RITEs ARE HELD FOR JESSE DYER

Funeral services were held at the Tolar Baptist Church Saturday for Jesse J. Dyer of Wheeler who died on December 19 in the County, Tenn., on October 28, 1889 and moved to Hood County, Texas, with his family in 1900.
He lived and taught school in Hood and Johnson Counties from 1919 until he came to Wheeler County in 1938 to become principal and teacher at Twitty.
He taught in both Shamrock and Wheeler and was superintendent of schools at Wheeler (1942-45) and Allison (1948-49).
He became county superintendent of Schools in 1949 and served in that capacity until he retired in 1959, having been active in Texas school work for 37 years.
He was a veteran of World War I, serving with the 90th Division in Europe in the A.E.F. He was a life member of the American Legion.
He was a member of the Wheeler Baptist Church.
Mr. Dyer was active in various Masonic organizations and was Past Patron of the O.E.S.
Masonic graveside rites were conducted at the Tolar Cemetery. Survivors include his wife, a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Dennis of Tulsa, a granddaughter, Deannett; one sister, one niece and one nephew.

TYPE TWO SABIN ORAL VACCINE TO BE GIVEN JAN. 5

Type Two Sabin Oral Vaccine will be given at a clinic to be held January 6th in Shamrock High School Cafeteria from 1:30 p.m. until 5:30 p.m.

This will be the second of a series of three Sabin Sundays sponsored by the Shamrock Chamber of Commerce for residents of Wheeler County.

A Spokesman for the clinic pointed out that there has been no controversy about Type Two vaccine and urges everyone to participate in this mass immunization. This clinic will be handled in the same manner as the first one conducted on November 4th. Pre-registration is urged and parents consent must be given for minor children. However, if the child has a card showing that he took the Type One vaccine at the Shamrock Clinic before it will be accepted as showing parental consent to take Type Two.
Donations will be accepted.

The Spokesman for the clinic stressed the fact that everyone is urged to be present for the dose on the 6th and that it is a county wide venture and not limited to any person or place of residence.

STEP AT A TIME: Soil Conservation has to be done a step at a time. This picture illustrates the point. These two waterways were constructed on the Hubert Tindall farm east of Shamrock. After construction, a cover crop of small grains or sorghum is drilled. The following spring permanent grass is sown for a good cover. When the grassed waterway is well established, then a diversion terrace will be constructed to empty excess runoff from the cropland into the waterways. When the extra water is cut off then the field can be terraced. These practices take time but each depends upon the other to insure conservation.

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

I have been asked by the editor of the Wheeler Times to do this article. Let me, in the beginning, offer my apologies to all food experts and technicians. All I know of food values and combinations is what I have learned from practice in my own kitchen. If families, after being subjected to some of my suggestions, will still speak to me without turning green around the mouth, I will be deeply grateful.

I will admit that I am a fanatic about not wasting anything... especially food. My mother always believed that "Willful waste leads to woeful want." I maintain that good food, fed to the disposal or garbage can, or neglected until it is spoiled, is like putting money into the incinerator.

The main idea to be brought out here has to do with using left-over Christmas dinner, especially turkey. When I think of left over turkey, I am reminded of a story that was told by the wife of the late Peter Marshall, U.S. Senate Chaplain. The day following a feast he seated himself at the table, slyly raised the lid of the turkey and said, "Margaret you had better say grace today. The Lord knows that I am not thankful for turkey hash."

Now the truth of the matter is that if the turkey had been stored away in the freezer for a few days or used in a dish that the Chaplain liked, he would have been truly grateful.

There are several things that

can be done with left-over food: make it into delicious, appetizing dishes.

As I proceed with this discussion I will incorporate several foods that might be left from a holiday meal.

It is very important not to let food "look" left over. Camouflage must be boldly used.

The simplest way to keep food until there is a desire for a repeat, is to use TV trays. (If you do not have them, some of your quick-meal-neighbors are likely to have a surplus, or they may be purchased at the local grocery.)

Arrange attractive servings: green beans, turnips, squash or dressing, turkey (boned) potatoes or any vegetables. (If there is not enough to fill a tray it may be added to another meal.) Cover with rich cheese sauce. Serve at once.

Turkey Spaghetti is also good. Consult a cook book, or call me.

Usually there are other foods besides turkey left from a big meal. Try these suggestions:

Heat green beans gently. Drain. Toss with toasted slivered almonds or brazil nuts.

Cook a small sliced onion, a bit of green pepper and a tomato (or use 1/2 c.) in 1T butter, watch it! Don't brown. Mix with green beans.

Sweet potatoes keep well refrigerated or frozen. Left overs may be rearranged in small baking dishes, sprinkle with marshmallows and nuts. Reheat. Mashed, they may be used in sweet potato pie.

Mashed white potatoes may be stored in a baking dish. When needed heat in oven. Sprinkle with

and freeze. A bit of ascorbic acid or "Flavor Savor" mixed with sugar will keep them from turning dark.

Oranges... Peel and slice a white onion; arrange alternately in serving plate. Cover tightly. Refrigerate a few hours. Good with meat or dry beans.

There is many combinations for serving canned fruit. But what about the juice I get goose bump, just to think anyone would pour canned fruit juice down the drain. Dump it into one container—apricot, peach, pear, pineapple, what have you. Freeze until you need fruit punch. With orange or lemon juice it is delicious.

The combined juice makes wonderful jelly. I call it "Refrigerator Jelly". Use about 5 cups plus 1/4 to 1/2 cup lemon juice. (A little at a time may be frozen until enough accumulated.) Add one package Sure-Jell and 6 cups sugar. It usually takes more boiling than for fresh fruit juice.

Down to the last suggestion. Any whipped cream left? Put blobs on a cookie sheet and freeze. Then store in covered container. When dessert needs cream, add a blob of the frozen cream when ready to sit down to a meal and by dessert time it is ready for eating.

I could go on and on. One would think that we never have anything but left-overs at our house. This is an all-time practice with me, not just a Holiday trick. It should be with you. Food allowances...

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"YES, WE'LL STAY FOR LUNCH," is the reply Laura Guthrie likes to receive when she extends an invitation. Cooking is one of her favorite past-times and the fact that she is a good cook can be verified by anyone; because she has, at one time or another, shared "loaves, baskets, or sacks" of goodies with practically everyone in town.

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well and freeze. Giblet gravy may be put in separate container. It freezes well.

If a substantial amount of food is left it may be stored two or three days in the refrigerator or a few weeks in the freezer. For instance, take bones from turkey or chicken, wrap tightly in foil and freeze. When needed it may be oven heated in the foil or put into leftover stock. (Stock may be bought ready prepared.) Here are some suggestions for serving.

Turkey Custard
Put a layer of dressing, left over or a fresh batch made with stock, in a 9x9x2 baking dish. Add a layer of meat, cover with custard, sprinkle with buttered crumbs. Bake 30 minutes 350 degrees. CUSTARD... Heat 1T. chicken fat or butter. Add 1T. flour. Cook 2 minutes. Add 1c. hot milk. Cook 3 minutes. Add 2 slight-ly beaten eggs and cook 2 minutes.

Serve-a-plate Style... Cook brocc-oli until just tender. Drain well. Put serving on a plate, add gener-ous amount of turkey bits, cover

crumbled crisp bacon and chopped green onions. Serve at once. Also they may be made into a "nest" in baking dish and filled with Eng-lish peas.

Left-over bread can be a prob-lem, but I seldom waste a biscuit. When cold they may be sliced op-ken, buttered and toasted. Good with jelly at breakfast, a snack af-ter school, or with Grandma mol-lasses at supper.

Biscuits may be refrigerated a day or two, then grated, stored in plastic bags in freezer and used in dressings or puddings.

Light rolls and bread may be dried in slow oven without brown-ing, ground, and use in dry crumb Recipes.

Now there is the problem of fruit. Some families eat it fresh while others let it dry up or decay in the fruit bowl that was used for decoration. Please don't waste it. AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

County Agent By CHARLES JACKSON

As the 1962 Wheeler County Cotton harvest progresses, we are able to harvest the test plots that have been carried out under the Northwest Texas Research Result Demonstration Program. Last week, Dwane Scott, Farm Demonstration Assistant that has been caring for the plots, harvested the demonstration that was conducted on Edgar Blockers farm in the Kellon community. This demonstration was fertility study and I know that many of the farmers are interested in the results of the test. Nine different rates of fertilizer was applied and a plot was left that wasn't fertilized.

The fertility test plot that received no fertilizer produced 375 lbs. of lint cotton per acre. By applying 60 lbs. of nitrogen per acre and 40 lbs. of phosphorus per acre the yield was raised to 625 lbs. of lint cotton per acre. This was an increase of 250 lbs. of lint cotton per acre at an additional cost of \$12.25 per acre. This was also figuring the cost of application at \$1.25/acre and the nitrogen and phosphorus at \$0.11/lb. By raising the nitrogen rate to 80 lbs. per acre and leaving the phosphorus at 40 lbs and adding 49 lbs of potash per acre.

The yield was raised from 625 to 675 lbs. of lint cotton per acre at an additional cost of \$6.50 per acre.

The conclusion on Edgar Blocker farm you could say that for an \$18.85 fertilizer investment per acre that he could expect to receive an additional 300 lbs. per acre yield. When valued at \$0.30 per lb. this would be a \$90 potential return for an \$18.85 investment.



Soil Conservation News . . .

By Earl Willard

We that are fortunate enough to live in this good land of ours, enjoy driving around to see what other people are doing and to enjoy the scenery. What are you doing to make this scenery more beautiful?

When sightseers drive by your farm or ranch do they see good crops growing in your fields and fat cattle grazing in your pastures? Do they see a bare hillside with ugly gullies on it that cannot be crossed with farm equipment and just stubs of a few

clumps of grass?

One conservation measure that can be used to prevent the ugly scene described above is to establish a grassed waterway in place of the ugly gullies.

Grassed waterways are natural or man made watercourses protected against erosion by a grass cover. They serve as safe outlets for terraces, diversion and contour rows. They may also serve as passageways for outside water that may enter your farm from other land.

Your first thought may be that you do not want to waste your good soil to construct a waterway. Generally it does not take much to establish an adequate waterway. & these acres need not be wasted.

When a waterway becomes well established it will be good to use it for hay or grazing as long as it is not over used. In fact, to maintain a waterway in good condition it is recommended that it be grazed or mowed.

You may also think that you do not want your field cut by waterways because it cannot be crossed with farm equipment. This is a mistaken idea. The gentle side slopes and flat bottoms of waterways are much easier crossed with modern farm equipment than the large gullies that have been mentioned above.

When you decide to establish a grassed waterway there are several things that should be taken into consideration. It should be designed big enough to handle the flow of water from the largest rain that can be expected to fall in ten years. Some of the factors that enter into the design of a waterway are: Soil types, slope of the land, the cover that is on the land and amount of land in the drainage area.

Soil conservation technicians assisting the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District will be more than glad to help in the design layout and checking of your waterway.




CONSERVATION IN PRACTICE



BEFORE AND AFTER: Pictured above is a useless gully and below is the same field after Soil Conservation Practices have been properly applied.



CYCLONE SEEDER: Cover Crops in the critical wind storm periods are an essential in Wheeler County. Cottonland is the worst crop of all to prevent blowing. Jack Finsterwald of Mobeetic is shown here solving the problem on his farm. He is using a cyclone seeder attached to his tractor to spread rye seed. Then a cultivator is used to cover the seed. This is done during the last time the cotton is cultivated. In this way the rye seed is seeded early and makes a good cover before the cotton is harvested. The rye also serves to add organic matter to the soil and may even be used some for winter grazing.



BORING WORK . . . BUT VERY SATISFACTORY: Soil Conservation Service soil scientist, Frankie Wheeler, is shown making a soil boring to be used in making a soils map of a farm in Wheeler County. He uses the auger to bring a profile of the soil from a depth of about three feet. Numerous samples are taken over the entire farm or ranch to enable him to determine the different types of soil according to texture. Slopes of the land and degree of erosion are also included on the map. The map will help the farmer to decide on types of crops to grow and how to manage them. It may also show that the land needs to go back to grass. A copy of the map is given to the SCD cooperator and the original is kept in the SCS office. This is one of the many technical services that the SCS office offers to SCD cooperators to help in conservation practices in the county.


