## C. WILDCATS DOWNED 16-8

Wheeler's Mustangs were extended to the limit by band of fired up Canadian Wildcats and came home weary but mighty proud of a 16-8 triumph last Friday night.

The game was played in Canadian before as many or more Mustang fans than Canadian fans and everyone who journeyed the 30 odd miles was rewarded with one of the best games seen in this area in a long time.

This game was homecoming for Coach J.T. Hill, but the Wildcats made it anything but pleasant for him right up to the final gun. Dunk Porter, who ripped and slashed his way for 175 yards, ran off his left guard with 19 seconds remaining to add 6 points to the Mustang's slim 2 point margin and hearts started beating again. They were nearly stopped on the kickoff as David Cook took a handoff and came close to getting in the clear before being knocked down on the 'Cat 25.

A fine 26 yard dash to the Canadian 42. Porter got 7 and a free 15 was awarded the Mustangs for tackling Porter by the face guard. This put the pighide on the Canadian 19 with 3:12 to go in the half, Don Burks hit off his right tackle for

to begin the second half and drove to a first down on the 'Cat 4 yard line. An illegal use of the hands fine cost them 15 and the Wildcats threw up the barricade and took over at the 16. The flags flew freely during the contest and hampered both teams and stopped promising drives by both clubs.

The Wildcats got their touchdown following a 2 yard quick-kick which left the ball on the Wheeler 34 with Canadian in possession. Yarnold picked up 4 yards and Eckles added 2. Cook headed to his right and cut downfield as he hit the sideline at the 20 and went in standing up, and

Canadian was right back in the game. Yarnold bounced out of the grasp of several Mustangs and squirmed over for the extra points.

The Mustangs capped the scoring with a 10 play 47 yard drive late in the game with Porter getting the last 10 on a determined blast but the fireworks weren't over until Cook's run with the kickoff was halted.

The Wheeler coaching staff was happy with the way the boys were able to hold off the determined Wildcats and know that this week's opponent, McLean, will be after the undefeated Mustangs just as hard.

### PERRYTON MAN DIES AT RIG MISHAP HERE

Furman Edes Nichols of Perryton, Texas was killed Thursday, September 24, on the job at the Hefley No. 1 Well on the Farmer Hefley farm 15 miles northwest of Wheeler.

A casing crew from Perryton was lowering 13 3/8 inch casing into the well when the elevator slipped due to improper size bolts and fell 40 feet. The elevator struck Mr. Nichols on the head and killed him instantly. The elevator weighs approximately 2000 lbs.

Furman Nichols was born at Saint Jo, Tex., on January 18, 1905. He attended school at Gainesville, Tex., and was a member of the Baptist Church. He had resided at Perryton for the past 7 years, having moved

from Oklahoma City, Okla. Mr. Nichols was married to Mattie Burling at Wichita Falls, Tex. on Nov. 17, 1954.

Mr. Nichols was employed by Bob Cartwell Casing Crews Inc. in Oklahoma City. He met his untimely death at the age of 59 years, 8 months and 6 days. The time of the accident was 11:15.

Funeral services were conducted at the First Methodist Church in Perryton, Texas on Sept. 26, 1964, at 2:00 p.m. with the Rev. Duane Bruce, officiating.

On Sunday, Sept. 27, the body was taken overland to Arlington, Kan., where a graveside service was held in Cego Cemetery with Rev.

### WHEELER 'B' TEAM MAULS MOBEETIE AT HOMECOMING

An eager band of Wheeler B Teamers ruined the Mobeetie Hornets Homecoming last Saturday night with a resounding 44-12 victory.

As the Hornets are an eight man team, the visitors played 8 men on defense and then used their regular 11 men when on the offensive. The Wheeler coaching staff chose to use an offensive and defensive team in this game in order to give more boys playing time and this decision proved to be decisive in the last half as the Hornets were worn down by the superior manpower.

The B Team drew first blood the second time they had the ball when Frankie Rogers went over from 7 yards out. Bobby Ware made the two pointer on a quarterback sneak. This was all the scoring for Wheeler in the first stanza although Tommy Smith had a fine run nullified by a clipping penalty.

Mobeetie came right back at the Mustangs and scored on a pass from Rector to Vowell but failed to add the extra point and the quarter ended with Wheeler owning an 8-6 lead. Wheeler added an insurance TD just before the half and again it was Rogers getting the tally with a 15 yard scamper.

Rick DeArment led a hard charging Wheeler forward wall that kept Mobeetie with their backs to the wall most of the last half. Gary Hardcastle tackled on a 22 yard pass interception run for the Mustangs 20th point and Rogers swept his left end for the extra points.

The Hornets went to the airways once more but were unable to gain and lost the ball on downs after a fourth down gamble on their 24. Ware hit Johnny Chapman with a pass down to the 6 and then Mike Goad passed once more to Chapman for the score. Tommy Smith got back into the scoring act with a fine run of 58 yards with a pass from Goad after an interception had given the Mustangs the ball at their 22. Smith tacked on the extra points and the Mustangs had a 36-6 lead over the tiring Hornets going into the final quarter of play.
