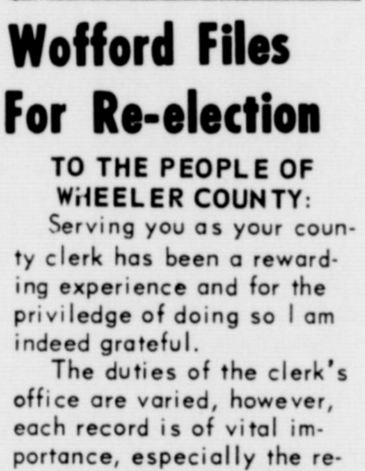

### BRUCE PARKER ENTERS RACE FOR DIST. JUDGE

Bruce Parker, former Gray County Judge, and long-time Pampa Attorney, has authorized The Times to announce his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 31st Judicial District, subject to action of the Democratic primary in May.

Parker has held public offices for 12 years in Gray County. He was elected county attorney in 1944, served for four years and was elected county judge. He held that office four years, then after a two-year interval was elected county judge again for four years.

Parker came to Gray county in 1930 after graduating from the University of Texas Law School and has lived in Pampa since that time.

Parker holds three college degrees, A Bachelor of Arts degree from West Texas State University, a Master of Arts degree from the University of Texas at Austin and a law degree from the University of Texas Law School, also at Austin.

Parker grew up on a ranch in Lipscomb county and attended a country school. He also attended school in Higgins before entering college.

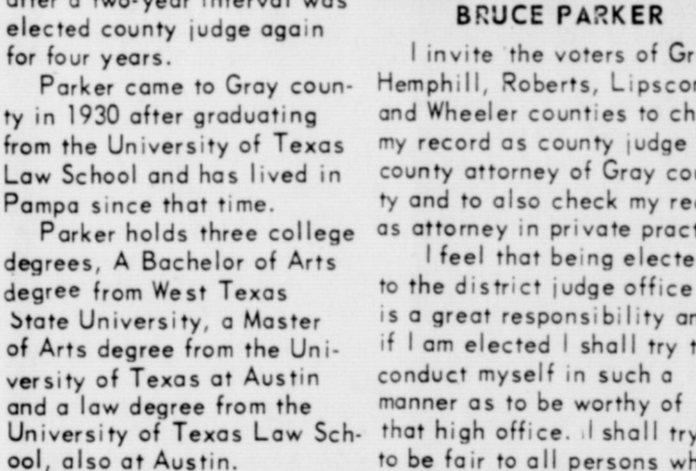
Parker was admitted to the bar of the state of Texas in 1930. He is a member of the State Bar, Texas Bar and Gray County Bar Association.

Parker lives at 1202 East Browning with his wife, Wilsie and their two daughters, who attend Pampa Schools.

In a statement announcing his candidacy, Parker said: "During the time that I served as county judge there were filed in the County Court of Gray County, 3,023 criminal cases, 231 civil cases and 781 probate, lunacy and juvenile cases making a total of 4,035 cases, approximately three fourths of these cases came to trial before me."

"My experience in presiding over the County Court in the trial of these cases has qualified me for the trial of cases in the District Court. I contend that there is no substitute for experience.

### County Treasurer, Palmer Sivage Announces for Office

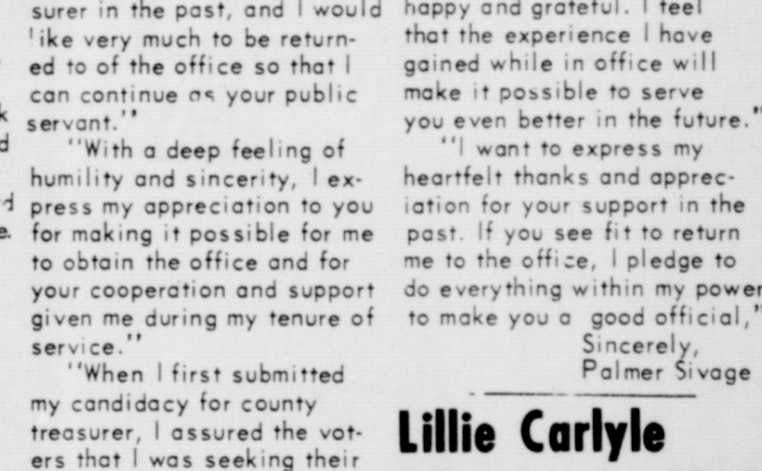
Palmer Sivage, popular Wheeler county resident, this week announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Treasurer.

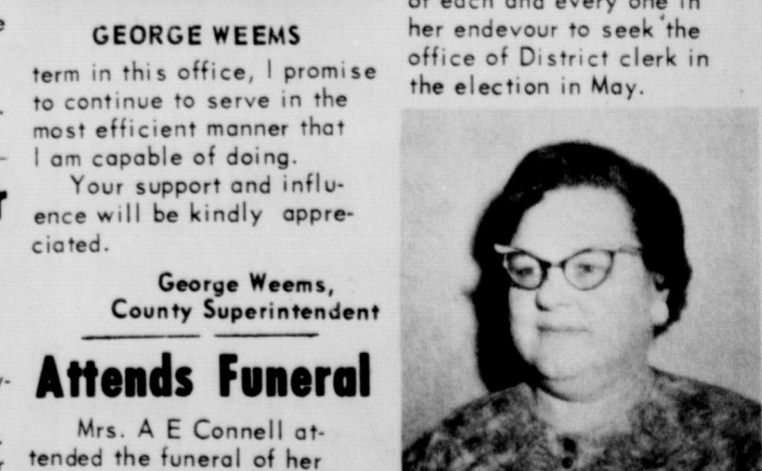
### Lillie Carlyle Files for D. Clerk

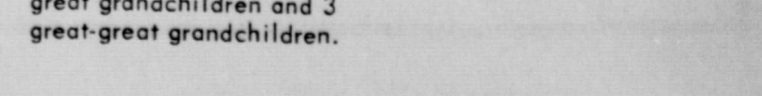

**Teenage marriages: Will your teenager marry in 1966?**

Parents of teenagers—here's a question for your consideration: Will your youngster soon join the ranks of married teenagers?

Not much chance with your youngster, you may say, but you had better look again if your teenager is a girl, says Mrs. Patsy Yates, Extension Family Life specialist at Texas A&M University.

Studies show that you have almost a 50-50 chance of a teenage daughter marrying before she is 20. In 1960, 48 percent of all Texas girls

or some 156,000 young women between the ages of 14-19 were or at some time had been married.

A recent study conducted by the West Texas Study Council in high schools across the state indicate that only four of the 238 schools studies require married students to take a course in home and family education.

Sixty-one of these schools had available and elective courses in home and family life which either boys or girls might take.

You can help prepare your daughter or son for the responsibilities of marriage and a home by encouraging them to enroll in high school home economics courses which teach management in the family and consumer buying. You can also urge them to take courses which may be offered in family relationships or family living.

These courses may not prevent teenage marriages, but they do offer a chance to prevent some teenage divorces. A frequent cause of marital problems is money.

Parents can give their youngsters sound preparation for the future by teaching them to do the family grocery shopping or helping the family business records or paying the family bills.

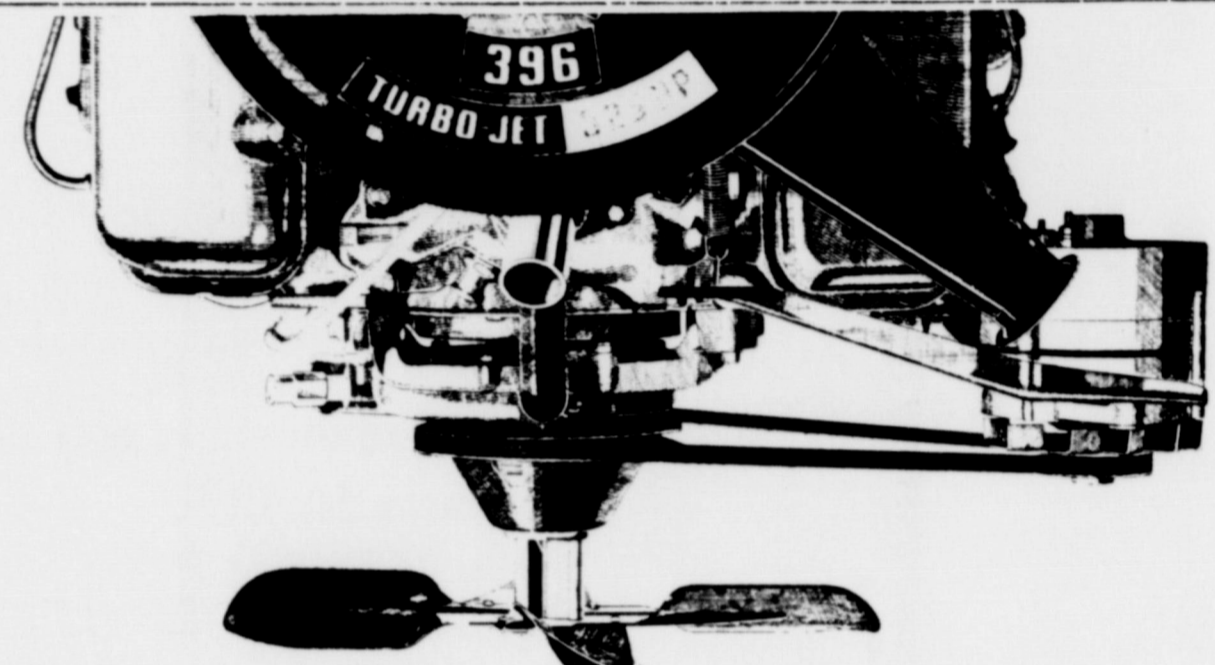

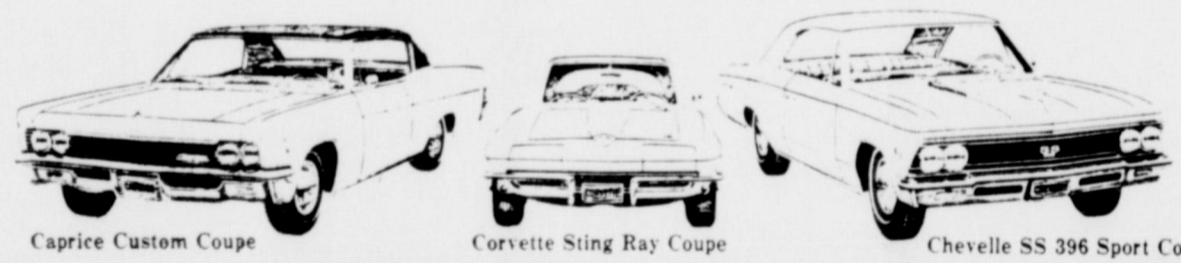

### Date Set For Mothers to March

What has the March of Dimes done for us lately? Someone asked us this the other day, saying now that polio is licked, where's the money going?

Birth defects cause serious physical and mental disability among many thousands of these babies. They are also responsible for many more deaths annually than cancer when you consider the number of miscarriages and stillbirths caused by defective prenatal development.

Faced with a problem of such proportions, we believe the March of Dimes has moved both swiftly and efficiently. In just seven years, it has become the largest private source of national support for research and care in birth defects.

It has created a nationwide network of centers to develop better methods of treating children with birth defects and to speed the application of new knowledge for their benefit.

Many research scientists supported by the March of Dimes are studying the nature of cells, chromosomes, body chemistry and systems, seeking to discover why birth defects occur and how they can be prevented.

That's just part of what the March of Dimes has been doing for us lately. Not so long ago, these advances seemed out of reach. Today, scientists and the March of Dimes are looking to the day when scarcely any mother will have to ask, "Why did it happen to my baby?"

### THE FAMILY LAWYER

#### Mischief in Mind

"There is no law," said Oliver Wendell Holmes, "against a man's intending to commit a murder the day after tomorrow."

But suppose the man still has mischief in mind when the day after tomorrow comes. And suppose he aims a gun at his intended victim and fires a shot. Then, even though he misses, he has indeed committed a crime: attempted murder.

Evil intent, by itself, is never a crime. Our jails would overflow if we punished every person who, however fleetingly, intends to cheat, slander, rob, or assault somebody else. There must surely be 1,000 clenched fists for every thrown punch.

Nor is active preparation necessarily a crime. The man who buys a gun, with murder in mind, is not yet guilty of attempted murder. At what stage does unpunishable preparation turn into punishable attempt? Where is the "point of no return?"

One test is the "specialness" of the preparation. A man who acquires special-purpose printing plates may be more clearly committed to the crime of counterfeiting than the man who acquires general-purpose ink.

Another test is the nearness, both in time and space, of the crime itself. The man two days away from a murder, in Holmes' example, still has time to cool off. A man planning a burglary in another city may yet change his mind before arriving at the scene of the crime. The law makes due allowance for the chance that either prudence or conscience will bring his effort to a halt.

But when the preparation is unmistakably evil, and when the victim is put in imminent danger, the law says a criminal attempt has been made—even though no actual harm is done.

For example, a cook who mixed poison into her employer's oatmeal was held guilty of attempted murder even though he decided not to eat it.

True, she might have relented at the last moment and snatched the dish away. However, the court concluded that a woman who would go that far did not belong in a kitchen, serving oatmeal, but in a jail, serving time.

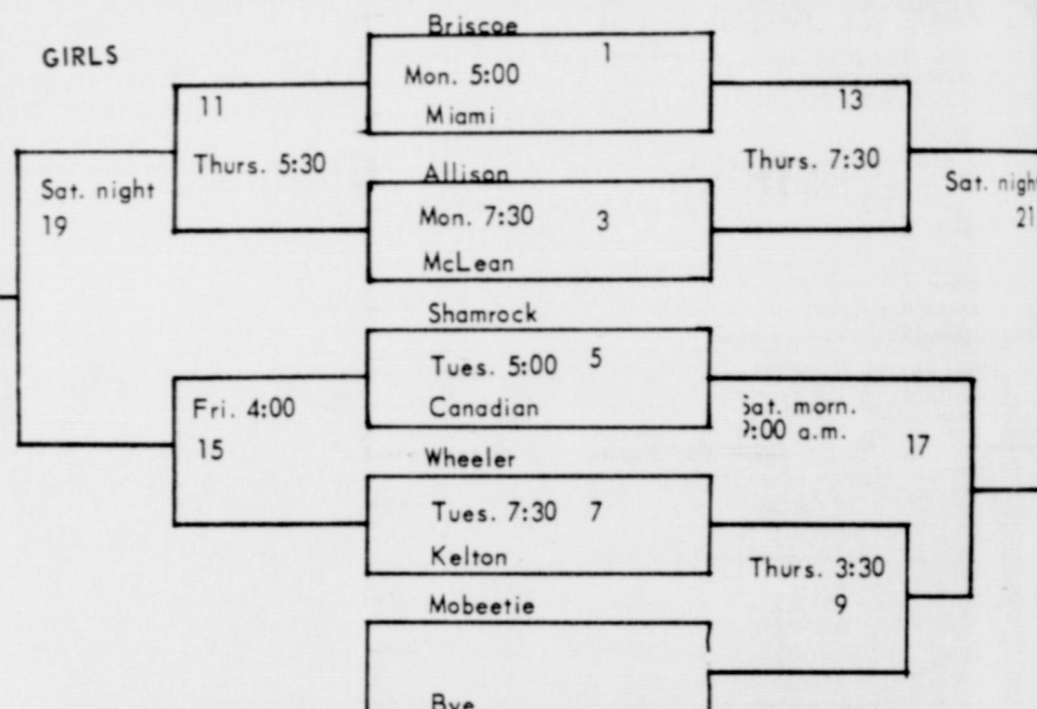

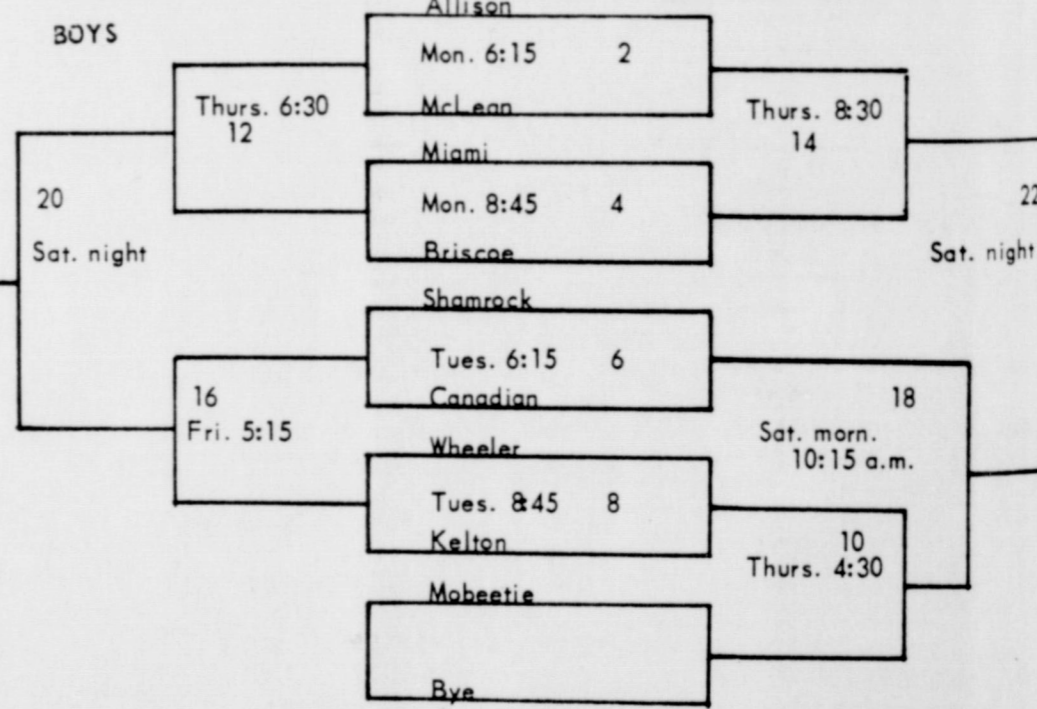
