# Hey You, How About Helping Campaign?

Letters were mailed out this week to all Eastland citizens by the Civic League and Garden Club urging the cooperation of everyone in making this year's Spring Clean-Up Campaign a success.

The explanatory letter announced that the City will offer special trash pick-up service during the week April 4-9. A three point check-list was also suggested:

Beautification—Check on the need for painting houses, renewing screens, repairing fences. Now is the time for planting seeds and perennials. It is not too late for pruning trees and removing dead wood.

Safety—Give attention to pruning trees and shrubs which create dangerous blind corners. Remove fire hazards and dangerous objects which might injure children.

Health—Destroy noxious weeds such as ragweed and johnson grass. Clear out breeding places of flies and mosquitoes.

Here is a copy of the letter mailed out to local citizens:

The time has come again for the annual Spring Clean-Up Campaign in Eastland sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club and Rotary Club, with the cooperation of the City.

As this is the only time of year the City can offer special pick-up service, we know you will want to take advantage of this service and do a real renovating job on your house and surrounding grounds during the week of April 4 through April 9. City pick-up will start at 8 a.m. April 11, 1960. Since there will be no street designation as to days for pick-up this year, all rubbish must be out by April 9 to insure pick-up. Return trips for pick-up to any area will not be authorized.

In order to cover the city more thoroughly this year, we would like to call your attention to clean-up of vacant buildings and lots. Let's make our city attractive to newcomers and visitors.

Your response and cooperation concerning this campaign in the past has been very gratifying. With citizens of Eastland always striving to make our city a better place in which to live, from a standpoint of beautification, health and safety, we are contributing greatly to the welfare of our community.

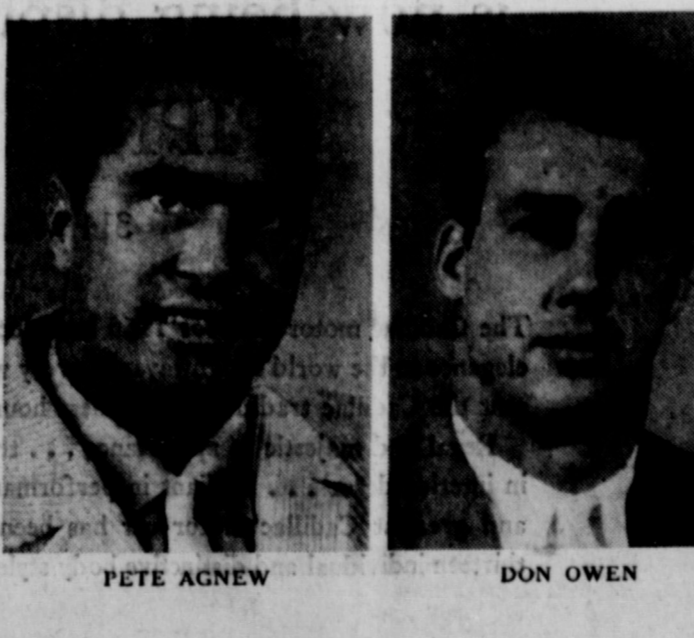

# Captains Are Named for Eastland Cancer Drive

Mrs. R. L. Carpenter, Eastland chairman for this year's American Cancer Society fund drive, today named seven captains to head the 1960 campaign in Eastland.

Captains are Mrs. Cecil Gollings, Mrs. D. J. Fiensey, Mrs. Charles E. Beakow, Mrs. B. O. Harrell, H. R. Garrett, Miss Lupie Parano and Garland Washington.

Mrs. Carpenter, in announcing the campaign, said that there are now a million Americans alive who have been cured of cancer. Twenty years ago there were only 180,000.

The Society considers "cured" only those alive and without evidence of the disease five years following diagnosis and treatment. By this standard, it is estimated that an additional 600,000 cancer patients diagnosed and treated within the last five years will live to enter the ranks of those cured. This means that today there are actually 1,600,000 men, women and children cured of cancer, although 600,000 will not formally be counted until five years from the time of treatment.

Twenty years ago, only one out of seven who developed cancer was saved. Ten years ago, it was one out of four. Today it is one out of three. It is estimated that 165,000 Americans will be saved from cancer this year.

This is good news indeed. But, unfortunately, there also is bad news, Mrs. Carpenter stated.

The dark side of the picture

shows that 85,000 men, women, and children will die needlessly of cancer this year because their cancers will not be diagnosed in time and promptly treated. It is possible to save half of all those who develop cancer through early diagnosis and proper treatment.

But the good news in cancer control is not the result of accident. It has come about through cancer research and education. More and more men and women are having annual health check-ups as the best possible protection against cancer at the urging

of the American Cancer Society. "Let us cut down on the bad news and increase the good news by supporting the 1960 Crusade of the American Cancer Society. Guard your family—Fight Cancer With a Checkup and a Check," the chairman urged.

## Eastland County Saving Bonds Ahead of Goal

An increase of 4 percent in February marked the second time this year that Savings Bond sales in Texas have been greater than sales in the same month in 1959 according to Guy Parker, Chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee.

February sales in Texas totaled \$15,506,998. Sales for the first two months of this year amounted to \$32,044,765 or 19.4 percent of the 1960 goal. Total bond purchases in Eastland County for January and February were \$75,775 which represents 30.7 percent of the 1960 county goal.

## Census Takers to Wear Cards for Identification

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying the takers of the 1960 Census of Population and Housing when they start their rounds on April 1. District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder pointed out today.

Each census taker will be provided with a red, white, and blue identification card to be worn on the lapel. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. Persons purporting to be Census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local district Census office which is located at Abilene.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is brown and bears the legend, "1960 Census of the United States," printed in green ink. In the portfolio, the census taker carries his supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools of his trade.

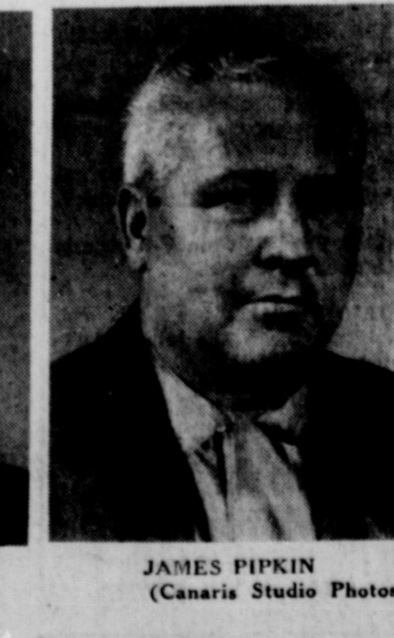

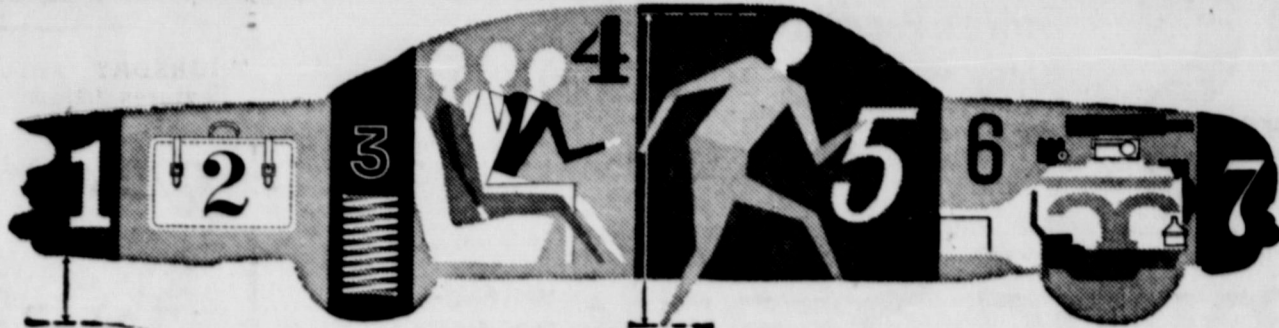
