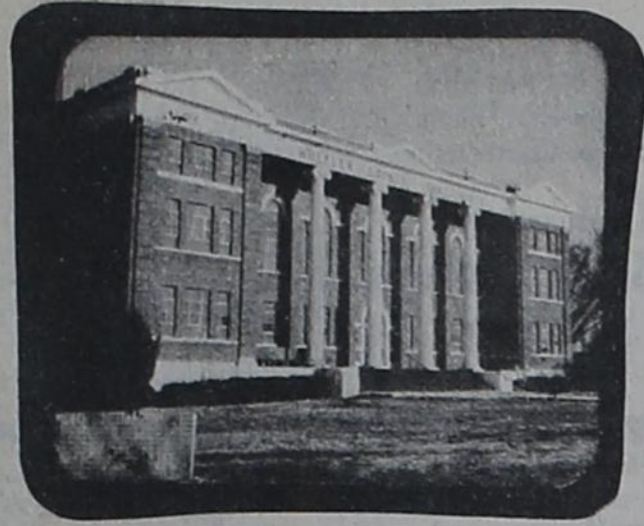

## Baker Automotive Has Been Burglarized

During the night Saturday, Baker Automotive was burglarized and an estimated \$340 in cash was taken. Entry was gained through the back door. The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department investigated the incident.

According to Sheriff Miller, tracks indicated each door back door between the Post Office and Speedi-Mart had been tried. Footprints showed each door to have been approached. The back door to Baker Automotive was the only one where entry was attempted.

Sheriff Miller reports the department has some clues and the investigation continues.

This is the second time Baker Automotive has been burglarized. Some \$2,000 in tools was taken four years ago. This burglary was solved and the tools recovered.

## Mobeetie I.S.D. Hires New Superintendent

The Mobeetie school district trustees hired a new superintendent Thursday. They hired David Malone from Chester and Itasca school.

Mobeetie school principal W.F. Howard had been acting superintendent since Bob Mickey left on Nov. 13th. Mr. Mickey had been superintendent many years and will be missed by his many friends. I had worked for Bob 13 years and hated to see him go.

Mr. Malone will begin his duties on Dec. 15th. After screening 21 applicants the trustees hired Mr. Malone 49 yrs. of age with a salary of \$33,420 per year plus \$200.00 per mo. vehicle allotment and \$200.00 utilities. He will live in the residence owned by the school.

Mr. Mickey 58 resigned after contesting the boards decision to cut his salary from \$46,646 to \$33,120. Mr. Mickey appealed the decrease to the Texas Commission on Education but attorney's reached a compromise to pay Mr. Mickey \$2,254 per month for September and October (the difference between his reduced salary and his previous salary).

Mr. Mickey left on Nov. 13th, and is now doing teacher appraisals for a private teachers evaluation firm.

**What's Up Doc?**  
**Estrogen Replacement**

**Question:**  
 Doctor, I recently had a Hysterectomy and my ovaries were removed. Do I need to be on some type of hormone replacement?

**Answer:**

This is a very common problem and applies to every woman at some time during her life. Estrogen is a female hormone and is made in the ovaries. When these are removed or stop functioning after child bearing years, the body needs an outside source of estrogen. Most women will experience some symptoms when there is not enough estrogen. The most common of these is "Hot Flashes". Personalities may also change significantly. Estrogen serves some very useful purposes for women besides for reproduction. Estrogen almost totally protects against heart disease until about 50 years of age, when it decreases. Bones are kept strong by estrogen, and many skin changes occur when estrogen is inadequate. All of these processes can be slowed by replacing estrogen. It is taken once each day. Recently, many doctors are also recommending that progesterone be given for part of the month. It is also very helpful for bones if a calcium supplement is added to the diet. Indeed, in women, many of the processes of aging can be slowed by the replacement of deficient estrogen.

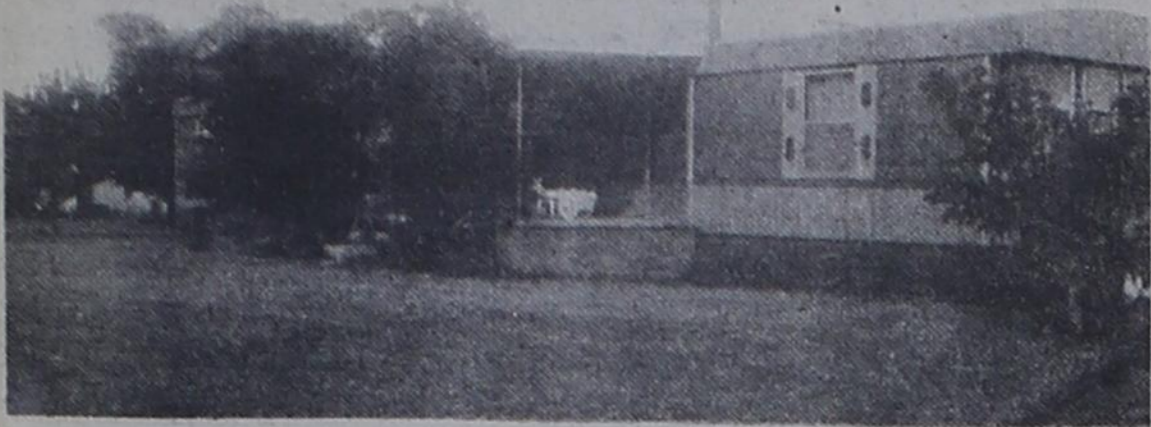
