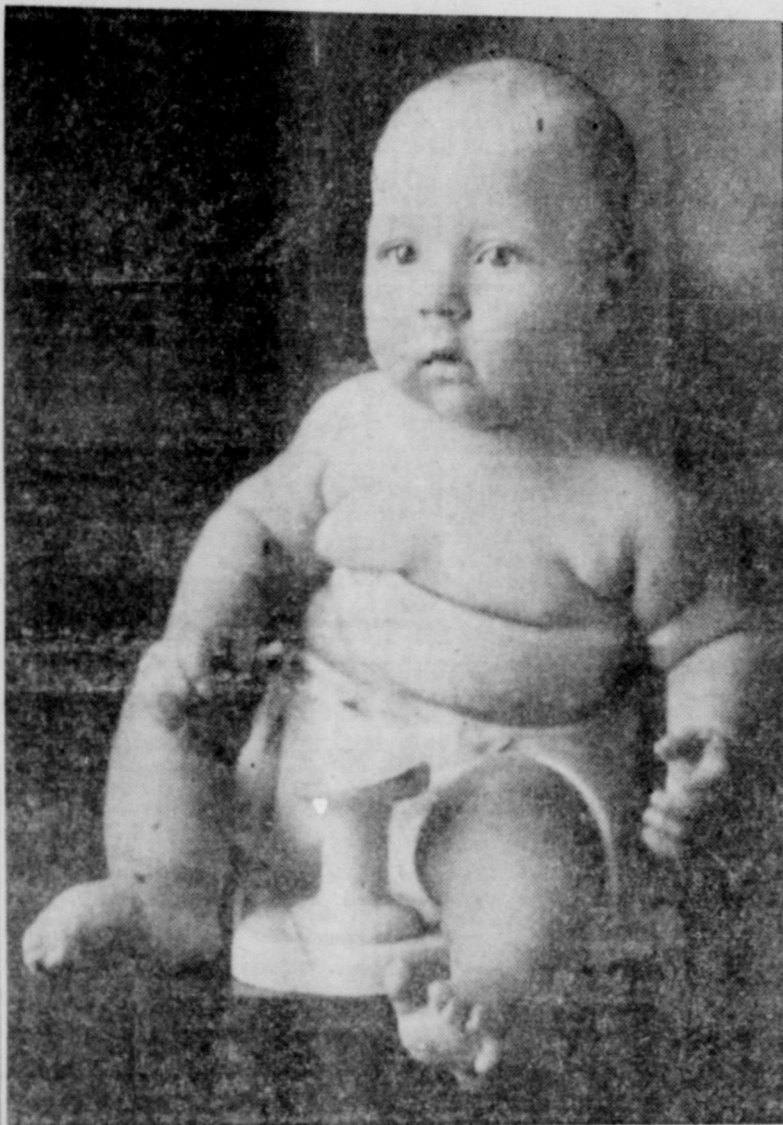
We will dismiss school on Tuesday, December 19 at 2:30 p.m. for the holidays, which will run from December 20 through January 1.

Holding only 30-29 margin at halftime, the Wheeler girls caught fire in the third stanza and built a comfortable 50-35 lead by intermission.

Allison's Antelopes handed the Mustangs their fifth loss of the season in as many starts with a 46-36 trampling. Joe David Malin was the big Allison gun as he sank eighteen counters followed by Hiram Begert with nine; Leslie Newson, eight; Lonnie Richardson, six; Mickey Richardson, four and Colie Donaldson, one. Monroe Page hit twelve points for the losers; Dunky Porter had seven; Bill Green, six; Randy Callan, five; Kendall Hunter, four and Bob Hink, two.

The score was tied at eighteen at half-time, but Allison led 34-25 at the end of the third period and the Mustangs never able to rally.

UNKNOWN PERSON MAILS LETTER TO THE WHEELER TIMES EDITOR

(Mailed to the Wheeler Times by an unknown person.)

Letter Said to Have Been Written by Jesus Christ Brings Fortune if Published by Those Who Possess It

The following letter, said to have been written by Jesus Christ appeared in the Vandalia Leader at Vandalia, Mo., and is being reprinted in the Hutchison County Herald by special request.

The original letter, said to have been written by Jesus Christ was found in the early days of Christianity by a child. There is a promise that whoever may have a copy of this letter in their possession will prosper and be followed by good fortune. If they publish it, but if they do not heed the command, bad luck and misfortune will follow them until it is made public.

From the hands of the child who found it the letter is said to have passed into the hands of a convert of the Christian faith.

For some reason this convert failed to have the letter published. He kept it, however, as a sacred memento to Christ and it passed on to his oldest son, and on down through many generations, but was never published.

The tradition being that when it finally was published it had been in one family for more than a thousand years. During all this period of time, the story goes, the family suffered repeated and continuous misfortune. Discouraged members of the family, migrated to countries other than where the letter was found, which was evidently Palestine, and finally one of them came to America, bringing the fatal letter with him. The having possession of it settled in Virginia, still keeping the fact of the letter secret.

Decendants of the family moved farther south, still followed by misfortune. Finally as the last member of the family lay on her death bed she called a neighbor woman named Thompson and gave the letter to her, relating its history.

"You shall not idle or misspend your time in bedecking yourself in superfluities of costly apparel and vain dressings for I have ordered it a day or rest. I will have that day kept holy that your sins may be forgiven you.

"You will not break my commandments, but observe and keep them, they being written by my hand and spoken from my mouth.

"You will not only go to Church yourselves, but also your manservant and maid-servant. Observe my words and learn my commandments.

"You shall finish your work every Saturday at 6 o'clock in the afternoon at which hour the preparations for the Sabbath begins.

"I advise you to fast five Fridays in that year beginning with Good Friday and continuing the Fridays following in remembrance of the five blood wounds he received for you and mankind.

"You shall love one another and cause them that are not baptised to come to church and receive the holy sacrament that is to say baptising and then the supper of the Lord and be made a member there of and in so doing I will give you long life and many blessings.

"Your land shall be replenished and bring forth abundance and will comfort you in the greatest temptations, and surely he that doth to the contrary shall be cursed.

I will also send hardness of heart on them, and especially on hardened and unpenitent unbelievers.

One result of this is that today not one in our big family shares the fears of the world as to the atomic bomb.

America as a whole, though, is departing from God's will. As a result, a constantly increasing number of families are being broken up through juvenile delinquency, alcoholism, divorce, etc.

St. Paul said to the Philippian Jailor: "Believe on Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved, and thy house" (Acts 16:31). This, of course, does not mean that if a man trusts Christ as his Savior, the rest of his family will automatically be saved. The sense is rather: "Believe in Christ and you will be saved, and this goes for your household too if they believe they will be saved" Acts 16:31). As Rom. 12 says: "Every one of us shall give an account of himself to God," but it is a wonderful fact that nothing will be so to keep a family together as mutual faith in Christ and mutual love for the Bible. 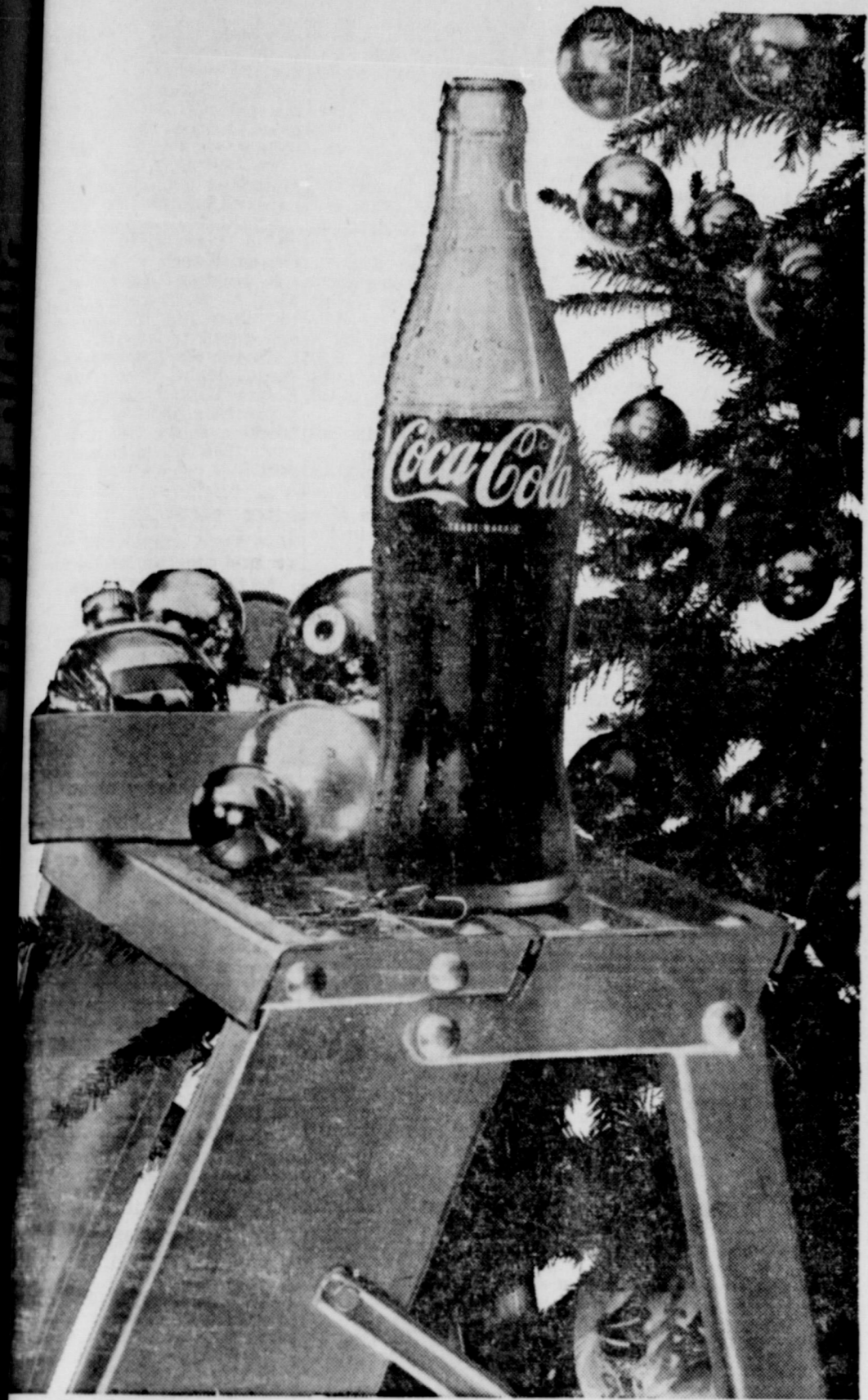

SHAMROCK WOMAN ALMOST MISSES BENEFITS

Mildred Rook stared in disbelief at the doctor sitting across from her. Unconsciously she twisted her pretty blue and white handkerchief into a string as the words sunk in. She would never be able to work again. It was well that she was seated because each word that the doctor spoke affected her like a thundering, slamming, pounding hammer against the piles driven into the ground until the end of time. Had she not been seated the words would surely have felled her. Numbly, Mildred Rook made her "thank-you," left the office and made her way into the sun-sparkled sidewalk. The hot cloudless day was a respite from the gloom that enveloped her, but only for a moment; because a stark realization swept over her; they had no money and neither she nor Cecil were physically able to work to earn it. How would they eat? And pay their bills? Again, the thoughts came to her like the deliberate, devastating blow of the pile driver.

One day shortly afterwards, Mrs. Rook called on the social security representative when he was in Shamrock. She was not supposed to be out of bed, but she had heard that maybe—just maybe she could get disability benefits; and she knew that however little it might be it would help. She is getting benefits now. Mrs. Rook gave the Social Security Administration written permission to tell her story: "In order to better acquaint people of the United States with the Social Security Act, with the benefits provided by that Act, and with the services performed by the Social Security Administration."

What is so significant about Mrs. Rook's story? Well, for one thing she does not receive regular retirement benefits, she receives too little for that; she receives disability payments. Secondly, she receives these payments even though originally some of the required credits to qualify for benefits were not on her record. Under the provisions of the disability law a person needs to have twenty quarters of coverage out of the forty quarters immediately preceding the time when she became unable to work. Each time Mrs. Rook was paid wages of \$50 in a calendar quarter she was credited with one quarter of coverage. Her record indicated she had eighteen quarters of coverage. That was close, but not close enough to qualify for and actually receive disability payments.

Mrs. Rook recalled that she had worked in the early 1950's and pointed out that this employment was not on her record. In speaking with her employer it turned out that the work had been performed but that the employer failed to report it. This work provided the necessary additional two quarters of coverage needed.

There was no question about the proof of employment and wages employer gave; if there had been, Mrs. Rook never would have been awarded disability payments.

She was lucky. Although she had no records of her own, her employer was still available and her work and wages were unquestionably substantiated so that she could receive Social Security credits.

We asked Mrs. Rook to re-draw the curtain on the by-gone years. She said that when she came to Shamrock there wasn't much here; and no paved streets; on the other hand there were only about five hundred people in the entire city to walk on them. There were two wagon yards in town which served as the hub of the economic, and sometimes social, life of the community. Folks tethered their horses in the yard when they came to town. Most of the groceries and feed were bought in the grocery store built within the framework of one of the wagon sites. Of course those years were so long ago that one school building housing the first through the eleventh grade was all that was needed to educate all of Shamrock's children.

Mrs. Rook's happiest recollections of childhood were these days shortly after the tent shows had come to town. Actors from the big cities traveled around the country, set up a camp site and put on short one or two act plays and comedies. For months afterward all the little girls in town got together and had their own tent shows. With something like nostalgia, Mildred Rook recalled her girlhood visits to Grandma's at Hickory. In those days one brought with him whatever he ate on the "rain" for the trip her mother baked sweet potatoes and small pies. Scarcely had the family been seated for the journey when Mildred and her sisters started eating in goodies. Those were wonderful, peaceful days, but they were not always that way.

Before coming to Shamrock, Mildred Rook lived in Mobeetie where Fort Elliott, one of the meanest, toughest wagon freight centers in the West. Wyatt Earp said that Mobeetie was one of the roughest towns he had ever been in. The town boasted the Fort itself in which were billeted many old soldiers hardened from the days of Indian fighting. These soldiers, with no more Indians to fight, turned their attention on the shippers milling around town; who in turn spent their free time in quest of the ladies decorating the town's twenty-seven saloons.

Then one day a cyclone hit Mobeetie and left the town bereft of structures. The jailhouse was one of the few dwellings still standing among the debris; but it really didn't matter anymore—the town-folk had gone with the wind. A little ball survived that cyclone though. A lady had given it to little Mildred and she still has it.

The years rolled on and, like anyone else's childhood and teens, they bore the marks of happy times and sad ones. Sunday was "Kodak" day. This meant young couples strolled hand in hand, stopping a picture which would fill tomorrow's albums of yesteryear.

Yes, it is a bit easier now to look upon those days with fond memories. One can do that a bit easier when she has even a little bit of money coming in each month. Mrs. Rook knows she was quite fortunate in this matter and that is why it is that she says, "I got a lot of help from the people at the Social Security Office." She's right about that. She got all the help that was needed to arrive at a determination; because she was not able to help herself. The help Mrs. Rook got was no more than anyone else in the same circumstances would have received. One of the reasons our aid was so effective was because of Mrs. Rook's uncanny knack for remembering things. She recalled in detail all the facts surrounding her employment in 1951 when the business she was with changed hands several times and her husband had been stricken ill. She recalled the amount of her wages at the time and the precise number of weeks she worked; and even the exact day she left that employment. It was her vivid recollection of these facts, verified by her former employer, that led to the establishment of the proper credit.

How could all of this misery have been avoided? Well, if Mrs. Rook had sent for a statement of her earnings at least once every three years the error that was finally corrected could have been caught in 1953 or 54. It would have been so easy at that time, and there never would have been the period of anxiety before Mrs. Rook's claim was finally allowed. After three years the statute of limitations has run and it is most difficult, as in Mrs. Rook's case, to correct any record. Sometimes it can never be done.

We asked Mrs. Rook for her view on social security. She sat there on the couch, pensive for a moment. "I understand now the narrow margin by which I qualified for disability benefits; but that's over now. Isn't it?"

I looked at this kindly woman. "Yes," I said, "it's over."

"Social Security", Mildred Rook said, "is the most wonderful thing that ever happened to the American people. A lot of them would not have security if it was not for Social Security."

We are glad Mrs. Rook made it. We know it isn't too much she gets, but it will help, and she will not have to worry herself sick. Perhaps now, without that worry, she may even get well again.

ORGANIZE TO FIGHT SCREW-WORMS

Animal health situation in this county and Texas is getting attention. The screw-worm pest causing an estimated hundred million dollars' damage in Texas is being targeted. A meeting initiated by Agent Bryan Swain and Agriculture Teachers: Wilks, H. C. Weatherby, Jacobs and David Low attended by a group of producers and others with animal health, to organize and support a program.

Purveyor was elected Chairman, Johnston, Mobeetie, assisted by B. F. Ris, Shamrock and James Ver, and Dennis Wilks, Secretary.

Such a program in Texas will support the reformed Southwest Animal Research Foundation in its health situation. Its purpose is to receive and disburse and sponsor research and

educational programs on animal health — including diseases, insects and parasites — to end these hazards of livestock production may eventually be controlled.

"Animal health," Chairman Tom Puryear said, "is not only a concern of the producer but the economic loss also affects business and consumers. We all have a lot at stake in this program."

The foundation's first major effort will be a program aimed at controlling the screwworm. The proposed program is patterned after the successful drive in Florida and the Southeast. The U.S. Department of Agriculture, livestock producers, and the State of Florida teamed up to just about remove the pest from the scene. The method used was based on the release of sterile male screw-worm flies over the State which resulted in the production of infertile eggs and almost complete elimination of the fly population.

Such a program in Texas will encounter problems not found in Florida. It is bordered by great land areas where the flies overwinter but cooperative efforts could overcome some of the problems, the chairman said.

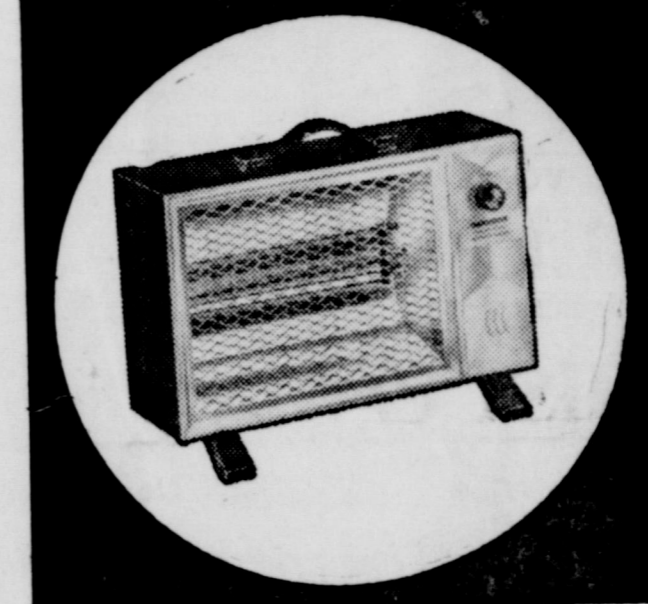
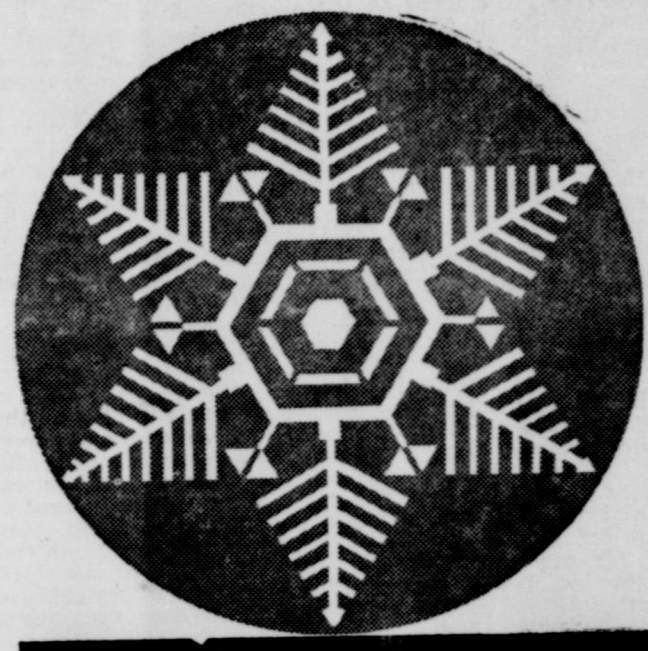

6 Accidents Investigated In Wheeler County

The Highway Patrol investigated 6 accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of November according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol Supervisor for this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,650.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Wheeler County from January through November of 1961 shows a total of 64 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 6 persons killed and 51 injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$63,815.00.

The veteran patrol supervisor announced that a stepped-up traffic law enforcement program is being launched in an all-out effort to stem the tide of traffic deaths during the remainder of the year.

"We find ourselves confronted with the alarming fact that statistics indicate some 238 persons will be killed in traffic crashes in Texas this December," the Sergeant stated.

The patrol supervisor reported that as of Friday, December 1, a total of 2014 traffic deaths had been reported to the department, as compared with 1984 during the same period in 1960. "This represents an increase of 30 deaths or two per cent," he said, "and presents all of us with a stern challenge to hold the line during the month of December. This will not be an easy job, because the toll of 218 deaths during December, 1960, was low for that month of the year and we will have to beat that in order to halt the trend toward a higher death toll for 1961."

"But we feel confident that with an accelerated enforcement program and most important, the active support and cooperation of the driving public—the statistics can be made to lie. And that is exactly what we propose to do."

"We feel that the traffic death tragedy cannot be over-emphasized. When it is considered that during last year alone, there were 2,254 violent deaths on the streets and highways of our state caused by colliding motor vehicles, it can readily be seen that concerted action on the part of everyone concerned is in order," the Sergeant added.
