Show Barn in Wheeler. The clinic will clinic, which is being sponsored by the Observes 50th Year begin at 7:00 p.m. each night. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is open to all interested persons free

Mr. B.F. Yeats, Extension Horse Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will conduct the clinic. Yeats has been Extension Horse Specialist since 1966. He has been responsible for giving leadership to adult and youth horse programs across the state. Yeats is widely recognized as an authority on horse behavior and training.

During the first night of the clinic, Yeats will present techniques for the basic training of horses. This will include starting the young horse, re-schooling the older horse with bad habits, and teaching the horse to turn, stop, back, and change leads. He will discuss the use of hand, feet, and seat (body position) in accomplishing these goals. The proper method of bitting a horse will be demonstrated. Yeats teaches basic horsemanhip principles, not gimmicks and quick-fixes.

The Farmers Home Administration is observing its 50th anniversary this year, still providing financial assistance to farmers and other rural residents and communities unable to obtain credit from other sources at affordable rates and terms.

Philip C. Madeley, Assistant District Director, said that a total of six loans totaling \$4,426,800.00 have been made in the Amarillo District comprising the North 20 countries of the Texas Panhandle this year. Of the total, four were rural rental housing loans totaling \$2,611,800.00 for 128 rental units, and two were community loans totaling \$1,815,000.00 for one water and sewer project.

Farmers Home is the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its predecessor agency, the Rural Reabilitation Adminstration, was created by Presidential Executive Order in 1935. The Farm Security Administration succeeded that agency in 1937 and was renamed the Farmers Home Administration by a 1946 Act of Congress.

their first visitors from Australia on Friday, Sept. 6. The visitors, Gwen and Geoff Lack, raise Poll Herefords on a farm near Wangaratta, north of Melborne, Australia. The couple had landed in Canada and are now on a 12,000 mile tour of the United States.

The Lacks attended the celebration in Canada in recognition of the 125th

Beef Cattle Co. of Wheeler received anniversary of the introduction of Poll Herefords into Canada. On their 1100 acre farm, the couple has 400 head of Poll Herefords. At the observance in July, they met Wallace Fields of Shamrock, who also raises Poll Herefords; since the couple intended to visit different areas of the United States, Fields extended an invitation to visit his place in Shamrock.

> The couple has been traveling by car. With several locations in the U.S. to visit, the couple considered flying to different locations and renting a car at each place, but found they could rent a car with unlimited mileage and see more of the country with possibly less expense. They avoid the Interstate highways, this also affords them a better look at the country. In Texas they have also visited Coleman, Midland and Abilene. This being their first visit to the states, the couple is having no trouble adjusting to driving on the right side of the road.

Beef production in the two countries was compared. In visiting prior to their tour of Beef Cattle, the Lacks told of the beef industry in Australia. Their 1100 acres is located in a more 'settled' area and affords them one animal per 3 acres. A 400 lb carcass is the ideal size, the buyers in Australia do not like the "marbled" affect prefered by Americans. In most cases the larger carcasses are sent to Japan. If a calf is "fed", it is for no longer than 10 weeks. An American feedlot built near the Lack's operation failed, partially due to the market for the smaller beefs. The market prices rely on the American market.

Geoff Lack commented, "Larger carcasses (over 400 lbs.) are sent to Japan and the 'junk' meat is sent to America from Japan."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 5, 1985**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood con-

trol projects. The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a twothirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment

authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire special water funds for water other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.
