LOCAL DEPUTY CAPTURES PAIR NORTH OF CITY

Two Oklahoma men, arrested near Wheeler Sunday night as suspects in the March 22 burglary of the Follett National Bank, were booked on another charge here Wednesday.

Oscar S. Stanley, 57, and S. E. Powell, 29, were taken into custody at about 10:20 p.m. Sunday by Wheeler County Deputy Sheriff Doyle Ramsey just this side of Sweetwater Creek north of the city on Highway 83.

They were charged Monday with taking \$3,068.15 from the Follett bank on March 22 and placed under \$5,000 bond each. Wednesday, the two were booked with the March burglary of Allison Merchantile Co in Allison.

Staley is being held in the Wheeler County jail here and Powell in Cochitree County jail at Perryton.

Staley also was charged with vagrancy, to which he pleaded guilty, and is now serving his sentence.

Ramsey and Milton Liles of Wheeler were sitting in the deputy's car when Ramsey recognized the green auto in which Staley and Powell were riding.

A search of the car revealed a crowbar, sledge hammer, auto body repairman's tool and several other tools in a sack, which apparently had been used in break-ins.

Several blankets, clothing and a few rolls of coins had been taken in the Allison burglary.

Wheeler Sheriff Bus Dorman was in Elk City, Okla., where the suspects live, continuing his investigation of the case.

Staley and Powell were questioned following their arrest by Ranger Bill Henslee of Pampa, Lipscomb County Sheriff Bill Fitzgerald, Oklahoma authorities and FBI agents from Amarillo.

THE SECRET OF SPIRITUAL VICTORY

Believers in Christ have been made "free from sin" by grace (Rom. 6:14, 18) in the sense that they need not, indeed, should not, yield to sin when temptation arises (Rom. 6:12, 13). Believers have also made "free from the law of sin and death" (Rom. 8:2) for Christ, in grace, bore the death penalty for them.

But no believer is free from what Paul calls "the law of sin which is in my members," that is, the old, Adamic, nature, with its inherent tendency to do wrong. Nor is he free from the conflict with the new nature which this involves. If the Christian would be truly spiritual and deal in a Spiritual way with the sin that indwells him, he must clearly recognize its presence; he must face the fact that while, thank God he is no longer "in sin" sin is still in him.

But this conflict should not discourage us for it is one of the true signs of salvation. It is unknown to the unbeliever, for only the additional presence of the new nature, along with the old, causes this conflict, for the Bible says about these two natures: "These are contrary the one to the other."

But not only is this conflict within the believer a sure sign of salvation; it also creates within him a deep and necessary sense of our inward imperfection and of the infinite grace of a holy God in saving us and ministering to us daily in helping us to overcome sin and live pleasing to God as an understanding and an appreciation of what He has done for us in Christ. As we are occupied with these "things of the Spirit" we find ourselves "walking in the Spirit," and Gal. 5:16 says: "Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfill the lusts of the flesh." How much better to have our lives transformed by occupation with Christ (II Cor. 3:18) and our position and blessings in the heaven lies with Him (Col. 3:1-3) than to assume the hopeless task of trying to improve the "old nature": always engaged in introspection; always occupied with the flesh!

HOLLIS, Okla. (Special) Any birthday is fun, good cause for celebration, but the best birthday of all must be the 100th anniversary.

Mrs. Mary Beatty who lives at the Pennington Nursing home, 1122 East Eula, in Hollis is looking forward to the celebration of her 100th birthday in April 15, 1962.

Grandma Beatty, as she is affectionately called by those who know her, has lived a long life and a good one, and there are many things she enjoys each day.

Nurses at the Pennington home relate how Grandma Betty loves to sing, especially each week when church groups visit the home to conduct singing. Almost every day, Grandma Beatty may be heard singing hymns and other old time favorites.

She enjoys visitors, her family, and the food and attention she receives in the home. She sits in her rocker at times each day, at other times, rests or sleeps in her bed.

Mrs. Beatty was born April 15, 1862 in Indiana where she grew up during the Civil War period. Moving to Missouri when she was young, she met and married John Beatty and started a family.

The couple moved to Old Greer County, Texas and settled in the area north of Martha in 1892. They went by train from Missouri to Vernon, Texas the closest railroad depot at the time.

From Vernon they made the rest of the trip in a wagon pulled by a team of mules, traveling around 30 miles a day. When the family arrived at Martha, they set up housekeeping in a dug-out, living there until 1900.

They moved then to Gordon, Texas but in 1907, the family moved to Madge and Union Grove community where they lived on a farm.

SALES TAX

I am a Democratic Candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the sixth in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

On February 5, 1962, when I announced for the office of State Representative, my statement read in part, "Relief from the complexity of the State Sales Tax by applying tax on an across-the-board basis." We have a sales tax, therefore, the issue in this campaign is the method to be used in amending this Tax Law in order to arrive at a just and equitable Sales Tax Law.

Our present Tax Law is based on Pennsylvania Sales Tax which went into effect in 1956 at 3% and is now at 4%. Pennsylvania Sales Tax Law is a model of complexities and is not working now, nor has it ever worked. The tremendous State Bureaucracy set up to administer this law merely puts an additional burden upon people of Pennsylvania. Texas said they could solve this problem of administration. In Texas its complexities have been transferred to the small business man and the individual. I do not call that a solution. It is merely passing the buck on an unworkable Sales Tax Law.

Our four neighboring States of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico have an across-the-board Sales Tax. These taxes were enacted in 1933, 1934, 1935 and 1937 as a 2% Sales Tax and are all now operating at 2% except Kansas which has increased to 2 1/2%. They are a proven workable Sales Tax, and my solution to our Tax problem would be along the lines of the Sales Tax in these States using the form of a Retail Sales Tax in preference to a Gross Receipts Tax. I will favor a 1% Tax provided it will pay the State's Bills; if not, I will favor a 2% Tax, but absolutely no more. Details on exemptions and retentions I will favor are covered in my radio address this Friday morning.

Our Sales Tax Law provides for raising the fee for Driver's License. This item should be removed from our Sales Tax Law and returned to its former fee. This item is a Highway Safety regulation and should not be used as a Tax source.

All of my radio talks have been placed on file with your local newspapers. They may be examined by anyone who would be interested in any of the particular subjects I have discussed.

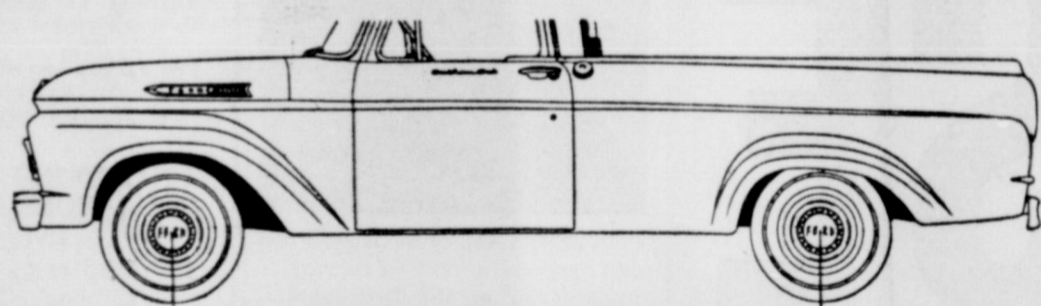
