The 56th annual Tuberculosis Christmas Seal Sale will be launched in Wheeler County Tuesday as some one thousand letters containing Christmas seals will be mailed to the residents of the county.

Peik, representative from the state office, stressed the fact that 80% of all funds collected will remain with the local unit for use in this county. Vondell Killingsworth was appointed to the position following the resignation of Mrs. Harris.

SHAMROCK WILL HAVE CALF SHOW DECEMBER 1

The State-Line Beef Calf and Beef Breeding Show will be held in Shamrock, Saturday, Dec. 1, at the Community Building.

The beef breeding division has been added this year and will replace the junior pony division held last year.

The event was started last year and is more or less an outgrowth of the old State-Line Free Fair. Prizes will consist of cash, trophies and ribbons.

The beef calf division will include all breeds, and will be divided into four classes—nurse calves, heavy, nurse calves, light; dry lot, heavy; and dry lot, light.

The beef breeding division will also be divided into four classes—bulls one year and under; heifers, one year and under; bulls, over one year but under two years; heifers, over one year, but under two.

Entries will be accepted from Beckham and Rogers Mills Counties in Oklahoma, and Collinsworth, Hemphill, Gray and Wheeler Counties in Texas.

Entries must be in place no later than 9 a.m. on Saturday, December 1, and must remain in position until 5 o'clock that afternoon.

According to Charles Jackson, County Agricultural agent, the judge for the show will be Bob Morford, head cattle buyer for Goch Packing Co. of Abilene. Mr. Jackson has worked with Mr. Morford at other shows and states he is a top judge.

The show is sponsored jointly by the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce and the Shamrock Sheriff's posse.

Deputy Sheriff Doyle Ramsey apprehended the pair Thursday afternoon near Wheeler.

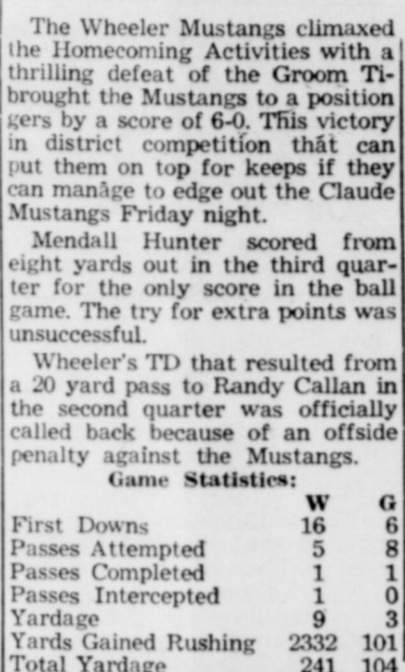
Punt, Pass & Kick Event Is Success; 40 Take Part

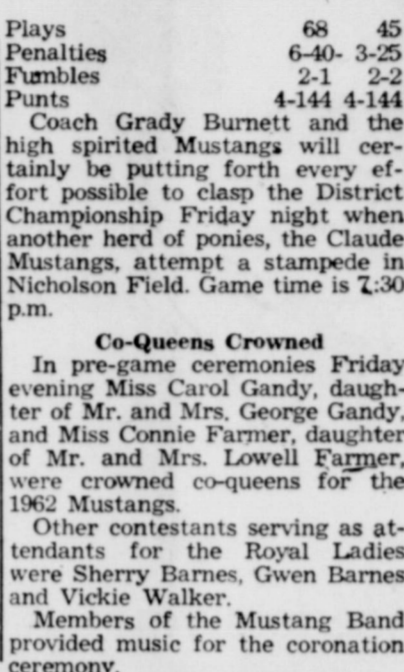

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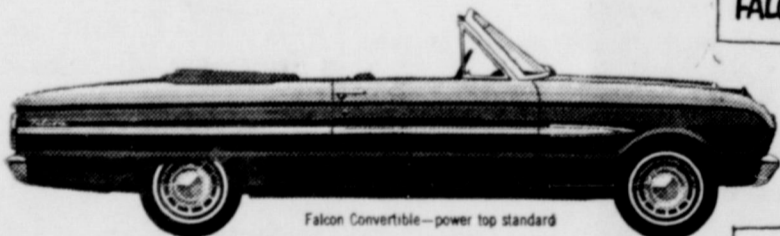

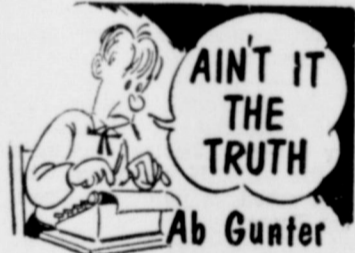

WHEELER COUNTY
Soil Conservation News . . .

Work in the SCS office has kind of slowed down at the present, while the farmers get out their crops. However, prospects for terraces, diversions, and ponds look very good for this fall and winter. While you farmers are in the field would be a good time to check on the need of terraces and diversions to control water. If water is getting off of the fields, then the condition of the land has no way to go but down. The SCS personnel will be available to help you check on the feasibility and cost of the structures. We have found that the cost is usually much less for terraces and diversions than the farmer anticipates.

The conservation plans on the John Dunn Ranch, and J. T. Johnson Ranch were recently brought up to date. George Dunn is getting his brush sprayed some each year, and J. T. 

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

By CHARLES D. JACKSON
... County Agricultural Agent

The cotton harvest in Wheeler County hasn't gotten into full swing yet but it is expected to in the next two to four weeks.

As of Monday morning a total of 2119 bales had been harvested in Wheeler County. So far the Allison gin has ginned 329 bales; Kellon gin has ginned 345; Wheeler Paymaster gin-345; Twitty J. M. Tindall gin-400 bales; J. M. Tindall gin of Shamrock-357; and Farmers Coop gin of Shamrock-

512. According to Herbert Stacy, manager of the J. M. Tindall gin of Shamrock, the average price received thus far on 28 bales sold last week was \$30.56 per 100 lbs.

According to Arnold "Fat" Jones, manager of the Wheeler gin, the average price received so far on the cotton sold has been about \$30.50 per 100 lbs.

The same report was received from Doyce Cochran, manager of the Shamrock Coop gin. His average has been \$30.15 to \$30.20 per 100 lbs.

Since we had our first frost last week the strippers should be able to start harvesting about two weeks from the first frost date. The cotton in the Allison and Kellon area will probably be later than the cotton in other areas of the County.

Next Year's Seed

It is time to think about next year's cotton planting seed, according to Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton specialist. Cotton planting seed should be stored only in bins which have been cleaned thoroughly and regular checks should be made to see that insect pests don't move in, he adds. Additional information on good storage practices and insect control recommendations may be obtained at the County Agent's Office in Wheeler.

Short Course

The 1962 Dairyman's short course will be held November 29-30 at A&M College according to A. M. Meekma, Extension dairy specialist. The latest information on dairy feeding, breeding and management as well as the marketing of milk and milk products will be presented by a group of top speakers.

The county agent will be glad to furnish anyone detail information concerning the program that would care to attend.

Extension of the sterile fly release rates were announced by officials of the Southwest Screw-worm Eradication Program last week. The latter will put a heavier burden of responsibility on individual livestock producers.

An additional 10,000 square miles are being included in the fly release area in Western Texas and number of flies released will be stepped up in some areas and reduced in others. While definite release rates have been designated according to the number of confirmed screwworm specimens sent for all areas, this will tend to vary themselves, will largely determine to the Mission laboratory of identification. Thus, the producers, how many flies they will get each week. This, of course, affects only those counties within the fly release area.

The additional area is composed roughly of the territory encompassed by a line running west from the old line along the Sutton-Schleicher County line, passing just south of Ozona and Sheffield and continuing westward until it intersects with a line coming north from the C.S.-Mexico border and passing through Sanderson. This line could vary somewhat, officials have said.

This new release area will receive 600 sterile flies per square mile per week. The Edwards Plateau and surrounding territory where native flies still exist in large numbers will receive 1,000 flies each week. The areas in southern Texas where fewer screw-worm cases are being detected will receive 400 flies per square mile each week.

Program officials will be watching the number of specimens confirmed as screwworms which are sent in to the laboratory each week by livestock producers and livestock inspectors. This will largely determine whether the number of flies being dispersed in any area should be increased or reduced. It is up to the producers to check their livestock on a regular basis and send in samples, unless they want to run the risk of having the number of sterile flies released in the area reduced.

Producers should put about 10 maggots or worms from a wound in a container of alcohol or water and send it to Box 969, Mission Texas, or they may send the sample to Charles Jackson, agricultural agent, and he will forward it to Mission.

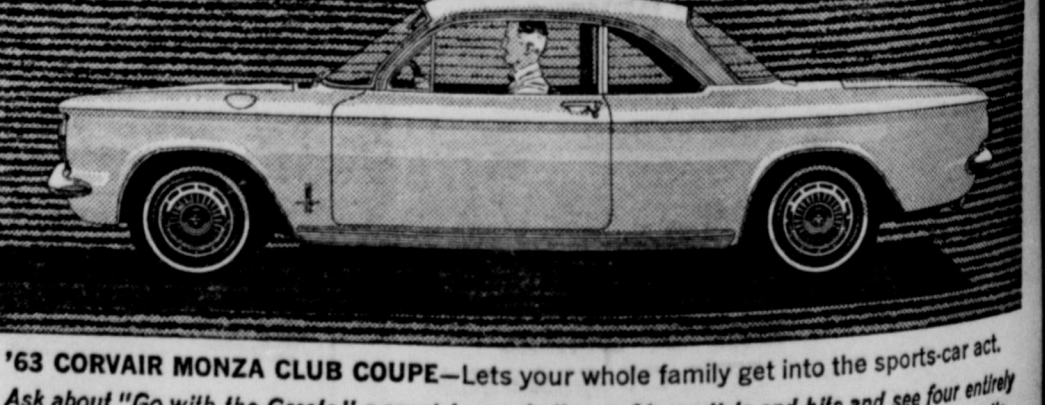

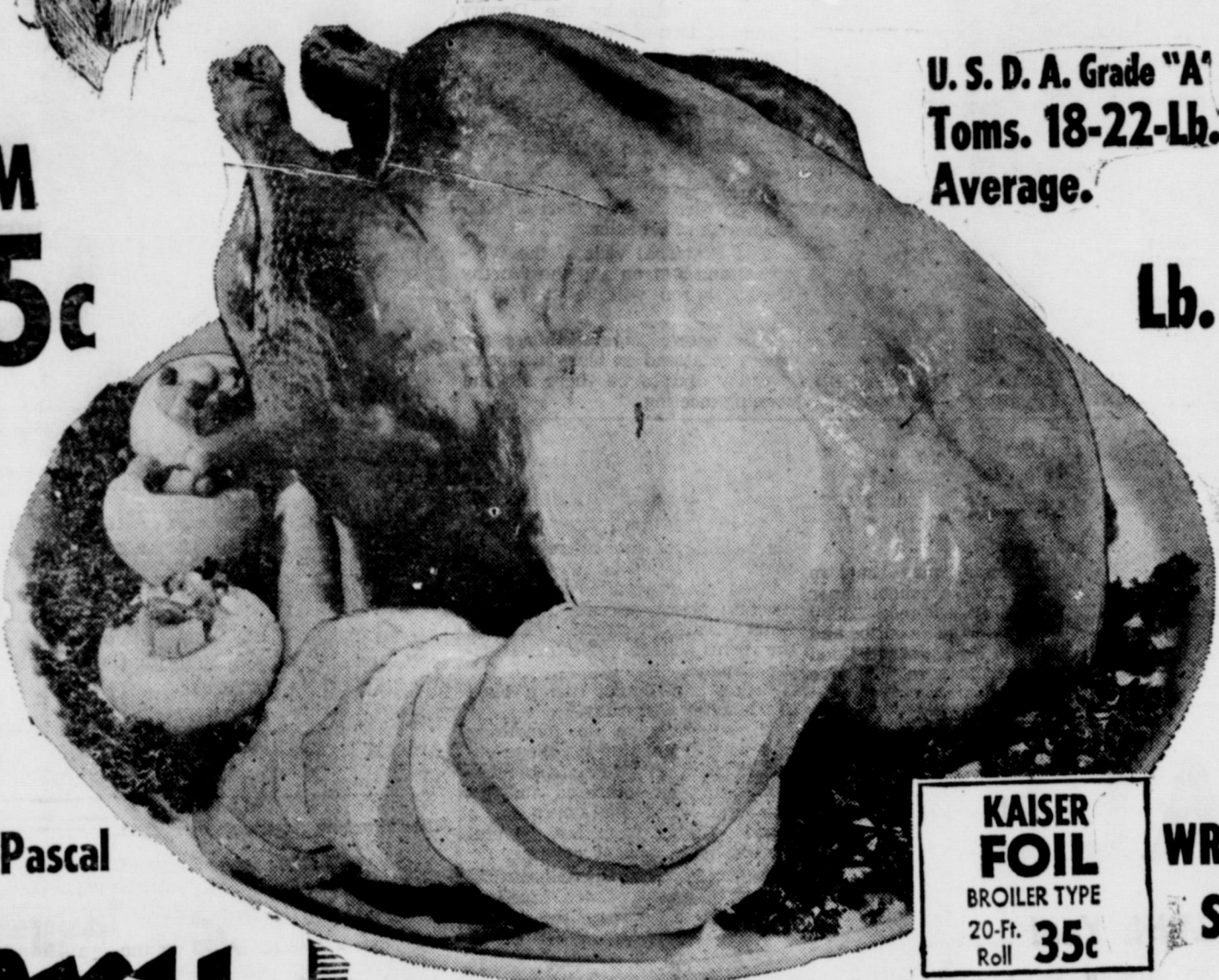
