

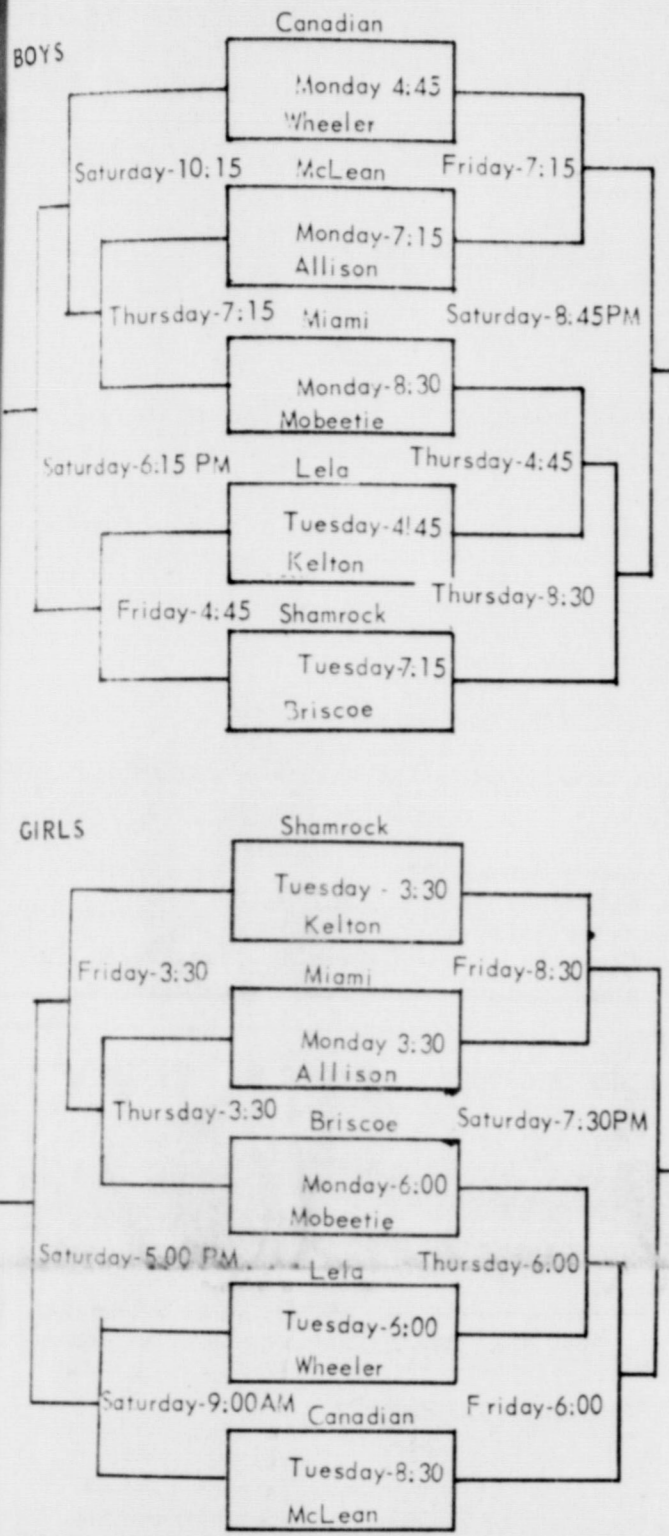

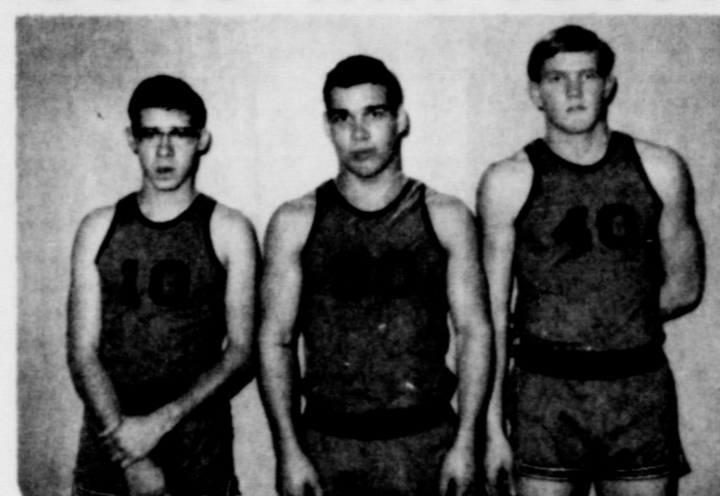


WHEELER BOYS WIN SECOND PLACE

Bertrum W. Kindy, 88, passed away in Parkview hospital Jan. 8, 1967 after an illness of two months. His home was at Webb City, Oklahoma.

Mr. Kindy was born Dec. 1, 1878 at Medina, Ohio to Abe and Matilda Kindy. He was married to Gertrude Fisher on March 15, 1904 at Champagne, Ill.

He was a retired painting contractor having lived in Oklahoma for the past 57 years. He was in Wheeler visiting with his daughter, Mrs. Williamson when he became ill and entered the hospital. He was a member of the Community Methodist Church of Webb City, Okla.

Survivors are his wife, Gertrude of the home, two daughters: Mrs. Edith Williamson of Wheeler and Mrs. Viola Marlar of Pampa; four sons: Herbert C. of Weleetka, Okla., W.O. of Perryton, Okla., Eugene and Ernest of Eugene, Okla. Services were held at the Community Methodist Church at Webb City, Okla., on Wednesday, January 11, 1967 with Rev. Bennett officiating. Burial was in Kaw City, Okla. Cemetery under the direction of Wright-Denson Funeral home. Grandsons of the deceased acted as pallbearers.

Old Jail Painted For Xmas Gift

William D. Morris, a Ft. Worth oil producer, was given an oil painting of a jail for Christmas.

It's a likeness of a stone jail built at Mobeetie, in the Panhandle, in 1883. It should make a good conversation piece.

Guests in Morris' home will ask: "What's that?" And he can reply: "My birthplace." Morris' parents lived out on the plains. Morris' uncle was sheriff of Wheeler County, So., when little William was expected. His mother and father moved into the jail to be near the doctor for the birth.

The painting was done by Morris' niece, Margaret Pickering. The old jail was abandoned when the County Seat was moved to Wheeler in 1900. Morris was born sometime during the 17 years that the jail was in use.

When grain attains its full height in April, the blue blossoms of this plant can be seen in almost every field of the Holy Land. The flowers are so abundant, they impart a distinct blue to the ground as one passes by.

Then there's the Pink Cistrus, this large pink flower blooms during Palestines lovely spring. A fragrant green called Ladanum comes from the Cistrus, the gum referred to in Genesis as Myrrh. Also there is the Almond. The Hebrew word for Almond means waker or watchers. The name is significant because the almond is the first tree to blossom in winter. A grove of trees in full bloom is one of the Holy Lands most beautiful sights.

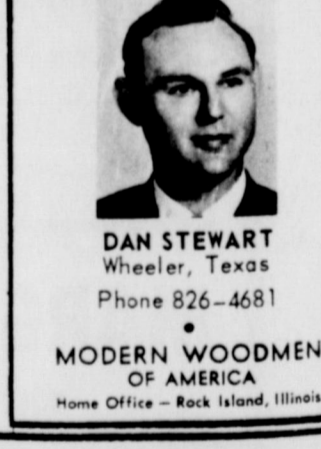

SUPPLEMENTAL PHOSPHORUS CAN UP % CALF CROP, WEANING WEIGHT

With green grazing being limited, beef cattle producers need to give special consideration to supplying phosphorus for their herds. This mineral is deficient at times in all sections of Texas, with late summer, fall and winter being critical periods in all areas.

Cows fed phosphorus supplements where the deficiency occurs may average as much as 200 pounds heavier than those not receiving the supplemental. Calves may weigh 50-70 pounds more at weaning age, calf crops can be increased as much as 30 percent and cows may conceive earlier after calving.

Practical methods of supplying phosphorus to range cattle include soluble phosphorus in drinking water and phosphorus supplements in mineral feeders.

Where the water supply of cattle can be controlled, adding phosphorus to the water may be the most satisfactory method. Monosodium phosphorus may be added to water troughs by hand while there are automatic dispensers which add the desired amount of mineral solution to a given amount of water.

Where the mineral is added by hand, recommendations generally call for 1/4 ounce of monosodium phosphate per eight gallons of water or 1/2 ounce per head daily. A stock solution of two and one-half pounds of this phosphate per gallon of water or 100 pounds to 40 gallons of water is recommended when using an automatic dispenser. This machine automatically proportions the mineral to the water.

Sheltered mineral feeders offer protection from wind and rain and thereby lessens waste. The weathervane type is satisfactory if kept level and treated with a rust preventive. Having the feeding trough 12-18 inches above the ground will permit calves free access to the mineral. The feeding box should

More New Recipes

By Vivian Warminski

While visiting my brother in Houston during the holidays, I ran across some recipes that I would like to share with you. The menu is called See-You Down - The Road Supper consisting of Schwencke Chowder, Pizza Hash, Hazel's Bean Salad and Meringue Cake.

Schwencke Chowder
Cook 1/4 cup chopped onion and 1/2 cup chopped raw bacon until the onions are soft and golden. Stir in 2 cups cream-style corn. Heat thoroughly and add 1/2 cup milk, 1/4 cup minced parsley, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and let cook gently about 15 minutes. Makes three to four servings.

Hazel's Bean Salad
Combine two cups sugar, 1 cup of water, 2 teas. salt. Cook 10 minutes. Cool. Add 1 cup vinegar and 1 small can each: Kidney, green, wax and Lima Beans, all drained well. Cover and allow to stand in refrigerator as long as feasible preferably overnight. Before serving, add 2 cups chopped celery, 1 large onion (sweet) 1 green pepper, sliced or diced; salt and pepper to taste. This make about 2 quarts of salad but it's a worthwhile project for it keeps getting better and better as it stands.

Meringue Cake
Beat two or three egg whites until they stand in soft peaks. Then continue beating while you add gradually 1 cup sugar. Lightly fold in one cup chopped nuts and add one cup finely crumbled soda cracker crumbs. Place in a very lightly greased pan and bake in a moderate oven (350) 15 to 20 minutes. Let it cool a few minutes. Prepare a package of whipped topping or use 2 cups lightly sweetened whipped cream, whipped. Mix with one cup pineapple or apricot preserves. Spread on top of the cake and sprinkle generously with coconut plain or toasted.

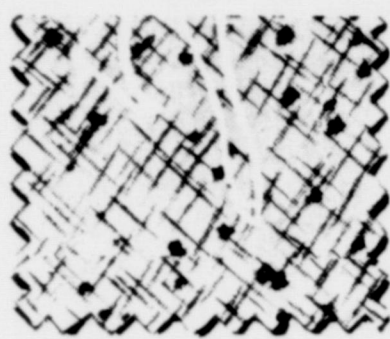

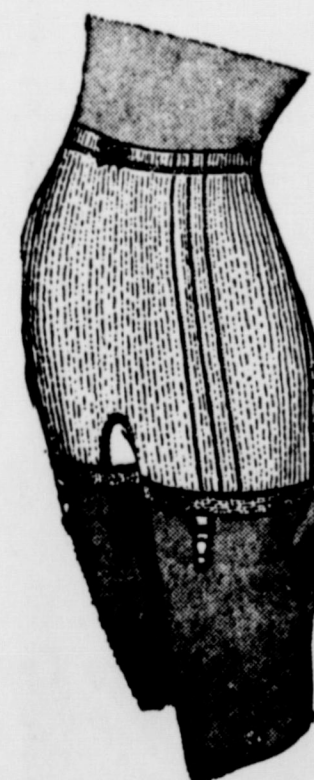
