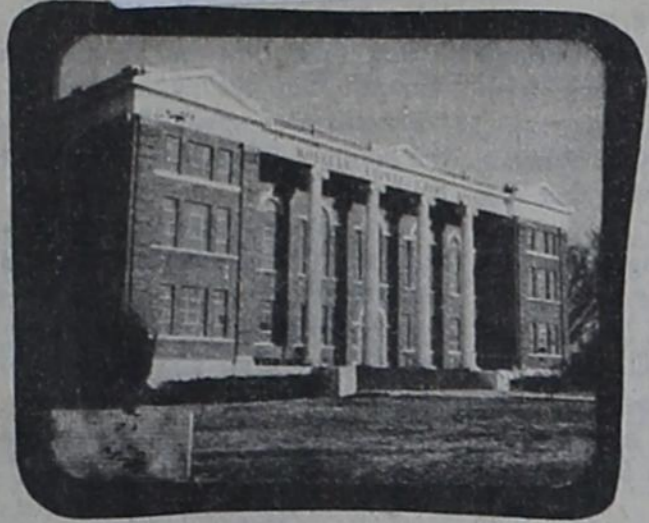

The Wheeler Mustangs continue to roll on in the '86 state football playoffs and are now in the quarter-finals after sending the Wilson Mustangs to the basketball court with a convincing 21-0 win last Friday night.

A Childress Fair Park crowd saw the Mustangs capitalize on a couple of big pass plays and their patented black death defense was too much for the Mustangs from Wilson to overcome.

It was evident from the opening kickoff that Wilson's lack of any kind of speed was going to be a big factor in the game and the Mustangs coaching staff had prepared accordingly.

Knowing that it was going to be tough inside, Wheeler ran more sweeps and pitchouts than at any time during the season and it paid off as three of Wheeler's backs gained over 50 yards with most of it coming outside.

Wheeler made the first down after receiving the opening kickoff before Danny Benefield fumbled at the Wheeler 44 where Justin Bednarz recovered for Wilson. Wilson's lack of speed showed quickly, and probably a good thing for Wheeler, as Bednarz

broke off his right tackle into the clear at the 40 but was overtaken at the 18 by linemen Stephen Meadows and Hale Hughes.

A Corbett Foster 33 yard field goal try sailed to the left and Wilson saw their first of two penetrations of the Wheeler 20 in the game go for naught.

Taking over on their 20 for their second possession, Wheeler set their offensive tone for the game. On second down, Grayson Benson swept left end for the 16 yards and two plays later, Cody Wiggins took a pitch around right end for 20 yards.

From the Wilson 39, Augie Hennard hit tight end David Jones for 26 big yards down to the Wilson 13. Two plays later Bubba Smith circled right end from the 13 and with Richard Smith booting the extra point, Wheeler was ahead 7-0 with 3:08 to play in the first quarter.

The Mustangs from Wheeler completely dominated play the rest of the first half. In fact, Wilson made no more first downs, only one in the half, and only made 49 yards total in the first two quarters.

Wheeler To Face Sunray In Quarterfinals Friday

Back on October 24th, little thought was given to the fact that they might face each other again when the Wheeler Mustangs came from behind and whipped the Sunray Bobcats 28-19 but that time is here this week.

The Mustangs have reached the quarterfinal game against the Bobcats by winning three games in the playoffs, two by shutouts, with the last being the 21-0 win over Wilson last Friday night in Childress. Sunray's regional win came last Saturday night in Levelland as they pummeled Wink to the tune of 40-6.

Only eight Class A teams remain in the hunt for the coveted state championship and two of them are from District 1-1A North and they will clash

in Pampa Friday night at Harvester Field at 7:30.

Both clubs come into the rematch with identical 11-2 records for the season and both suffered only one loss in zone play. Wheeler defeated the Bobcats and Booker but the one blemish on the Mustang's record. That is how even the ball clubs have been and are and a classic contest should be in store for the fans in Pampa.

Reaching this stage in the playoffs is nothing new for Wheeler as they have gotten to the finals three straight years back in the 70's, winning two state championships. The Mustangs have notched 101 wins on the gridiron the past ten seasons, a feat accom-

plished by only a few teams in Texas high school football.

"Sunray is a much better ball club now than when we beat them earlier but I think we are better also," Coach Preston Smith said after watching the Bobcats level Wink. Wink thought they had a chance to beat Sunray but look what happened."

The Bobcats are still led by quarterback Steve Moore and running back Joe Ely. Moore rushed for 115 yards in the Bobcats loss to Wheeler and Ely pounded out 95 in the Sunray rushing total of 256 yards.

Wheeler played the first Sunray game without the services of either Dicky Salyer or Bubba Smith. Salyer saw his first action of the year, since

sustaining a knee injury in the opening win over Shamrock, last week against Wilson when he was put into defensive action about a third of the game. "Dicky has done really well in his rehabilitation but we don't know when he can go on offense," Smith said.

Whoever wins Friday night's game will play the winner of the Baird-Throckmorton battle in next week's

Chamber to Sponsor 'Cash' Drawings

Drawing Time Remains 2:30; 58 Wheeler Shoppers To Share In Winnings

The Annual Christmas Drawing will again be offered by the progressive merchants of Wheeler. Certificates will be given away during December to the tune of \$1500. The merchants of Wheeler feel this is one way they can thank you, their customers for the support you have given them during the year and are giving you a chance to share the profits.

Drawing tickets have been available since Friday, November 28, at sponsoring businesses. A complete list of

merchants, both those giving tickets and those not giving tickets is shown below.

Four drawings will be held this year—three Saturdays before Christmas and Wednesday, Christmas Eve. The drawings will each begin at 2:30 P.M.

Fifty-eight people will share in the \$1500. The Wheeler Merchants will give away \$300 at the first drawing; \$400 will be given away at each of the remaining drawings.

On Saturday, December 6, the \$300 will be divided: 10-\$10, 4-\$25 and 2-\$50. Those fortunate enough to have their names drawn from the hopper will be handed envelopes containing script in the amount of their winnings; the script is in \$5 denominations and can be spent at any of the businesses participating in the drawing.

On December 13, 20 and 24, \$400 will be given away at each drawing. On each of the Saturdays, the money will be divided for seventeen people to share; the division will be 10-\$10, 4-\$25, 2-\$50 and 1-\$100. On Christmas Eve, eight people will be lucky; they will share 4-\$25, 2-\$50 and 2-\$100 envelopes.

You will receive one ticket per each dollar purchase—up to a maximum of \$500.



Elderly Homeowners Can Postpone Paying Delinquent Taxes

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Copeland said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral

affidavit with the court in which suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Copeland said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives at that homestead.

Copeland stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delin-

quent penalties and interest continue to add up, she said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax, penalty and interest."

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a naty public," Copeland said. What's Up Doc?

Question: Blood Pressure
Doctor, I have recently run out of my blood pressure medicine and haven't been to see the doctor to get it refilled. Is it really necessary that I continue to take this?

Answer:
High Blood Pressure, or Hypertension, is a very common problem. It is usually defined as a pressure greater than 150/90. There are several causes that can be corrected with surgery, but in most cases other treatments are indicated. In general, there are no symptoms associated with Hypertension. The problem lies with complications that develop over years of high blood pressure. The more pressure the heart has to pump against, the more it becomes stretched out of shape and can't do its job. This eventually leads to Congestive Heart Failure. (Inability to pump an adequate quantity of blood.) Hypertension increases your risk for having a heart attack (Myocardial Infarction) and damages blood vessels, eliminating adequate circulation. Several organs, such as the kidneys, are damaged by Hypertension. The most sudden, severe complication is in the form of a stroke or rupture of an Aneurysm.

There are many ways to treat High Blood Pressure. Decreasing salt intake, weight loss, and medications are the most common. Several medications have recently been developed that can be taken once each day, and one THD can be applied as a skin

patch once weekly. Hypertension usually needs to be treated for life. Proper treatment can virtually eliminate the harmful effects.

Reye's Syndrome
Question:
Doctor, my child was running a fever recently and a neighbor told me not to give aspirin. Can you explain why?

Answer:
There are several viruses that have been associated with a complication known as Reye's Syndrome after 2 to 3 days of upper respiratory disease. The child begins to have significant nausea, vomiting, and continues into a coma with seizures. 50% of these children die. When children with one of these viruses is given Aspirin, his chances of developing Reye's Syndrome increases significantly. So, since it is difficult to pinpoint the cause of fever immediately, we assume that it could be a virus and never give Aspirin. Reye's Syndrome is rare, but it is all too common if it develops in your child. Tylenol (Acetaminophen) works as well as Aspirin for fevers. So, never give a child Aspirin for fever.
