Recently a Wheeler High School Student, Larry Babb, underwent what appeared to be routine surgery for a knee injury. It was discovered however, that the operation was far more serious than expected.

Larry, the 15 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Babb, is a sophomore and a member of the Key Club. 1964 ALLOTMENT IS EXPLAINED

The Wheeler County ASCS office points out that some details of the 1964 wheat program, which will "make up the warp and woof of the program," were outlined recently by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman in a talk before a farm group. These are:

The national marketing quota will be about 1.2 billion bushels. Farm acreage allotments in 1964 will be only 10 percent smaller than in 1963. Most individual farm allotments for the 1964 crop will be the same as allotments for the 1962 crop. Each farmer will know his farm allotment before the referendum—it may be identical to the allotment he had in 1962.

Diversion payment for the 10-percent reduction in the allotment will be at 30 percent of the support level times the normal yield on the farm. If the farmer's normal yield is 25 bushel per acre and his county support level is \$2, then his diversion payment on acreage equal to 10 percent of his 1963 allotment will be \$15 per acre.

A voluntary acreage diversion, similar to the programs for the 1962 and 1963 wheat crops, will permit any farmer to reduce his plantings up to 20 percent below his allotment. On small farms, where the allotment is 15 acres or less, the entire allotment may be diverted. This voluntary program is expected to reduce wheat carryover (Continued on Page 8, No. 4)

Hospital Plans Are Progressing

Rep. Grainger McIlhenny was in Wheeler this past weekend and met with the steering committee to discuss the bill he is sponsoring in the Texas Legislature to create the Hospital District in precincts 1 and 2 of Wheeler County.

Since Mr. McIlhenny was in town the committee held a special meeting to discuss the matter with him and the final draft of the bill was approved. Since it is impossible to say just when the business of the Legislature will permit the bill to be passed due to the normal calendar difficulties, Mr. McIlhenny merely stated that the bill should be passed as soon as possible.

While in session, the members of the committee expressed the feeling that some people were not fully informed on the proposed tax situation regarding the Hospital District. The opinion was offered that proper publicity regarding the matter was the fair way to inform the concerned people and that all the facts should be given so that fair play could prevail in the matter.

The tax, as proposed by the steering committee, would be set up in the following manner: The valuation will be the same as the State and County valuation as set up by the commissioners court each

year under and according to law. Since the Court is allowed to tax this amount under the law, it is reasonable to assume that the valuations will never be any higher than is absolutely necessary. This also makes the valuation issue one of local election emphasis since the same people who will be paying the Hospital Texas will [so be electing the Commissioners.

It is felt, by the Steering Committee that he values being led o county and state valuations inserts a safety margin in the tax by setting up a situation that prevents the future hospital directors from raising valuations and thereby violating the original intent of the bill to create the Hospital District.

When the district becomes operational the tax program would be restricted between the valuations set up by the Commissioners Court presently this is about 10% of actual value, and the maximum tax of 75c per one hundred dollar valuation rate set up by the Hospital Directors. Since it is a time proven process of balance authority in government, this method is being employed to prevent any juggling of the program by any possible board of directors in the future.

The valuations will be set by the commissioners and the rate set by the directors and both will be elective officers subject to the disapproval of the voters.

There is nothing that can be set up in such a way as to absolutely forego and manipulation; whatsoever, of the rules concerned:

but since tax raising is a very unpopular move for officials of government it is believed that there is very little chance of the county and state valuations ever being set at an excessive rate.

The law also restricts the directors from collecting taxes in excess of the amount required to pay off bonds and remain operational. Hence another safety measure.

It was also brought out by the committee members that there are some doubt that when the hospital is built there is a likelihood that it would be impossible to obtain doctors. All that can be said of this matter is that numerous doctors have sated unequivocally that if a hospital is provided at Wheeler they would be anxious to come here.

The situation shapes up in this way. To get a hospital, we must get additional doctors and to get additional doctors Wheeler must build a hospital.

The matter boils down to the fact that Wheeler must do what it can to make the hospital possible and when this becomes a positive possibility, then only can medical doctors be asked to enter into agreements that will make the whole program possible.

It is not being advocated that the proposed hospital be built without and assurance of doctors but it is being brought out that until the possibility of hospital is created, any assurance of doctors but bind themselves to the situation.

Speakers for the evening will be Dr. C. M. Patterson and L. A. Maddox



Dr. C. M. Patterson, a native of Sweetwater, Nolan County, attended Arlington State College and Texas Technological College before graduating in 1947 from Texas A&M College, and with a degree in veterinary medicine.

From 1947-50, Dr. Patterson was a practicing veterinarian at Eastland and Comanche. He became a public health veterinarian for the Alaska Department of Health in 1950 with headquarters in Anchorage. In 1951 he was named to his present position, extension veterinarian.

Dr. Patterson is a member of the American, Texas and Brazos Valley Veterinary Medical Associations and has held official positions in the latter named organizations. He is a past president of the American Association of Extension Veterinarians and for five years served as veterinary editor for a major farm magazine.

Dr. Patterson is also a community and civic leader. He served as chairman of the Steep Hollow Community organization, as a chamber of commerce director and as a member of his church board.

He is the author of many stories, and bulletins and circulars which have been widely distributed to livestock and poultry producers by the state by county agents.



L. A. Maddox is a native of Miami, Roberts County. He graduated from the Miami High School and holds a B.S. degree from Texas A&M College (1942) in Animal Husbandry. He served in the U.S. Army from 1942-45 and attained the rank of first Lieutenant. Maddox was a ranch operator from 1945-49 and was employed by Texas (Continued on Page 8, No. 2)

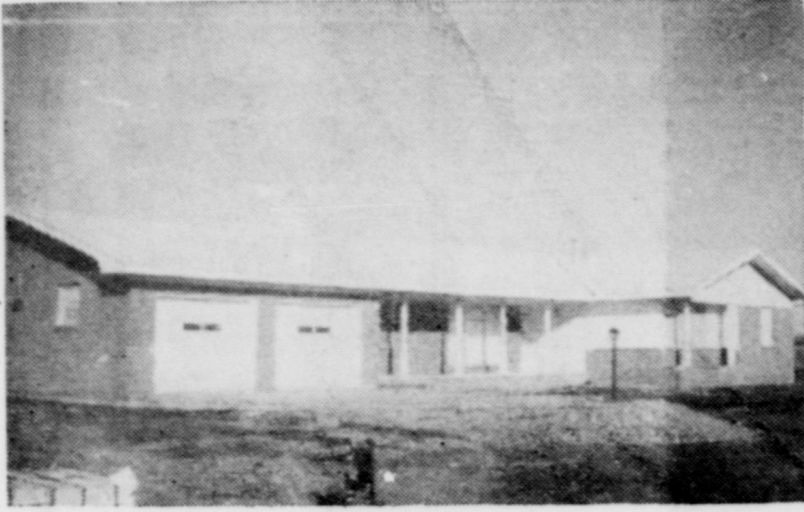

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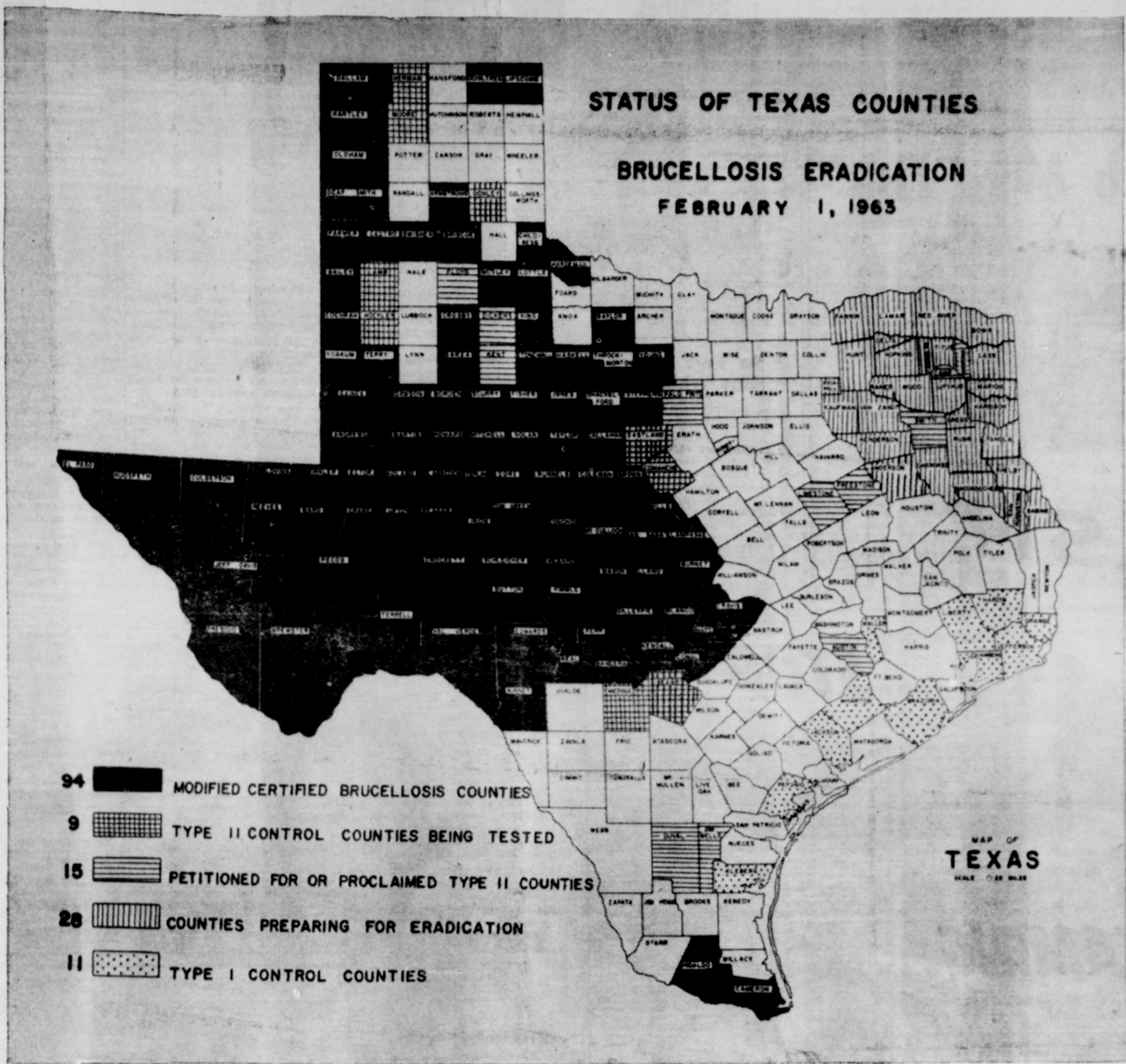

The Brucellosis certification and testing program is moving rapidly at the present time in the State of Texas. A total of ninety-four counties have been tested and certified which means that they have passed the final test and are declared a modified certified Brucellosis free area.

This means that they can move cattle from those counties to any place in the United States without being tested for Brucellosis prior to the shipment, if the individual herd has been tested and reported clean.

Nine more counties are being tested at the present time and one is Collinsworth county which joins Wheeler County on the south.

Another county that has recently been tested is Donley county which joins Wheeler County in the southwest corner.

Fifteen counties have petitioned for, or proclaimed, Type Two counties and twenty-eight counties in Northeast Texas are preparing for eradication by voluntary vaccinations of replacement heifers.

Eleven counties on the Gulf Coast have been designated type one areas since they petitioned for this type program which consist of vaccinating replacement heifers officially by a veterinarian that are to be kept in the breeding herd.

In order for a county to be designated a modified certified Brucellosis free area or to first be tested under the type two program, a petition must be signed by seventy five per cent of the livestock owners, owning fifty-one percent of the cattle.

The petition is then sent to the Texas Animal Health Commission in the form of an application.

This application is reviewed by this agency which will perform the testing, before a county is declared a type two area and tested. Counties are tested in order that the application was made. Several counties in one area are usually tested at one time if possible so the testing crew won't have to more so far between counties.

The total cost to the county has been estimated by officials to cost a county, such as Wheeler County, approximately \$200 to be certified.

The cost would be to operate a laboratory here in the county to run the blood samples. This includes water, electricity, and clerical help.

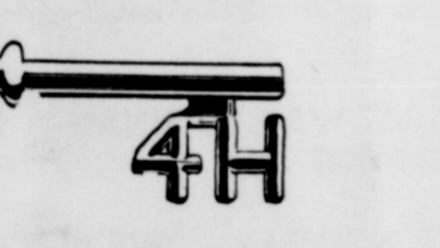

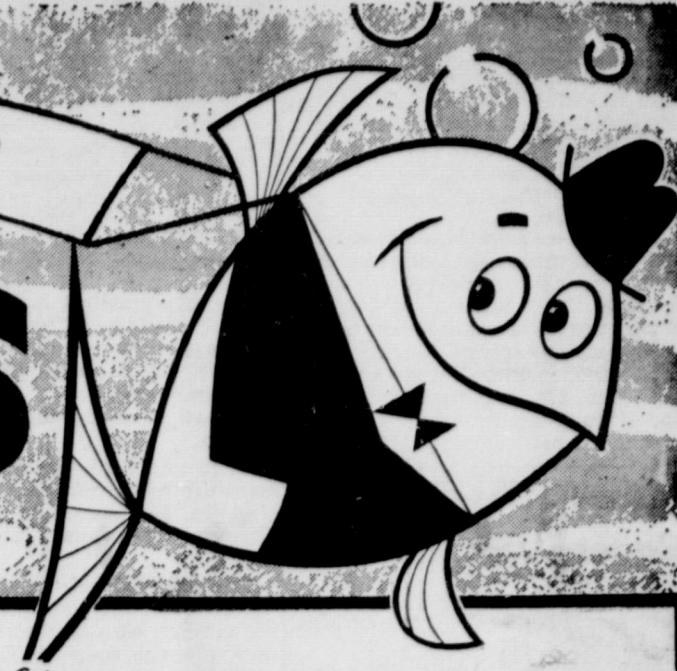

"AN ACT providing for the creation of a hospital district with boundaries coterminous with those of Commissioners' Precincts Numbered 1 and 2 of Wheeler County, Texas, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) for its maintenance support and the payment of bonds issued by it; providing the District with power to issue bonds, and methods for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for refunding of such bonds; providing that bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a governing body for such District, its powers and duties and the tenure of its members providing that no other municipality or political subdivisions shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of said District; enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this Act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency."
