

Bentley, Snapp Named All State

The Texas High School sports writers have released their selections for the 1984 Class 1A All State football team. Included on the second team from Wheeler are Steven Snapp at a defensive back position and Wade Bentley at linebacker. Paradise the number one rated Class A team during most of the 1984 season led the selection process with four players on the first team. The 1984 State Championship Munday which defeated Paradise in Bi-District and the Wheeler Mustangs in regional placed only one player on the elite team.

Snapp at 6' 175 pounds, started at quarterback for the Mustangs for three years and was a 1983 and 1984

All-District selection at that position. He was instrumental in the 1984 Wheeler effort that ended with their 17-20 loss to eventual state champion Munday in the regional playoff.

Bentley was one of the leaders of the Wheeler defensive unit that shut out 8 opponents in 1984. He was a unanimous 2 year All-District selection at both offensive guard and linebacker. At 6'1" and 190 Bentley led the Mustang special teams with his aggressive and dominant play.

Bentley and Snapp were the only district 1-A players selected. Nazaret, a victim of Wheeler's 1984 "Black Death" shut-out string placed two players on the All-State team in running back Chris Gerber and defensive back Ricky Backus.

M. Andis, SPS Manager, Named "Outstanding"

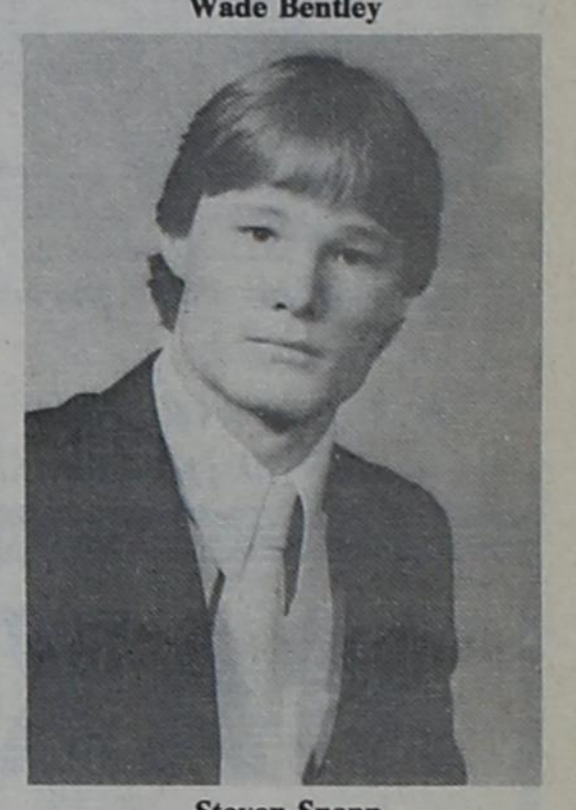
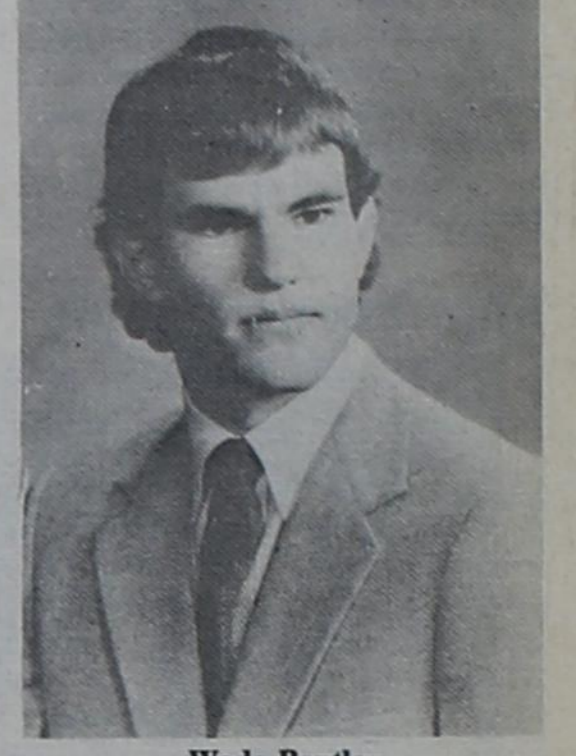
Marshall Andis, local manager in Wheeler for Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS), has been named the electric utility's "Outstanding Manager" for 1984, in communities with populations of 1,100 to 1,999.

He was recognized by SPS at the company's Annual Marketing Meeting held last week in Amarillo. Four other SPS managers, who serve in communities ranging in size from less than 799 people to more than 8,000, also were presented "Outstanding Manager" plaques by SPS Vice President of Marketing Gary Gibson.

Andis also won first place awards in two SPS "Living Better Electrically" marketing contests. No other SPS manager won as many as three awards this year, Gibson reported.

Andis has been manager for SPS in Wheeler since June 1, 1982. He first worked for the company in 1958, as a groundsman at Lubbock. He became a lineman journeyman in 1962. 

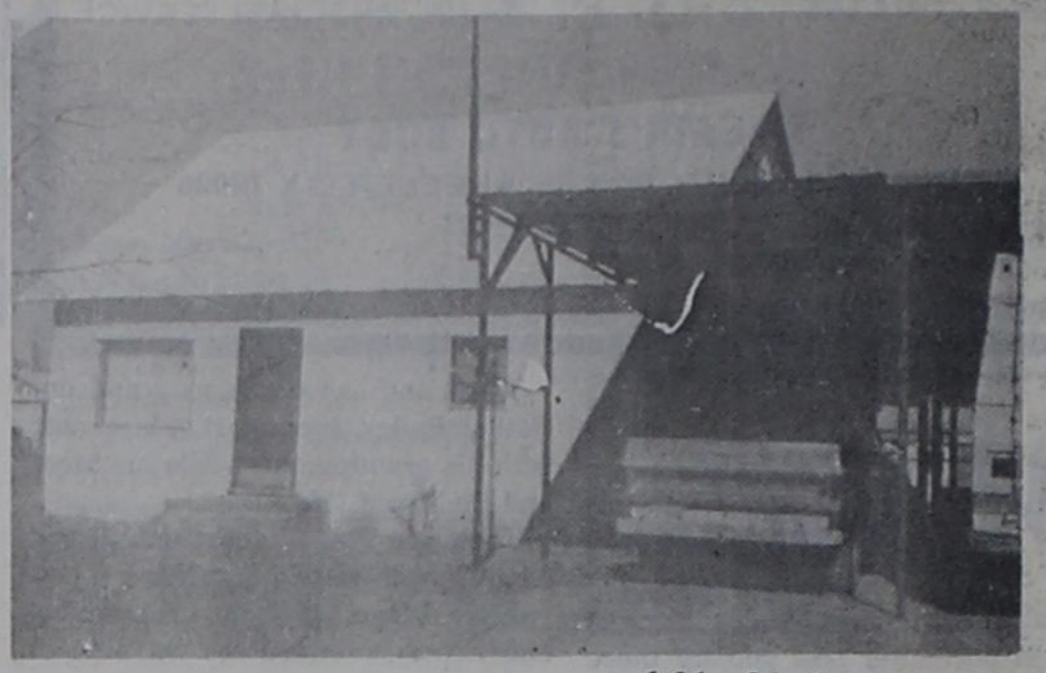

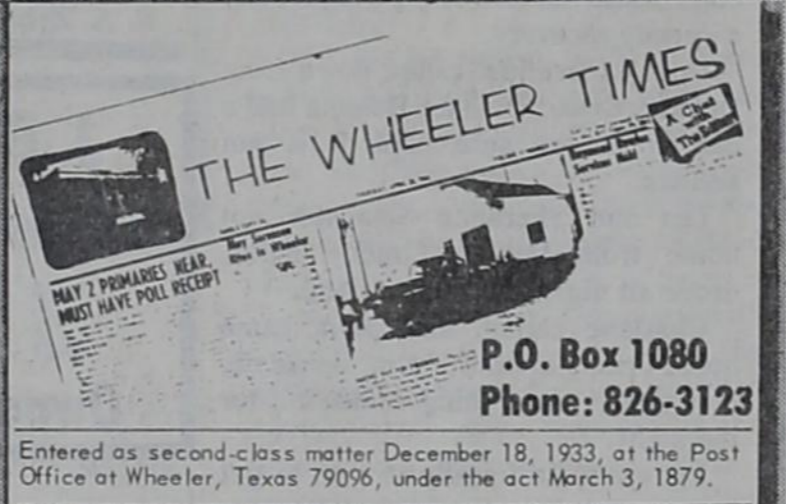

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. (AT&T Communications) gives notice to all of its Texas customers that a new procedure for long distance billing was made effective on an interim basis on August 6, 1984 in Docket No. 5800.

The procedure referred to is "Rate Period Specific Billing" and it applies to all message telephone service (AT&T Long Distance calls) including non-REACH OUT Texas calls within the State of Texas. This new procedure effects all AT&T Long Distance customers. All intraLATA long distance calls and all interstate long distance calls are currently billed using this procedure.

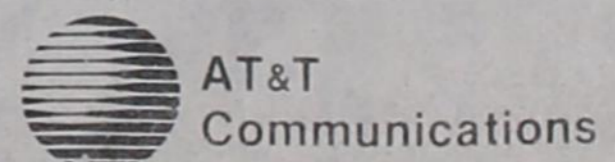
Under this procedure, customers are billed a specific charge for long distance calls according to the rate or rates in effect throughout the time of each call. If a call begins in one rate period and extends into a different rate period, the customer will be charged whatever rate is in effect for each portion of the call.

For example, if a customer places a call at 4:58 p.m. on a weekday and talks for ten minutes, the first two minutes of the call would be charged at the full weekday rate which extends from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The remaining eight minutes of the call would be billed at the evening rate which extends from 5:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. and includes a 25% discount. If Rate Period Specific Billing were not in effect, the entire call would have been billed at the higher day rate. Calls which extend from the evening rate period (25% discount) to the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) or from the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) to the day rate period (no discount) would also be billed according to the actual minutes of use during each rate period.

AT&T Communications anticipates a minimal increase of approximately .02% in its revenues or approximately \$250,000 annually.

A complete copy of the "Rate Period Specific Billing" tariff is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission.
