A 17 year old Mobeetie youth, John Bradley died Friday afternoon at Northwest Texas hospital of injuries he received August 8 when a horse fell on him pinning him to the ground on the ranch of Dr. S J Montgomery between Laketon and Miami.

Bradley, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Trout graduated from Mobeetie High School in May. Born in Wheeler, he was a member of the First Methodist church and of the Mobeetie Chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

Funeral services were held August 22 in the First Methodist church with the Rev C T Jackson, pastor, Rev B C Reed of Lefors, and the Rev Charles Uzzle pastor of the Mobeetie Baptist church officiating.

Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery by Charnichael-Whately funeral directors of Pampa.

A TRIBUTE TO JOHN BRADLEY TROUT

It is boys like John Bradley Trout that help to keep my faith in the younger generation. It is my contention that each generation of teenagers get better in the small schools of the country. The best way to combat juvenile delinquency is to go back to the small school where the teacher has a closer touch with the pupil.

John Bradley attended all 12 years in the Mobeetie schools and I got to know him real well in the past 4 years. He was not outstanding in the classroom, on the athletic or in a social gathering. He was just a solid citizen who could be depended upon to do his job each day. Until he was called upon, the teacher or the coach hardly knew he was around. All his classmates and all who knew him loved and respected him. I hope to know many more boys like John Bradley before I retire from teaching.

John Bradley loved horses and ranchlife and that is how he met his death. His horse fell on him, while working cattle August 8, 1965 and he remained in a coma for 12 days in the Amarillo hospital. He passed away Friday August 20 at 3:00 p.m. Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery Sunday August 22 at 3:00 p.m. Pallbearers were eight of his classmates from the Mobeetie graduating class of 1965. John Bradley Trout will long be remembered in the Mobeetie community.
