Co. Agent Gives Report on Show

Wheeler County 4-H supporters were well represented at the Top of Texas steer auction in Pampa at the annual junior livestock steer auction last week in Pampa. Before the sale, Panhandle Packing Co set \$21.75 per hundred as the floor price that they would pay for the calves. Premium money paid was the amount paid above the floor price.

The First National Bank of Wheeler purchased the calf fed by Glenda Hodges of Mobeetie for 40 cents a pound. The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce was the buyer of the calf fed by Sammy Pagan of Pagan and Mike Bryant of the Kelton 4-H club for 34 cents per pound. Dr. Calvin Jones of Pampa, a Wheeler county rancher purchased the calf fed by Terry McCasland of Wheeler for 35 cents per pound. The Wheeler Kiwanis club bid in a heavyweight calf for Everett Childress of Allison for 32 cents per pound. Champ Davis' calf of Shamrock was purchased by Clayton Hudson of Pampa for 34 cents per pound. A group of Shamrock merchants purchased Phyllis Pakans calf for 38 cents per pound. Businesses included in this group were: C & H Supply, Harry Frye Insurance Agency, Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, Shamrock Texan and Bedford Harrison Insurance Agency.

All the concerns listed above as well as the Wheeler County Farm Bureau were active bidders during the entire sale when Wheeler County calves sold. The boys and girls were very appreciative for everyone that contributed a bid towards their calf. In most cases any profit made from the sale of these calves will be used towards the boys or girls future education. Seniors this year feeding calves included Phyllis Pagan and Terry McCasland. Money received this year from calf sales and in the past years will be used to defray their college expenses next fall.

These private landowners did not think in the United States that the water district had a right to drive over a persons property, dig slush pits and core drill without paying damages; however the Court of Civil Appeals in their opinion held that the water district did have a right to do this, but that they would be liable for damages after they were incurred.

A difference of opinion does exist as to whether a "big dam" or a series of small dams, as are proposed by the Soil Conservation District, would be the most beneficial to Wheeler County.

The men who oppose the "big dam" are not against progress, but they have an honest and sincere difference of opinion with those people in Wichita Falls who are promoting the "big dam." The local farmers and ranchers feel that the series of small dams on Sweetwater Creek will be more beneficial in flood control and will not take as much land out of cultivation and at the same time provide adequate reservoirs for Wheeler and surrounding towns for years to come. Your local Soil Conservation District has already received approval on the construction of the small dams and is only waiting on a priority for surveying to commence. Gordon Stiles is chairman of the local district and could give you additional information on this project.

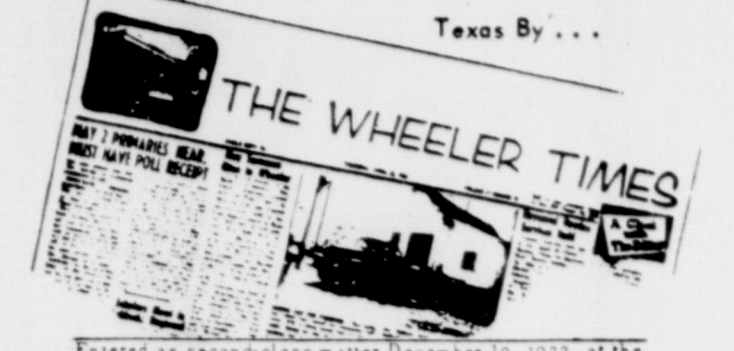

 Public interest in dams are getting pretty high. Several people have inquired about the status of the Sweetwater Creek Watershead project. The boys at the SCS office have said they have received some calls about the dam to be built by the Red River Authority, commonly known as the Big Dam. They have no knowledge of the Big Dam.

It has been a tendency all along to confuse these programs. In a further effort to straighten things up please bear with this explanation. The watershed structures or little dams are build on the tributaries or smaller streams that flow into Sweetwater Creek. They are usually no larger than Lake Finsterwald in the north part of the county. This is a watershed dam. They cannot hold more than 200 acre feet storage without a state permit. 200 acre feet is the same as water covering 20 acres 10 feet deep. The watershed program is a jointly sponsored by the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District and Wheeler County Commissioners Court. The structures are built by the federal government on land usually obtained by an easement. The water portion is returned to the landowner

 Scientist at the lower Rio Grande Valley Research and Extension Center have developed a watermelon variety, Rio Gray, which may greatly affect the watermelon industry. Assistant Horticulturist R T Correa developed the new melon.
 The new melon originated from a single round shaped fruit found in a commercial field of Charleston Gray melons in 1958. Through eight generations, Correa has selected for fruit shape, earliness, internal flesh quality and freedom from blossom rot, a physiological abnormality which can cut yields by as much as 30 to 40 percent.
 In commercial trials for the past two years, Rio Gray has out-yielded the Charleston Gray variety and has matured fruit 7-10 days earlier.
 Rio Gray has good internal quality, is a good shipper resistant to blossom rot and is slow to become over-ripe. It produces round, gray, family-size fruit that averages 22 pounds. It is also resistant to sunburn and pimples, the rind symptom of the tobacco ringspot virus. The plant is also highly resistant to fusarium wilt.
 The variety has found good acceptance from growers, shippers and consumers and research Superintendent W R Crowley at the Center told me he believed Rio Gray would be grown extensively in Texas within a few years.
 Seed of the new watermelon variety are available for the commercial plantings this spring.

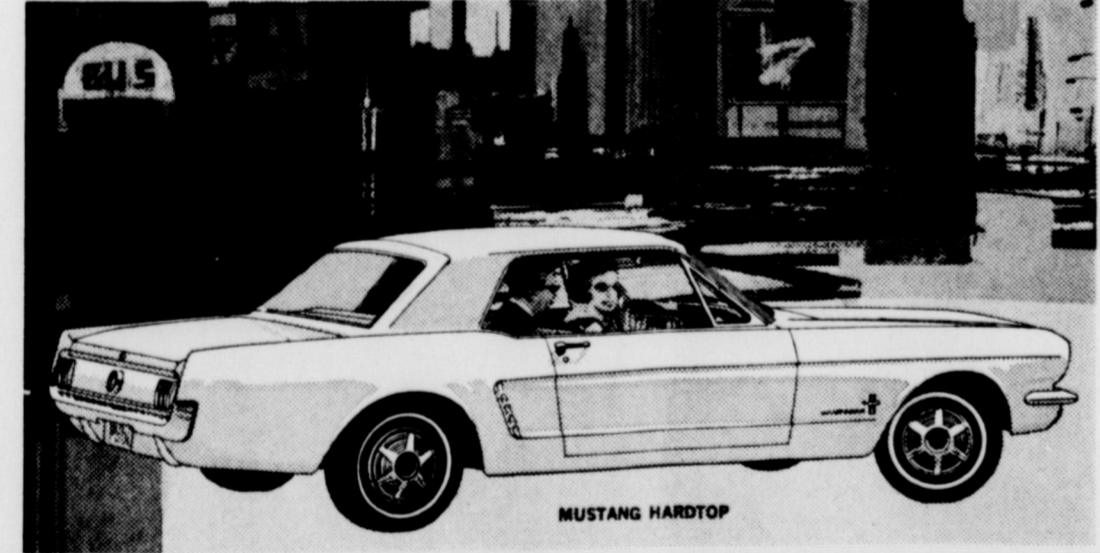

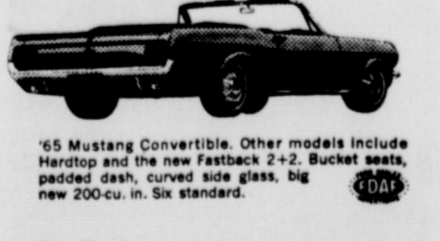
