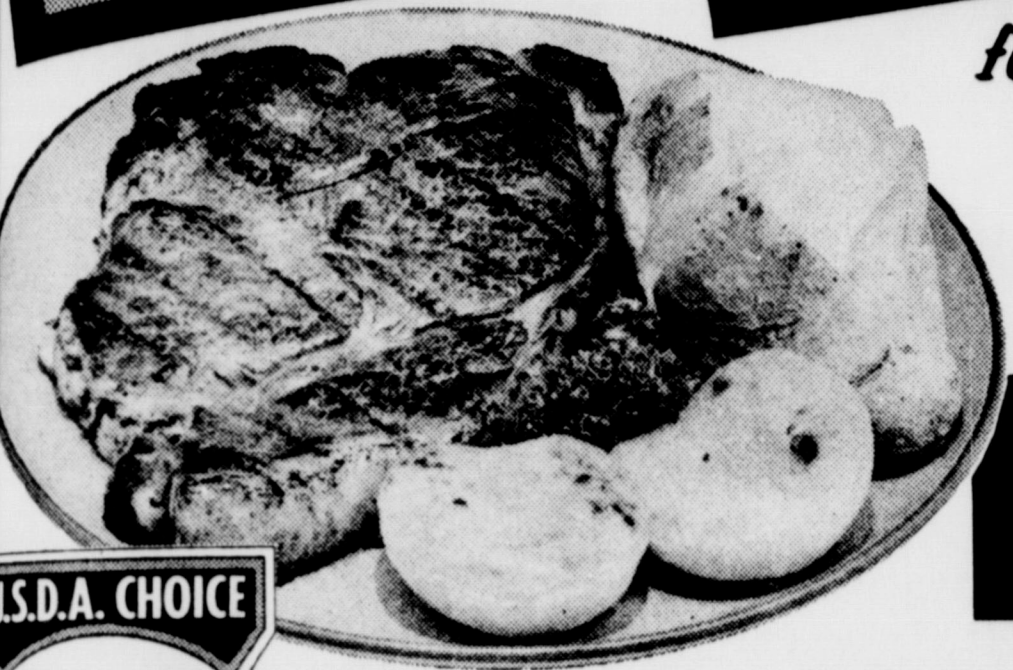

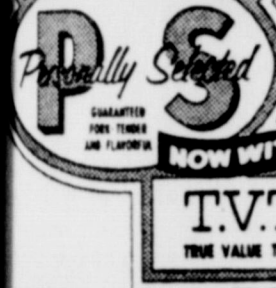

County HD Agent Report

By Vivian Warminski
Sugar! Spiced and everything nice—That's what Christmas means in a homemaker's kitchen.

The joy of baking and candy making for holidays can be dulled by lack of time, or over-complicated recipes. Fortunately, new products and methods permit simplified techniques and reduce preparation time.

Cookies, cakes, breads can be made from packaged mixes and refrigerated dough. Since they are so easy to bake there will be ample time to use your artistic talents in decorating creatively with frostings and seasonal garnishes.

Here are some recipes that you might find useful during the happy, hectic season.

"French Fudge"
1 1/2 cups (9 oz) semi sweet chocolate pieces
Dash of Salt
2/3 cup (1/2 can) sweetened condensed milk
1 t. vanilla extract

Put chocolate and salt in top of double boiler; cover and heat over boiling water until chocolate melts. Add sweetened condensed milk and flavoring; heat until well blended and smooth. Pour into a container at least 2 inches deep. Cover exposed surfaces with waxed paper or aluminum foil. Refrigerate or let stand at room temperature several hours until firm. Remove covering and cut into serving pieces. Store in tightly covered metal container.

"Coconut Coffee Ring"
Filling: 1/2 C. Flaked coconut
1/2 C. Firmly packed brown sugar; 1/2 c. Raisins; 1/2 c. chopped nuts; 2 tablespoons melted butter; 2 T. milk.
Dough:
2 C. sifted flour; 2 1/2 Teaspoons baking powder; 1 t. salt; 1/3 c. granulated sugar; 1/3 c. shortening; 1 egg, slightly beaten; 1 T. butter, melted; 1/3 c. milk.
Glaze: 1/2 C. confectioner's sugar; 1 T. Hot water or milk; 1/2 c. flaked coconut.

To make filling, combine coconut, brown sugar, raisins, nuts, butter and milk; mix thoroughly. To make dough, sift flour with baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in shortening. Combine egg and milk. Add to flour mixture and stir until soft dough is formed. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 30 seconds. Roll into an 18 by 19 inch rectangle. Spread with filling and roll up from narrow end as for jelly roll, moistening edge to seal. Place sealed edge down on ungreased baking sheet. Join ends to form ring; seal. With scissors cut two-thirds of way through ring at 1 inch intervals. Turn each section on its side. Brush with butter. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 20-25 minutes.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

New Cotton Program Information Meeting December 11

This week I was informed by Mr. Burris C. Jackson, Chairman of the American Cotton Congress, that arrangements have been made for Mr. John Schnitker, Under Secretary of Agriculture, and others of the U.S.D.A. Staff to come to Texas on Dec. 11 to explain regulations under the cotton program.

I'm sure that many producers, ginners, crushers, bankers and others interested in the cotton industry would like to attend this meeting. The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. in Dallas at the Statler-Hilton Hotel. Congressman W.R. Poage of Waco is scheduled to be on the program. All persons interested in cotton is urged to attend this informative meeting that is being sponsored by the American Cotton Congress.

Feeding Urea
Urea is a non-protein-nitrogen compound which through bacterial action in the rumen and in the presence of readily available carbohydrates is converted in protein usable by ruminants. Readily available carbohydrates are such feeds as molasses and the grains of corn, wheat, barley and sorghums. Correct amount of urea thoroughly mixed with molasses or the grains gives comparable feeding results to the vegetable protein supplements. The following points should be considered when urea is fed to cattle.

1. Urea should be limited to provide no more than one-third of the total protein in a supplement.

2. Urea should not exceed one per cent of the total ration.

3. Urea is most efficiently used when fed with a readily digestible carbohydrate. For each pound of urea in a mixture add 7-8 pounds of ground grain or 9-10 pounds of molasses.

4. Urea probably serves no useful purpose when included

in a ration that is already adequate in protein.

5. Mixtures containing Urea require thorough mechanical mixing.

By using 5 pounds of Urea, 60 pounds of cottonseed meal and 35 pounds of ground sorghum grain the resulting combination would be a 41 percent protein equivalent supplement. The total digestible nutrients would approximate that of 41 percent cottonseed meal. This mixture would have to be fed "daily" at no more than the two pound level.

New Insect Guide Available
Commercial vegetable growers are reminded that copies of a new guide covering insect control recommendations for 1966 are available from the county agents office.

NP-675, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Commercial Vegetable Crops" was prepared by entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and that the control recommendations are based largely on research conducted under Texas conditions.

The revised publication is intended as a guide for growers producing vegetables on a commercial basis who are equipped to apply some of the more toxic material without hazard. Home gardeners are reminded that they should continue to follow the recommendations outlined in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden." Copies of this publication are also available at my office.

It's not too early to begin the planning for the "battle with the bugs" on next year's vegetable crops whether in the home garden or on commercial acreages.

Dwane Scott, Farm demonstration assistant for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment station was given recognition for Meritor-

ious service to Wheeler county Agriculture at the noon meal of the Wheeler Kiwanis club at their Farm City week on November 22. The plaque awarded Mr. Scott, expressed the gratitude of both Wheeler county farmers and businessmen for his outstanding work with the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration program. The presentation was made by Bill Brooks, Work Unit Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service who is chairman of the agricultural committee for the Wheeler Kiwanis club.

Mr. Scott has worked very closely with research personnel, the county agent and the crops committee of the Wheeler county program building committee in setting up research demonstrations to help solve problems determined by the local committee. These demonstrations have included cotton and grain sorghum variety and fertility studies, weed control, gear fertility and variety demonstrations, alfalfa, disease control, grass, forage and livestock demonstration studies and many other problems connected with Wheeler county agriculture.

The Northwest Texas Research Demonstration program was initiated in Wheeler county in 1958. Grainger McIlhany, State Representative from Wheeler was instrumental in establishing the research demonstration project.

Grazing regrowth of Sorghum plants:
A light frost on sorghum or sorghum stubble regrowth may cause it to be a dangerous pasture for cattle. Sorghum plants under stress may have a tendency to build up prussic acid in the plant. Cattle can be killed by consuming only a small amount of this prussic acid.

Sorghum plants or sorghum regrowth can be safely pastured within a week after the plant has been killed and there is no possibility of any regrowth from the crown of

the plant. Most of the prussic acid comes from fields that have been partially killed, but warm days make a same thing.

Under normal conditions Sudangrass can be safely pastured. During the first light frost, there is a possibility of a build-up of prussic acid in the plant. This seldom happens, but when it does, cattle on the pasture on Sudangrass are lost.

Alfalfa should be completely dormant before grazing in the fall. There are reasons for this: 1. The growth should be left on long as the plant is growing to store nutrients in the roots for the next season's growth. 2.
