Two Mc Murry Wheelchair Students Receive Degrees

Two Sweetwater students who have overcome physical handicaps, inspired the spirits of friends and fellow students, and succeeded in living full lives, are now graduates at McMurry College.

Carolyn Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam L. Jones, 810 E. 15th, Sweetwater, and John Edd Killen, son of Mrs. Edd Killen, Route 2, Sweetwater, were candidates for bachelor of arts degrees. Both students are 1955 graduates of Newman High School in Sweetwater and have spent much of their lives in wheelchairs.

A 1950 polio victim, Miss Jones has been in a wheel chair since that time. Despite this, she led a well-rounded life through junior high and high school in Sweet-

water. One of her first loves was journalism, and she was a staff member of the Pony Express, student newspaper, for three years. Studying under Ben Brock, assistant principal and publications director of the high school, she won awards at the state press meet in Denton.

Killen was also a journalism student and member of the Pony Express staff.

Miss Jones, an elementary education major, plans to teach and is currently "practice teaching" at Bowie Elementary School in Abilene.

She now serves as acting president of the senior class of the college, and was elected vice-

president of her junior class in 1958. She was nominated for "Reservation Princess" this year. She is a member of T.I.P. Women's Social Club, Wa Wataysee Service Club, the Baptist Student Union, and has sponsored a Tri-Hi-Y chapter for Abilene High School girls. She has held positions on the student newspaper and yearbook staffs, and is active in National Education Association and Association of Childhood Education group functions.

Killen has followed the pattern which he began as a student in Sweetwater. He is constantly "on the go". Another McMurry student from Sweetwater recalled, "I remember when John Edd and I were both in Philip Nolan Elementary School, Reagan Junior High, and Newman High. Anytime a student was down in the dumps, he couldn't help but be cheered when he heard an air horn tooting and turned to see John Edd racing up the hall. That air horn, mounted on the side of his chair, was sort of a symbol of warmth, friendship, and courage, and would always bring to mind a picture of a shining face con-

Lawmen From All Over Panhandle Join In Hunt

Two escaped prisoners have been returned to the Wheeler County Jail in Wheeler, following a fruitless escapade Sunday. The men broke jail at 8:30 p.m. and were returned to their cell at 4:45.

The men were identified as Wayne Pearce, 19, of Sayre, Oklahoma; and Willie Stowe, 27, of Shamrock. Stowe had been sentenced to the State Penitentiary charged with theft over \$50 and breaking probation. Pearce was awaiting trial for car theft.

According to Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman, the pair made a key out of cardboard and unlocked their cell door. There was a chain on the door but they jerked the door until the chain broke loose.

The fugitives headed for the home of Pearce's brother, Sonny Pearce, on the Cleve - Hamilton Ranch, several miles northwest of Shamrock. The brother brought them back to the jail at 4:45 a.m.

Roadblocks were set up in the County following the break.

And approximately 75 patrol units were used in the hunt. Officers from Paducah, Clarendon, Canadian, Childress, Wellington, Matador, Pampa, McLean and several from Oklahoma converged on Wheeler to help hunt down the fugitives.

FOOD HANDLING SCHOOL TO BE HELD HERE

Teaching the schools will be Harry A. Smith, Public Health Instructor, Division of Public Health Education, Texas State Department of Health.

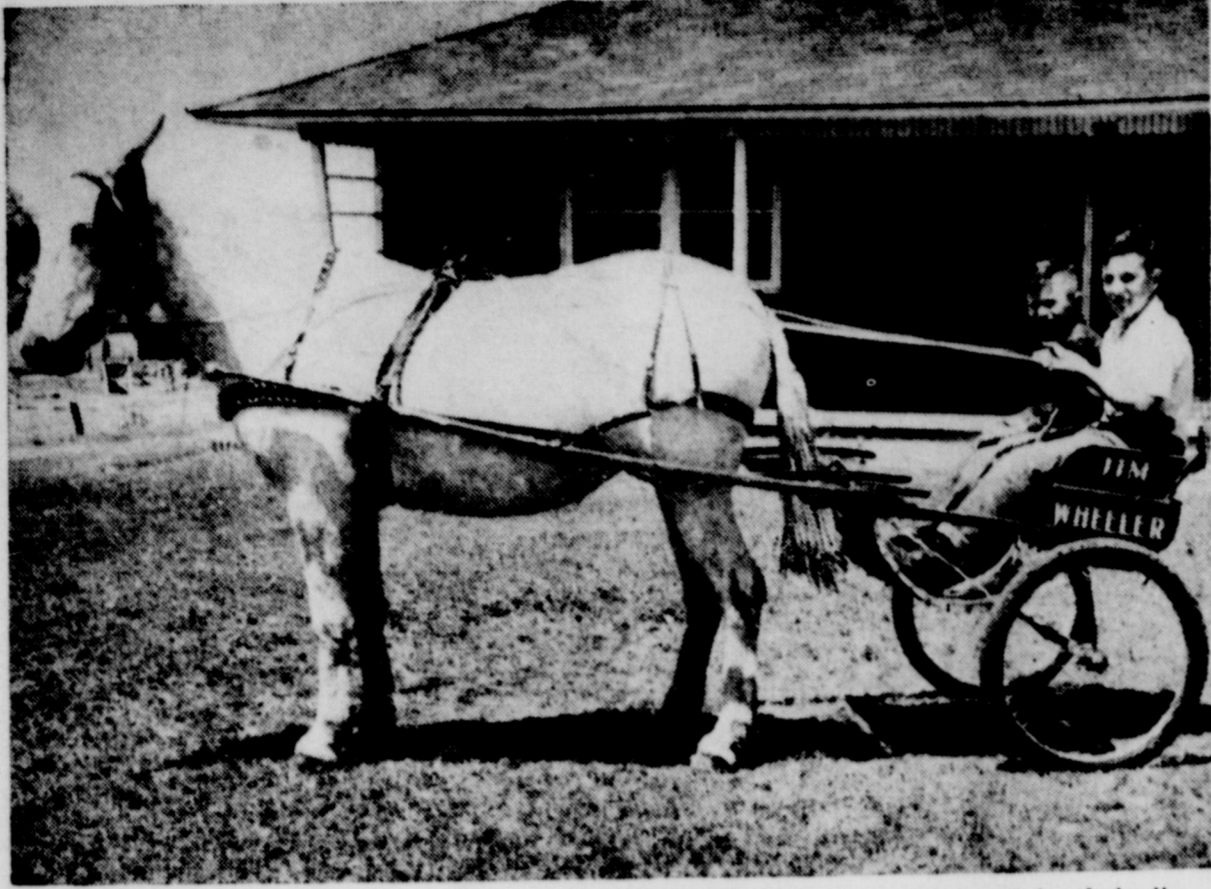

Billie Douthit To Attend 'Girls State'

Billie Douthit, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. K. D. Douthit of Briscoe will be sponsored as Girl State representative to Texas Girls State June 10 to 19 in Austin by the American Legion Auxiliary, West Passions Post 138. Billie has completed her junior year, at Briscoe, played on the basketball team 3 years, has been a student council member, an officer of her class, an office worker for the superintendent, and has a high scholastic rating. She is highly recommended by the faculty and the student governing body of Briscoe. The purpose of this program is to acquaint 400 outstanding young women of Texas with the government of their state from the city level through the State offices. While the girls are there they will be housed in the dormitories of the School for the Blind. These dormitories will be called cities, and cities will make up counties, the counties will make up the state governments. Political campaigns will be conducted by the girls and the girls elected to fill all offices at all levels. The duties and functions of all the offices will be explained to the girls by qualified men and women. Visits to the state Capitol and government in action. The governor of the State will address the girls and they will meet personally many state officials. A visit to the Governors Mansion will be one highlight of the trip. In addition a recreation program is planned with daily swimming and play time with visits to historic spots. Former girl representatives tell us the nine day trip passes all too soon with the varied and interesting schedule. These girls return to their homes better able to appreciate their local officials in government, their problems, and opportunities. They are also better qualified to be leaders in the Student Body of their high schools during their senior years and in higher education institutions. All 400 young women are chosen for their potential leadership abilities, and are chosen by the schools they attend. Their transportation to and from Austin, their expense money, and their registration fee is furnished by the sponsoring unit of the American Legion Auxiliary. Unit 138 wishes Miss Billie Douthit a good trip and we know she will bring back to her school and the entire community the benefit of her experiences and training. Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capital

There's a "get on with it" mood among House members during this special session.

House was the target of some criticism after the regular session for having made almost no progress in money-raising.

This session the House began processing money bills at a fast clip. Initial action indicated there was less opposition in the House to Gov. Price Daniel's tax program than during the regular session.

Many in the lower house seemed to be in a mood to get as much as possible over to the Senate and "let them worry with it a while." Then, if the finance problem still isn't solved at the end of this session, they hope people won't be saying that the House "sat on its hands again."

Senate attitude toward the various money-raising approaches is largely an unknown quantity. No money-raising bill ever came to a vote in the Senate - either in committee or on the floor - during the regular session.

WE NOTICED in the Wellington Leader where on May 11 the Wellington County Commissioners passed a resolution proposing the issuance of \$60,000 in warrants to build and equip a new county jail. Wheeler county has only a few months to reach a decision as to whether or not they will build a new county jail or transfer their prisoners to larger jails like Pampa or Amarillo. A new state law requiring that jails have at least 40 square feet for each prisoner makes the present county jail obsolete.

DURING final exams at Wheeler High School one of the teachers asked Kenneth Farris: "Do the questions bother you?" "Not a bit," replied Kenneth, "but I'm having a lot of trouble with the answers."

IN A LETTER from State Representative Grainger McIlhany we learned that the legislature is just completing the first week of special session which has been busy and has produced some good results.

"On Wednesday, the Governor signed four of our animal health bills including the measure setting up voluntary brucellosis control districts and also visual inspection of livestock in auction rings. These bills will go a long way in preventing a federal embargo on shipments of Texas livestock to points outside our state," McIlhany said.

"As you know, our special session has been called by the Governor to finance the operation of the state for the next two years. The House has already passed two major bills in taking care of our financial needs," he continued. "One of these bills revises the bookkeeping system of the Comptroller and will reduce our current deficit by about thirty million dollars. This amount of money ac-

tually has not been a deficit but appeared on the Comptroller's books as one due to the fact that under our present laws he does not count August receipts in closing out the financial condition of the state in the fiscal years end on August 31st."

"The other bill passed this week by the House carries a one year temporary increase in the corporation franchise tax. This bill will raise about fifteen million dollars toward retiring the state's deficit," McIlhany said.

"The Revenue and Taxation Committee is holding hearings this week on other tax bills that have been introduced, and they should have more bills ready for the House calendar by the middle of next week," he concluded.

A NUMBER of people have asked if the Farm Bureau has received the permit for construction of the TV translator system. We talked with construction engineer O. J. Setliff late Wednesday evening and he said the permit has not been received as of this date. However, he is expecting the permit to arrive within the next few days. Don't worry, the minute the permit is issued we'll let you know in the Times.

WHEAT and small grain harvest is getting underway in North Central Texas, and in the Panhandle wheat is practically all headed. The recent rains in some

areas fell too late to be of much benefit but dry-land acreage in the Panhandle has shown a noticeable improvement.

Latest reports on area conditions received by the Texas Employment Commission office are as follows:

Reports from the Childress-Paducah - Matador - Memphis - Clarendon area indicate practically no dry-land wheat will be harvested due to severe drought conditions. Small irrigated acreage in good condition. No outside machines or workers will be needed when harvest gets underway about June 5.

The wheat crop is progressing satisfactorily in the Amarillo - Canyon - Claude - Panhandle - Vega area. Recent rains have increased the prospects for an average or better yield. Harvest should get underway about June 20. No shortage of machines is expected to develop, however, the Amarillo office reports several openings for combine operators and truck drivers for the custom combine operators.

Reports from the Pampa-Candadian-Wheeler area indicate very little hail damage except in the Shamrock area. A normal yield is expected when harvest gets underway June 15 to 20. No outside men or equipment will be needed outside the normal migration pattern.

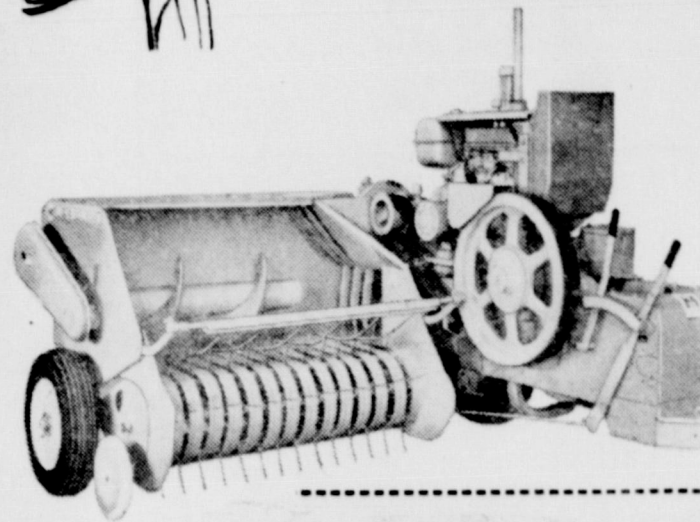

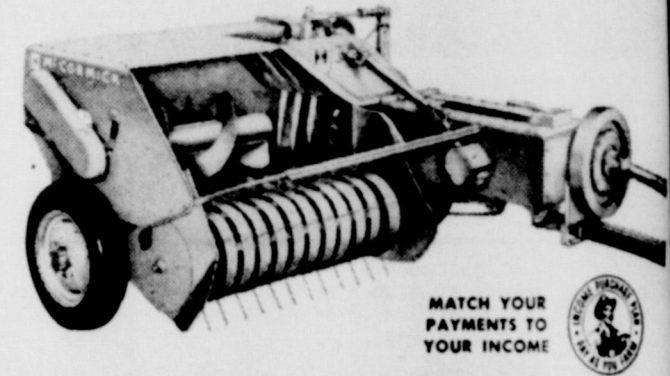
