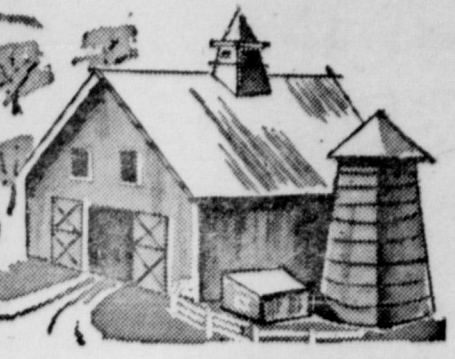

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SUPPORTS HOSPITAL BILL

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday evening, June 18 at Nora's Cafe with the president, Hyland Over, in charge.

The meeting was opened with prayer led by Watson Burdette.

Program chairman, James Verden, presented the guest speaker Billy Don Rives, who gave a report on the 4-H trip to Amarillo this month and gave his 4-H speech which was given at the Amarillo 4-H Club and won him a first place.

It was reported that North Wheeler County voters will vote July 20 on the ratification of the creation of a North Wheeler County Hospital District. Only qualified voters who own taxable property in north Wheeler county will be eligible to vote at the special election. Officials said the election order issued by the county commissioners, was preceded by the presentation of a petition signed 200 of the qualified tax paying voters of North Wheeler County.

Virgil Jamison, giving the report, stated that a lot of work has been done towards the project by several persons in the area. Now the question can be resolved by a vote of the concerned people.

Upon completion of the report concerning the Hospital, the entire Chamber meeting gave a standing vote of support to the creation of the district and in support of the Hospital Project.

Mrs. Ware was a member of the Church of Christ.

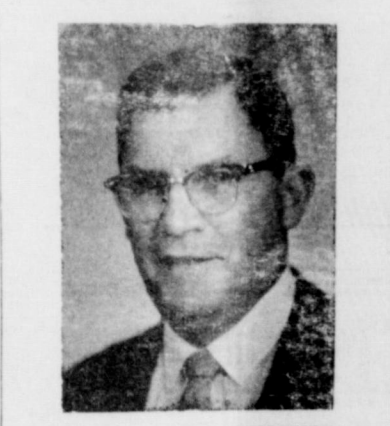

NEW ZIP CODE TO SPEED DELIVERY OF ALL U S MAILS

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1, 1963.

Everyone will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail, according to the post office department.

Wheeler Postmaster Virgil Jamison, Jr., announced that the ZIP Code for Wheeler will be 79095.

"Mobeetie's five digit ZIP Code will be 79061," stated Postmaster Rufus J. Tyson.

Both Wheeler's and Mobeetie's postmasters stressed the importance of all citizens of Wheeler learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return addresses on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing. It should follow the city and state in addresses.

These examples were given for the proper use of Zip Code:

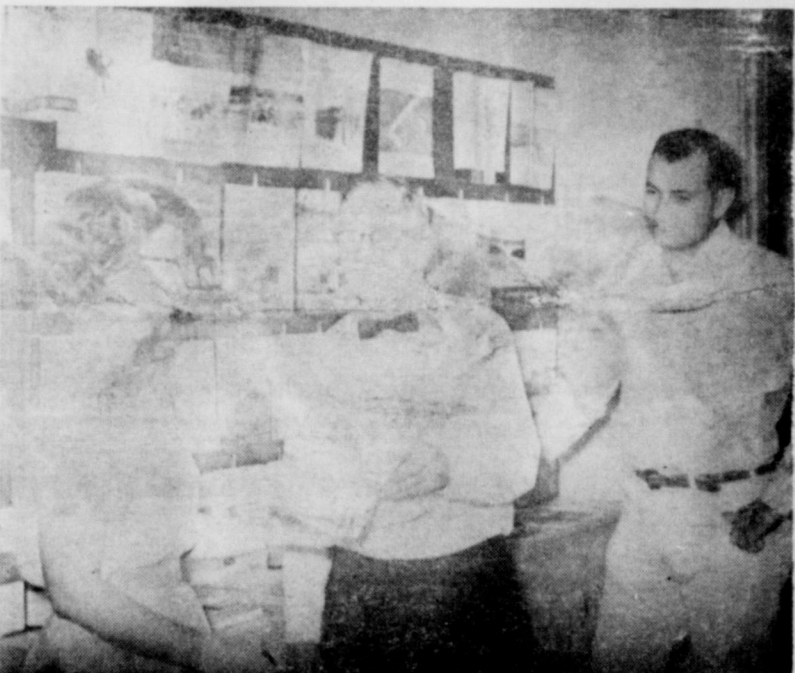

The new ZIP Code plan for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by Postal employees, to get it to the proper destination. Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error.

With Zip Code, a clerk need only glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

When Zip Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

The Federal Communications Commission has approved the purchase of telephone exchanges at Allison and Allison by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company effective at 12:01 a.m. on July 1. The Allison Telephone Company was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Harrison, D. D. Dillard, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in Amarillo, said the two exchanges will become a part of the telephone company's "Pampa group operations" under the supervision of George Newberry, telephone manager who headquarters in Pampa.

Dillard also said that Southwestern Bell plans to begin improvements on the switchboard, pole lines and telephone cables as soon as possible following the transfer of ownership. 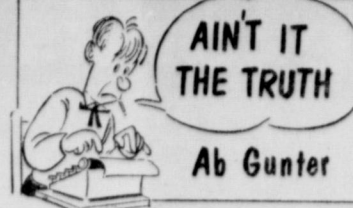

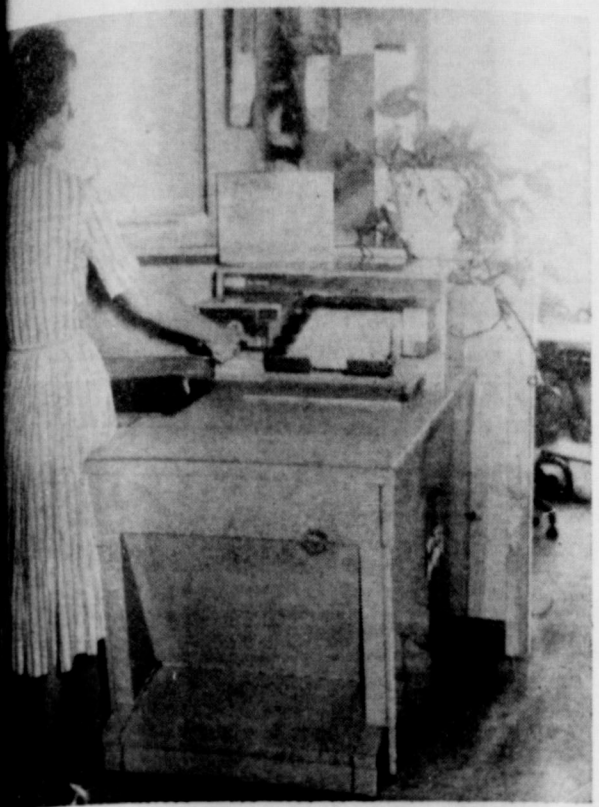

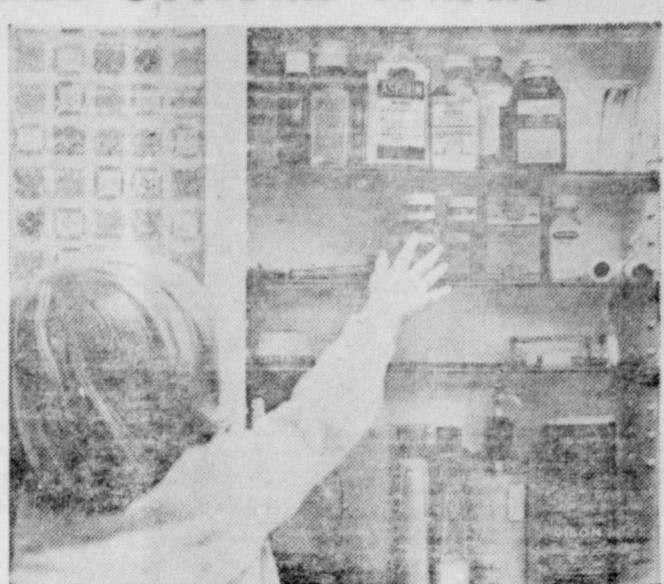
RULES GOVERNING 4-H JR. RODEO EVENTS STATED; RODEO JUNE 28-29

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo will be held June 28 and 29. At last count approximately 63 contestants had entered the events of the rodeo.

Rules For Each Event
BULL RIDING... Contestants must ride six seconds. Senior Boys, one hand; Junior Boys, one or two hands. The horse is allowed to be ridden in the arena. The rider must stay on the horse for the full six seconds.
CALF ROPE... The rope must go over the calf's head. Contestant is allowed two horns or two minutes to catch the calf.
SADDLE RACE... Saddle and Blankets are placed on one end of the arena and the horse rider starts back will be at the other end of the arena. All contestants will go at one time at the Flag of the Field Judge and the first five back riding with the saddle and blanket place.
WALK LEAD RACE... Race on horse back at a line on one end of the arena all ride on one line flared to start by the Field Judge and the boys ride to the far end of the arena, get off the horse behind the line and lead their horse back. The first six place.
BARREL RACE... All barrel races will be run in the arena. The race will be timed between the flags. The contestant must cross their train each time they round a barrel. Five second penalty for each barrel touched over and twenty second penalty for breaking the pattern.
FLAG RACE... Girls are horse back and are timed just like the barrel race. Contestant will be given a flag and she must carry it to the barrel at the far end of the arena, place it in a bucket of sand, remove another flag and return back across the starting line. Time is between the two flags.
BOOT SCRAMBLE... Each Small Fry contestant will remove their right shoe or boot. It will be placed in a pile about 12 steps from the starting line and all contestants will run up to find their shoe or boot, put it on and run back across the starting line.
SATURDAY NIGHT RACE... This is a timed event. Contestants wear swimming trunks under their regular clothes and take a bubble bath in a glazvanized tub. At the starting signal, each horseman fully dressed, rides to a row of tubs filled with water and bubble bath suds. Here they must dismount, disrobe down to their swimming suits or trunks, jump in the tubs, lather up, dry themselves, dress, and race back to starting line. A tub judge gives each contestant the signal that he has lathered himself properly and a second judge back at starting line rates each contestant on proper buttoning of all buttons. The riders must hold onto reins of their horses while taking bath—unless their mounts will ground tie.
POLE BENDING... Rules call for five poles to be set 21 feet apart with the first one set 21 feet from the starting line. The Pattern: Each contestant begins the pole bending race from a running start. Time begins as his horse's muzzle crosses the starting line. The rider may go to either right or left of the first pole. He then weaves the horse through the line of poles to the last one turns and weaves back through the poles to finish line. Penalties: Knocking over a pole, touching a pole with rider's hand or failing to follow the prescribed pattern causes the contestant's disqualification.
RIBBON ROPING... Contestants will work in pairs, a boy and girl. The boy will choose a girl helper, but a girl may run only once. The boy ropes the calf and the girl takes the ribbon from the calf's tail and runs back across the starting line. The rope must go over the calf's head and the boy must have the calf turned loose by time the girl gets to the line. This is a timed event.
WILD COW MILKING... The contestants will run on foot from a point behind the starting line to the cow, which will be staked. Contestants must milk enough into a "cock" bottle for the judge to pour out back at the starting line. This is a timed event.
RIBBON GOAT RACE... Contestants run from a point behind starting line to staked goat. Contestants take ribbon from goat's tail, and run back to starting point. This is a timed event.
STICK HORSE BARREL RACE... The contestants will run the Lloverleaf pattern on stick horses. Breaking the rules will disqualify contestants.

Homes Abound with Potential Poisons, AMA Official Warns

Children, supposedly "safe at home," are poisoning themselves at the rate of nearly 1,500 a day. "When you consider that more than a quarter million home-used products on the market contain toxins, it is not difficult to understand why more than 500 children die each year from self-administered poisons," said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vice-president of the American Medical Association. Children are naturally curious, especially the very young ones. They are prone to stick into their mouths anything they can get in their hands. It doesn't even have to taste good or look pretty. Most accidental poisonings occur in children under five. Two-year-olds are the most poison prone, with one-year-olds close behind. At this stage in life their curiosity is at its height and their sense of fear not yet developed. Dr. Blasingame explained. Medicine, especially aspirin, heads the list of items children seem to like to sample, accounting for nearly half of all accidental poisonings. In fact, too much of virtually any medicine can produce serious consequences. Among the supposed non-edibles that frequently find their way into children's stomachs are cleaning and polishing agents, detergents, shoe polish, cosmetics, waxes, insecticides, paint, turpentine, chalk, bleaches, plant foods, plaster, perfume and decorations.



Medicines account for nearly half of all accidental poisoning in United States each year. Discard unused medicine and keep rest out of children's reach.

A primary cause of such accidents, says Dr. Blasingame, is storing poisonous substances in food containers or soft drink bottles. A toddler just naturally assumes that a soft drink bottle contains a treat. He'll drink whatever he finds in it. "The facts are clear," he warned. "Between 65 and 70 per cent of all poisonings take place because an item was accessible to a child. If we're going to live in modern homes with modern conveniences and modern medicines, we have to develop some up-to-date standards that will make home safe for our children." Among suggestions for lessening the poisoning hazards in the home, Dr. Blasingame suggested: • Keep potential poisons out of reach and tightly sealed. • Never transfer toxic materials into household utensils. • Don't leave your child alone in a room in which you're working with poisons. • Give medicines only in a lighted room. If your child might have taken a poisonous substance, call your doctor for instructions at once. Don't wait to see what happens.

AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S NOTES

By: Charles D. Jackson

The County Agent's office has received several calls lately concerning Watermelon disease problems in the county. Mr. J. A. Reynolds of Mobeetie, reports that his plants are dying. From the description that he gave of the disease, all indications are that his plants are infested with Fusarium wilt. Fusarium wilt is a soil-borne fungus disease that attacks the root system and causes wilting and eventually death of the plant. There is no satisfactory chemical control for fusarium wilt. The only method of combating this disease is to follow a good crop rotation system and through the use of resistant varieties. A rotational system where watermelons are planted on the land only once in every five or six years is helpful in reducing damage from the disease.

The Charleston Gray variety is more resistant to Fusarium wilt and is showing considerable commercial promise in Texas than other varieties. Other varieties that show resistance are Miles, Blackie and Ironsides. These varieties are suitable for local market purposes.

Antracnose is another fungus di-

sease that attacks the foliage, stems and fruit of the Watermelon plant. The anthracnose lesions on the foliage appear as small irregular black spots which gradually enlarge. The lesions on the fruit first appear as small raised spots with a dark water-soaked appearance. The centers of the spots become sunken and turn yellow. Pink masses of spores may become apparent in these spots. This disease is especially damaging to the melons since one or two lesions will render a melon unmarketable. Anthracnose is spread by the use of seed from diseased melons, by crop residue in old melon fields and to some extent by rain and wind.

Periods of rainy weather during the growing season are ideal for the spread and development of this disease.

Methods used in controlling anthracnose are seed treatment, crop rotation and dusting program with one of the newer fungicides such as Captan or Zineb. Zineb should be applied at the rate of 6-8 percent Zineb at the first sign of the disease. Repeat applications should be made every 7-10 days if weather conditions remain for the spread of the disease.

The Charleston Gray variety is also resistant to this disease.

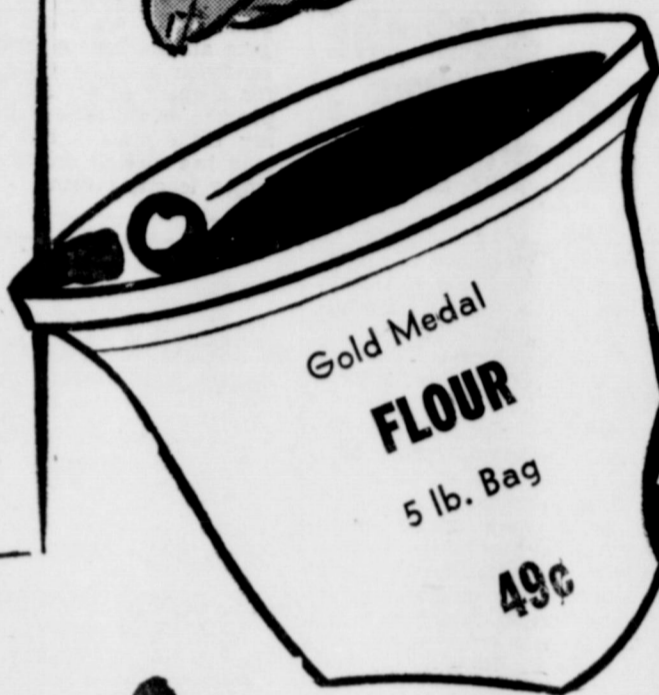

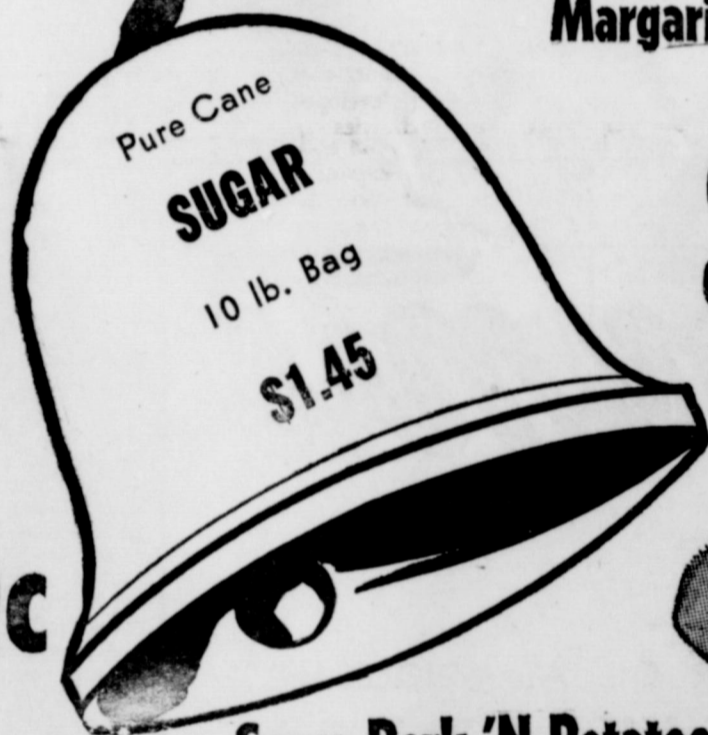

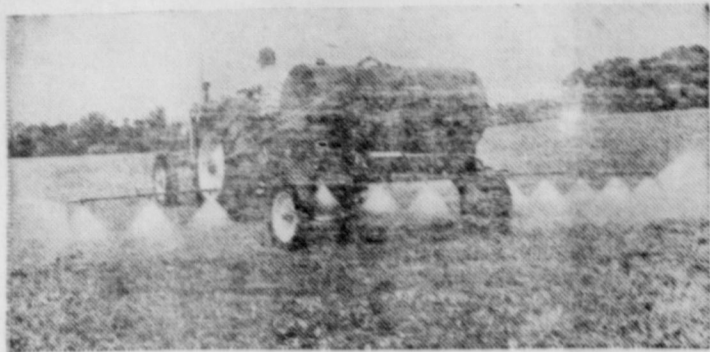

hanger on the grounds of old Moore Air Force base. It has more than 76,000 square feet of floor space and employs more than 300 people working in three shifts of 8 hours each, 7 days a week. The plant also contains the largest source of radioactive cobalt kept by USDA. The radioactive material is used to sexually sterilize the manure-dwelling screwworm flies.

The additional sterile flies will be used to combat isolated screwworm outbreaks occurring in the five-state eradication area. They will also be used to strengthen efforts to eliminate overwintering population of the pest in the southern areas of Texas and New Mexico where winter temperatures are warm enough to permit year-round survival.

Dr. S. C. Gartman, veterinarian-in-charge of USDA operations at Mission said the additional flies will give the program increased capability to deal quickly and effectively with each screwworm infestation as it is reported.

He emphasized that this move would not take the pressure off the individual livestock producer, who must continue to check for larva-infested wounds but would make it imperative that every case be reported so that the extra flies will be used effectively.
