

CONCERNING BLACKLEG

By Charles Jackson

Several Wheeler County ranchers have been losing calves and yearlings the past two weeks from a disease called Blackleg. This is a world-wide disease of cattle and sheep that has been a common disease for a number of years. It is caused by an organism, Clostridium chauvoei, that exsists in the soil and multiplication probably occurs in the intestinal tract of animals. The disease may appear in a heavily infested pasture year after year. It is believed that spores of the organisms enter through the digestive tract and after gaining access to the blood stream are depositied in various tissues througout the body.

In cattle, the great majority of lesions develope apparently spontaneously, unassociated with wounds or oth-

er injuries. Another bad feature about Blackleg is that it usually occurs in rapid improving or high conditioned animals.

Symptoms

Cattle that are usually affected are 6 to 18 months of age. Younger animals are usually immune to some degree. Seldom cattle past 3 years of age are affected. Following an incubation period of 1 to 5 days there is acute lameness, accompanied. by depression and fever. Characteristic swellings develop in the muscles of the hip, shoulder, chest, back, nect, tongue or pharnax. Af first, the swelling is small, hot and painful, but as the disease progresses the swelling becomes larger, cripitates on palpation and finally becomes cold and painless. General symptons

including prostration, tremors, dyspnea and high fever commonly denote a fatal termination. The disease is usually fatal in 12 to 48 hours after outset. CONTROL:

Animals may be vaccinated with a Blackleg bactrin which is very effective against the disease. If calves are vaccinated before they are 6 months of age, then they should be vaccinated again at 6 months. Weaned calves should always be vaccinated as well as any new calves or yearlings brought onto the place. Your veterinarian may recommend vaccinating older animals where outbreaks occur.

"There is no law," said Oliver Wendell Holmes, "against a man's intending to commit a murder the day after tomorrow."

But suppose the man still has misare also responsible for many chief in mind when the day after tomorrow comes. And suppose he aims a gun at his intended victim and fires a shot. Then, even though he misses, he has indeed committed a crime: attempted murder.

Evil intent, by itself, is never a crime. Our jails would overflow if we punished every person who, however fleetingly, intends to cheat, slander, rob, or assault somebody ed both swiftly and efficiently, else. There must surely be 1,000 clenched fists for every thrown

> Nor is active preparation necesgun, with murder in mind, is not yet guilty of attempted murder. The man who puts matches pocket, with arson in mind, is not yet guilty of attempted arson. At what stage does unpunishable preparation turn into punishable at-

> tempt? Where is the "point of no One test is the "specialness" of the preparation. A man who acquires special-purpose printing

> plates may be more clearly committed to the crime of counterfeiting than the man who acquires generalpurpose ink.

But when the preparation is unmistakably evil, and when the victim is put in imminent danger, the law says a criminal attempt has been made-even though no actual harm is done.

For example, a cook who mixed poison into her employer's oatmeal was held guilty of attempted murder even though he decided not to

True, she might have relented at the last moment and snatched the dish away. However, the court concluded that a woman who would go that far did not belong in a kitchen, serving oatmeal, but in a jail, serving time.

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
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
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
