CONVENTION WILL BE HELD BY GROUP ON NATIONAL INDIGNATION

The National Indignation Convention of Amarillo will reconvene on Thursday, January 20, in the Municipal Auditorium as part of a country-wide program.

General William P. Campbell, retired, who is now executive assistant to Dr. George Benson of Harding College in Searcy, Ark., will be the speaker for the patriotic meeting. His topic will be "The Soaring American Eagle versus the Growing Russian Grizzly."

The Amarillo N.I.C. meeting will be a part of a national telephone rally, with dozens of other indignation conventions gathered at the same hour across the United States in every Congressional district and hooked up through the Dallas headquarters with the local assembly.

An address by General Edwin A. Walker, who spoke in Amarillo on January 5, will be the highlight of this telephone hook-up. General Walker's speech, to be delivered in the Ector County Coliseum in Midland, will be amplified into auditoriums over the country at 8:30 p.m. (C.S.T.) on January 20th.

The major portion of this address will be heard at the Amarillo meeting, prior to General Campbell's speech, which is scheduled for 9 p.m.

Originator of the films "Communism on the Map" and "Communist Encirclement," General Campbell is also vice-president of the National Education Program in Searcy. At the time of his retirement, he was the Assistant Chief of Finance of the U.S. Army.

Through his work as an anti-communist leader, General Campbell has been granted more Freedom Foundation awards than any person in America, having received the George Washington Honor Medal from the Freedom Foundation in Valley Forge. "For Outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American Way of Life," through public addresses on "Americanism, Communism and the Individual Political Responsibilities," delivered in 1954, 1958 and 1959.

The N.I.C. was formed in Dallas on October 14, 1961, for protest in training of young Yugoslavian pilots at Perrin Air Force Base, near Sherman. On November 22, 23, and 24 it reconvened, with representatives from cities all over the nation. Amarillo's first National Indignation Convention was on December 14, when 1500 persons assembled in the Municipal Auditorium to hear Tom Anderson, editor of Farm and Ranch Magazine of Nashville, Tenn. The January 20th meeting will be at 8 p.m. with doors open at 6:30 p.m. It is open to the public and no admission charge will be made.

Adobe Walls Council Plans Capital Drive

For the first time in many years the Adobe Walls Council, Boys Scouts of America, which headquarters at Pampa, and covers twelve Texas and three Oklahoma Panhandle counties, will conduct a capital development campaign, according to Bob Brummal, Borger, Council President.

The drive, which will get underway early in February, will make possible the construction of much needed facilities at Camp Kiowa, located near Canadian, Texas, and the erection of a new service center on property already owned by the Council in Pampa.

The campaign goal has been set at \$139,000.00.

The Council president pointed out that 13,571 boys are available to be members of the Boy Scouts of America in the fifteen-county area. Nearly 6,000, 40%, are currently registered. As a result the Adobe Walls Council has for years earned the "First Place" position amongst Councils in Region Nine Boy Scouts—Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

E. E. Shelhamer, Pampa, former Council president, has been selected to serve as General Campaign Chairman.

Brummal indicated that the campaign has been in the planning stages for a long time, and that the Scouters of the area who have planned it are sure that they are on firm ground in supplying facilities for the kind of program boys want.

In the spring of 1960 while Shelhamer was president, he appointed a special long range planning committee to study the needs of the future. The committee headed by Vernon Schultz of Booker, submitted a plan to carry the council through 1970. Out of these studies came estimates of professional and office personnel, needs of the Council for leadership, office facilities, scout units, and camp development.

The planning of the campaign continued through 1961 as a Council-wide survey was taken to determine the feeling of the area toward Scouting and to try to find out if it would support a capital funds drive. The next move was to appoint a Capital Campaign Steering Committee. This again included men from the fifteen counties.

The list of projects in the camp development portion of the campaign include a camp service building for trading post, office and storage purposes; central showers; camp ranger's home; a craft and recreation pavilion; additional camp land and special camp maintenance projects.

Shelhamer has recruited George Newberry of Pampa to serve as Vice Chairman. Serving as area chairman in the Council's five districts are E. C. Krone, Guymon, Okla.; Frank Culberson, Pampa; Alton Broxwell, Perryton; Frank Phelan, Jr., Clarendon; and Lou Roberts, Borger.

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WHEELER COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

We very often hear some of the farmers in this area make the statement: "I realize that my farm needs terraces, but they are so hard to work that I just don't want them." Or we hear the remark: "I guess terraces are alright, but I doubt if they are worth the trouble and inconvenience that they cause."

It is true that a field with terraces is not as easy and pleasant to work as one that is nearly level and does not need them. Unfortunately, not all of our farm land in this area will fall into this category. Indeed, a great many of them have slopes of from 1 ft per 100 ft. to 5 ft. of fall per 100 ft. or even steeper. Cultivated land of this type should be terraced to keep run-off water from forming gullies and to keep down sheet erosion which is sometimes hard to detect.

If we would stop to consider which would be worse—working a field with terraces or working one that has gullies in it that cannot be crossed with farm machinery, it would be logical to make a decision in favor of the terraces.

Not only will a good terrace system save our farm from washing into ditches and strip sheet erosion, but there are other benefits as well. In our area where we have periods of drought, terraces will help conserve moisture by holding water on the land longer so it will have more time to penetrate into the soil. Also, they will help to distribute the moisture more evenly over the farm land. If all the inconveniences of terraces and all the benefits are carefully considered, surely the decision for a good terrace system will be made.

When a farmer makes a decision to construct a terrace system and needs some assistance, he may contact the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service which is assisting the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District with farm problems of this nature in this county. The District will be more than glad to give all the assistance they can.

Troy Jones, Rt. 1 Wheeler, was admitted to the Texas Rehabilitation Center of Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation on January 3, 1962.

At the Center, he will have a program of rehabilitation treatments prescribed for him by the medical director, a specialist in physical medicine and rehabilitation.

The medical program at TRC is made up of physical therapy, occupational therapy, clinical psychology, speech therapy, 24-hour rehabilitation nursing, and recreational therapy. These are prescribed as needed for the individual patient.

In rehabilitation at the Center, the entire person is considered. Church services are offered, there is a school for children, and entertainment programs are held regularly. The goal is maximum rehabilitation—physically, socially, and emotionally—so the person can live and work to the best of his abilities.

TRC is a non-profit, non-sectarian hospital which assures needed care of Texans of all ages who have been disabled by many kinds of accidents and diseases. About 55 percent of the operating budget must come from contributions of Texas citizens.

It was a funny feeling Friday morning Jan. 5, when I got up and found we had no lights. The clock had stopped about 2:20 A.M. I tried the telephone and it was out. Then I thought,

"Thank God the gas is still coming through."

Ernest Lasater has an electric thermostat control on his furnace, and he had no heat. Gertrude has an electric cook stove and no way to cook breakfast. She thought of a gas hot plate in the wash house and sent Ernest out there to heat water for coffee. While he was gone she rigged up a bread pan and fried bacon and eggs over the bath room heater.

Haskell Sammons had two freezers full of frozen food, and Sunday afternoon electric service had not been restored to his place. He moved the smaller freezer to town and plugged in at Bryce Clay's plumbing shop.

Clayton, Annie and Lee Ann Kelley from Canyon stopped by to visit the Rices a short while Sunday afternoon. They had been up to Wheeler to visit Mr. and Mrs. Edd Clay, Annie's parents. Mr. Clay has been quite ill, but was reported better.

When The Power Is Off

Many conveniences today we take for granted. We think little about electric power until we flip a switch and it is not there. In our modern life this can become a major problem, even a tragedy.

Mr. Cecil Snelgroves has a dairy farm in the Twitty community with 64 head of fine Holstein milk cows now producing. He has a modern milking system that takes the milk direct from the cow into a pipe line to the cooling tank. There it awaits the big tank truck to pick it up for transportation to market.

On Friday morning, January 5, 1962, Mr. Snelgroves found no power to operate his milking equipment. Sixty-four head of cows ready to be milked and no milkers operating. He waited for the power to come on, but none came. He kept waiting, but no power. Finally, about 3 p.m. he went to the store in Twitty in desperation. "What am I going to do", he inquired of Viola Carlton, who operates the store.

Viola answered, "Tell you what I would do, I would round up some neighbors and start milking those cows by hand."

Cecil took her suggestion and soon had seven men on the job taking the milk away from those cows. Cecil himself made the eighth man. The others were Woody Carlton, Clois Jolly, Bob Messer, Cecil Amerson, Eddie Clerkley, Jessie B. Ryan and Beuron Stevens.

Another problem developed; where to get the milk buckets. Since the advent of modern machinery into the dairy business no one keeps milky buckets. Very, very few people milk just one or two cows any more. So the men had to use what ever kind of vessel they could find. Cooking pots came in handy. Just anything that would hold milk.

Some of the cows are heavy producers, and having missed the morning milking their udders were strutting. In some cases milk was dripping from the teats. Some gave eight gallons at that one milking.

The cows were not accustomed to this ancient method of milking, so they objected strenuously. The men sometimes answered with words that would not do to broadcast. The men soon hit on a scheme that kept the cows too busy to do much kicking. One man would get on each side of the cow. Two men would start milking at the same time, and it was impossible for her to do much kicking with both feet at the same time. It seems that they would soon give up and let the milkers proceed.

This work continued until the men had milked an average of a little over five cows apiece. That was about three hours after they had started. Then the power came on and the remaining twenty cows went through their regular routine.

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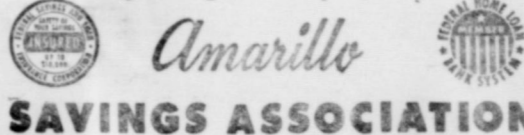

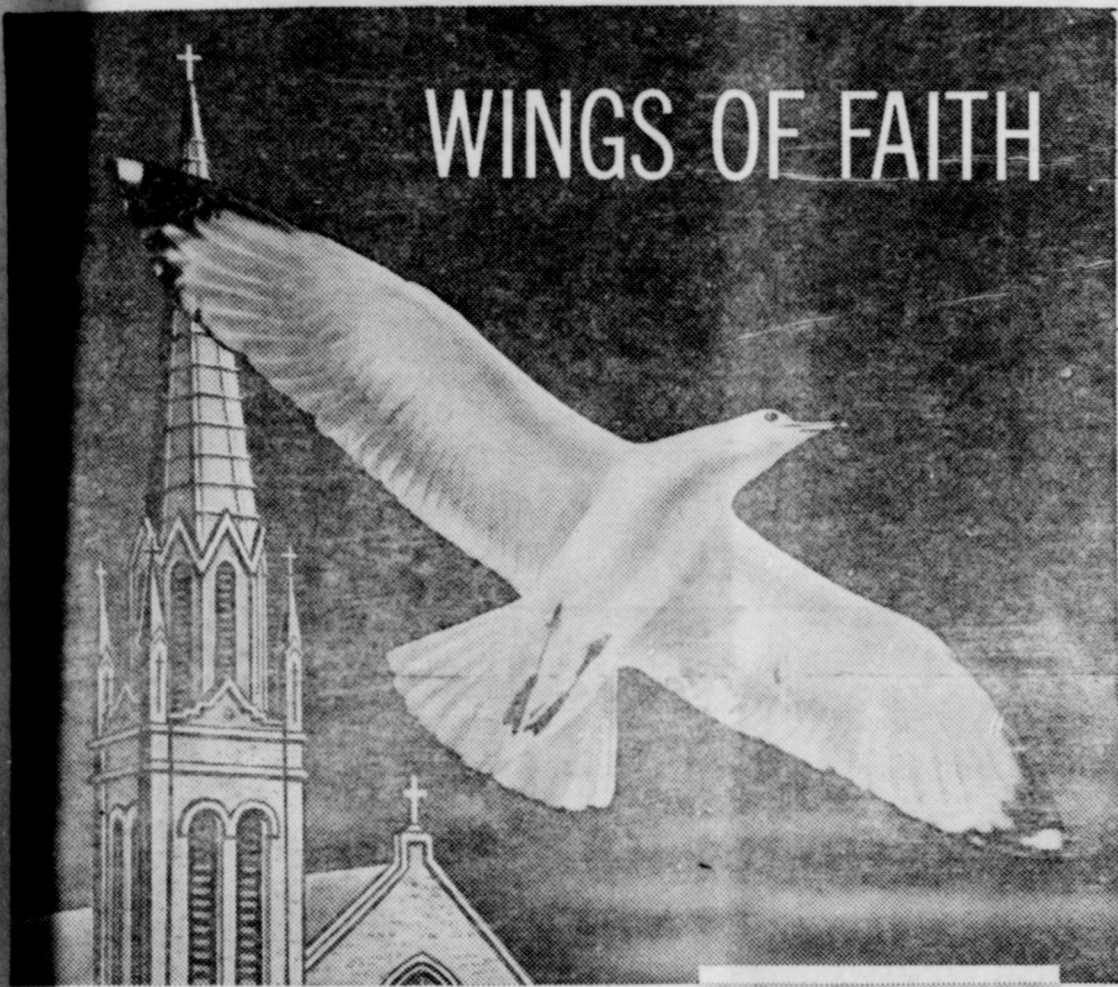

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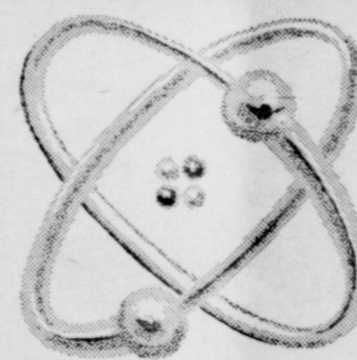
