of giblet after partial thawing. Place turkey on a rack in the lower part of roasting pan. Spoon melted shortening over all cover and place in oven. As soon as bird partially thaws insert roast meat thermometer. Cover and return to oven. Follow roasting schedule included with turkey.

To test for doneness press the thickest part of drumstick with fingers protected with clean cloth or paper. Meat should feel soft. Roast meat thermometer in thigh muscle should read 190 F. A third check for doneness is to place a thermometer into the center of the stuffing. When the thermometer read 165 F. the meat will be well done. Approximate time for the turkey to cook is: 8 to 10 lbs. turkey, 3 to 3½ hours; 11 to 13 lbs. turkey, 4 to 4½ hours; and for a turkey weighing 14 to 16 lbs., 4½ to 5½ hours.

Storage of left over turkey and stuffing is very important. It is recommended that the stuffing be removed from the turkey and cooled quickly in the refrigerator, then covered loosely. Reheat just enough for service. Place left over turkey in the refrigerator to cool, wrap loosely. Separately wrapped turkey and stuffing may be frozen for use within 4-6 weeks.
