The "electrolytic" process gives promise of a major breakthrough in this vital field of water treatment. Sayre's business representative, John W. Richey of Austin, said power costs for operating the plant are amazingly lowfrom a few mills to pennies per 1,000 gallons. This could mean, in the very near future, the economical treatment of the nation's vast saline water supplies for many industrial, agricultural, and municipal uses. The Sayre process is designed also to recover valuable metals from ore-
