## MARTIN DODD ON Range, Pasture Tour Scheduled For Fri., July 8

### EUROPEAN TOUR

Teresa Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Martin and Lisa Dodd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C.G. Dodd, are two Texas members of American International Education and Training, Inc., a European

Tour for High School graduates and college age young people. Teresa will be a Freshman at West Texas University and Lisa, a Sophomore at Texas Tech.

American International Education and Training Inc., will affiliate three credit hours toward their college education for participating and taking the European Tour.

The girls left Amarillo, Sunday, July 3rd to fly to San Francisco, Calif., to join their sponsor, Mary Olenchak, and other A.I. program group members, all of California and one member from Reodosa, N.M.

The California group will fly from San Francisco to London on July 6th where they will join about 400 other A.J. members aboard the Leonid Brezhnev Cruise Ship to the Mediterranean, visiting Holland, Portugal and pass thru the Strait of Gibraltar to Spain. Their land tour by bus and train will take them to Florence and Rome in Italy where they will have the opportunity to spend some time visiting the Vatican.

The tour will begin at 9:00 AM at the brush control

## Plant Clinic Tonite, July 7

This is the time of year when many home owners, as well as agricultural producers, are having problems with disease and insects that are attacking their plants.

In an effort to help answer the questions these people have, the County Program Building Committee has scheduled a Plant Clinic for Thursday, July 7 from 9:00 AM until noon in the Commissioners Court Room of the County Courthouse at Wheeler according to Don King County Extension Agent.

Three Texas Agriculture Extension Service specialists will be on hand to answer

question. They are Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Pathologist, Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist and Dr. Toland Roberts, Extension Vegetable Specialists.

King emphasized that the clinic is for anyone who has questions concerning plant growth problems, regardless if it is about the lawn, ornamental, vegetable or crops such as wheat, cotton, grain, sorghum or pastures.

The best approach would be for the person to bring a

specimen plant or cutting of a leaf, limb, etc. to the clinic. If, however, the problem occurs at some other time of the year or a specimen is not available, the person should feel free to come visit with the specialists.

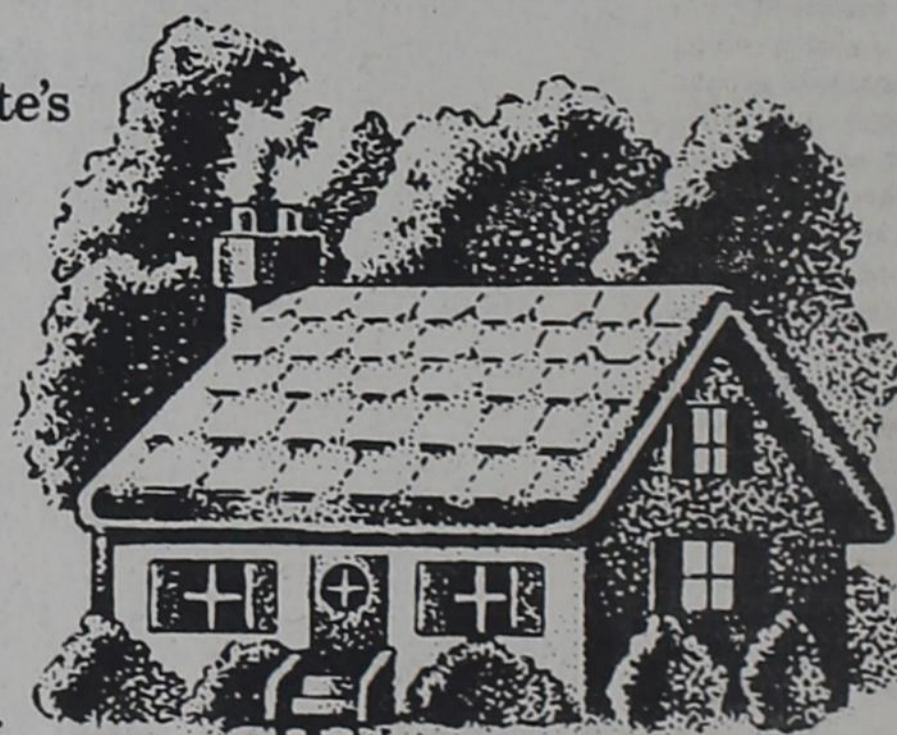

## CEILING FANS ADD COMFORT AND STYLE

Ceiling fans might make you think of steamy island hide-aways of "Casablanca." But they can also help you have a more comfortable summer right in your own home. From ornate brass to pastel plastic models, ceiling fans are back in style.

You don't have to have 12-foot ceilings to use a fan either. But for safety's sake, a fan should be suspended from ceilings that are at least eight-feet high, since the blades are at least one-foot from the ceiling. For cathedral ceilings, an extension pole can be used to place the fan at the desired height.

Choose a ceiling fan based on the size and shape of the room. Most fans range from 36 to 52 inches in diameter. The 36-inch fan is useful in narrow spaces like kitchens, porches and sunrooms. The 52-inch fan is generally used in larger areas requiring a wider, more uniform distribution of air movement.

As you shop for a fan, notice that some have metal housing and hand-rubbed wooden blades. Other models are housed in plastic with either metal or plastic blades.

Metal blades are potentially more dangerous than wood or plastic. Any sharp-edged or thin blade can injure your hand if it accidentally touches the moving fan. So as a safety precaution, select units with blades no less than 3/16 inch thick at the tip.

If you want a fan with variable speeds, be prepared for a little noise. Some ceiling fans with speed control make a noise that sounds similar to the humm from a faulty fluorescent light.

Ceiling fan lights range from small fluorescent tubes to ornate globes. Carefully choose a place for a fan with a light. For example, a fan with a light fixture suspended from an eight-foot ceiling will probably be too low.

A fan hanging low over tables or furniture may not present much of a problem. But in traffic areas, the light could become an obstacle. Some manufacturers offer a low-profile model light for such areas.

Ceiling fans range in price from \$50 from \$1,000. Higher priced models are often primarily decorative accessories cast of solid brass or finished with highly ornate trim, stenciling and hand-crafted detail. But the majority of models are in the \$100 to \$400 price range.

Installing a ceiling fan requires either an electrician or a competent do-it-yourselfer. The easiest form of installation is to use existing wiring from an overhead light fixture.

Don't install a fan near curtains that might become entangled in the blades. Also keep it away from areas where people change clothes. A low fan can harm a person raising his arms to dress.

Although a fan should produce years of reliable service, check the manufacturer's warranty. Most makers guarantee the motor for five years, but be sure to ask about servicing. Some manufacturers supply a toll-free number to answer consumer's questions, other have a network of service centers, and some neglect to mention service. So before you buy, ask the dealer what type of service is available.

With the wide variety of style, features, and prices

available, you should be able to find a ceiling fan to suit your needs both for style and comfort.

So don't be like the man who bought a ceiling fan, never touched the thermostat and then wondered why his electricity bills remained so high. You can save money with a ceiling fan, but only if you raise your thermostat.

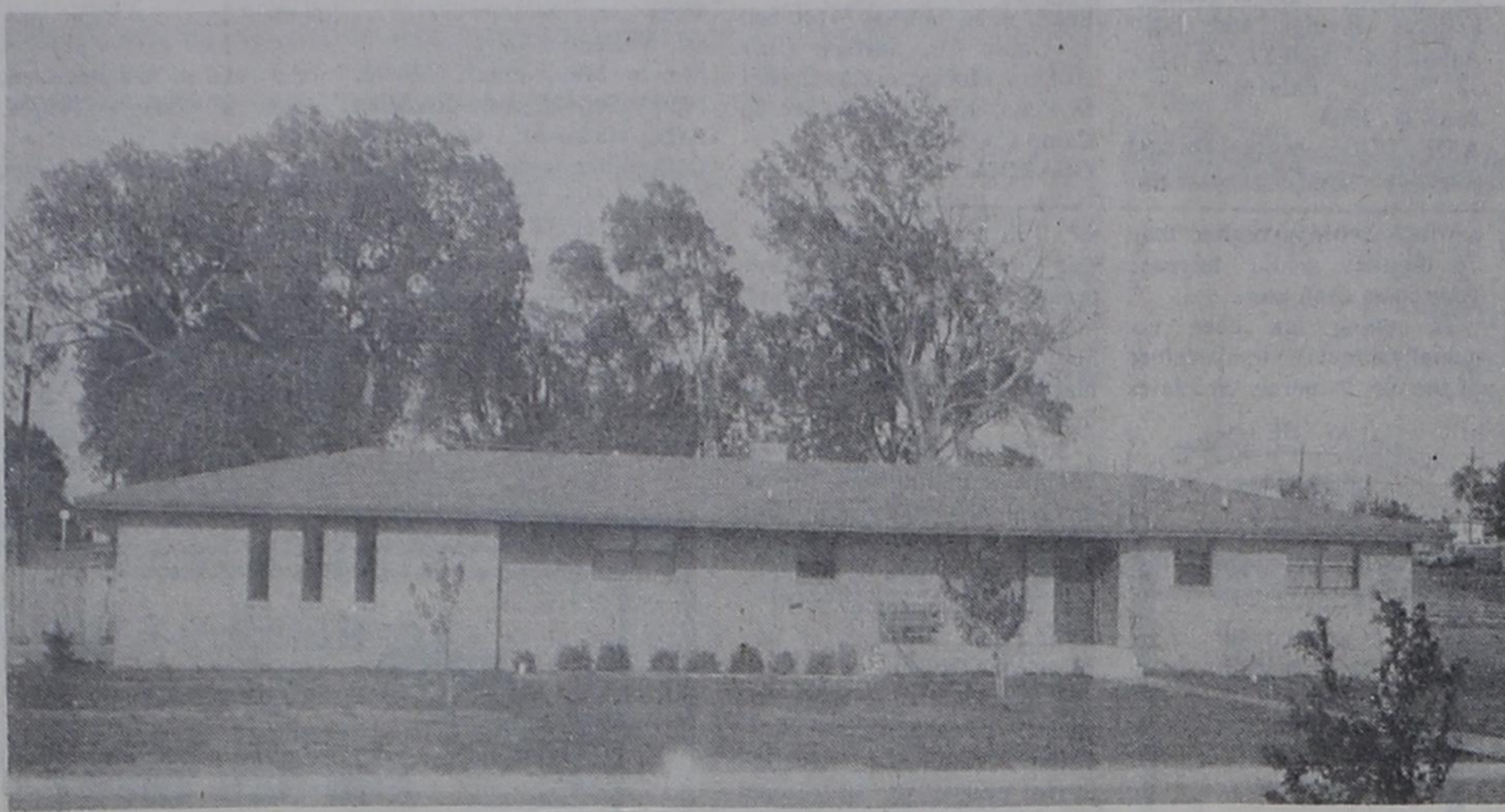

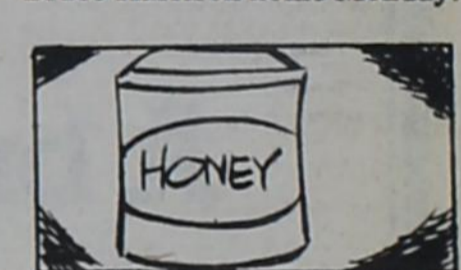

**Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application. As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers. Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

**Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies**

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. 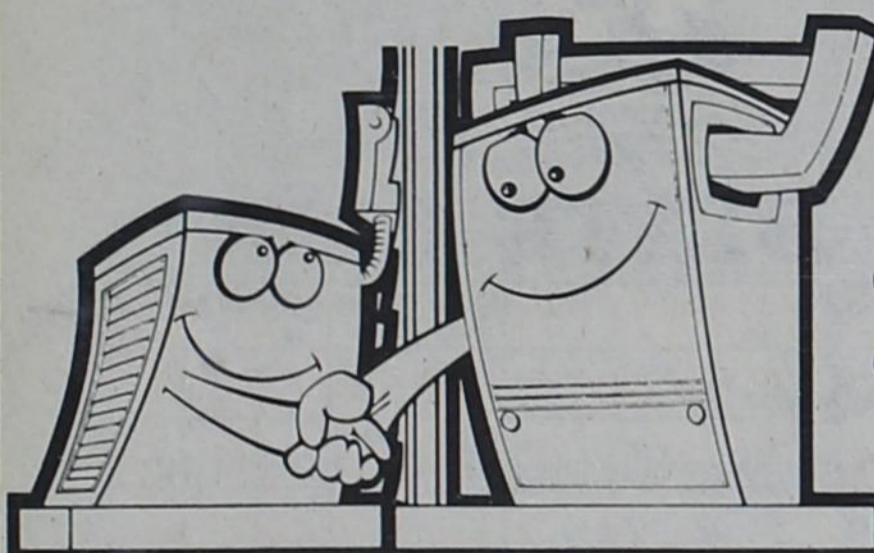

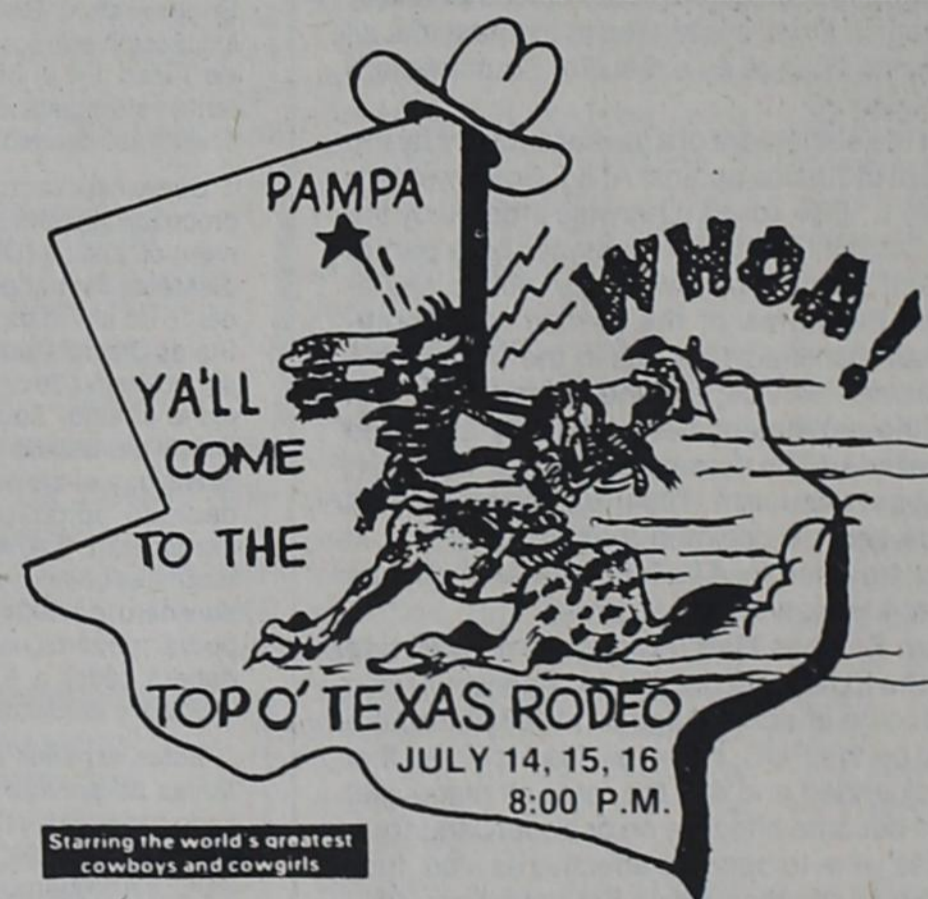

## Look At 4-H Membership

Some 140,000 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are members of the action-oriented, "learning by doing" program called 4-H.

4-H is the youth share of the educational efforts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, established in 1915 to diffuse among the people practical information relating to agriculture and home economics.

However, 4-H goes back farther than that. 4-H actually had its beginning in 1908 in Jack County when a boy's corn club was organized to help grow better corn. Shortly thereafter, girls got involved as organized groups such as tomatoe clubs, canning clubs and poultry clubs.

4-H in Texas has grown from an organization for farm boys and girls to one that is quite diverse in its makeup.

Girls now consistently outnumber boys in the program. Current figures show 72,129 girls to 67,653 boys. And about half of today's 4-H'ers—68,783—come from towns and cities larger than 60,000 people. More than 33,000 still live on farms and ranches while some 37,000 live in small towns and rural nonfarm areas. Of these 4-H'ers, more than 66,000 are active in about 2,000 community 4-H clubs. The remaining 74,000 4-H'ers participate through a number of different programs.

Assisting county Extension agents and the Texas 4-H staff to carry out effective learning activities and programs are some 15,000 volunteer leaders. Volunteer leaders organize many 4-H activities and conduct worthwhile learning experience for 4-H boys and girls. They are a vital cog in the total program, form recruitment to providing expertise in teaching various subject areas. Any interested individuals are invited to join the ranks of the 4-H volunteer leaders.

4-H continues to be a vibrant organization that is leading the way in helping youth learn practical skills and gain a knowledge of their environment that will make them better citizens and leaders of tomorrow.

4-H programs are open to all persons age 9 to 19 regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

## TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Hybrid portulaca is a sun-loving flower that gains more popularity almost daily, and it deserves all the praise it gets, for it may be the most outstanding new plant of the 80's for Texas.

You may have heard hybrid portulaca referred to as "purslane". Purslane is actually a noxious, tenacious weed. The weed was crossed with moss rose, otherwise known as portulaca, to produce hybrid portulaca, the flower that is offered in so many nurseries across the state as "purslane". Don't be fooled—the beautiful bloomers should correctly be called hybrid portulaca.

Hybrid portulaca comes in a wide range of colors, including white, yellow,



low, red, apricot, lavender, rose, and burgundy. Even bicolors and plants with jade-looking foliage have been developed.

Hybrid portulaca is the answer to a Texan's prayers in the heat of July, for it loves sun and heat, and can be planted as a low ground cover in those hot, full-sun areas of your yard. It will grow in moderate to bright light, but needs plenty of sunlight to bloom profusely. The plant is often used in hanging baskets,

barrels, and as borders.

As to the care of this plant, there's not a lot to tell. It does appreciate moderate water and fertilizer with high phosphates for blooming in the summer, but it will take neglect.

After hybrid portulaca flowers for a while, the seed pods should be removed to encourage more blooms. Don't worry about trying to pinch off each pod by hand—that's more work than this terrific plant requires. Just get out the garden shears or flexible line trimmer, and prune away. Pruning removes old pods and encourages branching, which soon results in an even showier display of bloom.

Hybrid portulaca will bloom all day for you, from spring through fall. If there's no frost in your area of the state, it will live through the winter and bring you more blossoms next year.

And though you may hear this showy, sun-loving plant called purslane almost everywhere you turn, remember that its correct name is hybrid portulaca, and try to use that name yourself.

## PERTURBING PICKLE PROBLEMS

Problems with pickle making can be by perturbing. Some common problems are shriveled, hollow, soft, slippery and dark pickles.

Shriveled pickles may result from using too strong a vinegar, sugar or salt solution at the start of the pickling process. In making very sweet or very sour pickles, it is best to start with a dilute solution and increase gradually to the desired strength. Over cooking or overprocessing may also cause shrinkage.

Hollow pickles may result from one of several causes. Poorly developed pickles may become hollow. Holding cucumbers too long before pickling is another cause. Hollowness may result from too rapid fermentation or too weak a brine during fermentation.

Soft or slippery pickles usually result from microbial action which causes spoilage. Once a pickle becomes soft it cannot be made firm. Microbial activity may be caused by too little salt or acid; cucumbers not covered with brine during fermentation; scum scattered throughout the brine during fermentation; insufficient heat treatment; a seal that is not airtight; or moldy garlic or spices. Blossoms, if not entirely removed from the cucumbers before fermentation, may contain fungi or yeast responsible for enzymatic softening of pickles.

Dark pickles may be caused by ground spice; too much spice; iodized salt; overcooking; or minerals in water, especially iron utensils.

For best results with pickles use only quality cucumbers or other vegetables or fruits and follow tested recipes.

## FRESH-PACK DILL PICKLES AT HOME

Would you like to make dill pickles at home? Here is a way to do them in a hurry.

Wash about seventeen or eighteen pounds of cucumbers thoroughly and drain them. Cover them with a brine made from one and one-half cups of salt to two gallons of water. Let them soak overnight and drain them.

Combine six cups of vinegar, three-fourths cup salt, one-fourth cup sugar, and nine cups of water. Tie two tablespoons whole mixed pickling spice in a clean, thin white cloth. Add to the liquid mixture and heat to boiling.

Pack the cucumbers into clean, hot, quart jars and add two teaspoons whole mustard seed, three heads of dill and one or two cloves of garlic to each jar. Cover with the lids according to the manufacturer's directions.

Process the pickles in boiling water for twenty minutes, in most cases. (Due to the altitude of Wheeler County, add two minutes to the processing time.) Start to count the processing time as soon as the hot jars are placed into the actively boiling water.

Remove the jars and set upright several inches apart on a wire rack to cool.

These fresh pack dills will add zest to meals anytime of the year.

## BRINED DILL PICKLES MADE AT HOME

Would you like to try your hand at making dill pickles? They will add a "store-bought" taste treat to those juicy hamburgers broiled in the backyard. To make five quarts of pickles, use ten pounds of three-to eight long cucumbers. Wash and drain them on a rack or wipe them dry. Put three tablespoons of while mixed pickling spice and a layer of dill in a large crock or glass jar. Fill the crock with cucumbers to within three or four inches of the top. Place a layer of dill and three more tablespoons of spices over the cucumbers. Garlic may be added if desired. Thoroughly mix one and one-fourth cups vinegar, one cup salt and one and one-fourth cups water and pour over the cucumbers.

Cover the pickles with a heavy china or glass plate or lid that fits into the crock.

Use a weight to hold the plate down and keep the cucumbers under the brine. A glass jar filled with water makes a good weight. Cover loosely with a cloth and keep the pickles at room temperature. Scum will start to form in about three to five days. It should be removed daily. Do not stir the pickles, but be sure

they are completely covered with brine. If necessary, make additional brine using the same proportions as before.

In about three weeks the cucumbers will have become an olive green color and should have the desired flavor. Any white spots inside the fermented cucumbers will disappear in processing.

The original brine is usually cloudy as a result of yeast developed during the fermentation period. If you object to the cloudiness, fresh brine may be used to cover the pickles when packing them into jars. Use one-fourth cup salt, two cups vinegar and two quarts water in making the fresh brine. Generally, the fermentation brine is preferred for its added flavor. It should be strained before heating to boiling.

Pack the pickles, along with some of the dill, into clean, hot quart jars. Add garlic if desired. Avoid too tight a pack. Cover with boiling brine to one-half inch of the top of the jar, and adjust the jar lids according to the manufacturer's directions.

Process the pickles in boiling water for fifteen minutes in most cases. (Due to the altitude of Wheeler County, add two minutes to the processing time.) Start to count the processing time as soon as hot jars are placed into actively boiling water.

Remove the jars. Set them upright several inches apart on a wire rack to cool.

The brined dill pickles will add zest to those summer picnics or to any snack or meal whether summer, fall, winter or spring.

## "STATEWIDE WATER PLAN"

Individuals, organizations and groups in the High Plains and Trans Pecos Region will have an opportunity to comment on the draft planning report prepared by the Texas Department of Water Resources which is to be used in amending the 1968 Texas Water Plan. A public hearing will be conducted by the Department of Water Resources at 7 p.m., on July 12, in Lubbock, at the Lubbock Civic Center.

Executive Director Charles E. Nemir has encouraged individuals, organizations, and local officials to participate in the hearing to address water needs set out in the draft report, "Water for Texas: Planning for the Future." Water quality protection, water conservation, public education, environmental protection, water supply development, flood protection, water management, and State participation in water financing are among the water issues addressed in the report.

Nemir pointed out that the "statewide water plan" package of legislation considered recently by the Texas Legislature is NOT the Texas Water Plan or amendments thereto to be discussed at the hearing.

He also said the he is concerned about participation in the hearing process. In many instances it takes a drought or other emergency situation to get people to pay attention to water. Most people are unaware or unconcerned about water problems as long as they can go to the

kitchen and turn on the faucet or go to the shower, turn it on, and out comes water. They're satisfied and they don't think about needing to plan and act now in order to have adequate water in the future.

Nemir added that some cities in Texas have been preparing and implementing water conservation plans, some including water rationing, in order to just meet peaking summer demands. These plans are needed primarily because of inadequate water treatment and conveyance facilities.

"The problem is that by losing time and progress now," Nemir said, "we will not be ready when the next extended dry period comes or when water supply and wastewater treatment systems can no longer meet the growing needs. This will result not only in possible severe problems, but we will accordingly have to pay a much high price later."

The hearing in Lubbock is the fourth of eight regional hearings being held in Texas during June and July. Additional hearings will be held in Abilene on July 14, El Paso on July 19, Austin on July 21, and in Baytown on July 26. Hearings have already been held in Longview, Dallas, and McAllen.

Fifty-six counties are included in the High Plains and Trans Pecos Region of the State. River basins included in this region are the Canadian, Upper Red, Upper Brazos and the Pecos River.

### REFUNDABLE ASSESSMENTS PROGRAM

AUSTIN — During the special session of the 68th Legislature, lawmakers passed an important measure which, if approved by voters this fall, will significantly improve the overall economy in Texas.

The Texas Senate and House of Representatives agreed to place on the November election ballot a constitutional amendment calling for a statewide refundable assessments program.

The program, which we sponsored, will provide for the promotion of food and fiber in Texas by providing representative associations of agricultural producers with the authority to collect refundable assessments on their product sales. The checkoff program must be approved by the producers who pay the assessment and they will be administered by board members who are elected by the producers. And, any producer of a commodity who does not wish to participate may request a

The program, which we sponsored, will provide for financing of marketing, promotions, research and education programs relating to products such as corn, wheat, grain sorghum and other commodities.

Currently, Texas is lagging behind other states in the nation in its ability to finance marketing promotions. Marketing and research promotions are essential to help sell Texas commodities at home and abroad.

The opportunity to expand our commodities markets overseas, especially for grain, is tremendous. A refundable assessments program will not only greatly benefit our producers, but it will also help provide additional jobs for the unemployed in this state. An increase in the exporting of our commod-

ities will result in a rise in the number of people needed to help get the commodities to the overseas markets. People can expect to see an increase in job opportunities in the trucking industry, railroads, elevator operators and more.

We believe that the proposed statewide program, which will be voted on by the people in the way of a constitutional amendment this November, is important to help improve the state of the economy. The program will not cost the state any money. It will be funded by producers of various commodities at very small assessments.

The purpose of such a program is to allow our farmers the right to join others to work to develop markets here and abroad, while at the same time boosting our economic climate.

We are fortunate that we were able to convince the Governor to let lawmakers consider the proposal during the recent special session. We believe it is very important to the agricultural industry.

One item which was placed on the special session agenda which also dealt with agriculture, but which failed to pass both Houses, was a revised workmen's compensation bill. The measure which was placed on the special session agenda differed greatly from the workmen's compensation bill we defeated during the regular session. Nevertheless, the measure which would have affected significantly fewer farmers than originally proposed, never reached the full Senate for vote.
