

MUSTANGS TRAMPLE BOOKER, 42-13

FIRST WIN OF THE '92 SEASON IS IMPRESSIVE

Wheeler's first victory of 1992, a 42-13 rout of Booker last Friday night,

was simply a game of follow your leader. Joe Dan Ledbetter, Mark Marshall, and Genaro Meraz the only

returning starters off last season's regional finalist, are three-fourths of the '92 co-captains. So who would be better to guide the Ponies to their first victory. And guide they did. Ledbetter caught four passes for 111 yards and one touchdown and returned a fumble for another TD. Marshall rambled for 132 yards on 16 rushes and two touchdowns and Meraz, playing in his first game of '92, powered for 104 yards on 12 carries, nailed six PAT kicks, and generally terrorized the entire Kiowa offense from his inside linebacker position.

The Mustang offense was not idyllic even as they rolled up 468 total yards. The 'Stangs were hit with 85 yards in penalties and coughed up four

fumbles. That did not matter in the final outcome however as a staunch Wheeler defense allowed only 133 total yards from Booker, with the Kiowas only being able to gain 26 rushing yards on 29 carries.


The game was a slow starter for both squads. The first score of the game did not come until there were 11 seconds left in the first quarter when Marshall, a senior runningback, capped a three-play, 47-yard drive with a four-yard run. Up to that point the only exciting moments had been back-to-back touchdown runs at 48 and 55 yards by Chad Dunnam and Marshall, respectively, that were called back because of penalties.

But after Marshall's first score, Kiowa return man Devin Garton caused plenty of excitement. The 5-8, 160-pounder caught the Corey Case kickoff on his own 12 yard line, headed right, dodged and weaved into the open field, broke an attempted tackle by Todd Baize and outran Meraz to the end zone for a 90-yard Kiowa score. Toby Wynn's PAT kick tied the score at 7-7.

The 'Stangs wasted little time in answering. Dunnam returned the ensuing kickoff 26 yards to the Wheeler 46 and on first and ten found a wide-open Ledbetter on the left side of the field and with 11:49 left in the half, Wheeler had regained the lead at 14-7.

Wheeler added two more scores before the half to pad their lead. The third score was a result of Wheeler's smothering defense. Booker faced a second and nine from their own 34 when quarterback Chad Phillips dropped back to pass. Defensive end Todd Baize came roaring around the right side and crushed Phillips forcing the ball onto the ground and into the hands of defensive end Joe Dan



She has been active in basketball for 2 years, track 3 years, FHA 3 years, FFA 1 year, and cross-country 1 year.


Julie has been a cheerleader at W.H.S. for 2 years and enjoys cheering for the Mustangs.

Wheeler 7th Grade Colts Thrashed Clarendon

The Wheeler 7th grade Colts improved to 3-0 last Thurs. as a result of a 52 to 12 thrashing of the Clarendon Colts. Wheeler scored in every quarter as five different Colts recorded touchdowns. Leading rusher for the 7th grade was Jeremy Davis who rambled and stumbled for 169 yards on 14 attempts. Newly found tailback Bryan Judd added 81 yards on 7 carries. Quarterback Marshall Flowers ran for 48 yards while directing the Wheeler offensive machine. Reserve tailback Shea Weatherly ran well for 23 yards as players began to play less familiar positions late in the game.

The game opened as a wild affair with the Wheeler 7th graders holding a narrow 14 to 12 margin after 6 minutes of play. The game began on an exciting note when Flowers returned the kickoff 77 yards for a score. The PAT failed for 6-0 Wheeler lead. Clarendon

answered with a score of their own on a 60 yard sweep. The PAT was no good and the game was tied again at six. Following the kickoff, the Colts went on a five 8 play drive culminated by an 18 yard jaunt by Davis who also added the extra point run. The lead was short-lived as the Clarendon eleven answered with a touchdown return of their own. The PAT failed so Wheeler retained the 2 point lead.

From this point on it was all black and white as Wheeler scored 38 unanswered points. On the opening drive on the second period, Davis covered all 57 yards in 3 plays scoring on a TD of 39 yards. Davis also added the PAT for a 22-12 Wheeler lead. Just before the half, the Colts struck again following a Clarendon turnover. With 18 seconds remaining, Flowers scored his second TD with a 6 yard knifing run to pay dirt. The PAT pass from Flowers to Salas ended the first half score at 30 to 12.

The third quarter began where the second ended with just under three minutes remaining. Flowers again found Salas this time for 6 points on a nine yard pass. Judd added the XP run to extend the lead to 38 to 12. Judd scored his first TD 2 minutes later on a nine yard sweep. Flowers completed the conversion pass to Ray Immel. Accidental discovery may end obesity

WASHINGTON—Researchers may have discovered a way to end obesity—by accident!

In a study with a potential cholesterol lowering agent, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Instead of lower cholesterol levels, patients receiving a natural plant colloid lost weight while body weight in a control group remained constant.

The scientists say the mechanism behind the weight loss is not clear, but suggest it is partially due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories. Scientists in another study published in the *British Journal of Nutrition*, found that patients consuming the same colloid lost weight in spite of being instructed not to alter normal eating patterns. Despite this evidence, other scientists may not agree on the weight loss benefits of colloids. Someday, pending further study, there could be universal agreement that colloids are helpful in confronting the problem of obesity.

National Dietary Research, whose research topics have been the subject of articles published in recent medical and nutritional journals, has successfully incorporated a series of colloids into a chewable food tablet called FS-1. When used as directed, FS-1 replaces high calorie fats with lower calorie nutrients, thus providing optimum nutrition with a minimum number of fat calories. According to an article published in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, consciously limiting the amount of food one consumes is not necessary to lose weight, provided you limit the fat.

Coach Karcher will move around his team to compensate for the losses to ineligibility. The changes will not be severe however, Jason Hink will take back his fullback position after

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

From The Minister's Desk:

On July 29, 1969, Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the surface of the moon. As millions of people watched this historic event on television, a news commentator excitedly proclaimed: "This is the greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world."

While this statement is understandable, it is not correct. The "greatest thing that has happened in the history of the world—" is not the ascent of man to the moon, but it is descent of deity to the earth. This is a visited planet! It is a planet that has been visited by God in the person of Jesus Christ.

But what was the purpose of this visit? There are at least three words that can explain the purpose of this visit. These three words are:—

1. Revelation. When Jesus came to this earth, He was the Manifestation of God in the flesh. Jesus perfectly and completely revealed God to Man. The Apostle Paul Emphatically affirmed that in Jesus "—all the fullness of Deity—" dwelled "—in bodily form." (Colossians 2:9)

The Apostle John recorded a great truth when he wrote: "—God is love—" (I John 5:8) This great truth would be a simple abstraction if Jesus had not become flesh and lived among men. (John 1:4) His fleshly life, which is recorded in the New Testament, provides a full and precise portrait of God and His love for man.

This planet has been visited by the Son of God. And this visit was a revelation of God and His nature.

2. Reconciliation. When Jesus came to this world, God and man were estranged by sin, needing reconciliation. This reconciliation was provided by the death of Jesus. The Apostle Paul wrote: "—While we were enemies, we were reconciled

to God through the death of His son—" (Romans 5:10)

The teachings of the New Testament are that the benefits of Jesus' death are appropriated when penitent man baptized into Jesus' death. (Romans 6:3-4) Through this act of faith, the demands of God's justice are met and the sins of man are graciously pardoned which allows man and God to be reconciled.

This planet has been visited by the Son of God. With this visit, "—God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself—" (II Corinthians 5:19)

3. Representation. Although Christians are reconciled to God by the blood of Jesus, they still are in need of daily representation before God. This representation has been provided by a mediator, "—the man Christ Jesus—" (I Timothy 2:5)

The earthly life "—of the man Christ Jesus—" was characterized by the common experiences of life. Because of these experiences, He can ably represent Christians before God's "—throne of grace—" (Hebrews 4:15-16) The question—Does God understand? — has been decisively answered by the representation of "—the man Christ Jesus—".

This planet has been visited by the Son of God. And this visit has allowed Christians to have representation before the throne of God.


