### NEPHEW TO TAKE ANTARCTIC TRIP

Dr. Ralph Hanna, well known Austin pediatrician was elected vice-president for United Cerebral Palsy's 5 state Southwest area, composed of Arkansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas, at United Cerebral Palsy's National Convention being held in St. Louis, Mo.

Charles Spencer, nephew of Mrs. Clyde Johnson, is one of twenty Americans participating in an operation which completely cuts them off from all physical contact with the outside world as they spend the next several months in the killing cold of a scientific station located near the South Pole.

The party includes 10 scientists and 10 navy men. Their headquarters is the Scott-Amundsen Station.

From now until the Antarctic winter ends, about the middle of next October, the only contact between these men and McMurdo Sound, the main American Antarctic base, will be by radio.

Ski Planes have completed the task of carrying a mountain of supplies to the Scott-Amundsen Station. There is enough fuel and food on hand to last all winter. There are also abundant medical supplies, scientific apparatus, and other equipment that long experience has shown are necessary to keep men alive and well under the brutally hostile winter weather conditions.

The men will probably remain at their station longer than 8 months, but by about mid October weather will have moderated to the point where new supplies can be sent to them by plane.

Observations are to be made by this party of men from instruments mounted outside the buildings of the American station but can be read from dials inside the shelters.

Spencer, serving his second year with the U.S. Navy is a native of Little Rock, Ark.

### SARAH GARRISON SERVICES HELD; GUYMON BURIAL

Funeral services for Sarah Garrison were conducted Monday, March 11, at 10 a.m. at the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. Frank Ross officiating.

Worth; one sister, Mrs. Gennie Elrod of Ranger; 13 grandchildren, 20 great grandchildren and 17 great great grandchildren.

Following the service at Wheeler, the body was taken to Guymon, Okla., for graveside services at 3 p.m. with Rev. Edgar Jones pastor of the First Baptist Church of Perryton, officiating.

Interment was in the Guymon Cemetery with Kirk Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Announcement of Caswell's selection was made in Dallas at the annual Young Texan awards banquet honoring the eight Young Texans of the Month finalists. U. S. Supreme Court Justice Tom C. Clark, featured speaker at the banquet, presented Caswell with the tri-angled trophy symbolizing outstanding leadership, citizenship and scholarship. The Troy Y. Post Award is the highest youth achievement honor presented in the state, carrying with it a \$2,000 college scholarship and an expense-paid, one week celebrity tour of Washington, D. C. for the winner and his father. The Young Texan program is co-sponsored by the Optimist Clubs of Texas and the Troy Post Foundation.

Richey of Austin, said power costs for operating the plant are amazingly low— from a few mills to pennies per 1,000 gallons. This could mean, in the very near future, the economical treatment of the nation's vast saline water supplies for many industrial, agricultural, and municipal uses. The Sayre process is designed also to recover valuable metals from ore-rich waters.

### SIX ACCIDENTS ON RURAL ROADS

The Highway Patrol investigated six rural accidents in Wheeler County during the month of February according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for an estimated property damage of \$3,535.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Wheeler county for the two months of 1963 showed a total of nine crashes resulting in one person killed, one person injured and an estimated \$4,685.00.

The Patrol Supervisor reported that a new hazard has been added to the traffic picture. You may not realize it but the current hiking has added an element of danger to driving. The Sergeant added that everyone decides to dance one of these fifty mile hikes, or a twenty-five mile hike should be aware of the traffic dangers that are involved and that all Texas drivers should be alerted to the fact that these pedestrians may cause a certain amount of danger.

Hiking today is a great deal different than it was twenty years ago. With Spring just around the corner more pedestrians will be seen on our streets and highways and it is important that all drivers recognize this hazard and be prepared to take evasive action if necessary.

"Our records reveal that approximately ten percent of all rural fatal motor vehicle accidents involved pedestrians during the last few years and this figure was somewhat higher in our cities, which points out the necessity for safe walking as well as safe driving," the Sergeant stated.

### Boys Found Innocent

According to Deputy Sheriff Doyle Ramsey, the four Gray County men apprehended in conjunction with a grassfire on the Stiles Ranch February 25, were cleared of having any connection with starting the fire.

A truck driver, seeing the men leave the fire, had notified officers. The Gray County men submitted to lie detector tests immediately following the incident. Results of the tests were announced his week.

### Withholding More Than Required Is Approved

Do you always owe more tax when you file your return. It may be that your employer did not withhold enough tax to cover all your income.

One solution to this problem is to have additional taxes withheld by your employer, says Mr. Ellis Campbell, Jr. To do this, simply reduce the number of exemptions claimed for withholding tax, thereby increasing the amount withheld each pay period. You may also authorize your employer to withhold additional amounts, such as \$4 or \$5 each pay period.

The Internal Revenue Service gets many inquiries as to whether the above practices are legal. They are perfectly legal. In fact, additional withholding is encouraged by the Service.

### Legislators Support Screwworm Program

**SCREWWORM BILL**  
Rep Jack Crain of Nocona had 50 co-signers lined up when he introduced a bill to provide \$2,840,837 as the State's matching share of the \$12,000,000 federal-state-private screwworm eradication program.

Since it is backed by Governor Connally's strong recommendation the bill should be off to a good start.

But the House Appropriations Committee didn't include a provision for screwworm eradication in its 300-plus page appropriations bill.

Cain said Legislators would seek a separate appropriation to cover the proposed state contribution.

### Spur Drive For Informed Young Citizens

In an open letter to 4-H Club members throughout the nation, President Kennedy said, "... today, a citizenry of all ages—informed and in action—is more important than ever to the strength and welfare of our nation."

And to be well informed and active citizens of the U.S. is the prime objective of 2.3 million 4-H Club boys and girls. Their theme for the year, "Citizenship in Action" was launched last November during the National 4-H Club Congress at Chicago.

Nearly an entire day was given to a general discussion of what constitutes citizenship in this age of cold wars, exploration of outer space, communication satellites and the like.

Being well informed on social, political and economic issues was the foremost qualification for citizenship stated during the session. Education, understanding and a willingness to assume responsibility also were considered prime requisites for intelligent and effective citizenship.

The two young people shown in the photograph are examples of vigorous, purposeful American citizens. Jacky Strickland, 20, is a student at the University of Florida and 1962 winner of a national 4-H leadership award. Miss Emily Jean Thomas, 19, is a national winner of the 4-H achievement award and a student at Radford College, Virginia. Both received \$400 scholarships.

These 4-H Club members have a long record of initiative, service and dependability. They are

well informed citizens active in school, community and public affairs. They have thousands of counterparts in their home states—products of 4-H training and environment.

At a recent 4-H meeting, citizenship was defined as "the unending process of education." This concept ties in to the "learn-by-doing" method applied to all 4-H projects and activities. During a 4-H Club membership that could span as much as 11 years, members steadily add to their knowledge and improve their skills.

Along the way, individual enterprise is recognized and rewarded. Educational trips, special training courses and college scholarships are among the awards.

**AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES**

The recent moisture we have received in Wheeler County is sufficient to stimulate the growth of small grains. Added benefits from the moisture may be obtained by the application of 20 to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre. This fertility should be applied late enough to avoid the danger of a hard freeze but before the plants begin to joint.

Approximately 1.7 pounds of nitrogen is removed from the soil in the production of one bushel of wheat through both the grain and straw. The efficiency at which the applied nitrogen is utilized by the crop ranges between 30 to 70 percent. Therefore, to produce a 40 bushel wheat crop, 113 pounds of nitrogen would be needed. Portions of the required nitrogen may be obtained from the soil from sods and residues, and from manure. Most of the nitrogen in the soils found in organic matter. After this amount is determined by soil test and subtracted from the total required, the amount of fertilizer nitrogen should be applied may be determined.

There is a large selection of nitrogen fertilizer available:

Ammonium nitrate — manufactured by passing ammonia gas into nitric acid; contains 33.5 percent nitrogen; one-half in the ammonium form and the other half in the nitrate form; one of the quickest-acting nitrogensous fertilizers.

Ammonium sulfate—comes primarily from a by-product of the coke ovens; also manufactured from synthetic ammonia by treating it with sulfuric acid; contains 20.5 percent nitrogen.

Urea—manufactured by combining liquid ammonia and liquid carbon dioxide at very high temperatures and pressure; contains 45 percent nitrogen.

Anhydrous ammonia—formed by uniting nitrogen gas from the air & hydrogen gas from natural gas. It is dry ammonia gas compressed into liquid which must be stored under pressure. It contains 82 percent nitrogen.

Nitrogen solutions—made from various combinations of ammonia sulfate, ammonium nitrate, urea, aqua ammonia, and water. The actual nitrogen content will vary from 20 to 41 percent nitrogen.

Any of those listed are good and approximately equal results should be obtained from the application of equivalent amounts of nitrogen from any of the sources listed. 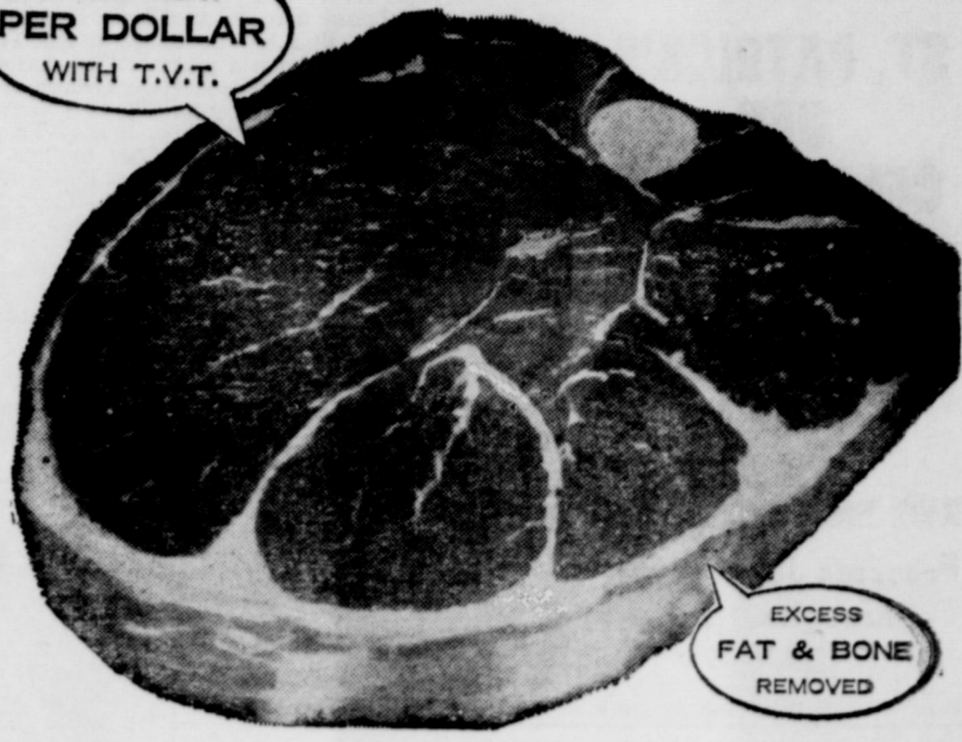
