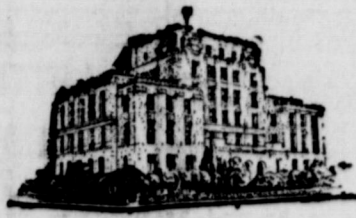

The next evening that you find time on your hands and maybe the TV is on the blink, why don't you round up the wife and kiddos and take a drive out to the Lake Leon dam. A spectacular view can be observed from the dam at dusk — when lights from all of the cabins, fishing

adapters and boat docks wink on. Lake Leon is its short nine years of existence has gained statewide and even National fame for its facilities for family relaxation.

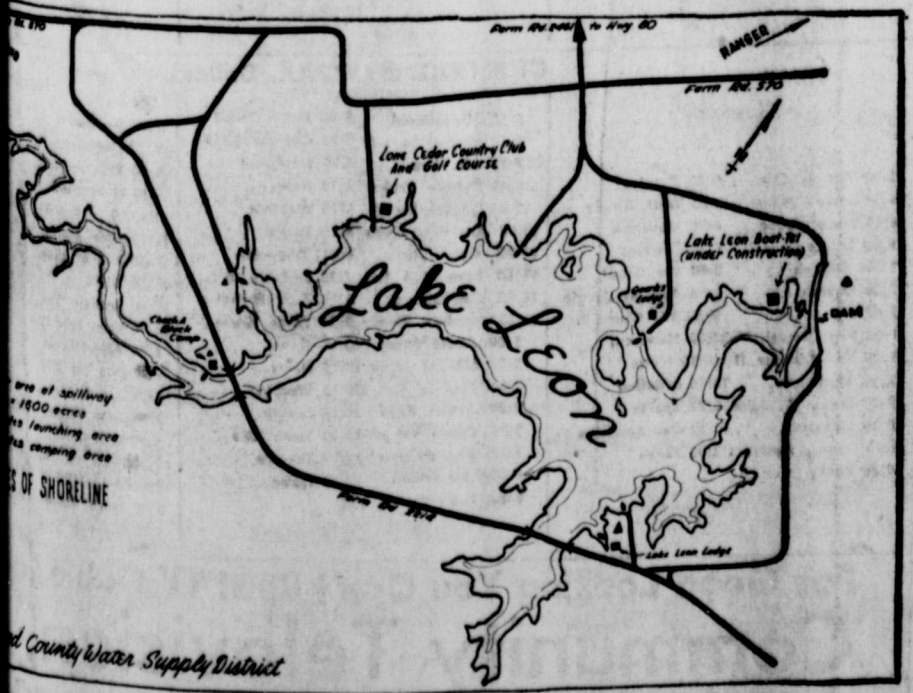

Dear Editor, The favorite past time of the last few weeks seems to have been the discussion of why John Tower, a Republican, defeated Wm. A. Blakley, a Democrat.

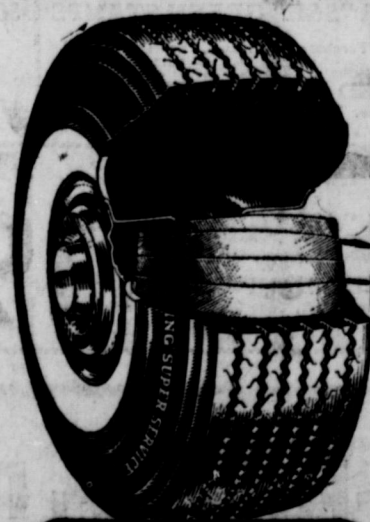

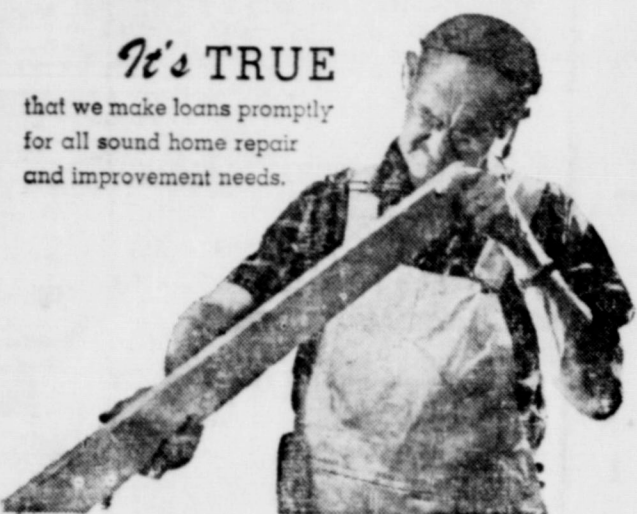
