The Wheeler Mustangs opened the 1985 football season with a 21-0 win over the Class AA Stinnett Rattlers last Friday night before a near capacity crowd at Nicholson Field and the name of the game for the Mustangs was defense.

The old adage that the defense is always ahead of the offense early in the season was certainly true in this game as the Mustangs were plagued by penalties and inconsistency. Several long runs were nullified by flags, one, an apparent touchdown by Randall Hugg on a 48 yard keeper at left end.

Even though the Mustangs sputtered on offense, they still completely dominated the visiting Rattlers by holding them to just 60 yards on total offense and the Rattlers were only in Mustang country one time and this was via a fumble recovery at the Wheeler 26 midway of the fourth quarter. Dale Hazel killed this threat with a pass interception two plays later.

Wheeler's double rushing duo of Toby Collins and Dickie Salyer picked up 131 yards of the Mustangs total of 190 yards on the ground but it was reserve running back Cody Wiggins that brought the crowd to its feet for the Mustangs first TD with a 70 punt return.

Wiggins fielded Mark Dalton's 44 yard kick cleanly at the Wheeler 30 and headed to his right and behind a tremendous wave of blocking broke loose and cut inside the last defender at the 5 yard line to go over for the Mustangs first touchdown of the season. Rodney Bond's attempted kick for the extra point sailed wide left and Wheeler led by 6-0. Wiggins run came six plays deep into the second period.

On the Mustangs first possession of the second half, they cranked up a 62 yard drive for their second touchdown and it was all on the ground with Collins and Salyer doing all the

legwork. No flags marred the 11 play drive and Collins got the touchdown on a 3 yard sweep off the left side. The Mustangs made up for the missed extra point in the first half by sending Hugg on a keeper to the left and the quick Mustang signal caller went in for the two points and Wheeler led by 14-0.

Richard Smith, sophomore linebacker, set up the Mustangs final TD of the game with a pass interception at the Rattler 28 early in the final quarter. Facing fourth and 2 at the Stinnett 20, Hugg picked up 5 and a first down at the 15 from which point

HORSE TRAINING CLINIC OFFERED

All horsemen in Wheeler County and surrounding counties are invited to attend a horse training clinic Tuesday and Wednesday, September 24 and 25, 1985 in the Wheeler County Show Barn in Wheeler. The clinic will begin at 7:00 p.m. each night. The clinic, which is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is open to all interested persons free of charge.

Mr. B.F. Yeats, Extension Horse Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will conduct the clinic. Yeats has been Extension Horse Specialist since 1966. He has been responsible for giving leadership to adult and youth horse programs across the state. Yeats is widely recognized as an authority on horse behavior and training.

During the first night of the clinic, Yeats will present techniques for the basic training of horses. This will include starting the young horse, re-schooling the older horse with bad habits, and teaching the horse to turn, stop, back, and change leads. He will discuss the use of hand, feet, and seat (body position) in accomplishing these goals. The proper method of biting a horse will be demonstrated. Yeats teaches basic horsemanship principles, not gimmicks and quick-fixes.

The Farmers Home Administration is observing its 50th anniversary this year, still providing financial assistance to farmers and other rural residents and communities unable to obtain credit from other sources at affordable rates and terms.

Philip C. Madeley, Assistant District Director, said that a total of six loans totaling \$4,426,800.00 have been made in the Amarillo District comprising the North 20 counties of the Texas Panhandle this year. Of the total, four were rural rental housing loans totaling \$2,611,800.00 for 128 rental units, and two were community loans totaling \$1,815,000.00 for one water and sewer project.

Farmers Home is the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its predecessor agency, the Rural Rehabilitation Administration, was created by Presidential Executive Order in 1935. The Farm Security Administration succeeded that agency in 1937 and was renamed the Farmers Home Administration by a 1946 Act of Congress.

BEEF CATTLE CO. IS HOST TO GUESTS FROM 'DOWN UNDER'

Beef Cattle Co. of Wheeler received their first visitors from Australia on Friday, Sept. 6. The visitors, Gwen and Geoff Lack, raise Poll Herefords on a farm near Wangaratta, north of Melbourne, Australia. The couple had landed in Canada and are now on a 12,000 mile tour of the United States. The Lacks attended the celebration in Canada in recognition of the 125th

anniversary of the introduction of Poll Herefords into Canada. On their 1100 acre farm, the couple has 400 head of Poll Herefords. At the observance in July, they met Wallace Fields of Shamrock, who also raises Poll Herefords; since the couple intended to visit different areas of the United States, Fields extended an invitation to visit his place in Shamrock.

The couple has been traveling by car. With several locations in the U.S. to visit, the couple considered flying to different locations and renting a car at each place, but found they could rent a car with unlimited mileage and see more of the country with possibly less expense. They avoid the Interstate highways, this also affords them a better look at the country. In Texas they have also visited Coleman, Midland and Abilene. This being their first visit to the states, the couple is having no trouble adjusting to driving on the right side of the road.

Beef production in the two countries was compared. In visiting prior to their tour of Beef Cattle, the Lacks told of the beef industry in Australia. Their 1100 acres is located in a more 'settled' area and affords them one animal per 3 acres. A 400 lb carcass is the ideal size, the buyers in Australia do not like the "marbled" affect preferred by Americans. In most cases the larger carcasses are sent to Japan. If a calf is "fed", it is for no longer than 10 weeks. An American feedlot built near the Lack's operation failed, partially due to the market for the smaller beefs. The market prices rely on the American market.

Geoff Lack commented, "Larger carcasses (over 400 lbs.) are sent to Japan and the 'junk' meat is sent to America from Japan."

Lower prices has reduced beef production in Australia. At one time the country had two head of beef per individual.

The couple left Shamrock for Clayton, N.M. They plan to eventually travel to Minot, North Dakota, to see a Poll Hereford which has been winning shows.

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PANHANDLE-WIDE

Susquecentennial Quilt Project Gets Underway

The Panhandle Plains Historical Museum and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are co-sponsoring a Panhandle Sesquecentennial Quilt Block Contest in honor of Texas' 150th birthday. According to JoAnne Arasim, the Museum's Curator of Textiles, the contest is one of the museum's official Sesquecentennial events, and it is the only Panhandle-wide activity planned for the 1986 Sesquecentennial Celebration.

Quilt block competitions will be held in each of the top 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, according to Becky Sanders, Clothing Specialist with the Extension Service. Extension agents in each county are announcing and promoting the contest she said. Anyone is eligible to enter, with the exception of Extension agents,

museum staff, and their families. Deadlines for submitting entries will be set by each individual county agent, saunders noted.

Each entrant is asked to create one or more quilt blocks representing a specific characteristic of her or his county. A panel of three judges, chosen by each County Extension Agent, will select the top three blocks in each county. Entries will be judged on overall appearance, workmanship, originality of design, adherence to theme, appropriateness of material, and use of color.

The first place blocks will be sent to the museum in Canyon on February 1, 1986, where they will become part of a 30-block Sesquecentennial Quilt. Thus, each of the top 26 counties will have a representative block, with the

remaining 4 blocks representing the Museum, the Extension Service, the Sesquecentennial, and the quilt project itself.

The Extension Service has issued general rules for the competition, Saunders noted. The rules pertain to such things as the size of the blocks, seam allowances, color, type of fabric, and so forth. In addition, the Extension Service has prepared a detailed outline entitled "Tips for Making a Winning Quilt Block", which will assist in making the entries consistent, she said.

The museum and Extension Service are planning a "quilting bee" for February 22-23, 1986, Arasim noted. Area quilters will come to the museum to actually finish the Sesquecentennial Quilt, and the public will be able to view and participate in the work as it progresses, she explained. Further details will be announced in the autumn of 1985.

Once the Panhandle's Sesquecentennial Quilt has been assembled and finished, it will be on exhibit at the museum in conjunction with "Lone Stars: A Legacy of Texas Quilts, 1836-1936", a major exhibit of the best quilts in Texas. This unique display is the outgrowth of several Quilt Roundup Days held around the state earlier this year, Arasim said. Of the 30 quilts selected for the exhibit, 6 were selected at the museum's Quilt Roundup Day in March, she noted. "Lone Stars", which is sponsored by the Texas Sesquecentennial Quilt Association, will have its Texas premier at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on April 26, 1986 and will be on display through June 8, 1986.

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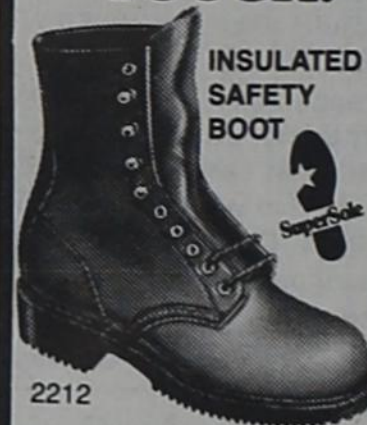


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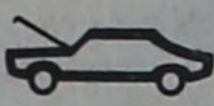

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT
Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.
The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.
The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.
The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, chloride control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT
Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

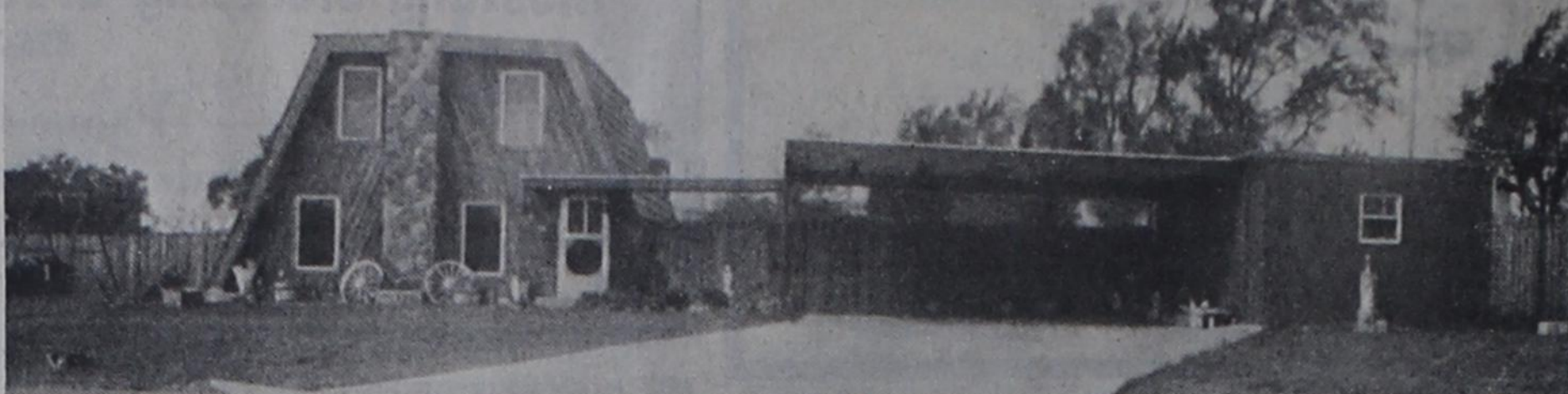

Another feature of the Wednesday night session will be an event clinic. The last part of the program will consist of an explanation of how the training techniques taught earlier can be applied to specific events such as barrel racing, roping, reining, western horsemanship, etc. The events to be considered will be determined by the interest of the participants.

The clinic is not intended only for show horses, but will be of benefit to anyone who rides. Don King, Wheeler County Extension Agent said, "Whether the horse is to be used for ranch work, roping, feedlot work, show, or recreational riding, the information presented at this clinic will help the horseman get the most performance and enjoyment from his horse."

Saw Lavelle and Darrell Mackey in town. Guess they are some kissing kin. Anyway, we are kin to the same people and they wanted to know what we'd heard.

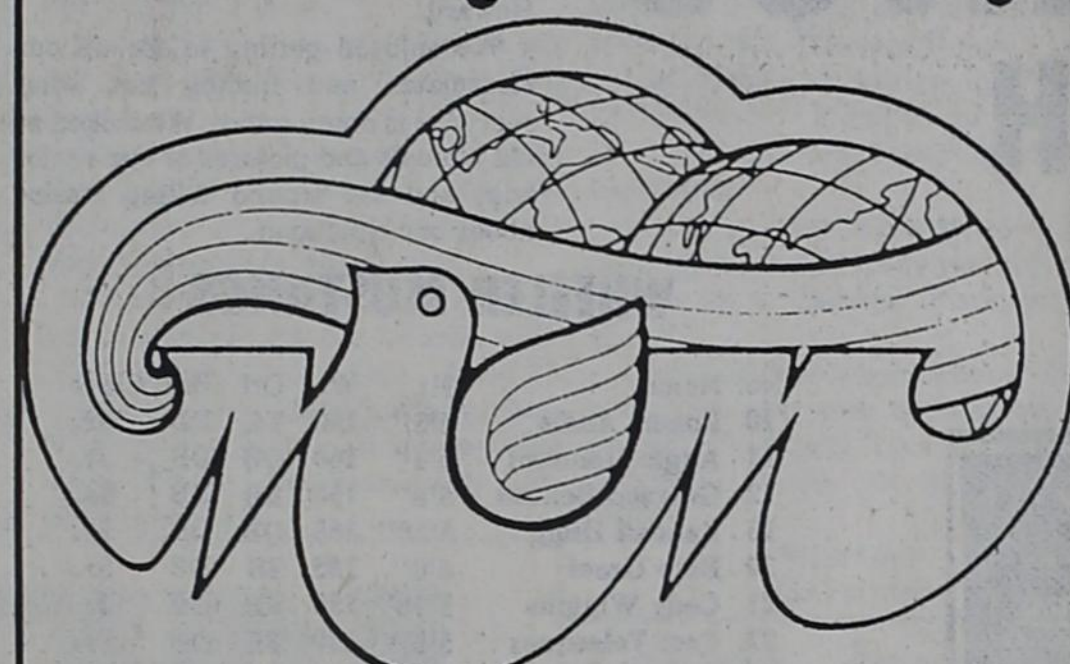

COASTERS FINISH FIFTH IN USSSA WORLD TOURNAMENT

The West Coast Awards/Sea-Land senior girls softball team finished fifth in a nationwide tournament Sunday, winning seven of its nine tournaments games.

The Coasters finished fifth in the United States of Slo-Pitch Softball Association (USSSA) Senior Girls Youth World tournament, losing only to the eventual champion and runner-up teams during the three-day tourney.

After losing its second tournament game Friday night, the team won six straight loser-out games Saturday and Sunday before finally being eliminated by the Sharks, from Jacksonville, Fla.

The Sharks went on to defend the championship they won last year at Kent's Russell Road Park, coming through the elimination bracket to beat Orange Crush, another Florida team, twice for the title.

Hit n' Misses of Louisville, last year's runner-up team, finished third, and Sweeney's, from Cincinnati, was fourth.

The Coasters were the only Washington team to finish in the top 10.

"When we got beat early, I never thought we'd finish this high," said Coasters coach Jack Helton, whose team now flies to Marietta, GA., for the ASA National tournament.

"With us having to play so many games, and with the weather the way it was, I thought we did an outstanding job getting fifth. I couldn't have asked any more of the girls," Helton said. "We'll go to Marietta playing really well."

Because the opening day of the tournament Thursday was washed away by rain, the schedule was protracted, forcing the Coasters to play their first seven games in a span of only about 40 hours.

"We played until about 2:30 a.m. Saturday morning, and were back playing again at 10," said Helton. "It was real humid here, and the temperature never got below about 90."

Shortstop Connie Helton (the coach's daughter) was named to the All-World Tournament team. She compiled a .686 batting average (22-for32) with two home runs, two triples and 12 runs batted in. Teammate Missy Hunter lost out in the home run-hitting contest when the Shark's Lisa Kelly blasted two during the championship series.

In games Sunday, the Coasters topped the Mid-America Monarchs 12-5 before falling to the Sharks 8-1. It was the second straight year the Sharks came through the elimination bracket to win the championship.

COASTERS FOURTH IN ASA NAT'L

It's not quite as big as the trophy coach Jack Helton had in mind, but the West Coast Awards/Sea-Land senior girls softball team will arrive in

Kent tonight with some hardware from the ASA National Championships, and darn proud of it.

The Coasters finished fourth to earn a direct berth to next year's national tournament in Wilmington, N.C. The top four teams automatically return.

"I'd like to have the big trophy, but I'm pleased with what we did," Helton said.

The Coasters, who were fifth-place finishers in last weekend's USSSA Senior Girls Youth World tourney, knocked off the two-time defending USSSA champion Jacksonville Sharks Friday, 4-1, after receiving a victory via forfeit in Thursday's first round. The Sharks had successfully defended their USSSA title last weekend—knocking the Coasters out of the running along the way.

Battling rain delays throughout Saturday, the Kent club continued through the winner's bracket with a 3-0 victory over the Stingers of New York. But then came the Satellite Beach Comets, from Florida, and the Coasters were tripped up, 12-3. They stayed alive with a 7-2 win over the Euclid Flames of Ohio, but then were eliminated by another Florida team, Orange Crush, 9-0.

"I thought we did well, considering the only teams we lost to in both the USSA and ASA tournaments are from Florida," Helton said. "They can play year-round. We were really the only team here that could stay with them. That in itself is a big satisfaction for the kids. We're not ducking our heads."

"We left with a goal in mind of finishing in the top five in both nationals and we went one better here. We'll come home with our heads held high. I thought we did well, all things considered."

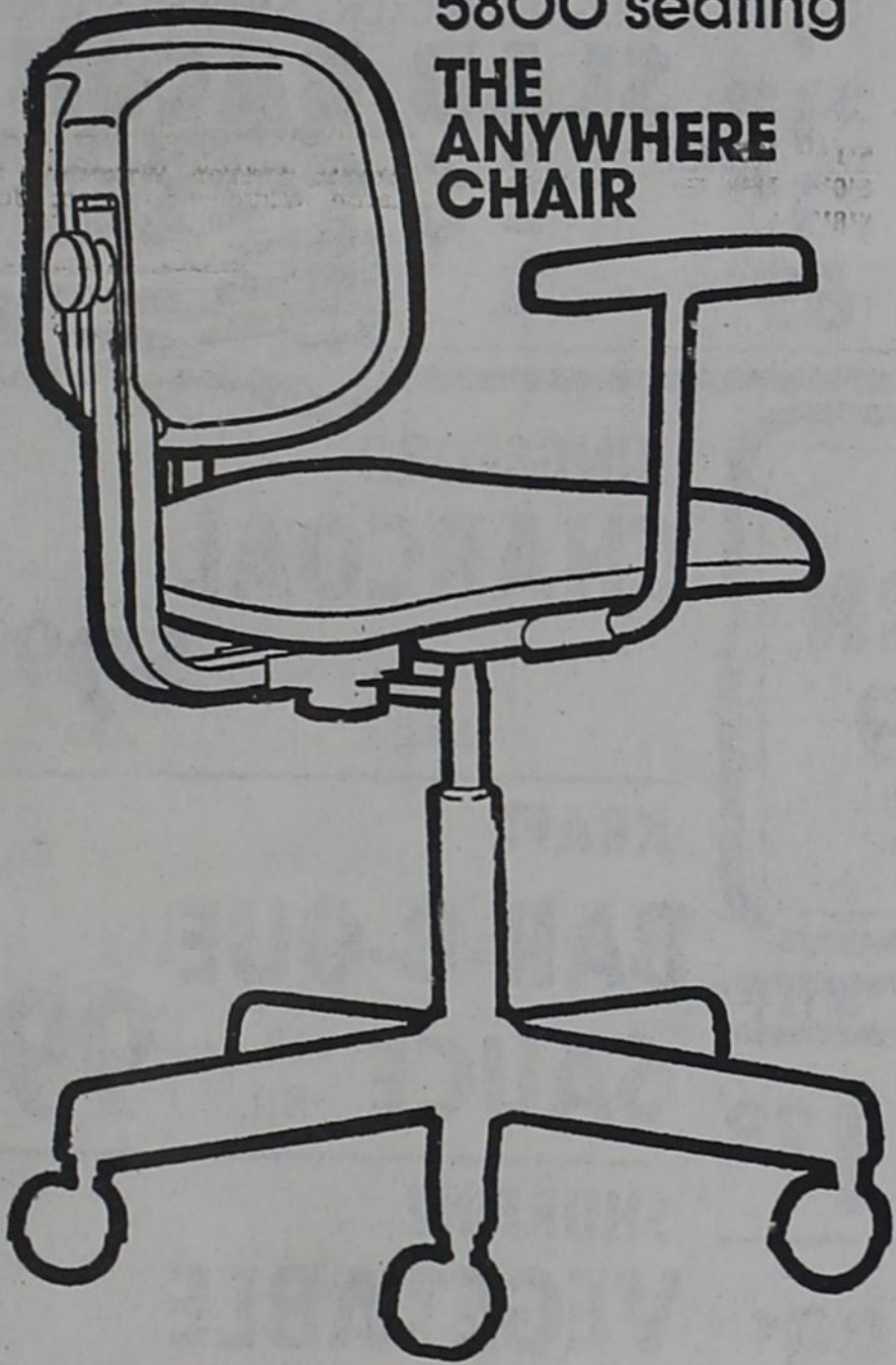

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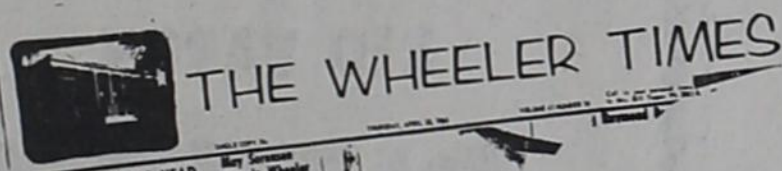
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
