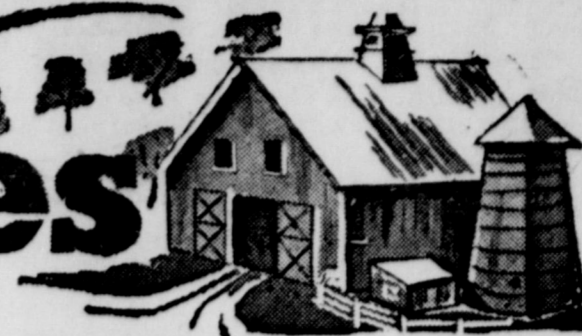

MUSTANGS LOSE TO GROOM TIGERS

The Groom Tigers wrapped up the district crown last Friday night as they put the Wheeler Mustangs down by the score of 37-14. It was a cold night and the Mustangs were just as cold in the first half of play. The Tigers held a 30-6 lead at halftime and the second half of play found the Mustangs outplaying the Tigers and holding their vaunted offense to six points.

The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and were forced to punt after failing to make a first down. Hunter got a good kick off into the strong wind and it zipped

to the Groom 30 where Lyn Barker, speedy 130 lb. halfback, fielded it and headed for the west sideline. Behind good blocking, a strongpoint of Tiger play all night, Barker got to the Wheeler 10 where he was hit and fumbled and the Mustangs recovered. This break was short lived as the Tigers recovered a Mustang fumble on the first play and took over at the 11. James picked up 5 to the 6 and Cornett ran his left end on a keeper to score standing up. The attempted kick was no good and the Tigers took a quick 6-0 lead. The Mustangs picked up 8 yards in two carries and Lady Luck again smiled on the Tigers.

A bad pitchout was fumbled and Groom recovered on the Mustang 37 with an obvious holding infraction against Groom on a Mustang going unnoticed. Three plays set up a first and goal from the Mustang 9. Barker made it to the 5 and Cornett got a couple to the 3. Littlefield picked up 1 1/2 and on fourth down, James barely made it over the center for the second Tiger tally. Barker ran the extra point and the score rose to 14-0. Porter returned the kickoff 22 yards to the Mustang 37. 13 plays later the Mustangs raked up their first score of the game. The drive was aided by a 15 yard personal foul penalty against the Tigers.

Another penalty of half the distance to the goal down on the 11 for tackling by the nose guard was assessed against the Tigers. On fourth down from the 9, Barker took a pitchout from Porter and passed to Jolly in the end zone for the TD. After the try for point failed, the Mustangs trailed 14-6. The Tigers took only 4 plays after the kickoff to score again. James circled the Mustang right side from the Wheeler 48 and cut back over to the center of the field and went all the way behind exceptional blocking; downfield by the Tigers. Cornett passed to Ruthardt for two points and the Tigers increased their lead to 22-6. Wheeler moved the pigskin to the midfield stripe after the kickoff before having to punt. A short punt sliced off Hunter's toe and it went out on the Groom 34. The Tigers hitched up and 7 plays later were over the goal once more. Littlefield picked up 39 yards in the drive; one run being 30 yards to the Mustang 23. Littlefield made the last 3 yards over right tackle for the extra point, but it was a fake and Cornett passed to Ruthardt, who was all alone in the end zone. The first half ended two plays later with the teams going to the warmth of their dressing rooms with Groom leading 30-6.

The second half of play started out with the Tigers seeming intent on really running the score up on the Mustangs. Taking the kickoff, they marched 68 yards for their final touchdown of the night. Cornett and Littlefield carried on all but four plays of the drive. Two passes from Cornett, one to Ruthardt for 23 yards and one to Barker for 25, were the big gainers on the drive. Barker went over his left tackle from the 1. Jerry Snyder kicked the extra point and the Tigers led by 37-6. Wheeler put the ball in play from their 39 after Heffley returned the kickoff 14 yards. Eight plays and three first downs later, the Mustangs were on the Groom 3 with first and goal. G. C. Baker carried on 5 of the 8 plays down to the 3 yard line. Baker was held for no gain on the third down, the Mustangs attempted a jump pass and it ended up in the hands of James of the Tigers and he ran it out to the 10 yard line. The third period ended two plays later with Groom operating

Former Wheeler Man Is Highway Fatality

Funeral services for John Mc Bee Ficke, 48, of Denton, formerly of Wheeler, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, November 4, in the Funeral Chapel in Stephen Hill. Burial was in the Brownwood cemetery.

Ficke was one of three persons who died November 2 in a head-on automobile collision two miles south of Gainesville on a rain-slick two-lane stretch of U.S. 77. A four-lane divided highway is being constructed along the stretch. He had moved to Denton in June from Mineral Wells and was manager of the Texas Employment Commission district office in Denton. He and a Rev. Merle N. Waldrep, another TEC employee, were enroute to Gainesville, where they went every Thursday from Denton when the accident occurred.

Others who died in the accident were Rev. Merle N. Waldrep of Denton and Otto J. Seaton of Dallas.

Ficke is survived by his wife, a teacher at Valwood School at Farmers Branch, and a daughter, Sue, a sophomore at North Texas State University.

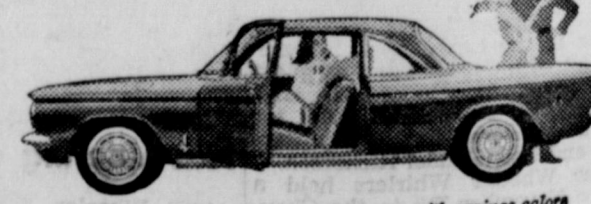

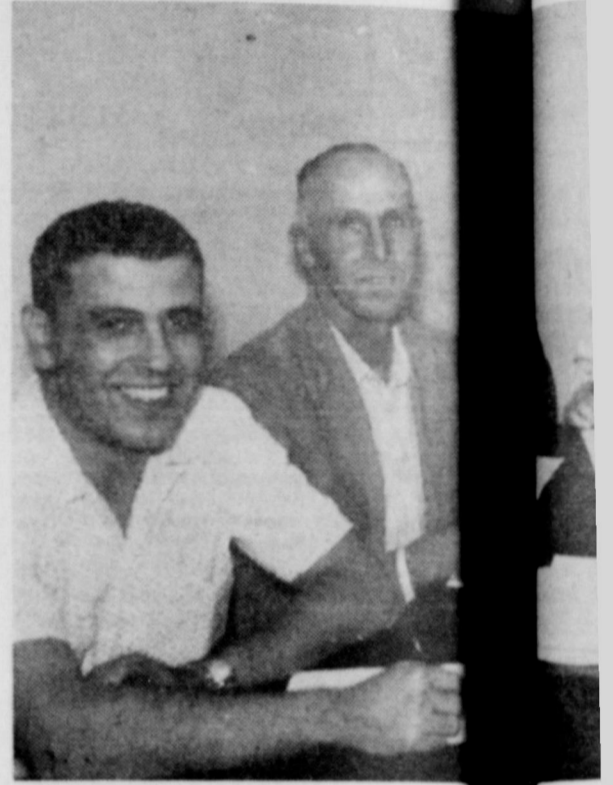

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ASC SOIL BANK Program Explained

The Soil Bank originally provided two programs to assist farmers to divert a program of their cropland from the production of crops and to carry out a program of soil, water, forest and wildlife conservation. These two programs authorized under the Soil Bank were:

1. The Acreage Reserve—a short time program to reduce current production of allotment crops. This program was discontinued on Dec. 31, 1958.
2. The Conservation Reserve—a

long-time program to shift general cropland from production to a conservation use.

The farmer receives two types of payment for putting cropland in the Conservation Reserve:

1. An annual payment
2. A cost-share payment to assist in establishing an approved conservation use on the land.

To date the local A.S.C.S. office has paid \$380,993.44 in 1961 annual payments.

A.C.P. PROGRAM

The Agricultural Conservation program operates as a farmer-Government partnership by providing a share of the cost approved soil and water conserving practice ACP assistance is made available for conservation over and above what farmers would carry out with their own resources and on their own initiative.

Participation in the program is voluntary, and all farmers are eligible to take part. In 1960 the following practices were carried out in Wheeler County:

- 4174 acres of grass seeding (establishing or improving cover crops) — \$8923.00
- Control of Competitive Shrubs — \$5227.00
- 4124 acres — \$4369.00
- 14 Livestock dams — \$1949.00
- Constructing cross-fences — \$685.00
- Constructing regular terraces — \$1419.00
- Diversion Terraces — \$2520.00
- Stubble mulching — \$3991.00
- Emergency Tillage — \$3406.00
- Deep Plowing — \$9821.00
- Weed Control — \$213.00

What Are The Duties Of The ASC Office?

The Wheeler County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, under the supervision of the office management and county committeemen, with the aid of office personnel, administer and are generally responsible of seeing that the national farm program is locally administered. Through those that serve the local A.S.C.S. office the requirements for eligibility to practicability to participate in these programs by day-to-day contacts with farmers; work with local newspaper editors; participation in published material; explanatory talks and program information meetings; periodic program letters and by informing representatives of other agricultural agencies of the essential details of the various programs which are in operation.

The national farm programs that are administered locally include: Acreage Allotment and Marketing Quotas, Agricultural Conservation Program, Price-Support Loans, Purchase Agreements and Incentive Payments The Conservation Reserve (or Soil Bank), Wool Program, Feed Grain, Wheat Stabilization and other programs assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture or Congress.

County and Community Committeemen are elected annually by the farmers of the county and function under the general supervision of the State's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, The Wheeler County Commit-

teemen are: Jess R. Patterson, Chairman, Albert Marshall, Secretary, John O'Gorman, Treasurer, Alternates are Buster W. Sherrill, Wheeler and John Ver-

Albert Marshall is office manager and office personnel: Dorothy J. Risner, chief assistant office manager; Ford, performance supervisor; Levitt, counter clerk and finance clerk; Willie Mae, marketing quota and clerk and head planimeter; Martha S. Manning, bank and feed grain clerk; M. Williams, loan clerk; on Immel, agricultural conservation program clerk; Bill W. Y. Lister, H. D. Pond and crop reporters.

PRICE SUPPORT AND INCENTIVE PROGRAMS EXPLAINED BELOW

Price support is made available to farmers through farm and warehouse-storage loans and purchase agreements. Price-support loans are made through private financial institutions, usually local banks. The financial institution provides the money to the farmer and holds the certificate of interest, which is one of the loan papers made out in the county office. All loan repayments are made at the county office.

For commodities stored in warehouses approved by the Commodity Stabilization Service the producer presents his warehouse re-

ceipt to the county A.S.C.S. office and signs a note. The producer may repay his loan at any time before the note matures. Interest is charged only on the period the loan is in effect. During the 1960 program the amount of grain loans in the amount of \$1,800,000.00 and wheat loans in the amount of \$34,349.93. Incentive payments for wool and unshorn lambs made to producers in the amount of \$90.00.

1961 feed grain payments in the amount of \$125,691.20 have made to date.

A TALE OF THREE CITIES
In Thessalonica Paul reasoned out of the Scripture three sabbath days with men who were unwilling to be convinced (Acts 17:1-9). The bigotry of these Thessalonians only kept them in spiritual darkness, but it moved Paul to bitter opposition to the truth, so that they persecuted and Silas and even followed them to Berea, stirring up opposition against them.

Bigotry has the same effect today. Let us never shut new light out and close old errors in. Moreover, it is a small step from shutting out new light from God's Word to engaging in bitter opposition to it.

The Athenians went to the other extreme. They were interested in what was old and clamored only to hear new (Acts 17:21). Yet when Paul came to them with the news of the gospel of grace, some "mocked" while more polite, said: "We will hear thee again of this and turned away (Verse 32).

The Athenian spirit too is still rife today. Many are constantly giving up the old and looking for something new. The latest fashions, the latest statistics and the latest advice must be the best.

Significantly, the story of the noble Bereans falls far short of that of the Thessalonians and that of the Athenians. These Bereans possessed the true spiritual greatness to give man's word respectful consideration, whether new, and then to subject it to careful examination in the light of the Word of God. They received Paul's words, with open minds, and then "searched the Scriptures whether those things were so" (Verse 11). For this God commended them "noble"—the spiritual aristocracy of their day.
May God help us to be neither "Thessalonians" nor "Athenians", but true Bereans. If we follow men we drift into human speculation, for men disagree on the most important issues. Only as we stand on the infallible, unchanged Word of God can we be sure.

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
