ORDINANCE NO. 46.

An ordinance authorizing the issuance of City Hall Bonds of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and providing for their payment, principal and interest:

Whereas, at an election held for the purpose on the 30th day of August, 1900, a majority of the qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, voting at said election, sustained the proposition to issue the bonds of said city, to the amount of Five Thousand Dollars, for the purpose of completing the City Hall, now in course of construction in said city, and

Whereas, it now appears to the City Council of said city that the present taxable values of said city, will not authorize the issuance of bonds to the amount of Five Thousand Dollars, but that bonds to the amount of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars can be lawfully issued, Therefore be it ordained by the city council of the said city of Amarillo, Texas, that the bonds of said city to be called City of Amarillo, City Hall bonds, be issued under and by virtue of article 486 revised statutes of the State of Texas, 1896, and also under Chapter 149, laws of 1899, page 268, for the purpose of completing the city hall, now in course of construction within said city.

Said bonds shall be numbered consecutively from one to five inclusive and shall be of denominations of \$1000 each, except number 5, which shall be of the denomination of \$500, aggregating \$4500. They shall be dated the 1st day of October, 1900, shall become due and payable 20 years from their date, but may be redeemed by the city at any time after five years from their date.

They shall bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable annually on the first day of October of each year. Principal and interest shall be payable upon presentation of bond and proper coupon, in lawful money of the United States, at National Park Bank, in the city and State of New York. Said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and counter-signed by the City Secretary, and shall bear impress of the seal of the City of Amarillo, Texas, on each of them. The coupons attached to have the signature of the Mayor and the City Secretary of said city.

It is further ordained by said City Council, that to pay the interest on said bonds, and create a sinking fund sufficient to discharge them at maturity, a tax of 8 1/3 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property in said city of Amarillo, shall be annually levied on said property and annually assessed and collected until said bonds with interest are paid, and the said tax of 8 1/3 cents on the \$100 out of a tax of 25 cents, levied in an ordinance authorizing \$9000 city hall bonds, passed January 26th, 1900, is hereby appropriated and set aside to pay interest and create the necessary sinking fund for the current year and shall be assessed and collected, and so applied, and said tax is hereby levied for each year hereafter while said bonds are outstanding, and the same shall be annually assessed and collected and applied to the purpose named.

It is also ordered that Mayor R. L. Stringfellow be authorized to take and have charge of said bonds pending their investigation by the Attorney General, and upon their approval shall have authority to negotiate their sale, and receive for the city the proceeds thereof.

That Ordinance No. 44, passed by this Council on the third day of September, 1900, and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance shall be in full force from and after its passage. Passed the 26th day of September, 1900. Approved 26th day of Sept. 1900.
