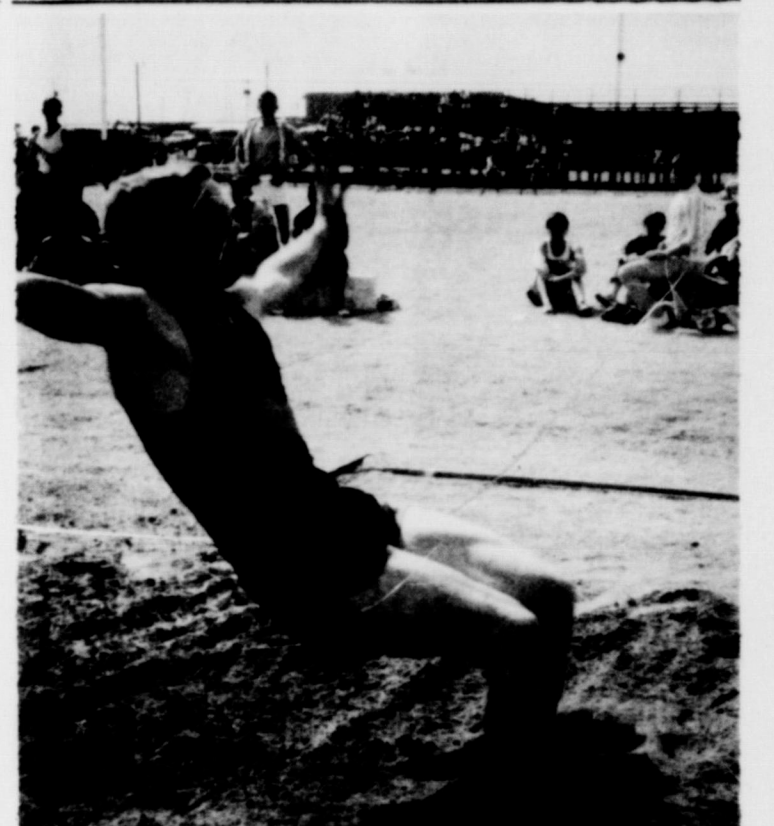

### THINCLADS PLACE FOURTH; 31 TEAMS ENTER PANHANDLE RELAYS

The Wheeler Track Team traveled to Panhandle Saturday to take part in the Panhandle Relays. The team competed with teams of large

er and smaller schools and came home with the fourth place honors.

The team entered 14 events. Wheeler was represented in each of the events at the meet. Of those entered the team qualified for finals in 10 events in Friday's preliminaries.

In Saturday's competition Wheeler placed in 7 events. Wheeler had two men in first place. One came in second, with one third, a fifth place and one tied for sixth.

Bob Stiles and Bobby Vanpool were sporting first place honors. Bob Stiles with a jump of 19'10 1/2" won first in Broadjump. Bobby Vanpool took only 10.5 seconds to run the 100 yard dash and came in first. This was the first time Stiles had placed in this event. Vanpool placed sixth at Shamrock in the 100 yard dash.

DeArment climbed a little closer to first place in the 330 Intermediate Hurdles at Panhandle. He came in second with a time of 42.5 seconds. This compared with his 4th place in competition at Shamrock.

Gary Harcastle vaulted 11' in pole vault competition. This put him in third place in his event. The 11' was 6" short of the distance cleared in competition at Shamrock.

With a fifth place, was Bobby Vanpool in the 220 yard dash. The time required was 24.3 seconds.

In the High Jump Villard Hunter tied for sixth place honors. A height of 5'6" was attained by Hunter at Panhandle.

Wheeler added up 42 1/2 points in the meet. In competition with 31 teams at the meet, Wheeler followed Panhandle, Clarendon and Wellington. Point wise the teams scored 100, 87 and 46 respectively. Silvertown came in fifth with only half a point less than Wheeler.

The three events which made the finals and did not place were the Mile Relay, 880 yard dash and High Hurdles.

The team will be in Perryton Friday to compete with 18 schools in Class 2-A competition. The team will again enter 14 events. The preliminaries will start at 9:00 with the finals set for 2:00.

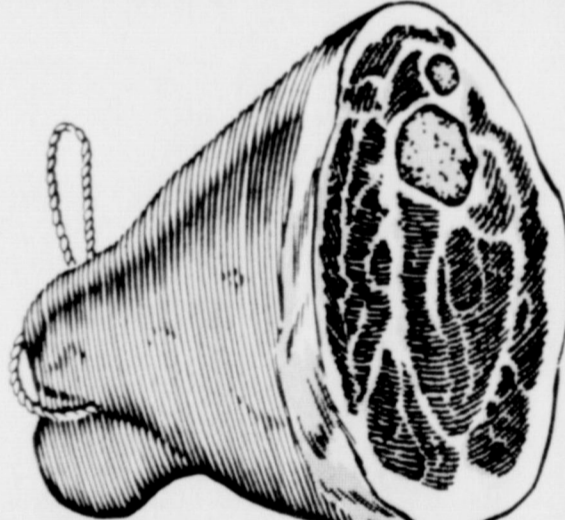

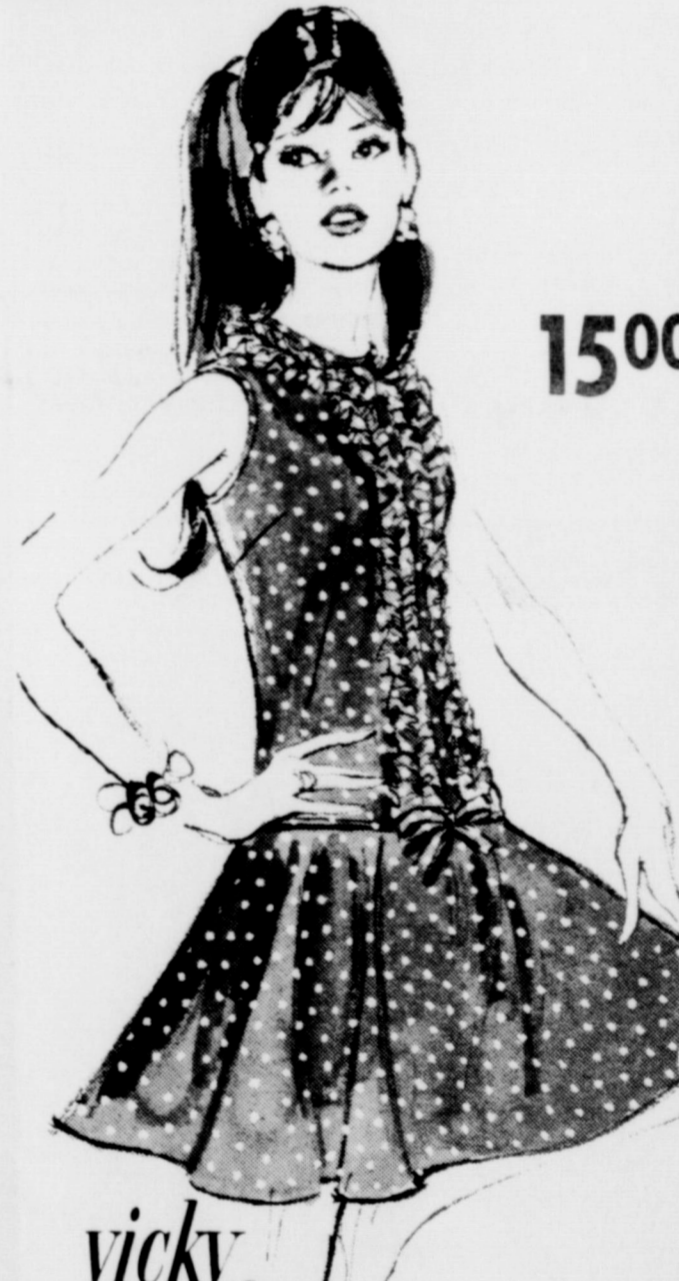

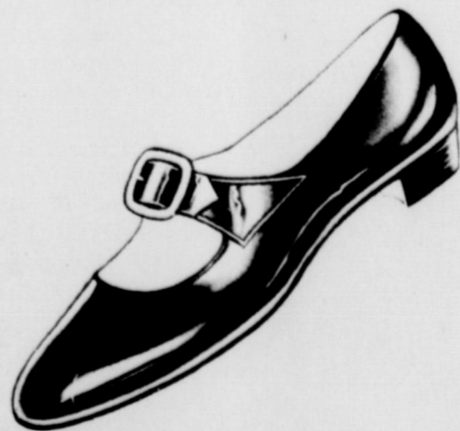

## POPCORN FOR CATTLE

By Charles David Jackson  
Cattle eating popcorn? Ridiculous! Maybe this idea isn't as farfetched as it sounds. The latest method of preparing grains to increase feedlot cattle gains involves popping sorghum grains. Not enough research has been conducted to form any conclusion, but this method may improve cattle gains.

Such methods as grinding, steam-rolling, pressure cooking, flaking and reconstituting grain in overnight silos have significantly increased gains in feedlot cattle.

The increasing interest in rations for cattle has been caused by the rise in number of marketed Texas feedlot cattle. Five percent of the marketed cattle in the state in 1955 came from feedlots. In 1960 the number represented 11 percent and in 1966 more than 25 percent of the cattle came from feedlots.

A new leaflet, L-597, "Rations for Growing and Finishing Cattle" has been released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Uel D. Thompson, Extension Animal Husbandman at Texas A&M, is the author of the leaflet.

It lists information on starting cattle on feed and recommendations for using protein supplements, roughage, additives and minerals in rations.

The system of starting cattle and feeding until slaughter on all grain, grain and a protein supplement or all concentrate with no roughage has been practiced by some feeders and is presently being studied at Texas A&M University. Feed per 100 pounds of gain is reduced considerably thus lowering production costs, but that rise of higher death losses, founder, liver abscesses, rumen ulcers, and slaughter price dock are some of the areas that need further study before definite recommendations can be made.

Copies of the leaflet are available at the County Agents office for persons wishing more detailed information.

**NEW AGRONOMIST TO SERVE PLAINS AREA:** Officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here have announced the appointment of a new area agronomist to serve the High and Rolling Plains.

The new agronomist, Dr. Robert B. Metzger, will assume duties in the position March 16 at the Extension Service District Office in Lubbock, according to Extension Director John E. Hutchison.

Metzger will be working closely with county agricultural agents of the area on education programs dealing with the important agronomic crops and will be responsible for providing needed training on subject matter. He will also assist agents with their result demonstration program and will work with other area specialists on short courses and other teaching and training aids, the director said.

Hutchison further stated that the agronomist will work closely with research personnel at the South Plains Research and Extension Center at Lubbock and other research stations in the area. He will also give assistance to the South Plains Development (SPD) program which was launched last week.

Metzger holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M University in agronomy and recently received a Ph.D. from Iowa State University in seed technology with a minor in crop production.
