RALPH WAYNE TO BE GUEST SPEAKER

The Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet has been set for Friday, Feb. 24 at the new school cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. Guest speaker for the evening will be Ralph Wayne, State Representative for the 89th District.

The installation of officers which has been the main objective of the banquet in years past will not be a part of this year's banquet. The officers for 1967 were installed at the January 17 Chamber meeting. Installed at the meeting were Jim Wright, president, Walter Dunny, vice-president and Betty Risner, secretary. New directors were John C. Vise and Jack Helton.

The speaker, Ralph Wayne was born in Wellington and now lives in Plainview. Education was acquired in many schools with Shamrock listed as having had a part in his elementary education. After graduating from high school at the age of 16, he received a BA degree from West Texas State University in 1953.

Mr. Wayne went into the service in 1954, after which he moved to Amarillo. He was employed by KFDD-TV until 1962 where he served with the news department and as Operations Manager for the station. He remained in Amarillo until 1962.

After living in Plainview for two years, Mr. Wayne was elected to the House of Representatives in 1964. His

first term with the 59th legislature, Wayne served with five committees and five interim committees. He was named one of the three "Outstanding Freshmen" Legislators in the 59th session.

At present, Rep. Wayne is serving on four committees: Rules, State Affairs, Banks and Banking and Labor. He is a delegate of the National Legislative Conference.

Wayne was named Outstanding Young Man of the Year in Plainview in 1965 and received the Distinguished Service Award. In January 1967 he was nominated for Five Outstanding Young Texans. He was listed in Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges.

Ralph Wayne is active in many organizations. He is a 32nd Degree Mason, York Rite Mason and Shriner. He is a member of Alpha Chi National Honor Society and Sigma Nu National Fraternity. Wayne is married and the father of three children. He has traveled extensively in Europe, Africa, South America and Central America.

Tickets for the banquet are being mailed to the Chamber Members. They are being asked to return the \$2.50 per ticket before February 18. If more tickets are needed than are received, additional tickets can be obtained through Betty Risner or Jim Wright.

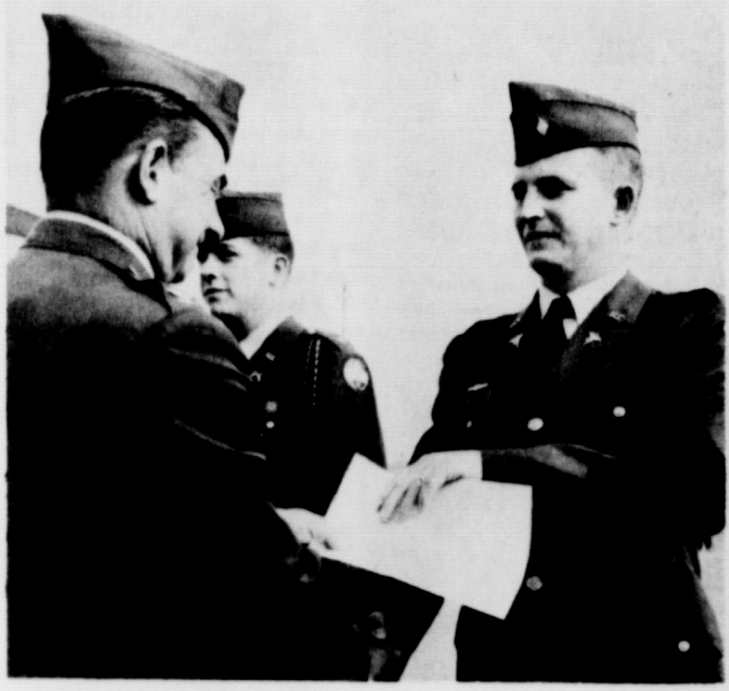

SECOND BLOOD BANK DRIVE STARTS MARCH 1

Kevin Cole of Ray, N.D., is a husky 11 months old now, but when he was born on March 31, 1966 in a Williston, N.D. hospital, his life was in the balance because of an Rh factor conflict in his blood.

Kevin's blood, O positive with several rare suntypes, conflicted with factors inherited from his mothers O negative blood.

Time and compatible blood were of essence. Four units, flown in the day before birth, were immediately transfused after the baby was delivered.

Four more units were brought by a Montana Air National Guard jet 90 minutes after the Red Cross regional blood center at Great Falls was notified of the need.

Three states to the west, at Bend, Ore., Mary Rose, 10, swam regularly last summer and rode her bike to the pool every day. But nobody, a year earlier, guessed she would ever be robust.

A sufferer from a congenital heart defect, in 1965 she underwent open-heart surgery. Surgeons sutured an opening the size of a silver dollar between the two upper chambers of her heart and reamed out a narrow channel in another section.

Twenty units of blood from the Portland Red Cross Center were used in the heart-lung machine which took over the functioning of Mary's heart while the operation was in progress.

Halfway across the country, in southeast Missouri, a 7 year old homophilic boy had received so many transfusions of blood plasma that his body had developed antibodies.

Internal bleeding resulted from an injury to his knee. The boy was sent to one of the St. Louis hospitals where a new blood protein concentrate, anti-hemophilic factor cryoprecipitate, is being used. This blood product is made by the Red Cross Blood Program in St. Louis. Its transfusion checked the patient's bleeding.

Again across half the country, in Bangor, Maine, a young man developed a small pox vaccinia infection. Blisters broke out on his face and eye lids and drained, forming a thick crust.

The malady diagnosed, doctors located in Boston and New York supplies of vaccinia immune globulin a blood product and the only cure for the infection. Two doses were given to him the night they arrived and two more the next day. Within 48 hours he was on the way to recovery.

The American Red Cross is the only source in North America of vaccinia immune globulin.

These four instances of the use of blood or blood products to save lives are only a few of the many that occurred last year declared Mrs. Roberta Adams, Chairman of the Wheeler County Red Cross.

In 1965-66, the bloodmobile from Wichita, Kans. Red Cross regional blood center collected 69 units of blood from our voluntary donors. Hospitals here used 12 units of blood provided by the center.

"Nationwide, the Red Cross collected 2,925,400 units of blood for civilian use, 169,700 for the Department of Defense and procured an additional 7,950 units from cooperating blood banks," Mrs. Adams said.

Distribution of blood derivatives by ARC was as follows: gamma globulin, used to combat various infections, 1,021,200 milliliters; serum albumin, used to treat shock and certain kidney and liver diseases, 72,000 one-hundred - ml. units or their equivalent; fibrinogen, which checks hemorrhaging in certain childbirth complications, 4,400 two-gram units; and vaccinia immune globulin, 1,700 five-ml. units. Packed red blood cells provided by the Red Cross and administered to patients with certain anemias totaled 67,400 units.

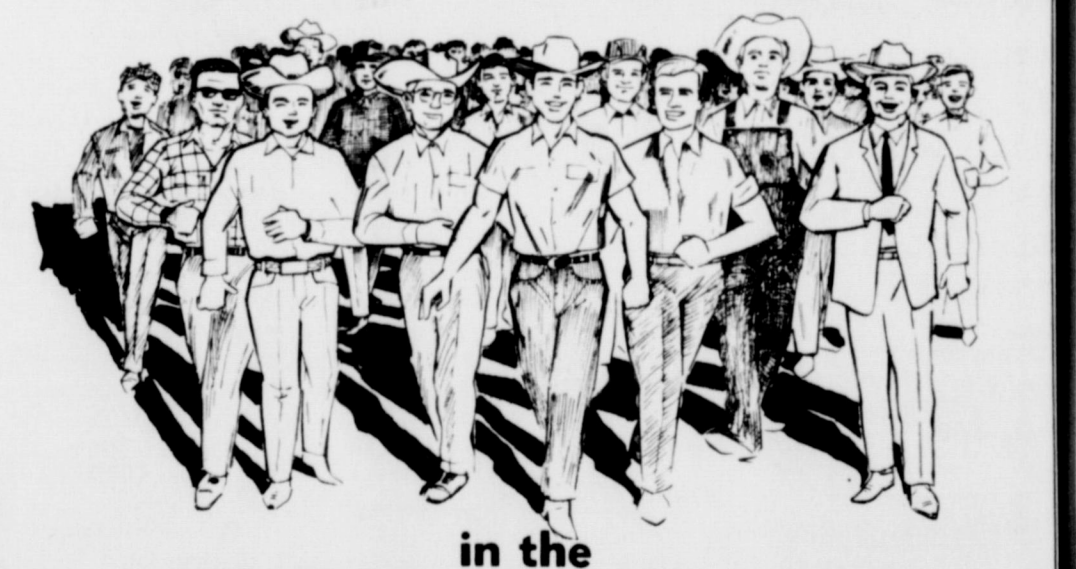

Valentines and gifts of candy or flowers are traditional on this date and have been in the United States since the Civil War. Although this day was named in honor of two saints it actually stems from the Roman feast of Lupercalia. In 496 A.D. this festival became St. Valentine's Day. Historians disagree about the identity of St. Valentine. One account says he was a priest who lived in Rome during the 200's. He was jailed for aiding persecuted Christians and was beheaded by the Romans about 270. Another St. Valentine was a bishop who lived about 60 miles from Rome. He was supposedly persecuted and eventually beheaded for converting a Roman family to Christianity. Homemakers often celebrate Valentine's Day with a special mealtime treat. You'll find ROAST PORK SPARE-RIBS WITH APPLE STUFFING just the thing to please a hungry family. Too, pork is plentiful now, according to the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service. Select 2 well-fleshed rib sections that match and weight about 2 pounds each. Saw or crack the breast one so it will be easy to carve between the ribs. Make apple stuffing. Lay one section of the ribs out flat, sprinkle with salt and pepper and spread with stuffing. Sprinkle the apples with the sugar, cover and cook until tender. Then remove the lid and continue to cook til the apples are candied. 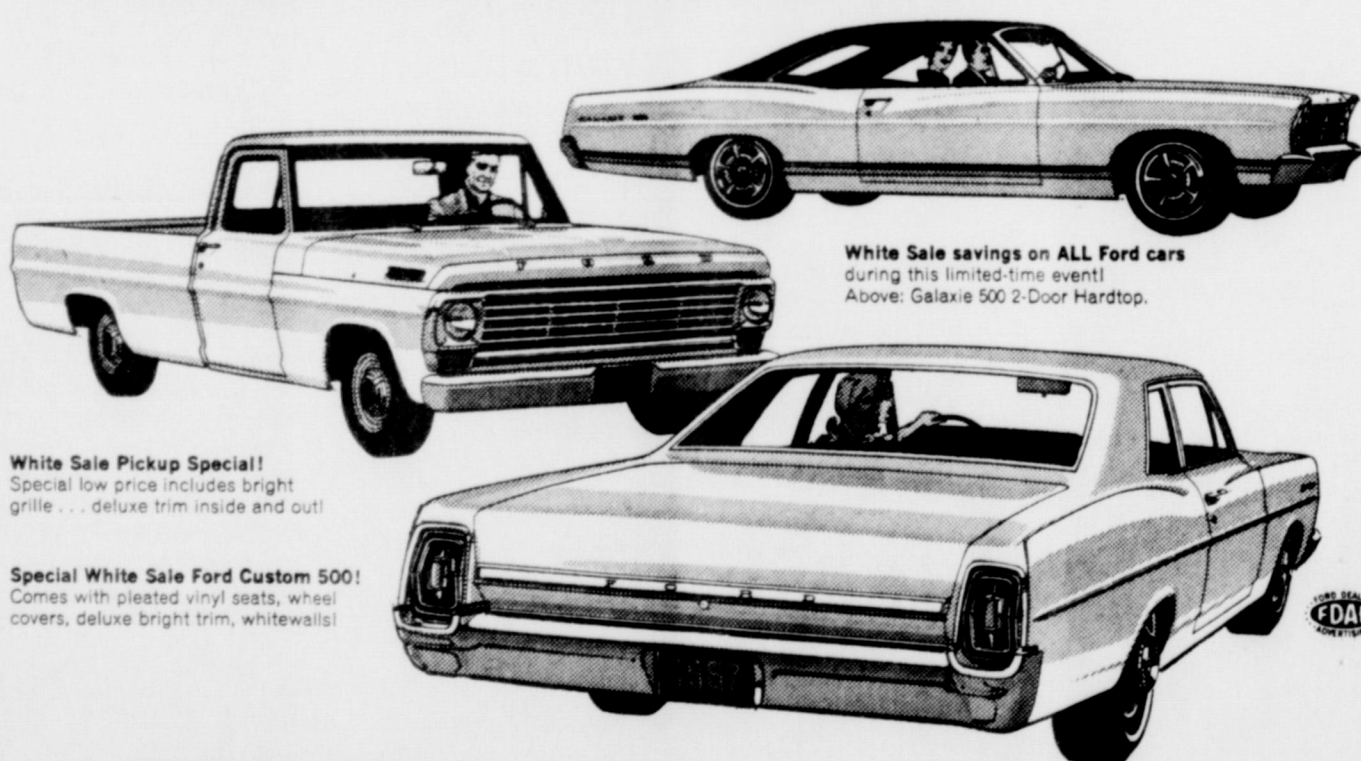
